VISITS OF H.M. AND H.M.A. SHIPS AND FOREIGN MEN-OF-WAR TO AUSTRALIAN PORTS.

1. The reporting of movements of H.M. and H.M.A. Ships is dealt with in Navy Order No. 268/1921.

2. The movements of Foreign Men-of-war are reported by Customs Officers to the Navy Office, Melbourne. These Officers also inform the Senior Naval Officer of the port at which they are stationed.

3. Future movements of H.M. and H.M.A. Ships and Foreign Men-of-war are promulgated by the Navy Office and/or Reporting Authorities to those Senior Naval Officers concerned.

4. The Senior Naval Officer of the port at which a war vessel is expected to arrive is to forward the following details as they become known to him :-

- (i) Name (or names) of ship (or ships).
- (ii) Expected time of arrival.
- (iii) Actual time of arrival.
- (iv) Expected time of departure.
- (v) Berth (or berths).
- (vi) Time convenient for official calls (if requested)

to the following officials, if stationed at or in residence at his port, and if visits of ceremony are involved :-

- (a) Official Secretary, H.E. the Governor-General.
- (b) Private Secretary, H.E. the State Governor.
- (c) Secretary, Prime Minister's Department.
- (d) Secretary, State Premier.
- (e) Chief Justice, Commonwealth.
- (f) Chief Justice, State.
- (g) Right Hon. Lord Mayor, or Mayor.
- (h) Senior Naval Officer, Afloat.
- (j) Secretary, Defence Department (Military).
- (k) Staff Officer, Base Commandant, or Senior Military Officer.
- (1) Consul for the country to which a Foreign Man-of-war belongs.

5. At Sydney the Commodore Superintendent will carry out these duties. At all other ports the District Naval Officer or Sub-District Naval Officer stationed at the port is responsible.

6. The procedure for naval visits of ceremony at Melbourne will be found in Navy Order No. 247/1921.

SPECIAL PACKING CASE FOR CLOTHING.

A new pattern packing case for Clothing will shortly be issued from Royal Edward Victualling Yard. It will be described on the Supply Note as "Case, Special," and is to be taken on charge in the Clothing Account at the Victualling Yard, on board H.M.A. Ships, and at Naval Establishments, in a separate column headed "Cases, Special." It is to be accounted for by H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments only by return to the Victualling Yard. The case is to be opened by cutting the iron bands on one side, and, when emptied, the lid is to be replaced, the bands renailed, and the case and lid returned to the Yard. On no account are nails to be driven into the lids of these cases.

- 3. Opportunity is to be taken of free freight for transport of these cases when ready for return to Royal Edward Victualling Yard. When H.M.A. ships are in port at Sydney, the cases should be emptied as early as convenient, and returned to the Victualling Yard as expeditiously as possible, and in all instances where practicable prior to departure from the port. AMENDMENTS OF FINANCIAL REGULATIONS (SEA-GOING).

The following amendments of Financial Regulations (Sea-going) have been approved :-

Article 6 is amended as from 1st July, 1920-

(1) by inserting immediately after the word "uniform" in the seventh line of clause (6) the words :-

> " Petty Officers dressed as Seamen on transfer to Regulating Petty Officer shall similarly be paid a gratuity of £15."

- (2) by omitting the words "A gratuity of £5" in the eighth line of clause (6), and inserting in their stead the words "A gratuity
- (3) by omitting the words "A gratuity of £5" in the eleventh and twelfth lines of clause (6), and inserting in their stead the words " A gratuity of £15."
- 2. Article 6 is amended as from 1st April, 1921, or as otherwise stated therein-
 - (1) by omitting clause (1) and inserting in its stead new clause (1) to read as follows :-
 - (1) Kit Upkeep Allowance-Kit Upkeep Allowance shall be granted to ratings as follows :-

Class I.—Free Kit on entry, and allowance of 1s. 4d. per diem commencing from date of entry.

Class II.—Free Kit on entry, and allowance of 1s. per diem commencing from date of entry.

Class III.—Free Kit on entry, and allowance of 1s. 3d. per diem commencing from date of entry.

Kit Upkeep Allowance shall be credited on the Ship's ledger in cash, and included in the fortnightly payments. Kit Upkeep Allowance shall continue to be credited during periods of detention. In all other cases where Deferred Pay is not credited, vide Financial Regulations, Article 12, Clause 6, Kit Upkeep Allowance shall also be stopped for the same period. Kit Upkeep Allowance is, as from 1st December, 1921, subject to reduction when ratings are in receipt of reduced pay in accordance with Article 43.

(2) by omitting clause (6), and inserting in its stead new clause (6) to read as follows :-

- (6) Outfit Gratuities on change of Class of Uniform-The following Outfit Gratuities shall be paid, in addition to the Kit Upkeep Allowance, to all ratings who are obliged to change their uniform from Class II. to Class I. or Class III., and from Class III. to Class II.-
 - (a) To Petty Officers dressed as Seamen on promotion £23 to Chief Petty Officer
 - (b) To Petty Officers, with 4 year's service as such, required to change from Class III. to Class III. uniform (as prescribed in Navy Orders 1921, No. 11) ...

(c) To other men and boys on transfer to ratings for which a change of uniform to Class III, is required

(d) To other men and boys on transfer to ratings for which a change of uniform to Class II. is required

When a man or boy is transferred owing to unsuitability for the rating held to another rating involving change in class of uniform, he is to be paid an Outfit Gratuity as prescribed in sub-paragraphs (c) or (d) above, but the articles in the compulsory kit of his former rating no longer required in the rating to which he is transferred shall be sold. The proceeds of such sale shall be brought to account in the Ship's Cash Accounts as a credit to "Navy Revenue." No Outfit Gratuity shall be paid when the transfer in rating is attributable to misconduct.

In addition to the gratuity payable under the subparagraph (a) of this clause, a further gratuity of £10 towards the cost of frock coat and sword shall be paid to Master-at-Arms on promotion.

3. Article 80 is amended, as from 1st January, 1921, by inserting at the end of each of the Kits for Class I., Class II., and Class III. ratings, the following :-

" 1 Bed.

1 Blanket.

2 Bed Covers."

- 4. Article 80 is further amended, as from 1st February, 1921-
 - (1) by inserting at the end of the kit for Class I. ratings :-" Optional Kit-

1 Waterproof Coat (Pegamoid or similar pattern).

1 pair Half Boots (in addition to 1 pair in compulsory kit) or Shoes.

1 pair Black Leather Slippers."

(2) by omitting from the kit of Class II. ratings-

"2 pairs Half Boots .. To be issued to Stoker ratings and all new entries sent to Flinders Naval Depôt for training."

(3) by inserting at the end of the kit for Class II. ratings-

" Optional Kit-

On and from 1st April, 1921, the provisions of Article 1394 of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions are applicable to the Royal Australian

The following amendments of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) have been approved accordingly, with effect as from 1st April, 1921:-

1. Insert, immediately after Article 8, new heading and Article 8A to read as follows :-

Pay for Performing Higher Duties-Officers. Article 8a .- When Accountant Officer is absent-

When the Accountant Officer (the rank allowed by complement being not below Paymaster Lieutenant-Commander) is absent from the ship continuously for upwards of three months otherwise than on leave, the Paymaster Lieutenant, Paymaster Sub-Lieutenant, or Paymaster Midshipman performing his duty, although not holding an acting order as Paymaster Lieutenant-Commander, may, on the approval of the Naval Board, be granted additional pay; but the special remuneration thus granted shall not exceed the difference between the officer's own rate of pay and the lowest rate of pay for a Paymaster Lieutenant-Commander. A full report of the circumstances shall be made to the Naval Board in order that the rate pavable may be decided.

2. Insert immediately after Article 9 new heading to read as follows :-

> Pay for Performing Higher Duties-Petty Officers and Other Ratings.

Article 9a. - When Senior Rating is absent-

Where a Senior Rating is absent for a period of fourteen or more consecutive days through sickness or on duty, and the consequent vacancy cannot be filled by drafting, the rating required to perform the higher duties of the Senior Rating may be paid the difference between his rate of Active and Deferred Pay received in the lower rating and the corresponding minimum rates prescribed for the higher rating.

Payment shall not be made in respect of employment elsewhere in the ship without prior Naval Board sanction, and shall be confined to periods during which steam is raised or internal combustion engines are in use, or when galley fires are burning.

PURCHASE OF FRESH PROVISIONS BY H.M.A. NAVAL ESTABLISHMENTS AND STATIONARY SHIPS.

- (c) Orders are to be prepared on Form A.S. 1046z, in duplicate, and signed by the Accountant Officer, one copy being forwarded to the Contractor and the duplicate retained. Receipt of the provisions to be noted on the duplicate.
- (d) Order forms A.S. 1046z are to be returned by the Contractor at the end of each month, attached to the claim.
- (e) Details of actual supplies, as per claim, to be inserted on requisition, and the necessary adjustment made in the Register of Liabilities.
- (f) A covering order (Treasury Form 19) is to be prepared for quantities actually supplied as shown on the approved requisition at end of each month.
- (g) Before certifying claim, the Certifying Officer is to attach the covering order to the requisition.
- (h) The usual notations regarding the passing of the account are to be made on the order forms and on the requisition, Circular Letter No. 252 being complied with, excepting that orders for fresh provisions will be prepared on Form A.S. 1046z and a covering order on Treasury Form 19 at the end of each month.

ECONOMY IN EXPENDITURE.

In view of the financial position and of the necessity for rigid economy, the Minister has directed that every possible effort must be made to reduce expenditure to the lowest possible limit consistent with efficiency.

The Naval Board, therefore, direct that all responsible officers, Naval and Civil, enforce strict economy in the expenditure of public money or stores, and also direct that careful attention is to be given to this matter by every officer concerned.

ENGINE-ROOM DEPARTMENT INTERCHANGE OF DUTIES.

The attention of Engineer Officers is called to the desirability of making periodical changes in the duties of Stokers and other Engine-room ratings.

- While recognising the value of interchange of duties as tending to improve the general efficiency of the personnel, the efficient organization of the Engine-room Department must necessarily remain the first consideration.
- 3. The work of the Engine-room Department should be allotted in such a manner as will best insure it being efficiently performed by the officers and men of the Department, so that each may know definitely the duties for which he is personally responsible. It is observed that interchange of duties, if effected with undue frequency, would be liable to impair the efficiency of the Department.

RAILWAY JOURNEYS IN NEW ZEALAND.

Arrangements have been entered into whereby officers and men of the R.A.N. required to travel on duty over the New Zealand Government Railways will be issued with necessary tickets upon presentation of the usual form of R.A.N. Railway Warrant.

2. As claims for reimbursement of cost of tickets so issued are required to be settled direct with the New Zealand Treasury, all railway warrants issued for journeys in New Zealand should be indorsed, in the space provided on the warrant, to insure that the warrant, together with the account, will be forwarded to the Director of Navy Accounts, Navy Office, Melbourne, for settlement.

3. The following amendment to Consolidated Navy Orders 1911-20, Appendix II. (as amended by Navy Order 451 of 1921), has been approved accordingly:—

Two separate warrants are required, one for the forward and another for the return journey. Warrants are to be indorsed for transmission with the account to the Director of Navy Accounts, Navy Office, Melbourne, for settlement."

MISCELLANEOUS EMPLOYEES IN NAVAL SHORE ESTABLISHMENTS.

It is the intention that all positions in Naval Establishments for Messengers and Caretakers, and other similar posts which can suitably be reserved for ex-Naval ratings, should be filled by former members of the Naval Forces, and that such employees should, in future, be duly attested as members of the Auxiliary Services, being subject to the Regulations attaching thereto.

- 2. No such casual employees should, in future, be engaged for a longer period than six weeks, as provided in Regulation 8 (c) of the Naval Financial Regulations.
- 3. A roster, showing the names of ex-Naval ratings who are applicants for employment in the Auxiliary Services, is kept in the office of the D.N.R.M., Navy Office, Melbourne. This roster includes ex-Naval ratings residing in all States of the Commonwealth.

When a vacancy requires to be filled, application should be made to the D.N.R.M. giving particulars of the position in question, and stating class of rating it is considered would be most suitable for the position. The D.N.R.M. will furnish a list of the names and particulars of applicants available from whom the respective Commanding Officer or Head of Department can select a suitable man. After selection has been made, the applicant should be referred, with the necessary Financial Authority, to the District Naval Officer, who will take the necessary action to finalize his engagement, in accordance with the Regulations for the Auxiliary Services.

4. All miscellaneous employees now serving in positions of the kind indicated above which can suitably be filled by members of the Auxiliary Services, and who, by virtue of former service in the Naval Forces, are eligible for entry in the Auxiliary Services, provided their services are required for a further three months or more, should, unless otherwise directed by the Naval Board, be attested as members of the Auxiliary Services, and placed on consolidated rates of pay, according to their present status and salary. Finance authority for the proposed grade and salary should be obtained from the Navy Office before final attestation takes place.

- 3. PAYMENT OF ALLOWANCE FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF HIGHER DUTIES—PERMANENT CIVIL OFFICERS (OFFICE STAFF).

Amendment (3), promulgated in Navy Order 520/1921, is cancelled, and the following substituted:—

"Paragraph 8 is cancelled and the following substituted, with effect from 1st April, 1921, except as regards that portion after the words 'higher duties' in the fourth line of sub-paragraph (b), which will take effect from 3rd December, 1921—

An officer who is in receipt of an allowance for the performance of higher duties shall have his allowance suspended during any period of cessation of performances of the higher duties, except as provided hereunder:—

- (a) Where an officer in receipt of the allowance has performed the higher duties for twelve months continuously, and is granted sick leave for a period not exceeding two weeks in any twelve months, he is to receive the allowance whilst on sick leave, provided that on returning from leave he again takes up the higher duties; also provided that any absence, except on recreation leave, emergency leave, or leave granted to an officer under Commonwealth Public Service Regulation 88 to enable him to fulfil the course of training prescribed by the Defence Act, during the period of twelve months from the date of taking up the higher duties, should not be counted in arriving at the date on which the officer becomes eligible for sick leave of absence at the higher rate.
- (b) Where an officer in receipt of the allowance is granted recreation leave or emergency leave, payment of the allowance will be continued during the officer's absence, provided that on returning from leave he again takes up the higher duties. Where an officer in receipt of the allowance is granted leave with pay under Commonwealth Public Service Regulation 88 to enable him to fulfil the course of training prescribed by the Defence Act, payment of the allowance will be continued during the officer's absence, and if his pay on account of Naval or Military training is less than his ordinary civil pay, he will be entitled to receive the difference plus allowance, provided that payment of the higher duty allowance should not be continued beyond the date the officer would have ceased to perform the higher duties had he not been absent."

AMENDMENT OF FINANCIAL REGULATIONS (SEA-GOING)— WARRANT OFFICERS WHOSE PROMOTION ENTAILS PECUNIARY LOSS—RATES OF PAY.

As regards the possibility of pecuniary loss by a rating on promotion to Warrant Officer, cases arising will be dealt with on similar lines to those laid down in Admiralty Monthly Order 3335 of 1920, and a special rate of pay granted.

Article 4 of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) is amended accordingly with effect as from 1st May, 1921, by adding immediately after the Scales of Pay in clause (3), as amended by Navy Order 183 of 1921, new paragraph to read as follows:—

In order to conform to the practice in the Royal Navy in regard to the payment of Store Allowances, which has recently been modified by Admiralty Fleet Order 3090 of 1921, the following amendments of Navy Order No. 395/1921 are approved to come into operation forthwith:—

The note included in paragraph VI. is omitted, and the following paragraph is inserted in its stead:—

" VII.—CHARGE.

"In all vessels in commission, including sloops, yachts, gunboats, &c., where a gunner is borne, that Officer is to have charge of the Naval Ordnance Stores and Explosives.

"In sloops and other vessels in which a combined account for all Warrant Officers' Stores is now being rendered, the Naval Ordnance Stores are to be transferred forthwith to the gunner where one is borne.

"In the case of sloops of the classes mentioned in Financial Regulations (Sea-going) Article 8 clause (8) (f), the gunner will be paid an allowance of 6d. per diem when the vessel is in sea-going commission and 3d. per diem when the vessel is out of of commission but fully stored.

"This extra allowance to the gunner will not be held to entail a reduction of the allowance paid to the Officer who renders the combined account, and, conversely, where a gunner is not borne this Order is not to be regarded as authority for increasing the allowance now authorized for the combined account."

(14) An Officer on the Retired or Emergency List called up for duty in time of war or national emergency shall receive pay and allowances at the rates prescribed for an Officer of corresponding rank in the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going), Deferred Pay being paid with Active Pay, provided that-

(a) an Officer who has been promoted after being placed on the Emergency List shall receive the full pay and allowances prescribed for

the higher rank:

and

(b) unemployed time on the Retired or Emergency List shall not count towards increments in

full pay governed by seniority.

(15) An officer on the Emergency List voluntarily reemployed in time of peace shall receive pay and allowances at the rates prescribed for an Officer of corresponding rank in the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going) provided that-

(a) unemployed time on the Emergency List shall not count towards increments in pay ;

and

(b) deferred pay shall not be payable."

2. Article 6 is amended, as from 1st July, 1921, by adding, immediately after clause (7A), new clauses (7B) and (7c), to read as follow :-

" (7B) Equipment Allowance to Officers on the Emergency List .- An Officer on the Emergency List voluntarily re-employed in the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going) may be granted an Equipment Allowance at the rate set forth in the subjoined scale, provided that-

(a) no allowance will be granted if less than three (3) years have elapsed between the date of the Officer's resignation from the Active List and the date of his re-

employment;

and

(b) an Officer may be paid Equipment Allowance once only within any period of five (5) years-

(7c) Outfit Gratuity to Officers on the Emergency List. - When called up for service in time of war or national emergency, an Officer on the Emergency List will receive the Outfit Gratuity of £30 under the same conditions set forth in this Article for Officers appointed for temporary service in the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going).

3. Article 14 is repealed, and the heading thereof omitted, as from 1st July, 1921, and the following article and heading are inserted in their stead respectively :-

"ARTICLE 14-SERVICE AND PROMOTION.

Article 14-Petty Officers and Other Ratings.-All previous service in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines, or in the Navy of any other of His Majesty's Dominions, of Petty Officers and other ratings serving in the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going) shall be allowed to count, as if served in the Royal Australian Navy, towards service for seniority, rates of pay and allowances and award of good conduct badges provided that the provisions of Article 9, clause (53), shall also apply in the case of good conduct badges.

4. Article 35 is amended, as from 1st December, 1920, by adding new clause (3A) immediately after clause (3), to read as follows :-

"(3A) The wives and families of members of the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going) detailed for duty at the Royal Australian Naval College may be granted medical attendance at the College, free of charge, by the Surgeon appointed for duty. This concession is conditional upon the work being carried out by the Surgeon appointed for duty at the College and subject to no additional cost being incurred by the Department.

The cost of medical attendance for confinements will not be allowed." (21/20646.)

REQUALIFICATION OF DIVERS.

A Requalifying Course for R.A.N. ratings holding the non-substantive ratings of Diver (1st and 2nd Class), and Artificer Diver will be held at Flinders Naval Depôt, Westernport, in April 1922.

- 2. A nominal list of R.A.N. ratings only, holding the non-substantive ratings of Diver (1st or 2nd Class) or Artificer Diver is to be rendered by all Ships and Establishments, to the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, Westernport, on the 1st March, 1922.
 - 3. The following particulars are to be furnished :-

(a) Whether rating is still recommended for Diver (see Diving Manual).

(b) Date of expiration of engagement. Ratings who are within two years of completion of engagement will be required to re-engage before re-qualifying, and it should be stated whether they are prepared to do so.

(c) Date of qualification as Diver, or date of requalifying.

(d) Whether the rating can be spared, with or without relief, to requalify for a period of one month.

GUNNERS' MATES CANDIDATES REQUIRED TO QUALIFY AS.

A number of ratings will shortly be required to proceed to the United Kingdom to qualify for the non-substantive rating of Gunner's Mate, and the selection will be made from ratings volunteering. Approximately six candidates will be required.

2. Candidates will be selected from Petty Officers, and Leading Seamen passed for the rating of Petty Officer. They must be prepared to re-engage for a period of seven years before embarkation, or have at least a period of seven years to serve before completing their existing engagements.

- 3. Before being permitted to proceed to the United Kingdom, candidates will be required to undergo a provisional course at the Flinders Naval Depôt, Westernport, in order to ascertain whether they have a reasonable chance of qualifying in the United Kingdom. This course will commence early in May, 1922.
- 4. Attention is drawn to the educational standard required by candidates qualifying for Gunner's Mate, vide Gunnery Training Manual 1920, O.U.5042.
- 5. Reports on Form A.S.1303 of ratings volunteering and recommended to qualify as Gunner's Mate should be forwarded forthwith direct to the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, by all Ships and Establishments, accompanied by Service Certificates.
 - 6. Blank Returns are required.

AMENDMENT OF ROYAL AUSTRALIAN FLEET RESERVE REGULATIONS.

The following amendments to the Royal Australian Fleet Reserve Regulations have been approved:—

- (1) Article 6 is repealed, and the following new Article is to be inserted in its stead:—
 - 6. Candidates for enrolment in the Fleet Reserve may apply for enrolment at any time within six months before expiration of engagement in the Royal Australian Navy, or within two years from the date of discharge. Men serving, if accepted, will be entered in the Fleet Reserve from the day following date of discharge from Active Service.
- (2) Article 21 is repealed, and the following new Article is to be inserted in its stead:—
 - 21. Royal Australian Fleet Reserve men are to be enrolled in the Active Service substantive rating (whether such rating was acting or confirmed) last held by them,
 - (2) Men who join the Fleet Reserve within one year of leaving the Active Service are to be enrolled in the non-substantive rating with which they left the Active Service except that a higher rating than Gunlayer, 2nd Class, is not to be held, and the rating of Diver is to be relinquished.
 - (3) Men who do not join the Fleet Reserve within one year of leaving the Active Service are to be enrolled in the non-substantive rating for which they may be considered fit. In no case, however, are men to hold a higher non-substantive rating than Seaman Gunner or Seaman Torpedo Man.
 - (4) In the second and subsequent periods of enrolment, men will be enrolled in the non-substantive rating for which they are reported fit, but no man is to be allowed to hold a higher rating than Seaman Gunner or Seaman Torpedo Man.
 - (5) Should a man be considered unfit to hold the rating of Seaman Gunner or Seaman Torpedo Man on re-enrolment, he is to be deprived of such rating.
- (3) The following words are to be inserted at the end of Article 43:— "(See Article 21)."

