PROPELLER SHAFT TUBES ZINC PROTECTORS H.M.A. CRUISERS AND " ALBATROSS."

4

Whenever opportunity offers, but under no circumstances less frequently than at yearly intervals, the inspection doors on the shaft tubes of H.M.A. Ships are to be removed, and the zinc protectors cleaned and renewed as found necessary.

2. The condition of these zinc protectors is to be noted in the Engine Room Register and any renewals found necessary are to be reported to the Dockyard Overseer for inclusion in the "Remarks" on Form A.D.488-Report of Examination of Propeller and Underwater Fittings.

3. The condition of the shaft liners and internal surface of shaft tubes as far as can be determined is also to be noted in the Engine Room Register.

4. Attention is drawn to the favourable conditions which obtain in shaft tubes for electrolytic action, which, if unchecked, may have serious results.

SPARKING PLUGS FOR MOTOR BOATS.

1. Examination of Central Store Accounts has disclosed that Sparking Plugs for Motor Boats have been issued from Central Store on Permanent Loan. This procedure conflicts with Navy Order 78 of 1930 as the Sparking Plugs held in Central Store are for issue in replacement of items shown in the List of Fixtures and Spare Gear for Motor Boats (Form D.6A).

- 2. Sparking Plugs for Motor Boats should be accounted for as follows :--
 - (a) Actual number fitted should be shown in Form D.6A under heading "List of Fixtures for Motor Boat."
 - (b) 50 per cent. of number fitted should be shown in Form D.6A under heading "List of Spare Gear for Motor Boat."
 - (c) Replacements of items shown in Fixtures and Spare Gear Lists should be demanded from Central Store as necessary, vide Article 26 (c) of Central Storekeeping Instructions.

3. Action should be taken for all sparking plugs to be withdrawn from Permanent Loan, and for necessary amendments to Lists of Fixture and Spare Gear for Motor Boats to be included in return to be furnished on 1st July, 1932, in accordance with C.O.R. Article 244A. In this regard, attention is drawn to the fact that in certain instances the quantities of Sparking Plugs shown in Form D.6A under heading "List of Fixtures for Motor Boats" are in excess of the number of Sparking Plugs actually fitted.

SIGNALLING BETWEEN H.M.A. SHIPS, SERVICE AIRCRAFT AND BRITISH MERCHANT SHIPS—SUMMARY OF REPORTS FOR YEAR 1931.

Reports (Form S. 174) furnished in respect of Signalling Exercises carried out by H.M.A. Ships and Service Aircraft with British Merchant Ships for the year 1931 have been analyzed. The following is a summary of the results, together with remarks thereon.

2. General.—185 successful exercises were carried out during 1931, there being only two unsuccessful attempts to establish communication. In the previous year 131 exercises were conducted, of which 5 were unsuccessful.

Notwithstanding a slight reduction, as compared with 1930, in the number of ships in commission during a portion of 1931, the number of exercises has appreciably increased, which, together with the improved results obtained, indicates a continued interest by the Communications personnel concerned.

3. H.M.A. Ships.—The following table shows the results of Exercises carried out by H.M.A. Ships during 1931 :—

Her transmission as observed from the Aircraft was regarded as fair, the exercise, which was carried out at a distance varying from 5 to 2 cables, being largely spoilt owing to fog. 4. SPECIAL STORES FOR ENGINEERING PURPOSES—REVISED PROCEDURE.

Action to introduce into H.M.A. Ships Canberra, Australia, Albatross, Tattoo, Penguin, and Adelaide, the revised Admiralty procedure for dealing with special stores for Engineering purposes, as promulgated in Admiralty Fleet Order 634/1931, is to be completed as early as practicable.