AMENDMENT OF FINANCIAL REGULATIONS (SEA-GOING)—INTEREST ON DEFERRED PAY.

The following amendments of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) have been approved with effect as from the dates shown therein, to apply to Officers and Men now serving:—

AMENDMENTS.

Article 12 is amended-

- (1) by omitting clause (2), as from 30th June, 1920, and inserting in its stead the following:—
 - "(2). Interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. shall be credited annually on the 30th June in each year on the amount of Deferred Pay standing at credit of each member on 30th June of the previous year, provided that a full year's interest shall be allowed only on amounts which have stood to the credit of member for a full year.
- (2) by adding, as from 1st March, 1922, new paragraph at the end of clause (2) to read as follows:—
 - "In the event of any member or his estate becoming entitled to receive Deferred Pay on account of discharge, expiration of engagement, resignation, death, or for any other reason, interest on the amount standing at credit on 30th June prior to discharge, resignation, death, expiration of engagement, or other reason, shall be allowed from 1st July to the end of the month in which payment of Deferred Pay becomes due."

SPECIAL STOCKTAKING OF ALL STORES ON BOARD H.M.A. SHIPS.

Recent inquiries have indicated that large surpluses of Naval Stores are carried in H.M.A. Ships without being accounted for in the Store Accounts. The Naval Board realize that the majority of these accumulations have been the result of transactions which occurred during the war period and are mostly due to the conditions of service which then prevailed.

- 2. To insure that all Government stores now on board are accounted for in the Store Accounts concerned the Naval Board direct that a special stocktaking of all Naval Stores (excluding fixtures) and Victualling, Naval Ordnance, and Medical Stores in H.M.A. Ships (including Shore Establishments) is to be held at the earliest possible opportunity. The Surveying Officers are to be appointed by Commanding Officers on the general procedure contained in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Article 1819 (b), and are not to be less than three in number unless very exceptional reasons prevail. Commanding Officers are enjoined to take all precautions to insure that a careful and accurate survey is held in all Ships and Establishments.
- 3. A report, accompanied by a statement showing surpluses and deficiencies found at stocktaking, is to be forwarded to the Secretary, Navy Office, for the information of the Naval Board, by 30th April, 1922. Any surplus stores found at stocktaking are to be taken on charge and returned to store in due course, if surplus to Ship's requirements or not allowed by establishment or not supplied with the special approval of the Naval Board.
- 4. In regard to surplus stores in Ships it is pointed out that in the past only on rare occasions have Store Accounting Officers taken on charge in their accounts surpluses so discovered. It is the Naval Board's direction that, in future, such surpluses should be entered in the accounts immediately they are located. Lax store accounting in this respect lends itself to considerable abuse.
- 5. With reference to the special stocktaking of stores referred to in paragraph 2 above, the Naval Board direct that particular attention be drawn to Navy Order No. 119/1921. Surveying Officers are in future to cause the instructions stated therein to be closely observed, as omissions in this respect may incur serious consequences. It is evident from a perusal of Store Accounts in office that in many cases important instructions contained in Navy Order No. 119/1921 have been entirely overlooked.

CHARGES FOR USE OF BILLIARD TABLES AND RESPONSIBILITY FOR REPLACEMENTS AND REPAIRS.

Rental at the rate of $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum is to be charged on the value of the first supply of billiard tables and accessories to officers' messes. Tables will not be liable to depreciation in value on periodical survey and percentage charge will be payable on the value of the first supply throughout the life of the table.

No percentage charge will be levied for the use of billiard tables supplied to men's messes. 3. No replacements, repairs, &c., will be arranged by the Department.

4. In the case of officers' messes all such repairs and replacements are to be undertaken and paid for in the first instance by the messes, and in making arrangements for these repairs and replacements steps are to be taken to insure that, as regards quality and price, the best terms are obtained.

Claims for reimbursement on account of these items to the extent of one-half of the amount of percentage paid (i.e., 3\frac{3}{4}\) per cent, per annum on the original outlay) should be forwarded into office before the close of each year, accompanied by receipted vouchers, for special authority for payment. A certificate is to be given thereon by the representative of the mess, to the effect that the table is in good order and condition. The contributions for repairs will, if desired, be allowed to accumulate for a period not exceeding four years.

5. Replacements and repairs, &c., in connexion with billiard tables and accessories supplied to men's messes are to be arranged and paid for by the Petty Officers and men using them.

VICTUALLING ACCOUNTS OF ACCOUNTANT OFFICERS LENT FROM THE ROYAL NAVY.

In many instances it has been the practice for Accountant Officers lent from the Royal Navy to take their copies of Victualling Accounts of H.M.A. Ships with them on reversion, thus causing considerable delay and difficulty in completing the audit of these accounts.

- 2. In order that any queries raised when the accounts are audited may be investigated at a later date by the staff of the Ship concerned, Accountant Officers lent from the Royal Navy are in future to deliver the duplicate R.A.N. Accounts affected to the superseding Accountant Officer in every instance. The latter Officer will be responsible for the safe custody of such accounts until the usual clearance after audit has been issued from Navy Office.
- 3. The usual practice of other Accountant Officers retaining such records for future reference is to be continued.

RECREATION LEAVE CIVIL OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES.

(a) PERMANENT STAFF.

Accumulated Leave.—In connexion with the instructions contained in paragraph 1 of Navy Order No. 53/1921, relative to accumulated recreation leave due to permanent officers and employees of the Civil Staff, the Naval Board have decided to extend the privilege of taking over accumulated leave due as at 1st January, 1922, for a further period of twelve months, viz., up to 31.12.1922. This concession will under no circumstances be extended beyond 31.12,1922, as the Board consider that Officers will thus be afforded ample time to avail themselves of leave which has accumulated owing to war conditions and pressure of work. All leave which has accumulated up to 1st January, 1922, not taken during 1922 will definitely lapse.

Heads of Branches and Establishments are therefore to make necessary arrangements to enable Officers or Employees to take accumulated leave due to them at the earliest possible date.

Leave for Current Year.—Heads of Branches and Establishments are also to make such arrangements as will allow Officers and Employees under their control leave of absence annually for recreation as provided in the Regulations. In exceptional circumstances, where it is not possible to grant leave for the current year, authority may be given for such leave to be taken in the following year in addition to the leave for such year. In all other cases, leave not taken in the year in which it accrues shall lapse.

The maximum amount of leave, therefore, which may be carried forward until 1923 is eighteen days, but this will only be permitted in cases where the exceptional circumstances stated in preceding paragraph exist.

(b) TEMPORARY EMPLOYEES.

Heads of Departments are to make necessary arrangements to permit temporary Civil Officers and Employees to take Recreation Leave as soon as possible after it becomes due. No temporary employee is to be permitted to carry forward leave from one period to the next leave period.

VICTUALLING AND CHECKING, ETC., IN SHIPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS.

With reference to Navy Order No. 262/1920, attention is again drawn to the numerous instances of "back victualling" and "back checking" which now occur, more particularly in connexion with the victualling of Officers, and Commanding Officers are to take the necessary steps to ensure that such adjustments are reduced to a minimum in future.

2. It has also been observed that the number on Ships' Books is frequently omitted either in the Mess Book or on the Victualling and Check Sheets. CIVIL OFFICERS (OFFICE STAFF)—GRANT OF SICK LEAVE IN BROKEN PERIODS,

In connexion with the calculation of sick leave, when granted in broken periods to Civil Officers (Office Staff), it has been decided that the minimum period of sick leave granted should, in future, be a half-day, and a half-day should be half the usual working day.

- 2. Absences owing to sickness of less duration than a half-day are not to be covered by the grant of short (casual) leave, but should be recorded, and when they amount to a half-day within a period during which there is no variation in the rate of pay, should be granted as a half-day. Where the number of hours so recorded exceed a half-day, but do not amount to a day, and a half-day's sick leave on that account is granted, the excess should be noted for inclusion with future short periods of absence to make up half a day in a period in which there is no variation in the rate of pay.
- 3. Absence on Saturday or other weekly half-holiday for the full working period should be counted as a day, but absence for a lesser period on such day should be recorded and dealt with as shown in the preceding paragraph.
- This decision also applies to Temporary Officers of the Office Staff who are eligible for the grant of sick leave.
- 5. In the case of officers stationed at Navy Office or surrounding offices, Heads of Branches, &c., will not record such absences, but should report same in writing to the Secretary.

(c) The District Intelligence Officer of the area in which the Officer making the report is situated.*

(d) The Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney.

4. The District Intelligence Officer is responsible for passing the information to :— $\,$

(a) The Commander-in-Chief of Stations within the limits of which the movement takes place.

(b) The Senior Officer of the Squadron or Flotilla to which the ship belongs, or which it is about to join.

(c) In the case of arrivals, the Senior Officer (if any) of the port from which the ship has come.

(d) In the case of departures-

 (i) The Senior Officer (if any) of the port to which the ship is next proceeding;

(ii) The District Intelligence Officer of the area to which the ship is proceeding or through which the ship must first pass to reach her destination, if not already informed in accordance with paragraph 5 hereunder.

(e) Such other authorities as may be directed from time to time by the Naval Board.

- 5. In reporting to the authorities mentioned in paragraph 4, sub-paragraphs (a), (b), (c), and (d) (i), the District Intelligence Officer is to transmit the report through the District Intelligence Officers of the areas in which those authorities are situated.
- 6. If movements have already been reported by W/T or otherwise, to any of the authorities mentioned in paragraph 4, this fact must be made clear when informing the District Intelligence Officer to obviate duplication of reports and unnecessary expense.

7. To enable the above procedure to be carried out, Senior Officers of Fleets, Squadrons, or Flotillas, or Commanding Officers of detached ships, are to inform the Officer responsible for making the report, vide paragraph 2, of the prospective departure of, and service on which ships and vessels under their command are proceeding, except in cases where the orders have come through, or emanated from that Officer. Similar procedure is to be followed in the case of arrivals.

8. Reports of all arrivals and departures are to be made to all the authorities specified in the preceding paragraphs except:

(a) in the case of a ship or squadron proceeding to sea for a few hours, for exercises, &c., when no report is necessary, but in any case where the departure has been reported the return should also be reported;

(b) that movements within the Sydney (Port Stephens to Jervis Bay inclusive) and Melbourne (Port Phillip and Western Port) areas will not be reported to the Admiralty;

(c) that movements of surveying vessels will be reported only when proceeding to or leaving their surveying area, and not when visiting their base for periodical coaling or taking in stores.

9. Telegrams should include the following information, the form being varied when the telegram is sent in confidential code or cypher:—

Arrivals (Ships) or (Squadron) date at (Port). Departures (Ships) or (Squadron) for (Port) date. Authorities informed.

It is most important that the authorities informed should be stated in each telegram.

10. In the ordinary course of events the movements of H.M. or H.M.A. Ships in and out of port are not reported by the Naval Agents and Consular, Colonial, or Indian Reporting Officers.

11. In order to simplify the work of the District Intelligence Officer, and to enable him to carry out the instructions contained in paragraphs 3 and 4 intelligently, programmes of prospective movements should, whenever possible, be supplied to the District Intelligence Officers affected.

12. A copy of the "Disposition of Warships," showing the present disposition and approved future movements of H.M.A. Ships, is forwarded by Navy Office to all H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments, District Naval Officers, and Sub-District Naval Officers, weekly on Mondays. This statement is to be posted on the Ship's Company or Drill Room Notice Board, as the case may be, for information.

13. District Intelligence Officers of adjoining stations and their telegraphic addresses are as follows:—

NOON POSITIONS OF H.M.A. SHIPS.

- 14. The following is the routine to be observed in reporting the Noon positions of H.M.A. Ships:—
 - (a) As a peace-time routine, and unless otherwise ordered by the Naval Board, the Rear Admiral Commanding or Senior Officer of a Squadron at sea is to make his Noon position, course, and speed by W/T to the Navy Office, Melbourne, and to the next port of call where possible;
 - (b) H.M.A. Ships and Fleet Auxiliaries at sea operating as detached ships are to make their Noon position, course, and speed to Navy Office, Melbourne;
 - (c) Sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) above do not apply when the voyage is of twelve hours' or less duration;
 - (d) These position messages should be sent through Naval W/T stations when in W/T touch; otherwise they are to be sent through the nearest coastal Radio Station of the Postmaster-General's Department;
 - (e) Position messages are generally to be transmitted in plain language unless the Rear-Admiral Commanding, H.M.A. Fleet, Senior Officer, or Commanding Officer of a detached ship considers that the nature of the operations of the Fleet or ship are such as to render it desirable to transmit the messages in cypher or code.
 - (f) R.A.F. Auxiliaries Biloela and Kurumba are to address Noon position messages to the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, as well as to the Navy Office;
 - (g) Reports of Noon positions by W/T are to be discontinued after warning of the imminence of war has been received by H.M.A. Ships, and may be discontinued at any time when, in the opinion of the Senior Officer present, or the Commanding Officer, the situation is such as to make communication by W/T undesirable. In such circumstances, special instructions as to any reports which may be required will be issued by the Naval Board.

PART II.

ARRIVALS OF MEN-OF-WAR AT AUSTRALIAN PORTS INVOLVING VISITS OF CEREMONY.

- The movements of Foreign Men-of-War are reported by Customs Officers to the Navy Office, Melbourne. These officers also inform the Senior Naval Officer of the Port at which they are stationed.
- 2. When visits of ceremony are involved on the arrival of a Man-of-war, the Senior Naval Officer of the Port is to forward the following details as they become known to him:—
 - (i) Name (or names) of ship (or ships).
 - (ii) Expected time of arrival.
 - (iii) Actual time of arrival.
 - (iv) Expected time of departure.
 - (v) Berth (or berths).

- (vi) Time convenient for official calls (if requested) to the following officials, if stationed at or in residence at his port:—
 - (a) Official Secretary, H.E. the Governor-General;
 (b) Private Secretary, H.E. the State Governor;
 - (c) Secretary, Prime Minister's Department;
 - (d) Secretary, State Premier;
 - (e) Chief Justice of the Commonwealth;
 - (f) Chief Justice of the State;
 - (q) Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, or the Mayor;
 - (h) Senior Naval Officer, Afloat;
 - (i) Secretary, Defence Department (Military);
 - (k) Staff Officer, Base Commandant, or Senior Military
 - (l) Consul for the country to which the vessel belongs (in the case of a foreign Man-of-war).
- 3. At Sydney, the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer will carry out these duties. At all other ports the District Naval Officer or Sub-District Naval Officer stationed at the port is responsible.
- 4. The additional procedure to be observed in regard to visits of ceremony at Port Melbourne is outlined in the following paragraphs:—
- 5. The Secretary of the Navy Office, Melbourne, will communicate the expected date and time of arrival of all Men-of-war when ceremonial is involved to the District Naval Officer, Victoria, who will make the necessary arrangements in regard to visits of ceremony as laid down in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Article 96, and in accordance with the customs of the Service.
- 6. The District Naval Officer, Victoria, is to report by telephone to the Navy Office the actual approach and arrival of all such Men-of-war and also in the case of other vessels in special circumstances when visits of ceremony are involved.
- 7. With reference to Article 96, paragraph (b), of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, "The Officer in Chief Command" will be the Naval Board, except when the flag of the Admiral or Commodore Commanding the Fleet is flying in Hobson's Bay, in which case the Admiral or Commodore Commanding will, for the purposes of visits of ceremony, be "The Officer in Chief Command."
- 8. The officer of the guard will be detailed by the District Naval Officer, Victoria, or the Senior Naval Officer of H.M.A. Ships present, should the latter be senior to the District Naval Officer, Victoria.
- 9. Before the arrival of a foreign Man-of-war the District Naval Officer, Victoria, will ascertain from the Navy Office by signal at what time it is desired that the official visits should be paid and returned (King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Article 96, paragraphs (b) and (c)), and whether there are any special orders for the officer of the guard. The District Naval Officer, if not at the time the Senior Officer, will be responsible that these orders are at once communicated to the Senior Naval Officer.
- 10. The officer of the guard is to be instructed in accordance with the above, and is to inform the Officer Commanding the arriving vessel, on boarding, of the arrangements proposed with regard to the receipt and return of visits of ceremony by the Naval Board, or the Senior Naval Officer, as the case may

be. He will give information as to the position of the Navy Office, the office of the District Naval Officer, and the facilities for reaching these offices. He will also explain the rank and status of the Senior Naval Officer.

11. Should a foreign Man-of-war, commanded by an officer of lower rank than a Captain, arrive in Hobson's Bay, the Naval Board, in the absence of the Admiral or Commodore Commanding the Fleet, may direct that the visits of ceremony be carried out reciprocally between the officer in command of such vessel and the Senior Naval Officer.

12. Notwithstanding that the Flag of the Admiral or Commodore Commanding may be flying in Hobson's Bay, or that the Officer in Command of the foreign Man-of-war may be of lower rank than Captain, special arrangements will, if considered necessary, be made for a visit to the Naval Board.

"Article 93. Charges for Admission, Sports Ground.

The Naval Board may approve of a charge being made for entrance to Sports Grounds enclosed in Naval property, subject to such conditions as may be prescribed.

Amounts collected as a result of such charge shall be paid to the credit of a General Fund or Sports Fund, but shall not be used for the advantage of individual members."

MEDICAL ATTENDANCE FOR CREWS OF FLEET AUXILIARIES.

An Officer or member of the crew of a Fleet Auxiliary is entitled to receive the benefits laid down by the Commonwealth Navigation Act as regards medical attendance and maintenance in case of sickness or injury arising in the course of his employment.

- 2. He is entitled to receive medical attendance (including the provision of medicines), maintenance and treatment in hospital at the expense of the Commonwealth Government, provided that he—
 - (a) receives any hurt or injury, or contracts disease;
 - (b) suffers from any illness (not being venereal disease or an illness due to his own wilful act or default, or to his own misbehaviour)

in the course of his employment on board H.M.A. Fleet Auxiliaries.

3. Where practicable, the patient should be attended by a Naval Medical Officer of the Permanent or Reserve Forces, and be given treatment in Naval Wards. If this be not practicable, he should be treated in a public hospital in accordance with the terms of the Navigation Act.

Should a patient elect to be treated at a hospital of his own choice, the liability of the Commonwealth Government is limited to the amount necessary to provide medical attendance (including medicines), maintenance and treatment in a Naval Ward or Public Hospital.

- 4. Treatment should be given until the patient is fit for full duty. Should any patient demur at the decision of a Naval Medical Officer as to his fitness for full duty, he should be sent to a Medical Inspector of Seamen appointed under the Navigation Act for final decision.
- 5. In addition to the above, payment may be made to an Officer (exclusive of the Master) or member of the crew on the following basis:—
 - (a) If the agreement will expire within a month from the date of landing at Home Port—Salary for one month.
 - (b) If the agreement does not expire within a period of one month from the date of landing at Home Port—Salary for a period of three months.
- 6. The maximum period for which salary will be paid is three months. Should the Officer or member of the crew be still not fit for duty at the expiration of that period, he will come within the provisions of the Seamen's Compensation Act for weekly payments or compensation.

LOWER DECK WELFARE MACHINERY. PROCEDURE FOR 1922.

After careful consideration of the procedure adopted in 1919-20-21 for the drawing up and transmitting of representations regarding matters affecting the well-being of the Petty Officers and Men, the Naval Board have decided to make certain changes in the Welfare Machinery for 1922 and subsequent years. It is considered that the changes will render the procedure better adapted to the conditions and requirements of the Royal Australian Navy.

2. The Board have also decided that the Welfare Machinery shall in future be put into operation biennially instead of annually.

3. The system whereby the representatives of the men constituted an Advisory Committee to a committee of Officers, known as the Welfare Committee, has been abolished and is replaced by—

(a) Group Meetings, to be attended by representatives of groups of classes or branches, to deal with requests which affect only particular classes or branches, and

(b) A General Meeting, to be attended by representatives elected from the Group Meetings, to deal with general requests.

4. The first meetings under the new procedure will take place in Sydney about the second week in May. The date, place, and time of all meetings will be decided by the Rear-Admiral Commanding H.M.A. Fleet.

5. Each Group Meeting and the General Meeting will be attended by Officers detailed by the Rear-Admiral Commanding H.M.A. Fleet. These Officers will not take part in the discussions of the men, but may give advice to the men if asked to do so. The Senior Officer present is to insure that the proceedings are conducted in a good Service spirit, and that the matters discussed are confined within the limits laid down in paragraph 17; subject to this, he is to permit freedom of discussion by all present. He will not be responsible for the decisions arrived at, which are to be determined by majority vote.

6. On the completion of the deliberations of each Group Meeting and of the General Meeting, the requests formulated will be forwarded to the Rear-Admiral Commanding H.M.A. Fleet, who will make his observations thereon before forwarding them to the Naval Board for consideration and decision,

8. Ratings below Able Seaman or the equivalent relative rating will not be eligible to attend Group Meetings or to take part in the election of representatives for these meetings.

9. The grouping or ratings and the number of representatives to attend the Group and General Meetings have been computed, as far as possible, according to the number of the various ratings borne, having in view the necessity of forming competent but not unwieldy meetings, and giving fair representation to the men at the two main bases—Sydney and Melbourne.

10. The Rear-Admiral Commanding H.M.A. Fleet will arrange for the election of the representatives from H.M.A. Ships and Establishments at Sydney; H.M.A. Ships and Establishments under the command of the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, and Ships under the direct command of the Naval Board which may be present at Sydney, will be included with the Sea-going Fleet for this purpose. The Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, will arrange for the election of the representatives from H.M.A. Ships and Establishments in Victoria.