2. The steps required to be taken are as follows :----

- (a) Forms A.S.197 (A.D.526) to be rendered to cover the transfer from Engineer's Fixture List to Central Store charge of all special permanent and consumable stores of descriptions detailed in Statement "A" of A.F.O.634/1931.
- (b) Articles or materials of Rate Book pattern are to be included in the ordinary Store ledgers. Separate central store ledgers are to be prepared for the remainder of the items, i.e., special stores. Any special stores already on charge are to be transferred to the new ledgers.
- (c) Revised particulars to be prepared in quadruplicate on Table VIII., Form D 127B (Ships) or Table XII. Form D 117B (Destroyers) and rendered to Captain Superintendent, Sydney, for review and transmission to Navy Office for approval.
- (d) Stocks of special stores in H.M.A. Ships to be completed to 12 months' estimated requirements.
- (e) On receipt of approved ship's copy of documents referred to at (c) above, particulars of the minimum stock to be maintained on board, viz. the "emergency" stock or 12 months' estimated requirements, whichever quantity is the greater, to be entered in the appropriate space provided on the ledger sheets.

3. The abolition of Dockyard reserves of special stores should be specially borne in mind when completing the revised forms of Table VIII. and Table XII. as indicated at paragraph 2 (c) above. If it be considered by Ships' or Yard Officers that stock should be maintained of any particular item in excess of the estimated 12 months' requirements, i.e., if an "emergency" or maximum stock of any item be considered necessary, the quantity recommended to be maintained as emergency stock should be shown on the above forms in lieu of the estimated 12 months' requirements, and a suitable notation made accordingly.

4. As regards the reference in paragraph 2 of A.F.O.634/1931 to the non-retention at H.M. Dockyards, in future, of templates, samples and sketches of special stores for H.M. Ships, arrangements may be made, so far as H.M.A. Ships are concerned, for templates, sketches, &c., to be lodged with the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, to facilitate demands for future supplies. A notation is to be made accordingly on the central store ledger page in the case of each special store of which sufficient particulars are held by the Naval Store Officer, Sydney. In this connexion, sketches of the majority of the special steaming stores of H.M.A. Ships Australia and Canberra are at present held at Garden Island. Responsibility rests with the Ships' Officers concerned to notify the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, when alteration of ships' fittings or other cause necessitates an amendment of the template, sketch, &c., held at Garden Island. In the case of special stores, in respect of which the notation referred to above does not appear in a ship's store ledger, care is to be taken that ship's demands to replenish show the purpose for which required and contain, if no template or drawing is attached, particulars in sufficient detail to enable the stores readily to be identified, purchased and surveyed in due course on receipt.

5. The abolition of Dockyard reserve of special stores makes it essential that timely demands should always be forwarded by H.M.A. Ships to replenish stock on hand.

6. Reports are to be rendered by each H.M.A. Ship concerned when action indicated in paragraph 2 above has been completed.

7. In order that the effect of the revised procedure on the Valuation Allowances of H.M.A. Ships may be ascertained, statements showing particulars of Consumable Naval Stores not previously supplied through Central Store, but which are charged to Valuation Allowances under the new procedure, should be attached to Quarterly Valuation Statements pending further instructions.

8. The necessary action to introduce the revised procedure in H.M.A. Ships at present in reserve is to be taken when these vessels are being prepared for commissioning.

CENTRALLY STORED SHIPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS-SYSTEM OF ACCOUNTING FOR CABIN FURNITURE AND BEDDING.

As a result of a satisfactory trial in H.M.A.S. *Canberra* of a revised system of accounting for cabin furniture and bedding, it has been decided that this system is to be introduced in all centrally stored ships and establishments. Details of the new system are as follows :---

(a) All cabin furniture (except items included in the Fixture List) and bedding are accounted for in the Central Store Account, the total quantities in the cabins being shown in the Loan Ledger.

- (b) Form S.1099, showing all permanent items of furniture and bedding in the cabin, is prepared, receipted by the occupant, and held by the Central Store Officer.
- (c) Returns and issues are dealt with on Forms S.1091 and S.156, which are posted to the ledger and bundled in the usual manner. Special books of forms are used for these transactions.
- (d) On an Officer vacating a cabin, the furniture is surveyed by a Board of Officers, including an Accountant Officer and the Warrant Shipwright (where borne), the result of the survey being shown on the back of the Form S.1099, which is dealt with in a similar manner to other permanent loan lists, the incoming Officer receipting the list on assuming charge of the contents of the cabin.

2. The following action, which should be taken as early as convenient, is necessary in order to bring the revised system into operation :--

- (a) Forms S.1099 to be prepared, in duplicate, for each cabin, all permanent Naval Stores being shown therein.
- (b) The original of Forms S.1099 to be retained by the Central Store Officer and dealt with in a similar manner to other permanent loan lists. The items in the cabins should be summarized on Form S.1099, and the totals posted to the loan ledger, the summary being bundled to support the entries.
- (e) On change of occupants of cabins, it is unnecessary to raise new Forms S.1099. The incoming Officer should sign the old form in the space provided after the relevant entries in respect of bedding have been made.
- (d) In the event of a cabin being unoccupied, the items should be transferred to the Officer responsible for unoccupied cabins.
- (e) When bedding is issued to Officers without cabins, Form S.1099 covering the items, should be prepared, summarized, posted in the loan ledgers and bundled. On return to store of the bedding, the permanent loan list (S.1099) should be receipted, posted to the ledger, and bundled as a supporting voucher, instead of Form S.1091 being raised as in the case of cabin bedding.
- (f) The following Certificate of Survey should be given on the back of Form S.1099 on each occasion when a cabin is vacated, a rubber stamp being obtained by each ship and establishment for this purpose :—

Cabin Furniture and Fixtures surveyed and found correct and serviceable except as shown below.

Charges for losses, damages, &c., have been raised vide Form A.S.126 No.....

COMMONWEALTH SAVINGS BANK AGENCIES IN H.M.A. SHIPS.

Consequent upon amendments to the procedure in regard to Commonwealth Savings Bank agencies in H.M.A. Ships, particulars of which are being communicated by the Commonwealth Bank to all officers acting as Commonwealth Savings Bank agents, the following amendments to Naval Account Regulations and Instructions, which will be incorporated in that publication in due course, are to be put into force forthwith :--

> 144. Savings Bank Agencies.—(1) With the approval of the Naval Board, agencies of the Commonwealth Savings Bank may be established in His Majesty's Australian Ships, and Accountant Officers may be appointed as agents of the Commonwealth Savings Bank to transact Savings Bank business.

> (2) Instructions in regard to the conduct of such business will be issued direct by the Commonwealth Savings Bank. Those instructions shall be observed in H.M.A. Ships provided that no modification of Naval accounting or other procedure is involved thereby.

> 145. Savings Bank business to be kept distinct from Public Accounts.—(1) Savings Bank moneys and transactions are to be kept quite separate and distinct from public moneys and accounts. In no circumstances are public funds to be utilized for paying Savings Bank withdrawals or for cashing Savings Bank cheques.

> (2) Savings Bank moneys shall not be brought to account in cash accounts of H.M.A. Ships and utilized as public funds, except with special approval of the Naval Board,

(b) Cancel Article 146.

2. It will be observed that the provisions of Article 145 which authorized excess deposits to be taken on charge in the cash account and public moneys to be utilized to meet excess withdrawals, and required the rendering of returns (Forms 9 and 12) to Navy Office, have been cancelled.

3. The provisions of Article 81 requiring Savings Bank moneys to be produced for verification, together with all other moneys entrusted to the Accountant Officer, will continue to be observed.

R.A.N. LOWER DECK WELFARE MEETINGS, 1932.

With reference to C.O.R., Article 32, and Navy Order 57 of 1931, R.A.N. Lower Deck Welfare Meetings will be held during the latter half of this year (1932).