11. A suitable Senior Officer will be detailed by the Rear-Admiral Commanding H,M.A. Fleet to preside at each Group Meeting. In addition, the Rear-Admiral Commanding will, if considered necessary, detail an experienced Officer of the Group to which the men belong to attend to offer advice and information, if required. The Presiding Officers and other Officers in attendance will be guided by the instructions laid down in paragraph 5.

12. The requests of each Group Meeting, when finally drawn up, will be handed to the Senior Officer present, who will transmit them to the Rear-Admiral Commanding for his comments. All requests, Class and General, will then be forwarded to the Naval Board for consideration and decision, vide paragraph 6.

13. In order to avoid duplication of requests, Group Meetings are to be particularly careful to formulate purely *Class* Requests, *i.e.*, requests on matters which affect the members of their class or branch only.

PROCEDURE FOR GENERAL REQUESTS.

14. The meeting for the drawing up of General Requests will be attended by the following representatives, who are to be elected from members of the Group Meetings on the completion of the preparation of Class Requests:—

15. The General Request Meeting will be presided over by a Senior Executive Officer, assisted by other Officers as detailed by the Rear-Admiral Commanding H.M.A. Fleet. These Officers will be guided by the instructions laid down in paragraph 5.

16. General Requests, when drawn up, will be handed to the Presiding Officer for transmission to the Naval Board, through the Rear-Admiral Commanding, as indicated in paragraph 6.

17. Group Meetings are to formulate Class Requests only, and the General Meeting General Requests only. In the event of any doubt as to the category under which a particular request falls, it should be dealt with as a General Request. Subject to this, Group Meetings and the General Meeting are authorized to discuss and put forward representations in respect of:—

The meetings will not be authorized to discuss or put forward representations as to—

Matters of policy, such as the employment, or distribution, or training of the Fleet;

Individual claims, or individual grievances of any kind; Matters affecting individual Ships or Establishments.

18. While it is desired to maintain the object of these meetings, which is to give recognized opportunities to bring to the notice of the Naval Board any conditions which, in the opinion of the men, require, and are capable of, improvement, the Board wish to impress upon the representatives the desirability of putting forward only requests which can reasonably be adopted.

It is important that it should be realized that, in view of the comparative high rates of pay and allowances at present in force, and the decreasing cost of living, requests which involve large additional charges to the public funds cannot be approved. It should further be borne in mind that requests, such as changes in accommodation which entail large structural alterations in Ships and Establishments, or material alterations in Uniform Regulations, which the Naval Board have recently and definitely indicated their inability to approve, cannot be expected to meet with success by repetition.

19. The Rear-Admiral Commanding H.M.A. Fleet will detail Junior Accountant Officers or Writer Ratings to assist each Group Meeting and the General Request Meeting in the formulation and presentation of requests.

USE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS IN OFFICERS' MESSES.

The Orders contained in Australian Fleet Orders No. 4 are to be observed in all Ships and Establishments of the Royal Australian Navy.

2. The following is a copy of the Order quoted :-

"OFFICERS' MESSES, WINES, ETC.

Wines, spirits, beer and alcoholic liquors are only to be served or consumed on board by the Officers in H.M.A. Ships under my command between the hours of 1200 and 1400 and between 1800 and 2300, or the time of closing the mess, if this is earlier than 2300. On the occasion of mess entertainments, the Commanding Officer may give special permission for an extension.

- 2. At times other than the above, all arrangements for the supply of wines, liquor, &c., of any kind are to be closed and the stocks locked up.
- 3. No tossing or gambling, in any form, for drinks of any kind is to take place, and all wines, liquors, &c., of any kind are to be put down to and paid for by the officer who consumes them, i.e., standing drinks is not permitted.
- 4. Presidents of messes are responsible that the mess servants and officers' stewards understand all the above orders and that any non-observance of these orders is reported to the Captain.
- 5. No spirits or liqueurs are to be consumed or allowed in gun room messes nor are any stocks to be maintained.
- 6. In accordance with the spirit of paragraph 5, gun room officers messing in ward room messes are not allowed spirits or liqueurs; in special cases, subject to the prior consent of the Captain or the executive officer, this prohibition may be waived as regards guests."

The names of the ratings so qualified should be sent to the Torpedo School for purposes of reference.

6. The necessary amendment to Article 9, Clause (20), of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) will be made in due course.

SHIELDS PRESENTED FOR COMPETITION AMONGST THE SENIOR NAVAL CADETS IN THE COMMONWEALTH NAVAL FORCES.

With reference to Navy Order No. 10/1921, the conditions of the competitions for the two Shields presented by the Australian Steam-ship Owners' Federation and the Australian Natives' Association have been further revised, and are now as shown hereunder.

 Navy Order No. 10/1921 is hereby cancelled, and Appendix IV. of the Regulations and Instructions for the Royal Australian Naval Reserve, 1922, is to be amended accordingly.

CONDITIONS OF COMPETITIONS.

- (a) Australian Steam-ship Owners' Federation Shield :-
 - 1. The teams competing for this Shield will be selected by the Sub-District Naval Officer, and will consist of ten Cadets, five of whom are to belong to the Signal Branch, and five to the Wireless Branch. Age limit, between 15 and 18 years.
 - Each Sub-District will separately compete for this Shield, and only one team from any Sub-District may compete in any one year.
 - 3. All members of a team must have been assessed as "Efficient" throughout their previous service.
 - 4. The Sub-District winning the Shield is to retain the Shield for the ensuing twelve months until it has been won for the following year. The Shield shall be kept in the Sub-District Drill Room.
 - The competition may be held at any time during the training year, provided that six months shall elapse between any two competitions.
 - 6. The competition in a Sub-District shall be carried out under the supervision of three Officers detailed by the D.N.R.M.; these three Officers will be the judges, and their decision shall be final.
 - 7. The tests for the competition shall be arranged as directed by the D.N.R.M.

- 8. The standard to be used in the tests is that of an Ordinary Signalman and Ordinary Telegraphist.
- Statements showing the points awarded to the competing teams shall be signed by the three judges, and forwarded to the D.N.R.M.
- 10. At the end of each year, the D.N.R.M. will promulgate the results for the competition for the year.
- 11. Points will be awarded in accordance with the following:-

POSTAL PACKETS AND PARCELS.

With reference to paragraphs 12, 13, and 14 of Article 105 of Consolidated Navy Orders, attention is directed to the fact that postal packets and parcels are not dealt with in the same way as letters, and that no responsibility can be accepted either by the Navy Office or the Post Office in regard to delivery to persons serving in H.M.A. Ships unless they are properly addressed to the port at which delivery is desired. In this connexion attention is directed to Admiralty Monthly Order 3203, of 1920, and subsequent Admiralty Fleet Orders on the same subject.

Parcels for persons serving in H.M.A. Ships cannot be accepted at Navy Office, and Officers and Men should inform their correspondents that Parcels must be addressed to the port at which the ship is lying or for which she is bound. In case of doubt senders of parcels should apply either personally or in writing to Navy Office immediately before despatching the parcel.

The same rules apply to parcels for persons serving in H.M.A. Ships which are forwarded by other means than by Parcels Post.

UNUSUAL PURCHASES AS A CHARGE TO GENERAL MESS.

Recent examinations of Provision and Cash Accounts of H.M.A. Ships and Establishments show that purchases of Beer, Cigars and Cigarettes have been made in certain instances for special occasions such as Christmas Day.

2. It is notified for general information that under no circumstances will such purchases be authorized in future. The purchases already effected were irregular, and have been passed as no definite instructions to the contrary have been promulgated up to present date, such not having been considered necessary. It is pointed out, however, that although a wide latitude is given Accountant Officers under existing Regulations in the purchase of necessary provisions for victualling Ships' Companies, purchases as a charge to the General Mess are to be restricted entirely to provisions. If the financial state of the General Mess in a Ship or Establishment justifies the purchase of special provisions on special occasions such as Christmas Day, New Year's Day and Easter Sunday, there is no objection to this course being followed. On all other occasions the standard of meals issued is to be regular and in accordance with the ordinary diet prevailing in H.M.A. Ships and Establishments in General Mess.

AMENDMENT OF AUXILIARY SERVICES REGULATIONS.

The following amendment of the Regulations and Instructions for the Auxiliary Services (Navy Order No. 294/1921) is approved, with effect as from 1st July, 1921:—

Article 71 is amended by adding new paragraph as follows :-

"In cases of absence on sick leave, and/or on extended leave without pay in excess of 31 days in any financial year, the Naval Board may defer the increment of the member concerned for the number of days by which such sick leave and/or extended leave exceeds 31 days, provided that such deferment shall apply to the next succeeding increment only."

AUTHORITIES TO INCUR EXPENDITURE.

- Regulations 8, 9 and 10 of Naval Financial Regulations (Statutory Rules 1920, No. 248), will shortly be repealed and new regulation No. 8 inserted as follows:—
 - "8. Officers-in-Charge and District Naval Officers are authorized to incur expenditure within such limits and subject to such conditions as may be prescribed by the Naval Board."
- Authorities of Heads of Branches.—Heads of Branches in Navy Office have been vested with limited authority by the Naval Board in respect of Votes placed under their supervision.
- 3. Authorities of Officers-in-Charge of H.M.A. Naval Establishments, Commanding Officers R.A.N. College, H.M.A.S. "Tingira," H.M.A.S. "Platypus," District Naval Officers, and Naval Representative, London—
 - (a) Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, is vested with authority—
 - (i) To engage skilled or unskilled labour at ruling rates of wages provided such are not less than Award rates, and provided that the work on which such labour is employed has been duly authorized. No person is to be employed at any wage in excess of 15s. per diem, unless the rate is that prescribed by an Award, or has been approved by the Naval Board.

(ii) To engage temporary clerks, draughtsmen, or typists for such limited periods as may be necessary, and to renew such appointments from time to time as requisite, provided that total period shall not exceed twelve months without Naval Board approval, at the rates prescribed in Arbitration Court Awards. The approval of the Naval Board is to be obtained for all increases beyond the rates prescribed in the Awards.

The employment of all temporary clerks, draughtsmen, and typists is to be reported to the Naval Board for confirmation.

(iii) To approve of payment of claims for Overtime and Sunday Pay.

> Early in each month a schedule of payments due or made to members of the Administration and Office Staffs (including salaried Staff), on account of overtime and Sunday work performed, &c., during the preceding month, showing name, position, number of hours worked, rate, amount paid, and a short explanation as to the necessity for such overtime, shall be forwarded for the covering approval of the Naval Board.

- (iv) To approve of demands on the Naval Store Officer for materials for upkeep of Yard Services, Floating Craft, &c., which the Commodore Superintendent is authorized to put in hand, or for which Naval Board approval has been received.
- (v) To approve of repairs to Yard Plant and Floating Craft being carried out, provided the cost of same, including labour and material, does not exceed £100 in any one case. This includes cost of replacements to make good defects, e.g., tools to maintain stocks, but does not include new work.
- (vi) To approve of expenditure for Contingencies, e.g., towage, electric current, telephone charges, not exceeding £100 in any one case.
- (vii) To approve of purchase of fresh provisions required for victualling sea-going personnel under the General Messing System.
- (viii) To approve of requisitions for local purchases of stores allowed by Establishment and freight and lighterage thereon, not exceeding £20 in any one order, or £500 in any one month. Requisitions in excess of these limits are to be forwarded for the approval of the Director of Naval Stores, Director of Victualling, Director of Ordnance, Torpedoes and Mines, or Director of Naval Medical Services, as the case may be:
- (ix) To approve, in emergent cases, of expenditure in anticipation of superior authority. This approval must be restricted to cases of real emergency, and necessary covering approval should be sought at the earliest possible moment.

- (b) Captain Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depôt-
 - (i) To approve of demands upon Naval Store Depôts, for Stores allowed by Establishment.
 - (ii) To approve of requisitions for purchase of Stores, other than victualling stores, not exceeding £10 in any one order or £50 in any one month.
 - (iii) To approve of expenditure, other than for Stores, not exceeding £25 in any one case, under Contingencies.
 - (iv) To approve of the employment of casual labour (non-clerical), but no person is to be employed under this authority for any longer time than an aggregate period of six (6) weeks in any financial year, without the approval of the Naval Board.
 - (v) To approve of purchase of fresh provisions required for victualling personnel under the General Messing System.
- (c) Commanding Officer, R.A.N. College-
 - (i) To approve of demands upon Naval Store Depôts for Stores allowed by Establishment.
 - (ii) To approve of requisitions for purchase of Stores other than victualling stores, not exceeding £5 in any one order or £25 in any one month.
 - (iii) To approve of expenditure, other than for Stores, not exceeding £25 in any one case, under Contingencies.
 - (iv) To approve of the employment of casual labour (non-clerical), but no person is to be employed under this authority for any longer time than an aggregate period of six (6) weeks in any financial year, without the approval of the Naval Board.
 - (v) To approve of purchase of Fresh Provisions required for victualling personnel under the General Messing System.
- (d) Commanding Officers, H.M.A.S. "Tingira" and H.M.A.S. "Platypus"—
 - To approve of demands upon Naval Store Depôts, for Stores allowed by Establishment.
 - (ii) To approve of requisitions for purchase of Stores, other than victualling stores, not exceeding £5 in any one order or £25 in any one month.
 - (iii) To approve of expenditure, other than for Stores, not exceeding £25 in any one case, under Contingencies.
 - (iv) To approve of purchase of Fresh Provisions required for victualling personnel under the General Messing System.
- (e) District Naval Officers-
 - To approve of demands upon Naval Store Depôts, for Stores allowed by Establishment.
 - (ii) To approve of requisitions for local purchases of other stores, and for such stores allowed by Establishment, the local purchase of which may be authorized by the Naval Board, not exceeding £5 in any one case, or £25 in any one month.

- (iii) To approve of Expenditure, other than for Stores, not exceeding £25 in any one case, under Contingencies, in connexion with the R.A.N. Reserve, expenditure incurred by District Naval Officer acting as local representative of the Naval Board or Naval Intelligence Officer, care and maintenance of ships and craft under his orders, recruiting for the R.A.N.
- (iv) To approve of payment of claims for overtime and Sunday pay. Early in each month a schedule of payments for overtime and Sunday work performed during the preceding month, showing name, position, number of hours worked, rate, amount paid, and a short explanation as to the necessity for such overtime, shall be forwarded for covering approval of the Naval Board.

(v) The expenditure to be authorized by District Naval Officers under (ii) (iii), and (iv) must not exceed in the aggregate the following amounts per month in the respective States, without the approval of the Naval Board:—

(vi) To approve, in emergent cases, of expenditure in anticipation of superior authority.

> This approval must be restricted to cases of real emergency, and necessary covering approval should be sought at the earliest possible moment.

(f) Naval Representative, London-

- (i) To engage, at ruling rates of pay, temporary clerks, draughtsmen, or typists, for such limited periods as may be necessary, and to renew such appointments from time to time as requisite, provided that total period shall not exceed six (6) months without special Naval Board approval. The approval of the Naval Board is to be obtained for all increases beyond ruling rates of pay.
 - Report of the engagement of any temporary clerk, draughtsman, or typist, under this authority shall be made forthwith to the Naval Board.
- (ii) To approve of payment of claims for overtime and Sunday pay. Early in each month a schedule of payments for overtime and Sunday work performed during the preceding month, showing name, position, number of hours worked, rate, amount paid, and a short explanation as to the necessity for such overtime, shall be forwarded for covering approval of the Naval Board.

(iii) To approve of demands on the High Commissioner for Stationery and incidentals not exceeding £5 in any one demand, or £25 in any one month. This limit may be exceeded in emergent cases, but covering approval of the Naval Board should be sought at the earliest possible moment. (iv) To approve of expenditure under Contingencies (e.g., rail fares, postages, cablegrams, &c.) not exceeding £10 in any one case. This limit may be exceeded in emergent cases, and in regard to travelling expenses and rail fares and freights, but the covering approval of the Naval Board should be sought at the earliest possible moment.

6

- (v) To approve of payments under Regulations to sea-going personnel borne on books of London Naval Depôt for pay.
- 4. Conditions which must be complied with.
- (a) The whole of the above Authorities are subject to compliance with the following provisions, except where otherwise specifically stated:—
 - (i) That provision made on Estimates will not be exceeded, and the requirements for the remaining period of the financial year will not involve the necessity for applying for additional provision on any Vote concerned.
 - (ii) That Certificate has been inserted by the local certifying officer that funds are available under his control, or by the Director of Navy Accounts that funds can be made available. (Not applicable to Naval Representative, or H.M.A.S. Platypus.)

(iii) That the expenditure does not involve any alteration in existing rules or practice.

(iv) That there is nothing irregular in the character of the expenditure.

- (v) That the expenditure is not an allowance or payment to any member of the Department except such as is governed by Regulations, and does not require Naval Board approval.
- (b) It should be noted that the responsibility for complying with provision (i) of clause (a) rests with the various Heads of Departments and Commanding Officers of Establishments only, in respect of items of the Estimates over which they have complete supervision. It applies in other cases (e.g., District Naval Officers) only in so far as specified amounts are allotted from the total amount, by the Officer supervising (e.g., D.N.R.M.).
- (c) Each Officer-in-charge referred to in clause (b) is to keep a register showing, in respect of each item of the Appropriation under which he will authorize expenditure—
 - (i) details of amounts provided on the Estimates;
 - (ii) details of expenditure authorized.
- (d) The total amount on the Estimates is provided to meet the requirements for the full year. Funds are made available periodically to meet current requirements and expenditure is not to be authorized in excess of the amounts actually made available. Further, although funds have been made available, it will be necessary to so regulate authorities during the earlier portion of the year that the balance of the amount provided for the full year will be found sufficient. For instance, if the amount provided on the Estimates for a particular item is £12,000 for the full year, and it is estimated that expenditure to the extent of £5,000 will be required during the last quarter of the financial year, only such expenditure should be

incurred in the early portion of the year as will not entail a lesser balance than £5,000 being available, although, possibly, funds totalling £9,000 had been made available during the previous nine months.

STORES SHIPPED IN H.M.A. SHIPS OR R.A. FLEET AUXILIARIES FOR CONVEYANCE.

(1) STORES SHIPPED FOR RETURN TO STORE ESTABLISHMENTS AT SYDNEY.

When stores are shipped in one of H.M.A. ships or R.A. Fleet Auxiliaries for return to Store Establishments at Sydney, the following procedure is to be observed :-

(a) Receipts are to be obtained in triplicate on Form A.S.549 from the Officers of the Ship conveying the stores for the packages forwarded, and the copies disposed of as follows :-

> Original-To be retained by the Accounting Officer at the Ship or Establishment sending the stores.

> Duplicate-To be handed to the Commanding Officer or Master of the vessel in which the shipment is made.

> Triplicate-To be sent by post to the Store Officer at the Store

Establishment to which the stores are consigned.

Separate Forms A.S. 330 (1 copy), A.S. 331 (in triplicate), R.A.N.R. 46 (1 copy), and A.O. 2 (in duplicate), A.S. 197 (in duplicate), whichever may be applicable to the stores returned, are to be prepared showing each package, bundle, &c., and forwarded so as to reach the Store Officer concerned before the arrival of the stores, if possible. These forms should show in detail the contents of the packages shipped.

(2) STORES SHIPPED FOR CONVEYANCE ONLY, OTHER THAN TO STORE ESTABLISHMENTS AT SYDNEY.

When stores are shipped in one of H.M.A. Ships or R.A. Fleet Auxiliaries for conveyance only, either from a Naval Establishment, Naval Reserve District, or another Ship, Bill of Lading (Form A.D. 79) is to be invariably prepared by the consignor, and a receipt is to be given for the stores taken on board.

If the stores are transhipped to another H.M.A. Ship, R.A. Fleet Auxiliary, or Yard Craft, for carriage to the consignee, the officer giving up charge of them is to obtain a receipt from the officer to whose charge they are transferred on the Bill of Lading (Form A.D. 79) before he hands over that document to such officer.

Bills of Lading are to show the number, marks, and description of each package and loose article shipped. They are to be signed by the Captain, Officer in Charge of Stores, or Master of the vessel in which the stores are shipped, and one copy is to be retained by him. Two are to be sent by the consignor to the consignee to arrive before the goods, if possible, by quickest mode of conveyance (but not by vessel conveying the stores if any quicker way of despatch is available), and another retained by consignor. One of the two forwarded by the consignor to the consignee is to be an "Extra Copy," and is for receipt by consignee and return to shipper.

Supply notes are to be prepared by consignor in accordance with existing regulations, and forwarded to consignee as soon as shipment of stores is effected.

(3) GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS IN REGARD TO ALL SHIPMENTS.

All stores shipped are to be properly and securely packed, and cases containing breakable articles are to be marked "Fragile." Should packages be insufficient or damaged, Forms A.S. 549, or Bill of Lading, A.D. 79, are to be suitably indorsed when receipt is given for the packages by the responsible officer of the ship conveying the stores.

Separate Forms A.S. 549, or Bill of Lading, A.D. 79, are to be prepared for Naval Victualling, Ordnance, and Medical Stores.

Items for different Consignees are not to be forwarded in the same package unless there are very special reasons for so doing, in which case such items should be packed in a separate parcel, and should be properly addressed before being placed in the packing case for shipment.

A Packing Note, which may consist of a plain list showing in detail the contents, is to be enclosed in an envelope and placed inside each package, &c., shipped.

In order to obviate difficulties in identifying stores shipped, the following particulars are to be legibly painted on each case, package, or bundle, or written in ink on labels A.S. 331c or A.S. 331D when these are used :-

- (i) Name of Naval Establishment, Naval Reserve District, or H.M.A. Ship sending the stores.
- (ii) Number of package. 0.6043. - 2

(iii) Rank and address of consignee, and where practicable and expedient-

(iv) Bands of the distinctive colours indicated hereunder for the several Departments are, where possible, to be used on drums, casks, cases, or packages. This will enable quantities of stores for different Departments to be readily sorted out at port of discharge :-

METHOD OF SHOWING NUMBERS BORNE FOR VICTUALS IN SHIPS' LEDGERS.