2. The machinery to be employed will, in the main, be similar to that of former years (see Navy Order 73 of 1929), but, in order to meet the convenience of H.M.A. Squadron, and at the same time lessen travelling expenses, the following modifications of the procedure hitherto followed have been decided upon :—

- (a) Each Senior Officer (R.A.C.A.S., C.S.S., and C.S.T.) will arrange for the conduct independently of Welfare Meetings within his command.
- (b) Requests submitted by meetings in *Penguin* and *Cerberus* are to be forwarded to the R.A.C.A.S., accompanied by the covering remarks of C.S.S. and C.S.T. respectively.
- (c) R.A.C.A.S. will co-ordinate and forward to Navy Office, with his remarks, all requests submitted.
- (d) Dates for holding the meetings will be left to the convenience of the respective Senior Officers; the dates need not be identical.
 - but the co-ordinated lists of requests should be forwarded by R.A.C.A.S. to reach Navy Office by the 31st December, 1932, if practicable.

(e) The number of representatives to be elected for the Group and General Meetings is left to the discretion of the Senior Officers, paragraphs 3 and 4 of Navy Order 73 of 1929 being used as a guide.

3. On this occasion, as in the past, it is the wish of the Naval Board that the representatives should be men who are in a real sense representative of Lower Deck views, and every encouragement is to be given to men who are willing to come forward as candidates for election.

4. The Naval Board desire it to be remembered that, from an economic point of view, the present is not a favourable time for the approval of requests which involve additional governmental expenditure. All such requests received by the Naval Board will, however, be considered on their merits as well as in relation to the prevailing financial situation. Requests which have as their objective the amelioration of what are considered to be burdensome conditions, rather than those which aim merely at the grant of increased privileges and such like, will be given preference in the event of it being possible to approve of any small additional expenditure.

5. The following subjects are to be regarded as outside the purview of the Welfare Meetings :---

Matters of policy—such as the employment or distribution or training of ships of the Royal Australian Navy, or movement or training of the personnel concerned.

Matters of discipline or the general arrangements of duties in the Service.

Individual claims, or individual grievances, of any kind.

Matters affecting individual ships or establishments.

Canteen arrangements.

Complements of ships and establishments.

ACCURACY OF RECEPTION OF W/T MESSAGES.

Cases have recently occurred in the handling of W/T messages, where mistakes were made either in copying, transmission, or reception.

These mistakes are usually due to one of the following causes :----

- (a) Careless writing in drafting, or in copying messages for handling;
- (b) Bad operating ;
- (c) Difficult atmospheric conditions.

It is of the utmost importance that all local organization for handling messages should be aimed at the elimination of such mistakes.

2. Where it is plain to the authority drafting the message, or even to the senior W/T rating on watch, that it is important to safeguard particular messages (or portions of messages) against any possibility of error, the service instruction "Repeat back" should be used throughout the route of the message, either by notation on the original draft, or by order of the rating in charge of the W/T office. The latter should be well able to judge, by consideration of the prevailing W/T conditions, as to the necessity of ordering messages to be repeated back.

3. It is not sufficiently known that service W/T procedure provides for the repeating back of portions only of a message (e.g., Positions, Sums of money, &c.), and this procedure may easily be ordered by the originator when drafting a message.

OFFICERS' COOK AND SHIP'S COOK BRANCHES-AMALGAMATION.

With reference to Navy Order 91 of 1932, the following arrangements with regard to the qualification of ex-Officers' Cooks 3rd Class and ex-Cooks (O.S.) for the rating of Leading Cook (N.S.) are promulgated for information.

2. Ex-Cooks (O.S.) who have passed for Leading Cook (O.S.) will be required to have practical experience in an Officers' galley, and to pass an examination at the School of Cookery in Officers' cooking. The standard of examination will be that laid down in the Manual of Naval Cookery for Officers' Cook 2nd Class.

3. Ex-Officers' Cooks 3rd Class who have passed for Officers' Cook 2nd Class will be required to have practical experience in a General Mess galley, and to pass an examination in the School of Cookery after undergoing a one month's bread-making course. The standard of examination will be that laid down for Leading Cook (O.S.).

4. A month's Bakery Course at the School of Cookery has been commenced for ex-Officers' Cooks 3rd Class at present serving in Depot. During the Squadron's forthcoming visits to Victorian waters, further ex-Officers' Cooks 3rd Class will be withdrawn for a similar course. Ex-Officers' Cooks 3rd Class, provided that they have obtained experience in a General Mess galley in addition to this course, should be able to qualify as Leading Cook (N.S.) before leaving the Cookery School.

5. Ex-Officers' Cooks 3rd Class will be changed over in their present Ships and Establishments, by drafting, with an equal number of ex-Cooks (O.S.), in order to provide the ratings concerned with the necessary experience and enable them to undergo the professional examination for Leading Cook (N.S.) in order of seniority.

6. Examinations for higher rating in the School of Cookery for ex-Cooks (O.S.) serving in H.M.A. Ships *Australia*, *Albatross* and *Tattoo* will be held between the 17th and 24th October, 1932, and, for ratings serving in *Canberra*, on the 5th November, 1932.

7. New Articles 163 and 164 of C.O.R., setting out the procedure for the training and advancement of Steward and Cook ratings, are being issued.

R.A.N. RELIEF FUND.

ORIGIN AND DEVELOPMENT.

1. The R.A.N. Relief Fund arose from very small beginnings. In April, 1913, Captain Constantine H. Hughes Onslow, R.N., and Commander William Burrows, R.A.N., gave into the care of the Chaplain of Williamstown Depot the sums of £5 5s. and £5 respectively, to be distributed by the Chaplain among any of the families of R.A.N. ratings he might find in need of financial help. In August of the same year Captain Hughes Onslow gave an additional £10, and Commander Burrows another £5. This small fund was known as the "Emergency Distress Fund."

2. In 1915 it was felt that the "Emergency Distress Fund" ought to enlarge its scope, if possible, in order to cope with the increasing number of cases of distress, which were the immediate outcome of the war. It was decided to initiate a fund, to be called the "R.A.N. Families' First Relief Fund." This was done, and an appeal for help was sent out to the various R.A.N. Ships and Depots. Commodore A. G. Gordon-Smith, R.N., kindly consented to act as the first Honorary Treasurer. As a result of the appeal, £135 0s. 9d. was collected, the greater part of which -£102 0s. 9d.—was given by the R.A.N. Reserve.

3. In the balance-sheet issued at the beginning of 1916 the Honorary Treasurer appealed to the R.A.N. for more generous assistance, and the fact that an appeal was made became known outside the Service. As a result, £447 12s. 4d. was obtained. Of this amount the V.R.C. gave £25; the Victorian Football League, £150; the Victorian League Umpires' Association, £20; the Royal Society of St. George, Penang, £33 16s. 4d.; and of the balance, £218 16s., a large sum again came from the R.A.N. Reserve and their friends.

4. June 12th, 1916, marks a distinct growth in the R.A.N. Relief Fund. On that date a letter was written to Rear-Admiral Sir William Creswell by the Secretary of the Victorian Football League, saying that the Committee were anxious "to make some special effort to augment one of the excellent funds it is understood you have for the benefit of the men of the Australian Navy," and asking that someone might be appointed to meet and confer with the Football Committee. As a result of a Conference between the Committee and the Naval Representative detailed for this purpose, it was decided to help the "R.A.N. Families' First Relief Fund." Other Melbourne societies—notably the Melbourne Branch of the Navy League—then became interested in Naval Relief, and it was ultimately decided that all the societies should co-operate in one general appeal to the public for this purpose, with the result that £18,112 5s. 10d. was collected on "Sailors' Day," 23rd March, 1917. This amount was distributed as follows :—

.5. With this great help from the "Sailors' Day" appeal, it was felt that the Fund could widen its scope of relief, and therefore, in 1917, the name

was changed from the "R.A.N. Families' First Relief Fund" to that of the "R.A.N. Relief Fund," and it was also decided to include Officers as well as ratings as being eligible for financial assistance.