As the method of compiling column seven of Ship's Ledger varies in different Ships, the following instructions are promulgated for future guidance and general adoption where necessary:—

- (1) Except as provided for in column eight, and unless berne for victuals only, the number shown in column seven should agree with column thirteen.
- (2) Classified checks are to be shown in columns five and six, checks to Sick Mess inserted in column six in red ink.

(3) To prove the total number actually victualled, according to Ship's Ledger, with that shown by Provision Account, the grand totals of columns five and six should be subtracted from the grand total of column seven. The result should thus agree with total of Provision Account. It is usual, however, when auditing accounts in Office, to overlook small differences in the total number victualled as per Ship's Ledger compared with the Provision Account, but the differences should not exceed the rate of one for every thousand victuals.

The attention of all ratings is drawn to the necessity of requesting that their Port Division should be that nearest to their homes.

2. Cases are continually arising of ratings who on their marriage set up a home and neglect to request that their Port Division should be altered as necessary. This neglect nullifies to a large extent the efforts of the Drafting Office to insure that other things being equal ratings are drafted to Ships based, or Establishments, near their homes.

AMENDMENT OF FINANCIAL REGULATIONS (SEA-GOING)— RE-ENGAGEMENT GRATUITY.

(Amendment of Navy Order No. 68/1922, &c.)

With reference to Navy Order No. 68/1922, paragraph 3, relating to the repealing of Article 14 of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) is cancelled, and the following paragraph is to be inserted in its stead:—

- "3. Article 14 is amended as from 1st July, 1921, as follows:-
- (i) by omitting the heading and clauses (1) to (16) inclusive and inserting in their stead the following heading and clause:—

"Service, Promotion, and Re-engagement Gratuity.

Article 14.—(1) Petty Officers and Other Ratings.—All previous service in the Royal Navy, or Royal Marines, or in the Navy of any other of His Majesty's Dominions, of Petty Officers and other ratings serving in the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going) shall be allowed to count as if served in the Royal Australian Navy, towards service for seniority, rates of pay and allowances and award of Good Conduct Badges, provided that the provisions of Article 9, clause (53), shall also apply in the case of Good Conduct Badges."

(ii) by re-numbering clause (17) as clause (2).

2. The reduced amount of Re-engagement Gratuity, viz., £10, provided for in the fourth paragraph of Navy Order No. 41/1919 will not be payable in cash on and after 1st July, 1921. The gratuity will thereafter be credited to the rating's Deferred Pay Account, and become subject to the conditions prescribed in Article 12, clauses (2), (3), and (4) of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going). Consequent upon this decision, the following amendment of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) is approved with effect as from 1st July, 1921:—

Article 14 is amended by adding at the end of clause (2) the following sub-clause:—

"(vii.) Ratings who, within six months from the date of discharge from the Royal Australian Navy, are permitted to re-engage for such further period as is necessary to complete not less than twelve years' service shall receive a gratuity of £10. This sum shall be credited as, and be subject to the conditions, set forth in sub-clause (iv.) of this clause."

3. The abolition of Re-engagement Gratuity as from 1st July, 1922, has been approved, and the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) are accordingly to be amended as follows:—

Article 14 is amended, as from 1st July, 1922, as follows:-

- (i) by omitting from the heading the words "and Re-engagement Gratuity."
- (ii) by omitting clause (2).

5. Captains of six years' seniority and above on 12th August, 1922, will receive retired pay of £800 per annum, if they have 21 years' service, with the addition or deduction of £15 per annum, limited to five years for each complete year in excess or short of the standard (21 years) on 12th August, 1922.

Captains of under three years' seniority on 12th August, 1922, will receive the rate of retired pay for which they are eligible under ordinary Regulations on that date, with an additional £100 per annum.

Alternatively, Captains in excess of required numbers will be placed on half-pay and retired for non-service in the ordinary course.

6. As regards Commanders, of the 200 surplus Officers of this rank, 180 Officers of seniority 1915 to 1919 are regarded as surplus. Special terms to Officers of the seniority indicated are offered, viz., £100 per annum, in addition to normal retired pay (vide page 2264A, Quarterly Navy List), up to a total maximum of £600 per annum.

PENSIONERS WHO SERVED IN DOMINION NAVIES DURING THE WAR.—RE-ASSESSMENT OF PENSIONS.

Attention is drawn to Admiralty Fleet Order No. 293/1922, which provides as follows:—

- 1. The Service Pensions of Royal Navy Pensioners who served in Dominion Navies during the War are to be re-assessed on the same scale as would have been proper had they served in the Royal Navy during the same period.
- 2. Under this ruling, pensioner service to 31st March, 1919, only, will be taken into consideration. The concession is subject to the condition that Pension Contribution at the rate of £18 per annum shall be paid by the pensioner for the period of service in respect of which the re-assessment is made. If desired, the pension contribution will be recovered from pension by suitable instalments.
- 3. This decision does not apply to pensioners who were serving in a civilian capacity.
- 4. Pensioners at present serving in the Royal Australian Navy who desire to have their pensions re-assessed in accordance with the above-mentioned Order should forward their applications to Navy Office through their Commanding Officer for transmission to the Admiralty. When forwarding such applications it should be stated by applicants whether it is desired that the refund consequent on re-assessment be recovered by suitable instalments from the Pension payable, or whether the amount due will be refunded in cash.

LEAVE AND NOTATIONS ON LEAVE HISTORY SHEETS.

It has been decided to cancel the present instructions regarding recreation leave of Officers and Men, and the various notations on Leave History Sheets. The instructions contained in the succeeding paragraphs of this Order should be followed in the future.

The leave granted to Officers will be recorded at Navy Office. The
procedure to be followed in regard to applications for leave of absence to
Officers is contained in Article 310 of the Consolidated Navy Orders 19111920.

Leave granted to Officers by Senior Naval Officers under clause 2 of Article 310 of the Consolidated Navy Orders 1911-1920 is not at present reported to Navy Office. In order that a complete record may be kept at Navy Office, all leave granted to Officers other than by Naval Board authority should be reported to Navy Office for record purposes.

3. A Long Leave Book (A.S.539z) and a Leave History Sheet (A.S.539y) have been adopted in the R.A.N. for the purpose of recording leave granted to ratings.

Care should be exercised to insure the accuracy of notations made in the Long Leave Book and Leave History Sheets of ratings, in order that the amount of leave due for the current year, or the amount of Foreign Service Leave due to R.N. ratings and ratings entered in the United Kingdom, or transfer from one Ship or Establishment to another, may be correctly determined.

4. The Long Leave Book should be kept in each Ship or Establishment by the Ship's Police; the names of ratings should be arranged therein according to their numbers on the Ship's Books.

The Long Leave Book should be checked with the Ledger after each of the three leave periods during the year, and the responsible member of the Ship's Office Staff should place his initials in the book when checking has been completed. The Accountant Officer will be responsible that this check is carried out.

- 5. At the end of each Leave Year, or on the transfer of a rating from one Ship or Establishment to another, the Master-at-Arms should total separately in the Long Leave Book the amounts of travelling leave and actual leave taken by each rating during the current leave year, initial in the column provided, and pass the Long Leave Book into the Ship's Office to be checked and initialed there also. The Long Leave Book should then be sent to the Captain's Office for the necessary notations to be made on the Leave History Sheet.
- 6. Attention is drawn to the fact that up to the 31st December, 1919, the Leave Year terminated on 31st December in each year. The ensuing Leave Year extended from 1st January, 1920, to 31st January, 1921. Each subsequent Leave Year terminates on 31st January.
- 7. Attention is drawn to Board decision on Welfare Request No. 114 (Navy Order No. 430/1921) that, as from the 1st February, 1922, all Officers and Men shall be allowed 42 days' leave per annum irrespective of whether serving in a Harbor Ship or Establishment, or in a Sea-going Ship. Previous to 1st February, 1922, Officers and Men were allowed leave as follows:—

Up to 31st December, 1919 28 days per annum ; From 1st January, 1920 to 31st January, 1922—

- (a) Sea-going Service 42 days per annum; (b) Harbor Service 35 days per annum.
- 8. In the event of a rating for any reason not proceeding on leave during one or other of the usual leave periods, a notation should be made in the Long Leave Book in the columns allotted to such period, stating the decision of the Commanding Officer as to whether the leave not taken is regarded as—
 (a) forfeited; or (b) deferred by permission.
- 9. As far as possible, all leave due in respect of a Leave Year should be taken within the year. It will, however, be within the discretion of the Commanding Officer to permit of a rating being allowed to carry over from one Leave Year to another a limited amount of leave when the rating concerned is unable to take his leave owing to the exigencies of the Service. This privilege may also be afforded to ratings whose homes are situated in Queensland and Western Australia, and who, in accordance with Navy Order No. 270/1920, are permitted to take their leave once a year, if desired.

On the transfer from one Ship or Establishment to another of a rating who has been permitted to defer leave from one Leave Year to another, the number of days' leave so deferred should be shown in the column provided on the Leave History Sheet.

An Officer may also be permitted to carry over a limited amount of leave from one year to another, if he is unable to take his leave owing to the exigencies of the Service, but each case should be submitted to the Naval Board for approval.

10. Ranks and ratings lent from the Royal Navy are permitted to defer 15 days' leave for each completed period of 6 months' service—2 days per month being allowed for shorter periods—and to take such deferred leave as Foreign Service Leave on their return to the United Kingdom. Except as provided in paragraph 11, any leave taken in excess of leave which can be taken locally by R.N. Officers and Men, without affecting Foreign Service Leave (viz., 12 days), should be deducted from accumulated leave.

11. Ranks and ratings serving at the R.A.N. College are granted leave at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, in accordance with powers conferred upon him under regulation 39 of the Naval College Regulations.

In the cases of R.N. ranks and ratings attached to the College who are entitled to accumulate leave to be taken on return to the United Kingdom, a maximum of 30 days per annum may be allowed to accumulate, and a maximum of 19 days' leave per annum may be taken in Australia without affecting leave accumulation.

The R.N. rank or rating at the College is thus allowed 7 days' local leave (not affecting accumulation) in addition to the 12 days normally allowed to a R.N. rank or rating serving in any other Ship or Establishment (vide paragraph 10).

It should be clearly understood that any leave over 19 days per annum, taken under regulation 39 of the Naval College Regulations, will be deducted from Foreign Service Leave.

- 12. Ratings recruited in the United Kingdom who retain their right to return passages to the United Kingdom at Commonwealth Government expense are permitted to defer leave, to be taken as Foreign Service Leave on their return to the United Kingdom, under the same conditions as R.N. ratings (vide paragraph 10).
- 13. At the end of each Leave Year, or on a rating being returned to the United Kingdom for discharge, or to the Royal Navy for reversion, the Ship in which the rating is borne at the end of the Leave Year, or prior to transfer to Cerberus, should calculate, from the various Leave notations appearing on the rating's Leave History Sheet, the number of days' Foreign Service Leave due, and make a notation accordingly on the Leave History Sheet. This notation should be initialed by the rating concerned, as an indication that he is aware of the amount of leave due and accepts the accuracy of the notation.
- 14. Care is to be taken in *Cerberus* that the Leave History Sheet of every rating returned to the United Kingdom for discharge to the Shore, or for reversion to the Royal Navy, bears a notation duly initialed, showing the amount of Foreign Service Leave due.
- 15. Should the necessary information regarding leave taken by a Royal Navy rating, or rating recruited in the United Kingdom, throughout the whole of his Service in the Royal Australian Navy, be not available in the Ship or Establishment in which he is serving, the Commanding Officer of such Ship or Establishment should forward to Navy Office the Leave History Sheet of the rating concerned, in order that same may be brought up to date from Office records.
 - 16. Navy Order No. 310/1921 is hereby cancelled.

EDUCATIONAL EXAMINATIONS, R.A.N.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF OFFICERS RESPONSIBLE FOR CONDUCTING THE EXAMINATIONS.

A Senior Executive Officer will be detailed for general supervision of the Examination, and will be responsible for its correct conduct. He will be assisted by Officers of the Instructor and Schoolmaster Branches and Chaplains, as requisite.

2. The Superintending Officer will be responsible for obtaining the Examination Papers required for each day from the Commanding Officer of the Centre, and will open the sealed envelopes containing the Examination Papers in the presence of the candidates.

The envelopes containing the Examination Papers will be sealed with one or other of the following seals:—

- (a) Government Printer;
- (b) Navy Office;
- (c) Examining Officer;

and each envelope will be indorsed across the flap, close to the seal, by either the Examining Officer or an officer authorized to sign for the Naval Secretary.

The Superintending Officer will carefully examine the seal before breaking it, and will be required to note upon the Examination Schedule the description of seal and signature indorsed on each envelope.

3. The Commanding Officer of the Centre, to whom the papers will be addressed by Navy Office, will be responsible for the safe custody of the papers up to the date of the examination, and that the papers are issued to the Superintending Officer personally, as they are required from day to day.

4. Before beginning each subject, the candidate should write his name, official number, rating, ship, and subject on the cover of the Examination Work Book, and the Superintending Officer should make sure that this is done. The first Christian name is to be given in full.

5. The candidates under examination should not be allowed to use scribbling paper. Any necessary rough work should be done in the Examination Work Book.

6. No candidate should be permitted to bring into the examination room any books or notes. Any one found giving or receiving assistance in the work of the examination, or using notes, should be dismissed from the room, and the fact reported to the Commanding Officer at the Examination Centre.

7. No candidate is to be allowed to leave the examination room until half-an-hour has elapsed after the opening of the Examination Papers. No candidate will be permitted to enter the examination room after any other candidate has left it.

8. Candidates should be seated far enough apart from one another to prevent worked papers being overlooked.

9. Strict supervision during the examination should be maintained. No room in which a candidate is being examined should be left without supervision at any time.

10. At the end of the time allowed for each subject, the worked papers should be sealed up, and at the end of each day, the worked papers for that day should be enclosed in one parcel and transmitted to the Examining Officer.

At the conclusion of the examination, the necessary schedules are to be completed, signed by the superintending Officer, and transmitted to the Examining Officer, together with the last day's papers.

11. To prevent errors from being made in the issue of certificates, the names and official numbers in the schedules should be typewritten, arranged in order of ships, and the first Christian name should be given in full.

12. Unless otherwise ordered, the Examining Officers in the respective examinations will be the following:—

(i) H.E. Test-The Headmaster, R.A.N. College.;

(ii) Educational Test, Part I.—The Senior Instructor Officer, Naval Depôt, Westernport;

APPOINTMENT OF COMMODORE COMMANDING H.M.A. FLEET.

The following copy of the appointment issued to Commodore of the First Class Albert Percy Addison, C.M.G., is promulgated for the information and guidance of all concerned:—

The Commonwealth Government, having invited the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to recommend an Officer to command His Majesty's Australian Fleet, the Admiralty having recommended you, and His Majesty the King having approved, the Naval Board hereby appoints you First Captain of His Majesty's Australian Ship Melbourne additional and Commodore of the First Class in command of His Majesty's Australian Fleet, to take effect from the twenty-ninth day of April, 1922.

2. The Naval Board hereby authorize you to hoist your Broad Pendant in His Majesty's Australian Ship *Melbourne*, taking charge of the following Ships, namely:—

When Ships of the Royal Navy or Ships provided and maintained by another Dominion are present with your Broad Pendant, the Senior Officer (whether yourself or a Flag Officer flying his flag in a Ship of the Royal Navy or other Dominion Navy) will have the right of command in matters of ceremony or international intercourse, or where united action is agreed upon, but will have no power to direct the movements of Ships of the other Service unless such Ships are ordered to co-operate by mutual arrangement.

4. A Warrant authorizing you to convene courts martial for the trial of any person borne on the books of one of His Majesty's Australian Ships is forwarded herewith.

SYSTEM OF EDUCATION IN THE R.A.N.

A .- EDUCATION OF BOYS.

- 1. There will be a compulsory school for junior ratings, whereby their training ship education may be continued progressively, thus providing a good general education.
- 2. (a) Every boy in the ship is to receive from six to eight hours' instruction weekly, preferably in the morning.
- (b) The School Register (A.S.396) will be examined and signed weekly by the Instructor Officer, and by the Executive Officer. The former will note, in the column provided, the reasons why any boy has not had his full time education during the week.
- (c) The Instructor Officer, or Schoolmaster where no Instructor Officer is borne, is to be assisted and advised as regards attendance by the Officer of the Military Branch detailed by the Captain to keep the Progress Book (S. 399) and supervise instructions other than educational. This Officer is to give the Instructor Officer or Schoolmaster access to the Progress Book, showing the total number of names of the Ordinary Seamen 2nd Class and Boys available for instruction, and he is to acquaint the Instructor Officer or Schoolmaster of the entry, discharge, or rating of Ordinary Seamen or Boys and of any reason for their absence from instruction. Commanding Officers are responsible that this Officer co-operates with the Instructor Officer or Schoolmaster and allocates the time available for all the instructions during the week to the best advantage in accordance with the orders in force.
 - (d) The School Register will be signed weekly by the Commanding Officer.
- (e) The School Register will be forwarded quarterly to the Senior Officer of the group to which the Ship or establishment belongs, signed by him, and forwarded to the Navy Office.
- 3. Where no Instructor Officer is borne, an Officer will be detailed by the Commanding Officer to see that the above Orders for instructions are carried out as far as possible, and to sign the School Register in lieu of the Instructor Officer.
- 4. The object to be aimed at in ships carrying on instruction for boys should be the passing of the Educational Test, Part I., and the examination for accelerated advancement to man's rating.

B.—EDUCATIONAL TEST, PART I.

- 1. Instruction for this examination will be carried out by correspondence and by individual instruction.
- 2. A course of about twenty lectures, to cover the whole syllabus, will be prepared under the direction of the Fleet Instructor Officer.
- 3. Copies of this course will be supplied by the Fleet Instructor Officer to the Senior Officers of groups, and will be available on demand from the Senior Officer of a group for use in Ships and establishments in that group in which no Schoolmaster is borne. The Senior Officer of a group will detail a Schoolmaster to correct these papers and give assistance to the candidates.
- 4. In ships and establishments carrying a Schoolmaster personal instruction will be given.
- 5. The School Register (A.S. 396) should be kept by all ships, as detailed in Section A.

- 6. In all ships and T.B.D.'s a rating who passed the examination for accelerated advancement to man's rating, or any higher examination, may be appointed Acting Schoolmaster for the purpose of giving individual assistance.
- 7. Copies of all courses are to be forwarded to the Headmaster, R.A.N. College, Jervis Bay.

C .- HIGHER EDUCATIONAL TEST.

The R.A.N. Syllabus is the same as the R.N. Syllabus as laid down in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Appendix X. Part XVII.

1. Instruction for this examination will be carried out by correspondence and individual instruction. The various subjects will be dealt with as follows:—

I.—General Knowledge.

- (a) A paper will be issued each week drawing attention to the leading current events and other matters, with a few notes on each.
- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.

II.—History.

- (a) A course of twenty lectures and explanatory notes, based on the three books—Groundwork of British History, by Warner and Marten, Section III., Blackie and Sons; The British Empire, by Sir Charles Lucas, Macmillan and Co.: and The Royal Navy, by John Leyland, Cambridge University Press—will be prepared and issued, one a week, together with a statement of the pages of the text books the candidate is to read during the coming week.
- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.

III.—Geography.

- (a) A course of twenty lectures and explanatory notes, based on the three books—Geography of the British Empire, by Bunting and Coller, Cambridge University Press; Applied Geography, by Scott, Keltie, Philip, and Son, Fleet-street; or Gateways of Commerce, Fairgrieve and Young; and Physical Geography, by Huxley and Gregory, Macmillan—will be prepared and issued, one a week, together with a statement of the pages of the textbooks the candidate is to read during the coming week.
- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.

IV.—Navigation (I.).

- (a) A preliminary course of ten lectures will be prepared by the Instructor Officer on the following syllabus (being a selected part of the full syllabus):—
 - To write a short definition or explanation, accompanied by sketch or diagram when possible, of the following:-
 - Great circles; small circles; the equator; the poles; a meridian; parallels of latitude; difference of latitudes; difference of longitude; departure; nautical mile; rhumb line; prime meridian; azimuth; magnetic

meridian; true course of a ship; magnetic course; compass course; variation; deviation. To apply variation and deviation in the correction of courses and

To be able to give a brief description of the shape of the earth; the revolution of the earth on its axis; the earth's orbit; the moon's orbit.

The traverse table. The use of the formula:-

dep. - = d long. cos mean lat.

- The Mercator's chart, brief description and advantages; how to read an Admiralty chart; chart abbreviations; to mark on a chart a position whose latitude and longitude are given; to measure the bearing and distance of one point from another on a chart; to plot a ship's track on a chart given the times of alteration of course and speed.
- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.
- (c) A further course of ten lectures on the remainder of the syllabus (K.R. & A.I., Appendix X., Part XVII.) will be prepared for use with candidates who do not go to Flinders Naval Depôt for special courses.

V .- Navigation (II.).

- (a) Ranks and ratings who have obtained first class marks in Navigation (I.) will be given, when practicable, a three months' course at Flinders Naval Depôt.
- (b) A course of twenty lectures will be prepared for those candidates who are unable to go to Flinders Naval Depôt.

VI.—Navigation (III.).

- (a) Ranks and ratings who have obtained first class marks in Navigation (I) will be given, when practicable, a three months' course at Flinders Naval Depôt.
- (b) A course of twenty lectures will be prepared for those candidates who are unable to go to Flinders Naval Depôt.

VII.—Practical Mathematics.

- (a) A preliminary course of ten lectures will be prepared by the Instructor Officer on the following syllabus (being a selected part of the full syllabus):—
 - Practical applications of arithmetic and mensuration, e.g., the keeping of simple accounts in connexion with messing and stores, percentages, averages, paint required for a given surface, or canvas for a sail, capacity of a drum or tank, weight of water in a flooded compartment or coal capacity of a bunker, ratio, proportion, variation; the use of logarithms in simple cases.

Algebraical signs and symbols and their use; the rules of indices; the expression of an algebraical formula in words and of a rule as a formula; to find the value of any one term of a formula when numerical values of the remainder are given; examples of formula connected with Service matters.

Simple equations of one or two unknowns; application to the solution of problems; the simpler geometrical properties of lines, angles, and triangles.

Meaning of the terms trigonometrical ratios, sine, cosine, and tangent in relation to an angle less than a right angle. To find these ratios for a given angle by construction and the converse; given one ratio, to calculate the values of the remaining two.

- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.
- (c) A further course of ten lectures on the remainder of the syllabus (K.R. & A.I., Appendix X., Part XVII.) will be prepared for use with candidates who do not go to Flinders Naval Depôt for special courses.

VIII.—Mechanics.

- (a) A preliminary course of ten lectures will be prepared by the Instructor Officer, on the following syllabus (being a selected part of the full syllabus):—
 - Ideas of force from common experience; balanced and unbalanced forces; force measured by comparison with the weight of a body or with the extension or compression of a spring; force, a directed quantity; force can be represented completely by a straight line; resultant of two or more forces; equilibrium; the triangle of forces—an experimental fact; resolved part of a force in any direction; three forces in equilibrium must meet in a point or be parallel.
 - The idea of leverage; "moment" of a force about a point; clockwise and anti-clockwise moments; in cases of equilibrium the sum of the clockwise moments is equal to the sum of the anti-clockwise; application to solution of practical problems; parallel forces; line of action of resultant; couples; centre of gravity; position in case of triangle, rectangle, &c.; change in position of centre of gravity of a ship when a heavy weight such as a gun is put on board, taken out, or shifted a known distance; pressure of a loaded beam on its supports; the steelyard.
 - Speed; uniform velocity; velocity represented by a straight line; triangle of velocities; velocity that is steadily increasing or decreasing in amount; example of falling body; rate of change of velocity; value of "g"; average velocity; height attained by body projected vertically upwards.
 - Unbalanced force the cause of change of motion; pull of the earth the cause of increasing velocity in the case of a body falling freely; the pull of the earth proportional to the "quantity of matter" in a body; mass; weight; weight of 1 lb. taken as unit of force; inertia.
 - Special properties of liquids; fluid pressure; the hydraulic press; pressure at a given depth in sea water; density; specific gravity.
- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.

(c) A further course of ten lectures on the remainder of the syllabus (K.R. & A.I., Appendix X., Part XVII.) will be prepared for use with candidates who do not go to Flinders Naval Depôt for special courses.

IX .- Magnetism and Electricity.

- (a) A preliminary course of ten lectures will be prepared by the Instructor Officer on the following syllabus (being a selected part of the full syllabus):—
 - Magnetic substances; elementary properties of magnets; their action on one another; polarity; magnetic induction; magnetic properties of iron and steel; residual magnetism; the earth a magnet; the magnetic field; lines of force; the magnetic compass; variation; deviation; magnetic screening.

Electrification by friction; conductors and non-conductors; electrostatic induction; potential; capacity; condensers; specific inductive capacity; induction electrical machine.

Current electricity; simple voltaic cells; forms in common use in the service; local action; polarization; effect of the current; chemical, heating magnetic; chemical measurement of current strength.

The electric current; current, electromotive force resistance; resistance of a conductor depending on material, area of cross-section and length; units in practical use; fall of potential in a current-bearing wire; the relation of E = RC; simple and divided circuits; arrangement of cells in series and parallel.

- (b) A few questions will be issued with each paper, and, on being answered, will be corrected and returned with explanatory notes.
- (c) A further course of ten lectures on the remainder of the syllabus (K.R. & A.I., Appendix X., Part XVII.) will be prepared for use with candidates who do not go to Flinders Naval Depôt for special courses.
- The course outlined in Section I. will be prepared independently by the Senior Educational Officer of each group mentioned in paragraph 3.

The courses outlined in Sections II., III., IV., V., VI., VII., VIII., and IX. will be prepared under the direction of the Fleet Instructor Officer. The courses will be forwarded to the Headmaster, Royal Australian Naval College, who will reproduce sufficient copies for all ships and establishments, and forward them to the Fleet Instructor Officer. Requisition is to be made by Commanding Officers to Senior Officers of educational groups for copies of the courses required. Senior officers of groups are to obtain copies of courses from the Commodore Commanding H.M.A. Fleet.

Copies of all courses and examination papers are to be forwarded to the Headmaster, Royal Australian Naval College, Jervis Bay.

- 3. The Senior Officers of Educational groups will be as follows:-
- (a) Commodore Commanding H.M.A. Fleet for Ships and Establishments under his command.
- (b) Captain Superintendent of Training for Ships and Establishments in Victoria, and those under the direct orders of the Naval Board.
- (c) Commanding Officer, Royal Australian Naval College, for College and attached ships.

- (d) Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, for Penguin, Tingira, and ships in reserve in Sydney.
- 4. The following Officers will be responsible for the issuing of the correspondence courses to the different groups, and the correcting of examination questions:—

(a) The Fleet Instructor Officer, ?

(b) The Senior Instructor Officer, Flinders Naval Depot.

- (c) The Senior Instructor Officer, Royal Australian Naval College.
- (d) The Senior Schoolmaster Officer of H.A.M.S. Tingira.
- 5. Examination papers in the subject-matter of the preliminary courses of IV., VIII., VIII., and IX. will be set by the Fleet Instructor Officer, reproduced as in paragraph 2, and issued by the Commodore Cammanding H.M.A. Fleet to Senior Officers of educational groups in demand.

The worked papers will be corrected by the Senior Educational Officer of the group to which the candidate belongs, and the worked papers forwarded to Navy Office, together with marks obtained by the candidate.

This examination will usually be held in April on dates to be promulgated by Navy Order.

Copies of examination papers to be sent to Headmaster, Royal Australian Naval College, and Navy Office.

6. Names of all candidates obtaining 55 per cent. of the marks are to be forwarded to the Navy Office as early as possible, accompanied by a recommendation from the Commanding Officer, stating whether these candidates are fit for courses at Flinders Naval Depot.

Any candidate having previously obtained 50 per cent. in any subject in the Higher Educational Test may be recommended for a course at Flinders Naval Depôt in this subject, without further preliminary examination.

Candidates so recommended will be given, if practicable, a three months' course at Flinders Naval Depct to complete the courses selected.

Candidates who cannot be spared to attend these courses may complete Higher Educational Test by correspondence courses in their ships.

- 8. Candidates who are sent to Flinders Naval Depôt for Courses as above, and have not completed the Courses of Sections I., II., and III., in their ships and establishments, will complete these Courses at Flinders Naval Depôt.
- No candidate will be allowed a second continuous course in the same subject at Flinders Naval Depôt, except in special circumstances.
- Records of students taking Correspondence Courses will be shown in the School Register (A.S. 396).

COMMONWEALTH PRECEDENCE TABLE.

In connexion with the Commonwealth Precedence Table published in the Commonwealth Gazette, dated 28th January, 1914, His Excellency the Governor General has ruled that under Item 10, only two Naval and two Military Officers are to be considered as being "Senior Officers in command of Naval and Military Forces."

The two Naval Officers are-

(a) The First Naval Member of the Naval Board.

(b) The Officer Commanding, H.M.A. Sea-going Fleet,

or the Officer duly appointed by the Governor-General in Council to act in either of those offices during a temporary vacancy or absence of either.

2. His Excellency has further ruled that the First Naval Member, or the Officer appointed to act as First Naval Member, takes precedence before all Naval Officers, whether senior or junior to him in the Navy List, at official functions which he attends in his capacity as First Naval Member of the Naval Board.

ADVANCEMENT OF OFFICERS' STEWARDS AND COOKS.

Advancements of Officers' Stewards and Cooks will be made in accordance with requirements, and from Roster, by the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, Westernport.

- 2. Advancements by Commanding Officers in vacancies arising in Ships are to be to the acting rating only, and will cease on leaving the Ship, or earlier, in the event of the vacancy being filled, or at any time, as may be decided by the Commanding Officer.
- 3. The qualifications for all ratings above Officers' Steward and Cook, 3rd Class, are to include :—
 - (i) Recommendation by Commanding Officer on Return A.S. 507.
 - (ii) At least one year's service in a Seagoing Ship in present rating.
 (iii) Ability not below "superior" for at least one year preceding.
 - (iv) Continuous very good conduct for one year, immediately preceding
 - advancement.

 (v) For Officers' Chief Steward and Cook, five years' minimum service as Officers' Steward, 1st Class, or Officers' Cook, 1st Class, will be required, together with ability not below "superior" for at least three consecutive years.
- 4. Before advancement to the rating of Officers' Steward or Officers' Cook, 1st Class, it will be necessary for the men concerned to pass the Educational Test, Part I.
- 5. Except for bread-making, for which will be substituted instruction in the different special dishes required by Officers' Messes, Officers' Cooks are to undergo similar courses of instruction in the Cookery School at Flinders Naval Depot, to those laid down for Ships' Cook ratings. New entry Officers' Cooks will, during the period of training, be detailed for duty in Officers' Galleys at Flinders Naval Depôt in so far as the training being carried out in the School of Cookery permits.

New entry Officers' Stewards will, as far as possible, undergo training at Flinders Naval Depôt as follows:—

Care of Cabin and Clothes; Laying a Table; Waiting at Table; Cleaning and Care of Silver and Mess Traps generally; Keeping of Mess and Wine Accounts; Knowledge of Marketing; Carving of Meats and Poultry.

For the different grades of Officers' Stewards no professional examinations will be required.

6. In future, the grade equivalent to "Ordinary Seaman" will be termed Officers' Steward or Cook, 4th Class, and progressive pay of 6s. 8d. and 6s. 10d. a day will be payable to the "Able Seaman" rating (Officers' Steward and Cook, 3rd Class) after three years and six years man's service respectively.

Officers' Stewards and Cooks, 4th Class, will be advanced to Officers' Stewards and Cooks, 3rd Class, after one year's service as such, subject to the approval of the Captain.

REDUCTION OF R.A.N. PERSONNEL (SEA-GOING.)

In view of the reduction of the Fleet in commission which has recently been effected, a material reduction in the *personnel* of the Sea-going Forces becomes necessary. This reduction will be effected in the main by reversion of ranks and ratings lent from the Royal Navy. The position as regards R.A.N. *personnel* proper is as stated hereunder:—

I. OFFICERS.

- The Board have under consideration the reduction of a limited number of commissioned and subordinate Officers in the following Branches:—
 - (a) Military Branch, exclusive of Engineer Commanders, Engineer Lieutenant-Commanders, and Engineer Lieutenants.
 - (b) Chaplains.
 - (c) Accountant Branch.
- 3. To assist the Board in the selection of the Officers to be reduced, up to such numbers as may be decided upon, Officers who wish to retire voluntarily under the conditions prescribed hereunder, are invited to submit applications to do so through the usual channels. It must be clearly understood, however, that the acceptance of any resignation will be subject to the requirements of the Service, and to the approval of the Naval Board.
- 4. Compensation will be payable to an Officer compulsorily retired under this Order, irrespective of whether he submits his name voluntarily or not. The terms of compensation approved are as follow; but Officers must understand that these terms are subject to ratification by Parliament, and those

who submit their names voluntarily must agree to accept any modification of the conditions which may subsequently be decided upon by Parliament:—

(a) Any Officer retired under this Order will be paid as compensation, one month's salary for each completed year of service. Pro rata payments will also be made for each additional completed month of service, but no pro rata payment will be made for any period of less than one month.

Service will be reckoned from the date of first appointment, and time served as Cadet Midshipman at the Royal Australian Naval College will be allowed to count for the purpose of compensation.

- (b) The minimum sum paid as compensation will be £200.
- (c) Compensation is in addition to deferred pay due and to any leave accruing under the Regulations (notwithstanding the provisions of Article 50, Financial Regulations (Sea-going).
- (d) Compensation will be based on the rates of active and deferred pay which the officer is receiving at the date of retirement, together with any allowances of a permanent character in the nature of pay, and victualling allowance. Married and dependent allowances will also be included in the case of an Officer who, having retained the old rates of pay, is still in receipt of these allowances.
- (e) Compensation will not be applicable to Cadet Midshipmen withdrawn from the Royal Australian Naval College.
- (f) In the case of an Officer who is nearing the retiring age, the sum payable as compensation will in no case exceed the amount which he would have received if he had been retained until reaching the retiring age, in addition to 12 months' pay on retirement.
- (g) Payment in lieu of furlough or extended leave will be made in addition to compensation under the terms of Articles 45 to 49 of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going), provided that in the case of extended leave the Officer has attained the prescribed age for retirement, or will attain the prescribed age for retirement on or before the expiration of the period of extended leave due.
- 5. An Officer retired under this Order will be entitled to passage at Government expense to the capital city of the State in which is situated his intended place of residence, provided that the expense of such passage does not exceed that involved in passage to the place from which he was first appointed.
- 6. Previous State service, which counts as service in the Permanent Naval Forces for the purpose of pay in lieu of furlough, will also be deemed to be service for the purpose of compensation, provided that there is no break between the State and the Commonwealth service.
- 7. The compensation scale will not apply to an Officer in either of the following classes:—
 - (a) An Officer who has been or may be discharged as medically unfit.
 - (b) An Officer who voluntarily retires otherwise than in response to this order.
 - (c) An Officer who has been or may be placed on half-pay under the terms of Regulations 109 and 110 of the Naval Forces Regulations (Statutory Rule No. 1 of 1921).

8. An Officer who desires to submit his name voluntarily for retirement under this Order, in accordance with paragraph 4 above, should forward his application so as to reach the Navy Office not later than the 31st July, 1922. Resignation, if approved, will be made effective as soon after that date as the Officer can be spared.

9. An Officer who is selected for retirement, without having voluntarily submitted his name, will be given not less than one month's notice of retirement.

10. An Officer who is retired under this Order and wishes to retain his commission will, if eligible, be placed on the Retired List.

II. RATINGS.

11. The necessary reductions as regards ratings are, as stated above, being effected mainly by the reversion of Royal Navy personnel. The Board are, however, prepared to release from their engagements, without payment of the usual "purchase money," a limited number of the following ratings, if they desire their discharge:—

E.R.A. 4th Class. Stokers. Sick Berth ratings. Blacksmiths. Joiners. Cooks.

12. Applications for discharge from the above ratings have been called for by signal and in many cases have already been approved. Applications may be forwarded until further notice. Each case will be considered on its merits, and it must be distinctly understood that, if discharge is approved, no compensation will be paid.

13. Ratings, who volunteer and are eligible, will be enrolled in the R.A.F.R.

R.N. OFFICERS SPECIAL TERMS OF RETIREMENT.

With reference to Navy Order No. 175 of 1922, advice has been received from the Naval Representative, London, by cable, that, under the latest scheme recently promulgated, the age of compulsory retirement for Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank and Warrant Officers has been reduced to 50 years, as from the 12th August, 1922.

- 2. Commissioned Warrant and Warrant Officers of 50 years of age, or above, on 12th August, 1922, may retire with the rate of Retired Pay they would have received at 55 years (see Quarterly R.N. List, page 2268), with a Gratuity of £150 for each completed year they are under the age of 55 years, plus £37 10s. for each completed period of three months in the case of an incomplete year, up to a maximum of £500. For the purpose of deciding the rate of Retired Pay, promotion from Warrant Officer to Commissioned Officer from Warrant Rank automatically increases, subject to satisfactory record, on ten years' seniority.
- 3. Commissioned Warrant and Warrant Officers under 50 years of age on 12th August, 1922, may retire, irrespective of age, on pay calculated on rank and seniority on the 12th August, 1922, with an additional two years' service in rank, plus a Gratuity of £500.
- 4. Warrant Officers of eight years' seniority or above on the 12th August, 1922, will be granted the minimum Retired Pay prescribed for Commissioned Officer from Warrant Rank, viz., £200, plus a Gratuity of £500.
- 5. The following cablegram has been received from the Admiralty regarding the terms for special retirement of Officers:—
 - "Reference to arrangements for special retirements of Officers contained in Fleet Order 1352/1922 number of applications from Warrant Officers and above under age of 50 on 12th August, 1922, to be provided under provisions paragraph 39 of that Order being greater in all cases than number of Officers to be reduced. Lists must be closed at early date. All from Officers of these classes serving on Foreign stations who wish to be considered must reach Admiralty on or before 31st July."
- The Board are prepared to cable to the Admiralty, at Government expense, all applications of R.N. Officers to retire.

ACTING CHIEF E.R.A. 2nd CLASS, CHIEF STOKER, STOKER PETTY OFFICER, LEADING STOKER, AND ACTING LEADING STOKER ADVANCEMENT TO.

Until further orders, the following rules for advancement to the ratings of Acting Chief Engine Room Artificer 2nd Class, Chief Stoker, Stoker Petty Officer, Leading Stoker, and Acting Leading Stoker are to be observed in the R.A.N.:—

(a) Advancement to Acting Chief E.R.A. 2nd Class or Chief Stoker:

Engine Room Artificers and Stoker Petty Officers who have not served for the qualifying period prescribed in K.R. & A.I., Appendix XV., Sections IV. and V., numbers 4 and 47, as necessary before advancement to Acting Chief E.R.A. and Chief Stoker respectively, may be permitted to sit for the qualifying examination. If successful, they may be subsequently recommended for advancement on Form A.S. 507; but until they have completed the qualifying period prescribed in K.R. & A.I., their names should be shown on a separate sheet (marked "Return of ratings passed, qualified in all respects except as regards time, and recommended "). If advanced before completing the qualifying time, they are to hold the acting rating until such period has expired. In the case of Chief E.R.A's. 2nd Class, this would mean that a greater period than one year would be served with the acting rating. In future, E.R.A's. and S.P.O's. are to be advanced to Chief E.R.A. and Chief Stoker, respectively, only by the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, after obtaining the approval of the Naval Board.

(b) Advancement to Stoker Petty Officer:

All advancements to the rating of acting or confirmed Stoker Petty Officer are to be made by the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, after obtaining the approval of the Naval Board.

The acting rating only may be given to men previously selected as Mechanician Candidates at the conclusion of the Mechanical Training Course, or to men advanced before they have served the necessary

qualifying time.

Men who have already been confirmed as Leading Stoker without passing through the Mechanical Training Course or are confirmed forthwith under paragraph (c), sub-paragraph (iii) below, may be recommended for advancement to Stoker Petty Officer, provided they fulfil the conditions prescribed in regard to such men in K.R. & A.I., Appendix XV., Section V., No. 90 (c) and (d). All other men should not be recommended for Stoker Petty Officer until they have qualified for S.P.O. in the examination held at the conclusion of the Mechanical Training Course.

(c) Advancement to Acting and Confirmed Leading Stoker:

(i) The provisions of K.R. & A.I., Appendix XV., Part I., Section V., Number 105 (F) are suspended. Men may be advanced to the acting rating (if fully qualified, and not within two years of the completion of their engagements) by Commanding Officers, in vacancies caused by an actual reduction of the numbers of Leading Stokers in the R.A.N., e.g., through advancement to Stoker Petty Officer, disrating to Stoker, or final discharge from the Service, and also when the Commanding Officer,

Flinders Naval Depôt, has informed the Commanding Officer of the ship in writing that the ship cannot be completed to complement in regard to Acting Leading Stokers. Otherwise, advancements to Acting Leading Stoker are to be made by the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, after obtaining Naval Board approval. Vacancies caused by drafting are not to be filled except by authority of the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt.

- (ii) As a temporary measure, Stokers 1st Class may be rated Acting Leading Stoker after one year's service as such, but the standard is not to be lowered.
- (iii) Any Acting Leading Stoker who held the rating on the 12th February, 1919, and has served as such continuously since that date, is to be confirmed forthwith, provided his character is satisfactory, and he is recommended by the Engineer Officer.
- (iv) At the end of each quarter, a return of Acting Leading Stokers who are recommended for the Mechanical Training Course should be forwarded to the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt. As such ratings, if they fail in the preliminary educational examination held at the beginning of the Course, or if they fail to qualify at the end of the Course, will revert to Stoker 1st Class, a man's name may, at his own request, be omitted from the return of men recommended for the Mechanical Training Course, but, if there should be at any time an insufficient number of recommended ratings available for the Course, the Commanding Officer, Flinders Naval Depôt, has authority to call in for the Course any Acting Leading Stoker. Any Acting Leading Stoker who has held the acting rating for two years is to be discharged to Flinders Naval Depôt to go through the Mechanical Training Course.
- (v) The Mechanical Training Course is to be of 13 weeks' duration. At the commencement of the Course, ratings who have not passed the Educational Test, Part I., are to be given a simple educational test, and, if unsuccessful, they are to be reverted to the rating of Stoker 1st Class, and drafted back to their ships. Engineer Officers should encourage promising Stokers 1st Class to sit for, and pass the Educational Test, Part I., observing that the passing of this Test (although not obligatory), and the obtaining of the required Auxiliary Watch Certificate, constitute the best preparation for the Course. At the end of the fourth week, the men are to be examined, and divided in order of merit, as follows:—

50 per cent. Fitters and Turners. 30 per cent. Boilermakers.

10 per cent. Coppersmiths.

10 per cent. Moulders.

Only those selected as Fitters and Turners are eligible for provisional selection as Mechanician Candidates. At the conclusion of the Course, the men are to be examined, and as a result may—

- (a) be provisionally selected as Mechanician Candidates, and rated A/S.P.O. (See para. (b), sub. para. (ii) above);
- (b) qualify for Stoker Petty Officer; or
- (c) qualify for Leading Stoker, but fail for Stoker Petty Officer. Men who qualify as Stoker Petty Officer will gain seniority as follows:—

6 months for over 95 per cent. at final examination,

4 months for 85 per cent. to 95 per cent. at final exami-

2 months for 70 per cent. to 84 per cent. at final examination

(but they will not be paid retrospectively), and if this makes their seniority as Acting Leading Stoker more than one year, they will be confirmed as Leading Stoker from the date they attained one year's seniority as Acting Leading Stoker, provided that their inclusion in the Class was delayed, through no fault of their own, after the date on which they had served nine months as Acting Leading Stoker.