3

6. In 1918 New South Wales likewise decided to help the families of Naval men who had fallen on evil days as a result of the war. Various patriotic societies in that State, guided and enthused by the Sydney Branch of the Navy League, held "Our Jacks' Day" on 1st November, 1918, and collected the magnificent sum of £163,262 6s. 8d. This was distributed in much the same way as the money collected in Victoria, viz. :--

20 per cent. R.A.N. Relief Fund,

10 per cent. R.N. Mine Sweepers (Dependants),

10 per cent. Naval Prisoners of War Fund,

30 per cent. R.N. Relief Funds,

30 per cent. Mercantile Marine Relief Funds.

7. Of this 20 per cent. allocated to the R.A.N., it was felt by the Committee of "Our Jacks' Day" Fund that "as many large subscriptions had been handed in on the understanding that one of the cardinal features of the Jacks' Day Appeal was that those who had been engaged in the war, or their families, should be cared for and liberally treated by those administering the Fund," it would not be right to place the whole of the 20 per cent. to the credit of the ordinary account of the R.A.N. Relief Fund. After consultation between the Executive Committee of the "Jack's Day" Fund and a representative from the Trustees of the R.A.N. Relief Fund, it was decided that £15,000 should be placed to the credit of the R.A.N. Relief Fund towards its usual and ordinary purposes of Naval relief; and that the balance of the 20 per cent.—£17,652—should be administered and distributed from Sydney by the "Navy League R.A.N. Claims Committee" for the benefit of those whose death or disability was the immediate outcome of the war.

8. The Relief Fund was further augmented in 1919 by £522 14s. 9d., forwarded by the Honorary Secretary "Our Sailors' Day Fund," Northern Tasmanian Branch of the Navy League, Launceston.

9. The foregoing statement does not include all contributions which were given during the war period towards the relief of Naval distress. These contributions include :---

10. On 6th May, 1922, the R.A.N. Relief Fund was constituted a proper and legal Trust Fund, and its object, according to the terms of the Trust Deed, was stated to be :---

"For rendering pecuniary assistance to Officers and/or men serving in the Royal Australian Navy, together with their dependants, also retired Officers and/or men, together with their dependants, and/or dependants of deceased Officers and men, in such manner as the Trustees shall in their absolute discretion deem advisable, and such assistance may consist of gifts or loans to such Officers and/or men, together with their dependants, in such manner and under such conditions as the Trustees shall think proper."

ADMINISTRATION.

11. Acting under the powers conferred by the Trust Deed as above, the Trustees have decided that the benefits of the Trust shall be limited to-

- (a) Officers and men serving in the R.A.N., together with their dependants.
- (b) The dependants of deceased Officers and men who have served within the R.A.N.
- (c) Officers and men who have served in the R.A.N., together with their dependants-

Provided that, save in the case of exceptional circumstances of distress, the dependants of deceased Officers or men, and ex-Officers and men and their dependants will not be regarded as eligible for assistance from the Fund for more than five years after the date of death or discharge from the Service of Officers or men respectively concerned.

12. The Trustees have further decided that as a general rule assistance given from the Fund shall be limited to the amount derived per annum from interest on invested capital.

13. The administration of the Fund, under the authority of the Trustees, is vested in two Committees, one operating in Sydney and the other in Melbourne. The Committees comprise respectively the Captain-Superintendent and the Chaplain of the Penguin, and the Captain-Superintendent of Training and the Chaplain of Flinders Naval Depot, the Chaplain in each case acting as Honorary Treasurer. Applications for relief should be addressed to the Chaplain of the Penguin, or of Flinders Naval Depot, according to the location of the person or persons in need of assistance ; in the case of ratings serving in sea-going ships, the request for assistance should be made through the Ship's Chaplain.