Men who qualify for the confirmed rating of Leading Stoker, but fail for Stoker Petty Officer, will not gain seniority as Acting Leading Stoker, but will be eligible for confirmation upon attaining one year's seniority as such. They will not be eligible for further advancement to Stoker Petty Officer, but they may, however, be recommended again for the Mechanical Training Course after a further year's service, and if they fail to qualify for Stoker Petty Officer, after inclusion for the second time in the Mechanical Training Class, they will lose the prospects of ever becoming Stoker Petty Officers.

(d) Promotion Roster for advancement to Stoker Petty Officer:

The names of confirmed Leading Stokers will not be entered on the Depôt Roster for promotion to Stoker Petty Officer until they have been included in Return A.S. 507.

The system of marking to be used in determining the position of a man's name on the Promotion Roster will be that approved for general use for all Promotion Rosters, but, in the case of Leading Stokers, marks given for "Service in present rating" are only to be applied to the time served as confirmed Leading Stoker.

If, however, adequate care is exercised in the stripping, assembling, and use of the rifles, the wood will keep in good condition.

DEFERRED PAY CLAIMS.

With regard to Finance Authorities issued for payment of Deferred Pay to personnel serving in H.M.A. Ships, the following action should be taken if, on the receipt of the authority, the payee has been transferred to another ship:—

The claim should be forwarded for payment to the ship to which the rating has been transferred, under cover of a memorandum.

. If only one payment is included in the Finance Authority, the original authority should be sent forward as an enclosure to the memorandum.

If more than one payment is shown on the Finance Authority, an extract should be made therefrom, and the extract sent forward with the memorandum.

In all such cases the Director of Navy Accounts should be immediately advised of the ship to which the authority is transferred.

2. This procedure does not, however, apply in the case of personnel reverting to the United Kingdom. In such instances the claim and Finance Authority should be returned to the Director of Navy Accounts, who will arrange for payment to be made in London.

USE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS IN OFFICERS' MESSES.

The consumption of alcoholic liquors in Officers' Messes on board H.M.A. Ships and Establishments is to be restricted to the hours between 1100 and 1400 and between 1730 and 2300 or the time of closing the mess if earlier than 2300. On occasions of Mess Entertainments the Commanding Officer may grant special permission for an extension.

- 2. At times other than the above all liquors are to be locked up.
- 3. Tossing or gambling for drinks is strictly prohibited.
- Presidents of Messes are responsible that the above orders are carried out and any infringement is to be reported.
- No spirits or liquers are to be consumed nor are any stocks of spirits to be maintained in gunroom messes.
- 6. In accordance with the spirit of paragraph 5, gun room officers messing in Ward Room Messes are not allowed spirits or liquers; in special cases, subject to the prior consent of the Captain or the Executive Officer, this prohibition may be waived as regards guests.
 - 7. Navy Order No. 136 of 1922 is hereby cancelled.

ARRANGEMENTS WITH THE STATE GOVERNMENTS IN RELATION TO COMMONWEALTH AND STATE OFFICERS CALLED AS WITNESSES ON BEHALF OF THE COMMONWEALTH OR OF A STATE.

The following arrangements made between the Commonwealth and State Governments, in relation to Commonwealth and State Officers called as witnesses on behalf of the Commonwealth or of a State, are promulgated for general information and guidance:—

When a member of the Commonwealth Naval Forces or a permanent or temporary civilian officer in the employ of the Defence Department (Navy) is summoned or called as a witness on behalf of a State, he shall, as regards his attendance to give evidence, be deemed to be in the performance of his duty as a Commonwealth Officer and no witness fees (other than the expenses, if any, paid by the Commonwealth for his travelling allowances) shall be charged by or paid to him on account of his being so summoned or called, but the State on whose behalf he was so summoned or called shall pay to the Commonwealth such sum as is sufficient to recoup the sum (if any) paid by it for the travelling allowance of the Officer.

2. When a State Officer who is subject to the Public Service Regulations of the State is summoned or called as a witness on behalf of the Commonwealth, he shall, as regards his attendance to give evidence, be deemed to be in the performance of his duty as a State Officer and no witness fees (other than the expenses, if any, paid by the State for his travelling allowances) shall be charged by or paid to him on account of his being so summoned or called, but the Commonwealth shall pay to the State such sum as is sufficient to recoup the sum (if any) paid by it for the travelling allowance of the Officer.

3. Any claim for travelling allowances of an Officer payable to the Commonwealth by a State pursuant to this arrangement may be rendered direct by the proper Officer of the State Department concerned, and any such claim payable to a State by the Commonwealth may be rendered direct by the proper Officer of the State Department concerned to the proper Officer of the Commonwealth Department concerned.



SWIMMING TESTS.

With reference to Navy Order No. 96 of 1922, it has been decided that, as a standard swimming test in the R.A.N., every man in the future must be able to swim 40 yards in a duck suit in deep water, after which he must be able to keep himself afloat for three minutes.

- Qualifications in the test should be awarded as follows:—
 - "Fair"—meaning that the men only just managed to pass, and should be given more practice.
 - "Good"—an average swimmer.
 - " Very Good "-a strong swimmer.

These qualifications are intended to assist Officers at sea to recognise backward swimmers.

- 3. Notations on Service Certificates should be made as follows :-
 - "Passed Swimming Test" (P.S.T.)," followed by qualification and date: or
 - "Cannot swim," and date.
- 4. Every effort should be made to insure that all Officers and Men pass the Swimming Test.
- The last sentence of paragraph 3 of A.F.O. 3602/1920, the provisions of which were adopted by Navy Order No. 96 of 1921, is hereby cancelled. (P.361/1/4.)

A new form of Excess Luggage Warrant in book form has been adopted for general use in H.M.A. Ships, Naval Establishments, and Offices. Each book contains one hundred warrants. A first supply of one book will be made without demand to each Ship, Establishment, and Office, and demands for future supplies should be made on the Director of Navy Accounts. - 4. Attention is drawn to the necessity that a separate Excess Luggage Warrant be supplied to the person travelling, corresponding with the railway warrants necessary for the journey, e.g., a rating travelling from Crib Point to Nowra would require to be issued with the following Warrants:—
 - (i) Railway Warrant Excess Luggage Warrant ... Crib Point to Melbourne.
 - (ii) ditto. Melbourne to Sydney.

and

(iii) ditto.

Sydney to Nowra.

5. Provision has been made on the new form for the insertion of the weight of the luggage allowed to be carried at Departmental expense by the person travelling, vide prescribed scale set forth in Financial Regulations (Sea-Going), Article 22, Clause 1, and Naval Financial Regulations 74D. (This weight is inclusive of the passenger allowance granted by Railway Department, viz., 1 cwt. in respect of 1st class passengers, and 84 lbs. for 2nd class.)

Any weight in excess of the prescribed scale allowance referred to must be paid for by the person travelling at the time of booking his luggage.

Where a member is travelling with his luggage, care must be taken to see that the free passenger allowance, which is covered by his ticket, is granted, otherwise he will render himself liable to refund any extra charge which may be incurred.

- 6. In the case of Naval Drafts, the total baggage would not ordinarily exceed the total luggage allowance as per prescribed scale. Authority is, therefore, given in the case of Drafts for the total service baggage to be carried at Government expense, and Excess Luggage Warrants issued in such circumstances should be amended accordingly.

CLAIMS OF R.A.N. PERSONNEL TO MEDALS IN RESPECT OF MILITARY SERVICE.

With reference to Navy Order No. 410 of 1921, it is notified that steps are being taken to verify the claims of the Officers and Men mentioned in the returns rendered in accordance with the Navy Order quoted.

- 2. In the event of any further claims being made by Officers and Men whose names were not included in the returns rendered under Navy Order No. 410 of 1921, particulars of claims should be forwarded to Navy Office for investigation.
- 3. Generally speaking, no Naval rating should be permitted to wear any Medal or Decoration which is not covered by a notation on his Service Certificate, and notations in regard to award of Medals should be made only on Navy Office authority. A Commanding Officer may, however, upon examination of medals produced, or investigation of a rating's Certificate of previous service; give provisional authority for the wearing of Medals or Ribands claimed in respect of such service; but full particulars should be reported to Navy Office, in order that the claims may be investigated and authority issued for the necessary notation on the claimant's Service Certificate.
- 4. All new entries who have seen previous War Service are to be interrogated as to the war medals earned in respect of service in any Branch of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, and particulars should be reported to Navy Office for investigation, provisional authority to wear ribands and medals being given, in the meanwhile, under Clause 3.

CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF SECONDARY BATTERIES.

The use of other than pure distilled water for Lead Secondary Batteries is very injurious and seriously affects their life and efficiency.

- Water from the supply mains, ordinary filtered water, and water from ship's evaporators not specially constructed for the purpose, is not to be used.
- 3. The life and efficiency of Lead Secondary Batteries are also seriously affected by the use of electrolyte of incorrect density.
- 4. The specific gravity of the electrolyte specified by the various manufacturers for use in their secondary batteries is in all cases specified for a temperature of 60° Fahr. It is therefore necessary to correct the hydrometer readings to the standard temperature of 60° Fahr. The density varies '0004 per degree Fahrenheit.
- 5. When the temperature of the electrolyte is above 60° the correction is to be added to, and when below 60°, subtracted from the hydrometer readings.

Example-

- (a) Hydrometer reading 1·224 at 80° Fahr. 80° Fahr. = 20° above 60° Fahr. 20 × ·0004 = ·008 to be added 1·224 + ·008 = 1·232 at 60° Fahr.
- (b) Hydrometer reading 1 · 236 at 50° Fahr. 50° Fahr. = 10° below 60° Fahr. 10 × · 0004 = 004 to be subtracted 1 · 236 - · 004 = 1 · 232 at 60° Fahr.
- 6. A limited number of specific gravity temperature correction charts has been supplied to H.M.A. ships and shore establishments. Further copies may be obtained upon application to the N.S.O., Sydney. Copies of this chart are to be posted for the information of Officers and men responsible for the care and maintenance of secondary batteries.
- 7. The importance of using only pure distilled water for the electrolyte and final washings in reconditioning cells is to be impressed upon all concerned.

ORDERS TO REGULATE THE CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF WARLIKE STORES, GUNS, ETC., IN THE ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVY.

Section 1.

DUTIES OF DEPUTY ARMAMENT SUPPLY OFFICER.

The Deputy Armament Supply Officer, under the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, is in charge of the Naval Armament Depôts at Sydney. He is generally responsible for the upkeep of guns, ammunition, and other Naval Armament Stores necessary for the ships and depôts of the Royal Australian Navy. He is responsible that the Magazine and other regulations with regard to the safe keeping of ammunition and explosives are carried out in the Armament Depôts.

 He is responsible to the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer for the Naval Armament Depôts in accordance with the Regulations for Naval Armament Services and any subsequent amendments or additions thereto.

3. In the absence of the Assistant Inspector of Naval Ordnance he is to arrange for, and carry out, the annual and other examinations, if necessary asking for the assistance of a specialist officer from the Fleet. On no account is the examination of any stores for any year to be omitted unless the omission is authorized by the Director of Ordnance, Torpedoes and Mines.

Section 1a.

INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING NAVAL ARMAMENT STORES.

. The Deputy Armament Supply Officer will furnish on the 15th January, April, July and October quarterly statements of explosives (Form O.48) to the Naval Board, and on 1st April in each year he will submit for Naval Armament Stores and Ammunition to cover requirements up to 30th June of the next year but one.

2. In order that provision may be made for stores required for the Gunnery School and Naval Reserves, the Captain Superintendent of Training and Director of Naval Reserves and Naval Reserve Mobilization respectively, are to forward to the Deputy Armament Supply Officer by the 1st February in each year, a complete list of those stores that are required to complete the various Depôts up to full establishment. 303-inch Small Arm ammunition for the Naval Reserves (except that for the District Naval Officer, Sydney, who is to demand from the Deputy Armament Supply Officer), is to be obtained direct from the local Military Authorities.

3. In all demands for Naval Armament Stores allowed by establishment, the columns "Establishment Proportion" and "Remaining" are to be filled in. Proper forms, which can be obtained from the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, as required should be used.

4. On 1st October in each year District Naval Officers are to forward to the Deputy Armament Supply Officer a statement of quantities, condition and storage of Explosive Stores, together with any remarks thereon.

 Demands for Naval Armament Stores not allowed by Establishment are to be marked "Special" and submitted to the Senior Naval Officer. The reasons for demanding are to be inserted.

6. Ships leaving Sydney for lengthy or indefinite periods are to demand sufficient practice ammunition to cover requirements for the time they will probably be away, as transport for ammunition is difficult to obtain.

Section II.

RETURNS TO BE RENDERED BY SHIPS.

All returns which are called for by Admiralty Regulations are to be rendered to the Navy Office or to the Depôt concerned.

Section IIb.

The examination of Ammunition and Ordnance in Depôts is to be governed by the "Regulations for Naval Armament Services," and "Instructions for the Inspection of Naval Armament Stores," and as they may be subsequently amended by Admiralty instructions.

2. The necessary returns are to be rendered accordingly.

Returns rendered from Depôts to the Navy Office are to be accompanied by an extra copy for despatch to the Admiralty, where applicable.

Section III.

INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING GUN MOUNTINGS, TORPEDOES AND TORPEDO TUBES IN STORE AT SYDNEY.

Gun Mountings, Torpedoes and Torpedo Tubes in store at Garden Island, Sydney, will be on the accounting charge of the Engineer Manager, Garden Island.

2. The Engineer Manager, under the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, will be responsible for the maintenance, adjustment, repair, modification, &c., of these gun mountings, torpedoes and torpedo tubes.

DONATION FROM CANTEEN FUND OF H.M.A.S. "AUSTRALIA" IN 1919 FOR THE ERECTION OF HEADSTONES ON THE GRAVES OF RATINGS BURIED IN THE DALMENY CEMETERY, SCOTLAND.

In 1919 the Canteen Committee of H.M.A.S. Australia donated a sum of £160 to be used for the upkeep of graves of ten men belonging to H.M.A.S. Australia who were buried in the Dalmeny Cemetery, South Queensferry, Scotland, and for the provision of five headstones for the graves of five of the ten men buried at the Cemetery, similar to those already erected over the graves of the other five men.

2. The Naval Representative reports that the communication received from the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Australia, expressly stated that the sum of £160 donated was to be allocated as follows:—

£100 on trust for that Ship, the interest of which is to meet the upkeep and care of the graves;

£60 for purchase of the five headstones required.

3. The Naval Representative further states that tenders for the provision and erection of five headstones, similar to those already erected, were invited from five firms in Edinburgh, and the lowest tender received is £30 for each headstone, a total of £150.

4. The Imperial Authorities now bear the cost of all maintenance charges in connexion with the graves of R.A.N. personnel buried in the United Kingdom, and, in view of the altered circumstances which have arisen since the donation was made, the Board have decided that it is now unnecessary to reserve any sum to be used towards the upkeep and care of the graves. They have therefore notified the Naval Representative that the lowest tender received, viz., £30 for each headstone, should be accepted, and that the work of erection of the headstones should be proceeded with forthwith. The Naval Representative has also been asked to report when the work has been completed, and to make a recommendation as to the disposal of the amount of the balance of £10.

PERMANENT CLERICAL OFFICERS (OFFICE STAFF)—PAYMENT FOR OVERTIME ON HOLIDAYS.

The instructions contained in clauses (iii) and (v) of Navy Order No. 402 of 1921, relating to payment for overtime on holidays, will not in future apply to permanent clerical officers (Office Staff) whose usual hours of duty are 9 a.m. to 4.30 p.m.

2. Holiday overtime to these officers will, except in regard to the hourly rate, be governed by the provisions of clause 8 of the Public Service Arbitrator's Determination in the case of the Commonwealth Public Service Clerical Association, and the instructions issued by Navy Office in connexion therewith. Any such officer, therefore, who is instructed to work on a holiday involving overtime extending into the evening hours should be required to remain on duty till 5.45 p.m. before ceasing duty for tea,

A first supply of "Manual of Naval Cookery" (revised 1922) has been received, and will be distributed to all Ships and Establishments without demand.

This Manual will be a gratuitous issue to all Ship's Cooks and Officers' Cooks, and until a further supply is received from the United Kingdom priority is to be given to all leading Cooks and below now borne. A demand for the balance required to complete gratuitous issues is then to be forwarded to the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, who will arrange supply when the balance of these Manuals now on order is received.

Commonwealth Navy Order.

REDUCTION IN R.A.N. PERSONNEL (AUXILIARY SERVICES).

It has been decided that, following on the reduction of the personnel of the Sea-going Forces, a material reduction in the personnel of the Auxiliary Services must be effected at an early date. The reductions will apply to both officers and ratings.

 A reduced establishment for the R.A.N.R. Staff and employees attached thereto is being prepared, and the numbers of officers and ratings serving will be reduced to this establishment as soon as practicable.

3. Voluntary Resignation.—Before resorting to compulsory retirement for the purpose of effecting the necessary reduction, applications for voluntary retirement will be considered. Officers and ratings who wish to retire voluntarily under the conditions prescribed hereunder, are therefore invited to submit applications to do so through the usual channels. It must be clearly understood, however, that the acceptance of any resignation will be subject to the requirements of the Service and to the approval of the Naval Board.

Applications should reach Navy Office not later than the 14th September, 1922.

4. Compulsory Retirement.—Immediately after the closing date for voluntary resignations, i.e., the 14th September, 1922, the Naval Board will proceed to decide which of these applications can be accepted, and whether any additional compulsory retirements are necessary.

5. Date of Discharge.—Officers and ratings who are compulsorily retired will be discharged as soon as their services can be spared, subject to their receiving not less than one month's notice of retirement. Officers whose voluntary resignations are accepted will be retired as soon as they can be spared.

6. Compensation.—Compensation will be payable to an officer or rating retired under this Order, irrespective of whether he submits his name voluntarily or not. The terms of compensation offered are as indicated below; but it must be understood that these terms are subject to ratification by Parliament, and persons submitting their names voluntarily must agree to accept any modification of the conditions which may subsequently be decided upon by Parliament.

7. Any officer or rating retired under this Order will be paid as compensation one month's salary for each completed year of service. Pro rata payments will also be made for each additional month of service, but no pro rata payments will be made for any period of less than one month.

8. The minimum sum payable as compensation will be-

(i) For Officers, £200.

(ii) For ratings of the relative rating of Leading Seaman and above, including General Workmen, Grades I. to III., six months' pay.

(iii) For ratings of the relative rating of Able Seaman and below, including General Workmen, Grade IV., three months' pay.

 Compensation will be based on the rates of consolidated pay and high cost of living allowance which the officer or rating is receiving at the date of retirement. 10. In the case of an officer or rating who is nearing the retiring age, the sum payable as compensation will in no case exceed the amount which he would have received if he had been retained until reaching the retiring age, in addition to twelve months' pay on retirement.

11. Furlough and Extended Leave.—Payment in lieu of furlough or extended leave will be made as prescribed in the Naval Financial Regulations, provided, however, that in the case of extended leave, payment in lieu will be made irrespective of whether the officer or rating concerned has attained the prescribed age for retirement.

12. Continuity of Service.—In all cases, compensation and/or furlough will be based on the period of continuous service immediately prior to retirement.

13. State Service.—Any previous State Service which may be permitted under Regulations to count as service in the Permanent Naval Forces for the purpose of pay in lieu of furlough will also be deemed to be service for the purpose of compensation, provided that there is no break between the State and the Commonwealth Service. Satisfactory proof of such service will be required.

14. Temporary Service.—Temporary service, either with a Commonwealth Department or with a State Department, will be included in computing compensation and pay in lieu of furlough, provided that such service is continuous with later permanent employment. Satisfactory proof of such temporary service must be produced.

15. Removal Expenses.—Removal expenses to the Home Port of an officer or rating will be allowed on retirement if the removal is carried out within three months of the date of retirement. The provisions of Naval Financial Regulation 77, sub-regulation (6), will not apply in such cases. It should be clearly understood that the amounts authorized in connexion with removal expenses cannot be paid to the individuals concerned in the event of their electing to remain in their present Districts or Sub-Districts.

16. Superannuation Scheme.—Persons retiring voluntarily or compulsorily and receiving compensation will not benefit under the proposed Superannuation Scheme which is to be submitted to Parliament.

17. Cases not entitled to Compensation.—Compensation under this Order will not be payable to—

 (a) any member or employee whose retirement or discharge has been in the nature of a penalty, or on account of unsatisfactory service or inefficiency or medical unfitness;

(b) any person whose first appointment to or in connexion with the Defence Department has not been confirmed;

(c) any person who was discharged as having reached the age for retirement;

(d) any person retiring voluntarily otherwise than in response to this

(e) any person discharged to half pay under the terms of Regulations 109 and 110 of the Naval Forces Regulations (Statutory Rules No. 1 of 1921).

18. State Pension Rights.—Before payment of any compensation is made to any Officer or rating who has had previous State service, he will be required to sign an undertaking not to claim any pension, retiring gratuity, or compensation to which he may be entitled under any of the laws upon or in respect of his retirement or discharge from the service of the Commonwealth,

19. Leave.—In the case of officers and ratings retired under this Order, any annual leave taken up to the date of retirement will not be taken into account in assessing payment in lieu of furlough or extended leave. No additional payment, however, will be made in lieu of annual .leave still outstanding at the date of retirement.

20. Retired List.—An officer who is retired under this Order and wishes to retain his commission, will, if eligible, be placed on the Retired List.

AUTHORITY OF THE COMMODORE SUPERINTENDENT AND SENIOR NAVAL OFFICER, NEW SOUTH WALES.

In amplification of Article 19 of Consolidated Navy Orders 1911-1920, the following rules in regard to the functions and command of the Commodore Superintendent, H.M.A. Naval Establishments, and Senior Naval Officer, New South Wales, are promulgated for general information and guidance:—

- (a) In regard to the control of Naval Establishments in New South Wales and H.M.A. Ships at Sydney, he will act generally in the same way as a Commander-in-Chief of a British Home Port. (Vide Articles 497 to 514, King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions.)
- (b) In the event of Officers required for Surveys, Visitors for Detention Quarters, &c., not being available from Ships and Establishments under his orders, Officers from other Ships in port should be detailed for the duty (application being made to the C.C.A.F., if present at the port, when necessary).
- (c) All reports, &c., required by the Regulations to be rendered to the Admiralty by the Commander-in-Chief of a Home Port are to be rendered to the Naval Board by the C.S.G.I. direct.

RECRUITS FOR R.A.N.—PROCEDURE TO BE OBSERVED IN CASES OF OBVIOUSLY UNFIT APPLICANTS.

When a candidate for entry presents himself and is seen to be suffering from a marked deformity or other obvious signs of physical unfitness, the Recruiting Officer may use his discretion as to whether the candidate should be presented for Medical Examination.

2. Should the Officer in Charge of Recruiting consider that Medical Examination is unnecessary, he is to record the candidate's name and the exact condition on which he based his decision.

(A) REVISED FIXED ISSUING PRICES FOR PROVISIONS.

With reference to Navy Order No. 284 of 1922, the following is a complete list of all articles of provisions for which a fixed issuing rate will obtain as from 1st October, 1922. The rates shown are to be charged for all issues to the General Mess and to Repayment Messes in H.M.A. Ships and Establishments, including vessels where the Standard Ration system of victualling is in operation :-

Note.—(i) The purchase of Hind Quarters of Beef separately is approved only at Sydney and Melbourne (including Westernport). At other ports, Fore and Hind Quarters must be purchased in equal quantities, pending further instructions to the contrary.

(ii) Articles against which an asterisk is shown have been added to the list of fixed issuing prices in force immediately prior to 1st October, 1922.

2. The prices of articles of provisions not provided for in the foregoing list are to be regulated as follows :-

(a) Supplies under local contracts-To be charged for at contract rates-

(b) Supplies from Royal Edward Victualling Yard-To be charged for at prices inserted in Supply Notes by the Victualling Store Officer. On the first day of each quarter the prices of all such provisions remaining on charge are to be averaged to the nearest farthing, and such average price is to apply until all such stocks carried forward to a new Provision Account have been expended.

(c) Supplies purchased other than (a) and (b) - To be charged at actual cost price.

3. The special attention of Accountant Officers is drawn to Navy Order No. 203 of 1922, which is still applicable, and which is to be closely observed in all Ships and Establishments.

 Consolidated Navy Orders 1911-1920, Article 309, and Navy Order No. 49 of 1921, are hereby cancelled.

(B) REVISED STANDARD RATION AND MESSING ALLOWANCE FOR SHIPS NOT VICTUALLED ON THE GENERAL MESSING SYSTEM, AND INSTRUCTIONS GOVERNING SAME.

As from 1st October, 1922, the Standard Daily Ration in the Royal Australian Navy shall be as follows :-

Bread, 12 ozs.; Butter, 2 ozs.; Tea, ½ oz., or Coffee, 2 ozs.; Sugar, 3 ozs.; Chocolate, 1 oz.; Potatoes, 12 ozs.; Condensed Milk (unsweetened), 2 ozs., or Fresh Milk, 1/2 pint; Fresh Vegetables, 1/2 lb. (see note (i); Fresh Meat, 9 to 12 ozs. (see note (ii)).

Note .- (i) Fresh Vegetables to consist of one of the following :-Cabbage, Carrots, Onions, Parsnips, Swedes.

(ii) Fresh Meat to consist of :- Carcass Beef, 12 ozs.; Corned Beef, 12 ozs.; Mutton, Carcass, 12 ozs.; Mutton, Chops, 12 ozs.; Rolled Ribs, 9 ozs.; Topside or Thick Flank, 9 ozs.; Veal, 12 ozs.

If satisfactory arrangement for supply can be made, the daily meat ration may be made up of one-half of any two of the foregoing quantities.

Substitutes when fresh provisions are not available :-

In lieu of Bread-Biscuit, 8 ozs., or Flour, 12 ozs.

In lieu of Fresh Meat-Preserved Meat, 8 ozs.

In lieu of Potatoes-Rice, 3 ozs., or Flour, 5 ozs.

In lieu of Fresh Vegetables-Dried Peas or Haricot Beans, 3 ozs.

2. Any additional quantities of the above articles, and also any other provisions required by messes, are to be issued on repayment, and charged against a Messing Allowance of 9d. per head per diem, which will come into operation with the Revised Standard Ration.

3. All provisions for which there is a fixed issuing price will be issued on repayment to messes at the established price, and in the case of articles stocked for which no fixed issuing price applies, the cost price is to be charged, or as otherwise may be approved from time to time for Ships in General Mess.

4. Accountant Officers of Parent Ships are to arrange that, as far as possible, stocks of various provisions are maintained in Tenders to provide a reasonable variety for issue on repayment, but special steps should be taken to avoid loss by deterioration on account of such stocks. Where necessary, surplus requirements are to be returned to the Parent Ship to insure that losses do not occur.

5. The Messing Allowance of 9d. per diem, being based on the revised fixed issuing rates to apply from 1st October, is subject to revision at any time when the list of fixed issuing prices is revised.

6. The Standard Ration System is compulsory for all ratings except Officers' Stewards, or Cooks (or other ratings acting as such) when victualled in Officers' Messes, and no departure from this rule is to be permitted without the express approval of the Naval Board.

7. Officers may elect to be either victualled on the Standard Ration or for their Mess to be credited with the full Victualling Allowance authorized; but such decision is to remain in force for the full period of a quarter, and is to include all Officers and ratings victualled in the Mess concerned.

8. On Saturdays and Sundays, in harbor, Messes may, if so desired, be credited with the full Victualling Allowance authorized instead of the provisions otherwise allowed by scale, and this also applies to the following days at sea or in harbor:—

Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, New Year's Day.

On such days Messes may make their own victualling arrangements by obtaining their requirements from official or private sources. Sufficient notice is to be given to the Victualling Department by caterers of Messes accordingly so that no loss to the Crown will arise in the case of fresh provisions.

9. Where not inconsistent with special instructions contained in the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) or in Navy Orders, King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions are to apply, any case of doubt being referred to the Naval Board for decision.

(C) System of Accounting for Accountant Officers' Stores in Tenders.

The following procedure is to be adopted in accounting for the above-mentioned stores:—

- (1) Provisions—
 - (a) Where the General Messing System is in force in a Parent Ship, a separate Provision Account (Form A.S. 83, Part I.) is to be kept in the Parent Ship for Tenders on Standard Ration.

This account is to contain a record of all supplies and returns of provisions in Tenders on Standard Ration, including transactions with Parent Ship, Royal Edward Victualling Yard, Contractors, &c. After being checked on board the Parent Ship, the total numbers victualled, and total quantities issued for Standard Ration, and on repayment in Form A.S.462, page 26, lines 2 and 4, are to be entered monthly in pages 10 to 45 of the Provision Account for Tenders kept by the Parent Ship.

The issues for Standard Ration and on repayment are to be entered and abstracted separately, the values of issues on repayment being inserted.

Form A.S.461 (Mess Book and Issues on Repayment) is to be forwarded into Office with the above Provision Account.

Form A.S.462 (Account of Paymaster's Stores) is not required to be forwarded to Navy Office, but is to be retained in Parent Ship for future reference until the Accounts are examined and passed at Navy Office.

- (b) Where the Standard Ration is in force in the Parent Ship, a separate Provision Account for Tenders need not be kept, all transactions being embodied in the Provision Account of Parent Ship.
- (c) In Tenders in which the system of General Messing is in force, a complete set of Victualling Books and Forms are required to be kept and rendered into Office in the usual manner, after being examined and certified to by the Accountant Officer of the Parent Ship.
- (d) All supplies of fresh provisions for Tenders are to be arranged by the Parent Ship when in company.

(2) Implements—

- (a) All implements and mess utensils in use by Tenders are to be accounted for in the Implement Account (Form A.S.83), Part III.) of the Parent Ship.
- (b) Implements (i.e., Victualling, Cooks', and Butchers') are to be issued to the rating doing victualling duties, and distributed by him as necessary on temporary receipts from the ratings concerned.

These implements are to be taken on charge in Form A.S.462.

(c) Mess Utensils for use of Messes are to be issued direct from the Parent Ship to the Messes concerned, the senior rating of each Mess being responsible to the Accountant Officer of the Parent Ship for the care and custody of the article issued.

Lists of the articles on issue to Messes are to be furnished to the rating doing victualling duties, who is to see that the articles are properly transferred in cases of supercession, &c., of the senior hands of the Messes.

(3) Officers' Mess Traps-

Pending further instructions, Officers' Mess Traps in all Tenders are to be accounted for in accordance with the existing procedure. Form S.1248 (revised February, 1922) will be adopted at a later date, concerning which further instructions will be issued in Navy Orders.

(4) Clothing-

(a) Stocks of Clothing for issue on repayment, except Hat Ribbons and Soap, are not as a rule to be kept in Tenders unless for a period of detached duty or in the case of some special emergency.

All issues of other clothing on repayment are as a rule to be made direct by the Parent Ship, such issues being from stock carried by the Parent Ship and taken credit for in Clothing Account (Form A.S.83, Part II.) of the Parent Ship.

(b) Articles of Loan Clothing for use in Tenders are to be accounted for in the Clothing Account of the Parent Ship, being also entered in Form A.S.462.

(5) Transactions with Royal Edward Victualling Yard-

All transactions of Tenders with the Royal Edward Victualling Yard are to be arranged by the Parent Ship, no demands or returns being made direct by a Tender unless expressly approved by the Accountant Officer of the Parent Ship.

(6) Mustering of Provisions-

In addition to the usual muster at the end of each quarter, remains of Provisions in Tenders are to be mustered at an unexpected date during each quarter, and any surpluses discovered are to be taken on voluntary charge in the Accounts kept by the Parent Ship and the Tender concerned as soon as discovered. Immediate necessary action is also to be taken in the case of deficiencies.

It is essential that the officer or rating mustering stores should on all occasions be a member of the staff of the Accountant Officer of the Parent Ship.

THE LATE REAR-ADMIRAL J. S. DUMARESQ, C.B., C.V.O.

The lamented death of Rear-Admiral John S. Dumaresq, C.B., C.V.O., late Rear-Admiral Commanding, H.M.A. Fleet, which occurred at Manila on 22nd July, 1922, occasioned the receipt by the Naval Board and the Commonwealth Government of many messages of condolence and regret.

INVENTIONS BY OFFICERS OF THE R.A.N.

Articles 415 and 416 of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions are to be considered applicable to all Officers and other persons employed under the Naval Board, except that wherever the word "Admiralty " appears therein the words "Naval Board" shall be read. In this connexion, attention is drawn to Part VII. of the Commonwealth Patents Act.

2. In the case of "warlike inventions" of persons serving in the Royal Australian Navy, particulars will, at the discretion of the Naval Board, be communicated to the Admiralty, and in the event of any such invention being adopted and used by the Admiralty, consideration would be given to the question of an award to the inventor in accordance with the procedure and principles now employed and followed in the case of inventions by Officers and men of the Royal Navy (vide paragraph (v) of the Agreement contained in Clause 6 of Article 415, K.R. and A.I.). In such cases, the inventor will be required to execute two Agreements-one being in the exact form quoted above, the other having the words "Naval Board" substituted for the word "Admiralty" wherever occurring in the Agreement.

3. As a general rule, no financial assistance will be given from public funds towards the expenses of inventors in working out their inventions.

SPECIAL RESERVE OF ENGINEER OFFICERS, R.N. LIMITATION OF TRAVELLING EXPENSES ALLOWABLE.

In order to give effect to Admiralty Fleet Order 1502 of 1922, the following amendment of Navy Order No. 298 of 1921 has been approved :-

AMENDMENT.

Insert immediately after para. 6, new para. 6A, to read as follows:-

"6A. The maximum sum which can be repaid in respect of expenses incurred in taking up and relinquishing appointments for training or service in H.M.A. Ships and Training Establishments is £20 for the double journey. This sum shall include rail, steamer, and other fares, travelling allowance and baggage, and all other incidental expenses.

In the event of the travelling expenses of any Officer being likely to exceed the maximum sum, he should be informed that he can only claim an amount up to £20 in respect thereof, but that every endeavour will be made to meet the special circumstances of his case. Should the Officer, however, wish to cancel his application to undergo training, the possibility of the Admiralty having to terminate his service in the Special Reserve should be brought to his notice."

UNIVERSAL TRAINEES DISPOSAL OF RECORDS OF SERVICE ON DISCHARGE FROM THE PERMANENT NAVAL FORCES.

With reference to Navy Order No. 391 of 1921, it has been brought to the notice of the Naval Board that in many instances, when notifying the discharge from the Permanent Naval Forces of ratings who are still liable for further Universal Training under the compulsory clauses of the Defence Act, Ships and Establishments do not forward to the District Naval Officer the Naval or Military Records of Service (R.A.N.R. 2 and 2 (a) or A.M. Forms M.8) referred to in paragraphs 4 and 5 of the Navy Order above quoted.

2. The failure of Ships and Establishments to forward these Records of Service necessitates much correspondence and delay, and attention is drawn to paragraph 6 of the above-mentioned Navy Order, which directs that the Record of Service and Registration Papers, together with the Postal address of the person discharged, are to accompany the notification of discharge. OFFICIATING MINISTER, CHURCH OF ENGLAND, TOWNSVILLE.

Consequent on the closing down of the R.A.N.R. Sub-District at Townsville, the Reverend Canon Frederick G. Williams, Chaplain, R.A.N.R., formerly Church of England Chaplain at the port, has been placed on the Retired List as from the 1st July, 1922.

Canon Williams has intimated that if at any time one of H.M.A. Ships should call at Townsville, without a Chaplain, he will, should the Captain so desire, be pleased to conduct a service, without remuneration.

CARE AND UPKEEP OF GRAVES OF DECEASED NAVAL PERSONNEL.

The Naval Board have had under consideration the desirability of making provision, in some measure, for the care and upkeep of the graves of deceased Officers and men of the R.N. and R.A.N. who are buried in Australia and adjacent islands.

2. The Imperial War Graves Commission have accepted responsibility for the care and maintenance of the graves of members of the Naval and Military Forces who died on service during the late war, i.e., between 4th August, 1914, and 31st August, 1921.

3. With regard to burials conducted entirely by the Service prior to 4th August, 1914, and those subsequent to 31st August, 1921, the Board have approved of the following arrangements for the periodical inspection of Naval graves to insure that they do not fall into a neglected condition:—

- (a) In future, the Report of Death of an Officer or man (Form A.S. 1121) should include the following notations:—
 - (i) Whether the burial has been carried out by the next of kin, or entirely by the Service;
 - (ii) If conducted by the Service, particulars as to Cemetery, number of grave, &c.
 - (iii) Particulars as to the Title Deed of the grave.
- (b) The particulars given in (a) will be noted in a Graves Register, kept at Navy Office, and a quarterly return will be issued to H.M.A. Ships and Establishments notifying the whereabouts and exact location of the graves which are to be inspected.
- (e) At ports, other than Sydney, at which a D.N.O. or S.D.N.O. is situated, the D.N.O. or S.D.N.O. will be responsible that the graves at his port, as shown in the quarterly return, are kept clean and tidy. At ports or places at which no D.N.O. or S.D.N.O. is situated, the Senior Officer of any visiting Ships should detail a party to undertake this work.

At Sydney, responsibility in this matter will rest with the C.S.G.I., and at Western Port with the Captain Superintendent of Training.

(d) When working parties detailed as in (c) are visiting the cemeteries, the Petty Officer or leading hand in charge should inquire from the Cemetery Authorities as to whether they have any record of any Naval Graves in the Cemetery, other than those included in the quarterly return. If such proves to be the case, the additional graves should also be attended to.

> Particulars of graves which come to notice in this manner should be reported by the D.N.O. or S.D.N.O., or Commanding Officer, to Navy Office, for inclusion in the next quarterly return.

4. Where a burial is carried out by the next of kin, in accordance with Clauses (3) and (4), Article 92, Financial Regulations (Sea-going), it is assumed that such next of kin will be responsible for the care of the grave; but in cases where the burial is conducted entirely by the Service, and specially in the case of those at outlying ports, the Board desire Officers and men to co operate in the above arrangements for the proper care and condition of Naval graves.

STATIONERY FOR NAVAL RESERVE DISTRICTS AND SUB-DISTRICTS.

Official paper and envelopes for use in Naval Reserve Districts and Sub-Districts have been standardized, and stocks will in future be held by the Naval Store Officer, Sydney. Demands for such items of stationery required for half-yearly periods commencing 1st October and 1st April of each year are to be forwarded by Sub-District Naval Officer for approval of the District Naval Officer, who, if he concurs and funds are certified as being available locally by the Certifying Officer, is to transmit the demands to the Naval Store Officer, Garden Island, Sydney, so as to reach that Officer at least one month previous to the commencement of the period for which the stores are required.

2. Requirements of other office stationery (except requirements of New South Wales District) are to be obtained through the local office of the Commonwealth Stores Supply and Tender Board in the capital city of each State. Requisitions are to be prepared and forwarded by Sub-District Naval Officer for the approval of the District Naval Officer, who, if he concurs and funds are certified as being available by the local Certifying Officer, is to transmit the requisitions to the Director of Naval Stores, Navy Office, for necessary action. When requisitions are returned from Navy Office approved, orders are to be placed in the usual manner by the Sub-District Naval Officer with the Commonwealth Stores Supply and Tender Board referred to above.

3. Requirements of New South Wales District are to be requisitioned in the same manner as other Districts, but the demand on the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, is to accompany the requisition forwarded to the Director of Naval Stores. When the requisition has been approved it will be returned to the District Naval Officer, and the demand will be transmitted direct from Navy Office to the Naval Store Officer, Sydney.

ACCUMULATION OF ANNUAL LEAVE BY RATINGS WHOSE HOMES ARE IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA OR NORTH OF BRISBANE.

With reference to Navy Order No. 204 of 1922, paragraph 9, which provides that ratings, whose homes are situated in Western Australia or North of Brisbane, shall, subject to the exigencies of the Service permitting, be allowed to accumulate the whole of their annual leave with a view to taking same once a year, if desired, this instruction is not intended to imply that ratings may be granted any leave prior to its being due, but authorizes the carrying forward of accumulated leave by the ratings concerned until the following leave year.

2. In cases where ratings are permitted, under the provisions of Navy Order No. 204 of 1922, to defer Christmas leave, and take same at a later date during the following year, such ratings may carry forward also their claim to the concession, in the matter of railway warrant for the journey beyond Adelaide or North of Brisbane, provided in Article 21, Clause 4 (i) of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going).

3. In the case of a rating who has been permitted to defer his Christmas leave, being discharged to another ship before leave so deferred has been taken, the following notation should be made on his Leave History Sheet by the Commanding Officer of the Ship in which permission is given to defer leave:—

"Christmas leave deferred by permission— No railway warrant issued, Article 21, Cl. 4., Fin. Regs."

REDUCTION OF R.A.N. PERSONNEL (SEA-GOING)—ISSUE OF RAILWAY WARRANTS AND PAYMENT OF TRAVELLING EXPENSES TO OFFICERS.

With reference to Navy Order No. 219 of 1922, the Naval Board have now decided that Officers who are retired voluntarily or compulsorily under the Compensation Scheme will be entitled to Railway Warrants and Travelling Expenses in accordance with Articles 16 and 22 of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going)—

AMENDMENT OF NAVAL COLLEGE REGULATIONS.

(Statutory Rules 1921, No. 239.)

- 1. Regulation 6 is amended by omitting from the second line of subregulation (1) the words "or naturalized".
- 2. Regulation 30 is amended by omitting from the third line of subregulation (2) the word "Naval" and inserting in its stead the word "Victualling".
- 3. Regulation 64 is amended, as from 1st October, 1922, by omitting from the third and fourth lines the rates "2s. 4d." and "2s.", and inserting in their stead the rates "2s. 1d." and "1s. 9d." respectively.
- 4. Regulation 78 is amended, as from 1st January, 1922, by omitting sub-regulation (1) and inserting in its stead the following sub-regulation:—

1. It has been decided that from 1st September, 1922, Officers and Employees of the Civil Staff who are eligible for Recreation Leave, shall be granted such leave under the following conditions:—

(a) Where Recreation Leave for any year is taken in one period, leave shall be granted by days, and Saturday is to be counted as one day.

(b) Where Recreation Leave for any year is granted in two or more periods, the whole period of leave should be dealt with on an hourly basis.

Thus, under the provisions of (b), leave in the case of a clerk who is eligible for 18 days' Recreation Leave annually and whose ordinary hours of duty are 9 to 4.30 p.m. (less three-quarters of an hour for lunch) on Monday to Friday, and 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday, i.e, $36\frac{3}{4}$ hours per week, would amount to $110\frac{1}{4}$ hours.

2. When submitting application for Recreation Leave, Officers are in future to state the exact time from which it is desired leave should commence, e.g., an officer desiring leave from 11 a.m. or 2.15 p.m. should state this on his application.

AMENDMENT OF AUXILIARY SERVICE REGULATIONS— UNIFORM GRATUITIES.

The Uniform Gratuities payable to members of the Auxiliary Services under certain circumstances have been revised in accordance with the reduced issuing prices of clothing which came into operation on 1st January, 1922, and to provide for the payment of gratuities to ratings or employees who are required to change the class of uniform worn by them, for reasons other than promotion, as approved in Navy Order No. 91 of 1922, Request No. 3.

2. These gratuities operate as from 1st January, 1922, and in all cases where gratuities have been paid since that date at higher rates than shown hereunder, the amount paid in excess of the rate now applicable is to be recovered from the person concerned. MATE (A)-INTRODUCTION OF RANK IN R.A.N.

The Naval Board have approved of the introduction of the rank of Mate (A) in the Royal Australian Navy. For the present, the number of promotions will be limited to one in every three years, and the first promotion will be made in 1923, provided a candidate qualified and recommended is forthcoming. If no selection is made, the vacancy will be provided for the following year.

2. A Selection Committee to interview the candidates of the Writer and Victualling Branches for the rank of Mate (A) will assemble in July, 1923. The names of candidates, who are qualified in all respects to appear before the Selection Committee (see Clause 4), are to be forwarded to reach the Navy Office by the 1st July, 1923.

 Candidates must not be less than 21 years or more than 25 years of age on 1st August, 1923.

4. Before being permitted to present themselves before the Selection Committee, candidates will be required:—

(a) to obtain a 1st Class Certificate in the Higher Educational Test, i.e., 75 per cent. of marks in each of the following four subjects:—

> General Knowledge, English History, Geography, Practical Mathematics.

(b) to pass a professional examination in the subjects of the Branch to which they at present belong, i.e., a Writer rating will be required to take an examination in Captain's Clerk work, Ship's Office work, and Typewriting, and a Victualling rating in subjects appertaining to the Victualling Branch, the standard being that of the Professional Examination for Warrant rank for the Writer and Victualling Branches.

Recommendations are to be made on the established Form A.S. 1304.

All candidates for Acting Mate (A) are to be medically examined before they appear before the Selection Committee. Form A.S. 1304 is to contain a statement that the candidate has been medically examined and found to be fit for Warrant Rank.

5. The Professional Examination will be held in May, 1923; the actual date will be notified in due course.

6. The candidate selected will be granted the rank of Acting Mate (A). Acting Mates (A) will be appointed, in the first instance, to a Ship or Establishment for experience in the duties of the Branch other than that to which they belonged prior to being given the acting rank. A professional examination will be held at the end of 12 months' service in the acting rank, and on passing, and being recommended, candidates will be confirmed in the rank of Mate (A).

7. Classes of Certificate in the Professional Examinations referred to in paragraphs 4 and 6 will be assessed as follows:—

80 per cent. of total marks in each examination or over .. 1st Class

65 per cent. of total marks in each examination or over.. 2nd Class 50 per cent. of total marks in each examination or over.. 3rd Class

AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVAL RESERVE.

It has been decided that all promotions to the ranks of Midshipman, Sub-Lieutenant and Lieutenant of the Military, Engineer and Accountant Branches of the Royal Australian Naval Reserve shall be "on probation" instead of "provisional" as the regulations now provide.

2. Consequent upon the above, the following amendments of the Regulations and Instructions for the Royal Australian Naval Reserve have been approved:—

(1) Articles 55 and 56 are omitted and the following articles are inserted in their stead:—

"55. Promotions to be 'on probation.'—All promotions to the ranks of Midshipman, Sub-Lieutenant, Lieutenant, Midshipman (E), Engineer Sub-Lieutenant, Engineer Lieutenant, Paymaster Midshipman, Paymaster Sub-Lieutenant and Paymaster Lieutenant shall be on probation until the Probationary Officer has been recommended for confirmation by the Commanding Officer of the Ship or Establishment in which a period of continuous training is performed. In the event of a Probationary Officer not being recommended for confirmation within two years he shall revert to such rank or rating as he shall, in the opinion of the District Naval Officer, be qualified for, and his probationary promotion shall determine."

"56. Promotion to Sub-Lieutenant and Engineer Sub-Lieutenant.—Sub-Lieutenants and Engineer Sub-Lieutenants shall be selected from Midshipmen and Midshipmen (E) who possess the qualifications and have passed the examinations prescribed in Appendix II."

(2) Article 57 is amended by omitting from the fourth and last lines the words "have qualified by passing the examinations laid down for their respective ranks in Appendix II." and inserting in their stead the words:—" possess the qualifications and have passed the examinations prescribed for their respective ranks in Appendix II."

(3) Article 60 is amended by omitting the words "and have qualified by passing" and inserting in their stead the words "who possess

the qualifications and have passed."

WARRANTS FOR THE ARREST OF ABSENTEES OR DESERTERS.

RETRENCHMENT SCHEME SERVICE UNDER NAVAL AGREEMENT ACT 1903 TO COUNT FOR SERVICE.

With reference to Navy Order No. 219 of 1922, approval has been given for service in the Australian Naval Force under the terms of the Australasian Naval Agreement Act of 1903 to count as time served in the Permanent Naval Forces for the purpose of assessing the amount of compensation to be paid on retirement under the Government Scheme of Retrenchment, and the following amendment of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) has been approved with effect as from 1st July, 1922:—

After Article 46 the following Article is to be inserted :-

"(46a.) HIGH COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE — AUXILIARY SERVICES —AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE AUXILIARY SERVICES.

TRAVELLING EXPENSES INCURRED IN THE UNITED KINGDOM: CAB HIRE CHARGES.

 Claims for refund of Travelling Expenses incurred in the United Kingdom by officers and men proceeding to Australia to join the R.A.N., reverting to the R.N. upon termination of their R.A.N. appointment or engagement, &c., frequently include charges for cab hire in United Kingdom.

2. Admiralty Fleet Order 1103 of 1922 sets forth the conditions and present rates for cab hire in London and other ports of the United Kingdom. So far as the provisions of this Order are not at variance with Article 17 of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going) such conditions will, in future, be regarded as applicable to all claims for refund of cab hire in the United Kingdom chargeable against Commonwealth funds. In this connexion paragraphs 1 (b) and 6 of Admiralty Fleet Order No. 1103 are to be regarded as superseded by clauses (3) and (5) respectively of Article 17 of the Financial Regulations (Sea-going).

3. Accountant Officers are, therefore, required to make themselves familiar with the conditions and rates set forth in Admiralty Fleet Order No. 1103, and are to ensure that any cab hire charges included in claims for travelling expenses incurred in the United Kingdom are strictly in accordance with the provisions of such Order as amended by paragraph 2 above, before same are submitted for necessary approval to payment.

REPATRIATION BENEFITS—ELIGIBILITY OF MEMBERS OF THE R.A.N.

With reference to Navy Order No. 229 of 1921, relative to the eligibility of members of the R.A.N. for Repatriation benefits, the Repatriation Commission has ruled that discharged Naval ratings who served during the War shall be eligible for benefits under Repatriation Regulation 92. This Regulation, in so far as, in its amended form, it relates to Naval ratings is promulgated hereunder for general information:—

"Naval Ratings.—The Commission has decided that the time limitation of three years from the date of discharge referred to in the second proviso to Regulation 92 (5) shall operate in the case of discharged Naval Ratings as follows:—

- (i) In the case of discharge from the R.A.N. prior to 8th September, 1920—as from the date of discharge.
- (ii) In all other cases of discharge—as from 8th September, 1920."
- Regulation 92 of the Australian Soldiers' Repatriation Regulations,
 1920, reads as follows:—
 - "92. (1.)—A Deputy Commissioner may, subject to the next succeeding sub-regulation, provide for the vocational training of a soldier who, owing to disabilities due to or aggravated by War Service, is unable to follow the occupation in which he was engaged prior to his enlistment, or an occupation offering the same conditions and remuneration, and for the vocational or professional training of the widow of a soldier without children, and may pay such fees as are necessary for the purposes of training:

Provided that in the case of a widow of a soldier the total fees shall not exceed £40.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in the last preceding sub-regulation a Deputy Commissioner may, subject to such conditions as the Commission directs, grant vocational training to a soldier who was at the date of enlistment under the age of twenty years: Provided that the continuance of the training or the payment of training fees, training expenses and sustenance shall be dependent upon the receipt by the Deputy Commissioner of favourable reports as to the applicant's progress.

- (3) Applicants for training under this regulation shall be trained for such trades or callings as are approved by the Vocational Training Committee.
- (4) If the applicant is aggrieved at the decision of the Deputy Commissioner under this regulation the Deputy Commissioner shall refer the case to the Vocational Training Committee for a recommendation.
- (5) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-regulation (1) of this regulation, a Deputy Commissioner or the Executive of a Country Local Committee may, in the case of a soldier who—
 - (a) is in, or has registered for and is awaiting employment, or
 - (b) is undergoing vocational training,

but desires to undergo a course of training in order to increase his efficiency or to qualify for another position, pay such fees and expenses as will enable him to complete the necessary course of training:

Provided that the total amount which may be paid to any one applicant under this sub-regulation shall not exceed £40:

Provided further that no assistance shall be granted under this sub-regulation after the expiration of three years after the date of the discharge of the soldier, or in the case of a widow within two years after the notification of the death of her husband.

Provided also that expenses shall only include books, instruments and essential apparatus and shall not exceed the sum of £5 in any one case.

(6) Any application for training under sub-regulations (1) and (2) of this regulation shall be made within six months after the date of discharge of the soldier:

Provided that where an applicant applies after the expiration of that period, a Deputy Commissioner may approve of the application if he is satisfied that there are special circumstances which justify that approval."

TASMANIAN RAILWAYS-BOOKING CHARGE OF 5 PER CENT.

The Commissioner of Railways, Tasmania, has levied a charge of 5 per cent. on all tickets issued on Railway Warrants, to meet the cost of checking warrants and preparing claims on the various Departments issuing Warrants.

To obviate this charge as far as possible, special instructions have been issued to the District Naval Officer, Tasmania, regarding Warrants issued in Tasmania. In the case of Warrants issued by H.M.A. ships at Hobart or by Naval Establishments in other States for journeys in Tasmania, as the expenditure involved will be inconsiderable, the booking charge of 5 per cent. will be accepted against Departmental Votes.

In the Torpedo and Electrical Defect Lists of H.M.A. Ships, it is observed that items have been inserted which should have been carried out by the Ship's Staff during commission. The inclusion of such items in Dockyard Repairs involves unnecessary expenditure which it is desired to avoid as much as possible.

The attention of Commanding Officers of H.M.A. Ships is drawn to the necessity of Torpedo and Electrical Parties concentrating upon the work of their Department in order to permit of the proper care and maintenance of the ships' equipment.

SUBMERSIBLE MOTOR PUMPS CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF.

Attention is directed to the necessity for the proper care and maintenance of Submersible Motor Pumps. It is pointed out that corrosion of the core and bearings of these pumps can be entirely avoided by proper attention after each occasion on which they are used, and the following instructions are to be observed:—

After use Submersible Motor Pumps are to be dismantled and thoroughly dried out, all working parts being vaselined. Varnish is to be applied to any bare parts of the stators and rotors, or other corrodible parts.

DEMANDS FOR NAVAL STORES.

In view of surpluses of Naval Stores brought to account by special stocktaking held in H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments in accordance with Navy Order No. 77 of 1922, the Naval Board direct that Commanding Officers are in future to take necessary action to insure that, when demands for Naval Stores are forwarded to the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, only such quantities as are required to replenish are included in demands.

 All articles of plate, relics, trophies, pictures, challenge cups, &c., presented to or acquired by H.M.A. Ships, Naval Establishments and Residences are, in future, to be taken on store charge as indicated in paragraph 3 of above-mentioned Fleet Order.

3. A register of these articles held in H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments will be kept at Navy Office. Names of donors and dates of presentation, together with any other details considered necessary will be recorded. This register will be compiled from returns already received from H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments.

4. Particulars of any future presentations, &c. received are to be forwarded to Navy Office annually on 31st December. If no such articles are received during the year a "Nil" return is to be forwarded. In addition to the annual return, a report giving full particulars required is to be forwarded to the Secretary, Naval Board, at the time each presentation is made. In the annual return it is to be stated whether the articles previously received have been sighted, are in safe custody, and are still accounted for in the Store Accounts concerned.

5. When ships pay-off into reserve Commanding Officers are to obtain instructions from the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, as to the disposal of such articles. If no specific instruction has been given to guide the Commodore Superintendent in such cases, he will obtain instructions in the matter from the Naval Board.

No transfers of these articles are to be effected without Naval Board approval or, in the case of ships paying-off into reserve, the approval of the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney. TRANSPORT SERVICES.

Land Transport.—As far as is possible, when land transport is required for the Naval Service, advantage is to be taken of the Army or Air Service permanent transport available in Capital Cities. In this connexion the following procedure is to be observed:—

In Melbourne and Sydney:

Application is to be made direct to the Officer-in-Charge of the respective permanent sections of the Army Transport. Air Service Motor Transport is only available in Melbourne, and necessary arrangements for such transport will be made by the Staff Officer for Supply and Transport, 3rd District Base, Victoria Barracks, Melbourne, who is also the Officer-in-Charge of Army Transport in Melbourne.

In other Capital Cities:

Application is to be made direct to the Military District Base Commandant.

2. Should suitable Army or Air Service transport be not available, the services of the civilian contractors to the Defence Department are to be availed of, and application is to be made direct to such contractor when his services are required. Particulars of contracts existing in the various States are to be obtained from time to time by all concerned from the following:—

In Melbourne-Secretary, Defence Contracts Board, Victoria Barracks, Melbourne. -Secretary, District Contracts Board, In Sydney Ordnance Store, Pitt-street, North Sydney. In Brisbane -Secretary, District Contracts Board, Victoria Barracks, Petrie-terrace, Brisbane. In Adelaide -Secretary, District Contracts Board. Military Barracks, Keswick. -Secretary, District Contracts Board, In Perth Victoria Barracks, Perth. -Secretary, District Contracts Board, In Hobart Anglesea Barracks, Hobart.

In States where the services required cannot be performed by the Army or Air Service transport, and there are no contracts with the Military Authorities for transport to be carried out by civilian contractors, arrangements are to be made locally as necessary in the usual manner.

- 3. Sea Transport.—Applications received at Naval Establishments in New South Wales from the Military Authorities for Sea Transport of goods required to be shipped from Sydney by one of H.M.A. Ships or R.A. Fleet Auxiliaries, are to be forwarded to the Commodore Superintendent and Senior Naval Officer, Sydney, who will, whenever practicable, arrange for the transport required. In the case of all other ports, unless one of H.M.A. Ships or Fleet Auxiliaries is present at the port and the Commanding Officer can conveniently comply with the transport desired, applications for freightage of military stores are to be forwarded to the Naval Board, giving full particulars of the services required. Action will then be taken to inform the Military Authorities of the facilities which can be afforded and any further details necessary.
- 4. Financial Arrangements.—No charge will be made by the Military Service for transport services rendered, except where there is additional cost arising from the performance of the work for the Naval Service. Similarly no charge is to be made for sea transport effected in H.M.A. Ships or Fleet Auxiliaries, except under circumstances where additional cost to the Naval Service is occasioned.
- 5. All transport carried out for the Naval Service by Civilian Contractors referred to above is to be paid for direct from Naval votes.

RAILWAY WARRANTS—TRAVELLING ALLOWANCE FOR BOYS AND RATINGS UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE.

The Naval Board have approved of all Boys and other ratings under 18 years of age, who are proceeding to their homes on Christmas leave, 1922, being granted 2nd Class Return Railway Warrants or Steerage Steamer Tickets at Departmental expense. It should be clearly understood that this concession is confined to the limits of the Commonwealth, and is limited to rail or steamer fares only. Motor or Coach Fares will not be allowed, except in the cases of Boys training in H.M.A.S. Tingira, and of Cadet Midshipmen at the Royal Australian Naval College, and in these cases only when no more economical means of travelling exists.

2. Travelling Allowance, in advance, will also be payable at the rate of 4s. per diem; for a portion of a day, 1s. for the first six hours, and 6d. for every subsequent three hours while actually travelling from ship to home, and from home to ship. No Travelling Allowance is to be paid when the Boys or other ratings are accommodated in Ships or trains where meals are provided at the expense of the Department.

PASSAGES OF OFFICERS AND MEN TO AND FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM.

It has been decided that all passages for Officers and Men between Australia and the United Kingdom shall be taken by the Commonwealth Government Line of Steamers, if berths are available, unless otherwise approved by the Naval Board.

- 2. In cases where the Commonwealth Government Line of Steamers is fully booked, or offers no convenient sailing date, the Board have approved of Officers of the rank of Commander or above having the option of travelling by the P. and O. or Orient Steamers. All other Officers should be booked by the cheaper lines, i.e., Aberdeen, White Star, or Blue Funnel Lines, subject to no additional expense being involved through Officers being retained on full pay in consequence. In such cases, the payment vouchers should bear a Certificate from the Officer responsible for booking the passages, stating that accommodation was not available by the Commonwealth Government Line of Steamers.
- 3. In cases where special approval is given to Officers to make their own arrangements for passage via America, &c., the amount of money advanced should be the equivalent of the cost to the Department of a passage by the Commonwealth Government Line of Steamers, viz., scale rates less 5 per cent.

ADVANCEMENT OF BOYS TO THE RATING OF ORDINARY SEAMEN, 2nd CLASS.

Boys who have not passed the Examination for Accelerated Advancement to Man's Rating at the age of 17 years are to be advanced to Ordinary Seaman 2nd Class, or equivalent ratings, provided they are of "Very Good" character and "Superior" ability, and are recommended by their Superior Officers.

SWIMMING TESTS.

With reference to Navy Order No. 96 of 1921, it has been decided that, for the standard swimming test in the R.A.N., every man in future must be able to swim 40 yards in a duck suit, after which he must be able to keep himself affoat for three minutes.

 - "Fair"—meaning that the man only just managed to pass, and should be given more practice.
 - "Good"—an average swimmer.

" Very Good "-a strong swimmer.

These qualifications are intended to assist Officers at sea to recognise backward swimmers.

- 3. Notations on Service Certificates should be made as follows :-
 - "Passed Swimming Test" (P.S.T.), followed by qualification and date
 - "Cannot swim", and date.
- 4. Every effort should be made to insure that all Officers and Men pass the swimming test. In this connexion attention is called to Admiralty Fleet Order No. 3602/1920, the provisions of which were adopted by Navy Order No. 96 of 1921.
 - 5. Navy Order No. 242 of 1922 is hereby cancelled.

MICRO-BIOLOGICAL LABORATORY, SICK QUARTERS, GARDEN ISLAND.

A Laboratory has been established at the Sick Quarters, Garden Island, and all Pathological work required by Medical Officers will be carried out there.

- When possible, patients should be sent to the Laboratory in order that specimens may be collected. When this is not possible the specimen should be conveyed to the Laboratory as expeditiously as possible after same has been obtained.
- 3. The Wasserman Reaction.—Bloods will be tested at 10 a.m. every Thursday. Specimens of blood should arrive at the Laboratory by 9.30 a.m. on Thursdays, or, if this is not practicable, at 2 p.m. on Wednesdays. Reports will be available at 5 p.m. Thursdays.
- 4. Throat Swabbing—Examination for Diphtheria.—The swabbings should arrive at the Laboratory as soon as possible after they are taken, and preferably in the forenoon. Supplies of sterile swab sticks may be obtained on application.

- 5. Vaccines.—Material for preparation of Vaccines should be forwarded without delay to the Laboratory, either on a throat swab stick or in a sterile watertight receptacle. The Vaccine will be available three or four days later.
- 6. In cases where blood counts are required arrangements should be made for patients to arrive at the Laboratory as early as possible in the forenoon.
- 7. Arrangements may be made by signal for any other Pathological work required.
- 8. In all cases the patient or specimen should be accompanied by full clinical notes, and exact requirements should be stated in writing.
- 9. The blood of ratings treated in Sick Quarters, Garden Island, for syphilis should be examined quarterly during the twelve months following treatment, in order to determine the curative effect. Medical Officers should make arrangements accordingly.

INSTITUTION OF DEFENCE CONTRACT BOARDS FOR THE LOCAL PURCHASE OF STORES FOR THE NAVAL, MILITARY, AND AIR SERVICES.

The Defence Contract Boards in all States have been re-constituted, with authority to purchase local supplies of stores for the Naval, Military, and Air Services. From 1st January, 1923, supplies of stores required to be purchased in Australia for the Naval Service must therefore be obtained in accordance with the instructions governing the operations of the Contract Boards in the various States. Copies of these instructions have been issued to all Officers concerned.

- 2. Only such stores as are authorized for purchase in Australia will come within the scope of the instructions referred to. The existing system of obtaining stores abroad will not be affected.
- 3. The direct purchase of stores by H.M.A. Ships (Sea-going) in emergency in accordance with existing regulations or procedure is not affected by the new system of purchase, nor the purchase of fresh provisions for Ships and Naval Establishments.

AMENDMENT OF NAVAL FORCES REGULATIONS.

(Statutory Rules 1921, No. 1, as amended by Statutory Rules 1922, No. 76.)

1. Regulation 36A is amended by adding at the end thereof the following

sub-regulations :-

"(3) In the absence of the District Naval Officer on short leave, i.e., for periods not exceeding four days, the next senior officer of the Royal Australian Naval Reserve Staff at the port where the District Naval Officer has his office irrespective of whether such Officer is a Sub-District Naval Officer or an Officer on the Staff of the Sub-District Naval Officer, shall act for the District Naval Officer and sign all papers 'for D.N.O., absent on leave.'"

- "(4) In the absence of the District Naval Officer on long leave or from any other cause for a period exceeding four days, the next Senior Officer of the Royal Australian Naval Reserve Staff in the District shall assume command of the District, unless special arrangements shall have been made for some other Officer to be appointed temporarily as Acting District Naval Officer, and shall sign papers for D.N.O., absent on leave (sick or otherwise, as the case may be). If the next senior Officer of the District is stationed at a Port other than that in which the District Naval Officer has his office, and in another Sub-District, it shall be the duty of the District Naval Officer, before proceeding on leave or on duty (or of the Senior Officer at the Head-Quarters port of the District, in case of sickness or emergency) to obtain instructions from the Director of Naval Reserves and Naval Reserve Mobilization as to the temporary command of the District."
- 2. Regulation 52 is amended as follows :-

(1) by omitting from the first line of sub-regulation (1) the word "two" and inserting in its stead the word "ten".

(2) by omitting sub-regulation (2) and inserting in its stead the follow-

ing sub-regulation :-

"(2) The period of appointment shall be for three years, provided that, in the case of an Officer who is on loan from the Royal Navy, his appointment as Honorary Aide-de-Camp shall cease at the same time as he ceases to be attached to the Royal Australian Navy, if that occurs before the period of three years is completed."

- 3. Regulation 112 is amended by omitting the words "and other" in the second last line and inserting in their stead the words "Officers from Warrant Rank and".
- 4. Regulation 114 is amended by omitting from the last line the words "under regulation 97 to" and inserting in their stead the words "under these Regulations for".
- 5. Regulation 115 is amended as from 31st May, 1922, by inserting after the words "Commissioned Officer" in the seventh line of the table in sub-regulation (1) the word "promoted".