14. Balance-sheets showing the financial position of the Fund, and the amounts disbursed as relief, are issued half-yearly. The details of ordinary cases are, however, regarded as strictly confidential, and the names of persons assisted are not promulgated in the balance-sheets.

INJURIES REQUIRING THE ISSUE OF AN ACCIDENT NOTE AND INCLUSION IN THE LIST OF MINOR INJURIES.

It has come to notice that certain instructions in Admiralty Fleet Order 653/1932 are not being complied with nor are the provisions of Navy Order 122 of 1930 regarding the issue of Accident Notes being rigidly observed.

2. Both the above-quoted Orders are closely related and it is essential that, where an injury sustained either on or off duty is of a nature to justify record in the Nominal List of Minor Injuries, an Accident Note be issued in respect of the injury, i.e., no name should appear in the nominal list, *vide* A.F.O. quoted above, without a supporting Accident Note.

3. It has also come to notice that the very important notation as to whether the injury was sustained on or off duty is not being inserted in each case in the nominal list of minor injuries in the Medical Journal. In future care is to be taken that this notation is made in the nominal list and, for this purpose, the column headed "Whither discharged" in the Alphabetical List is to be used, the heading being altered to "State whether on or off duty."

4. In each case of the issue of an Accident Note an endorsement is to be made at the foot of *both* copies thereof indicating whether the Officer or Man was on the Sick List, the Attending List or, where no medical treatment was given in the ship, on neither List.



H.M.A. SHIPS AND NAVAL ESTABLISHMENTS-STOCKTAKING OF NAVAL STORES.

It is evident from a detailed examination of recent stocktaking reports of H.M.A. Ships that stocktaking in certain cases has not been carried out in a satisfactory manner, and that the regulations have not been complied with. In this connexion, the following matters and comments are brought to the notice of all concerned :—

(a) Stocktaking of Valuable and Important stores, and of the requisite percentage of the remaining stock, has not resulted in the disclosure of large discrepancies subsequently found to exist.

It is essential that the stocktaking on transfer of Central Store Officers be carried out by the incoming officer personally, or if this be not possible, by an officer nominated by him. In either case, the Central Store Officer assuming charge, after furnishing the requisite certificate, is responsible for the stock of which he has assumed charge. In all cases of transfer of Central Store Officers the Certificate of Transfer of Charge is to be accompanied by copies of Reports of Stocktaking containing the appropriate stocktaking certificates signed by the officer taking the stock.

(b) Stocktaking within a short period of previous stocktaking has disclosed the existence of errors in patterns and descriptions of stores which would have been disclosed had stocktaking been carried out properly in the first instance.

Reports of Stocktaking to adjust differences in description and pattern numbers of items should not be forwarded to Navy Office for approval until the correct designations of the items have been established beyond doubt.

- (c) Deficiencies have been reported, and ledgers adjusted, and the deficient stores have been found within a short period, necessitating the re-adjustment of the ledgers. It should be confirmed that stores are actually deficient before approval to write off charge is sought. Serious discrepancies should, however, be provisionally reported to Navy Office as soon as practicable and not held up until the end of a quarter. In all cases where discrepancies are disclosed adjustment is not to be effected until it has been ascertained that the ledger balance is correct.
- (d) Ledger pages for stores mustered have not been initialed and dated by the officer or rating taking stock, and Form S.1098 has not been properly completed as regards particulars of stowage of stores, &c.

Failure to record carefully these particulars is a contributory cause of discrepancies in stocks.

(e) In the majority of cases explanations of discrepancies are confined to the notations "errors in issuing and accounting," "errors on transfer to Central Storekeeping," and "found in ship."

The explanation "errors on transfer to Central Storekeeping" is not now applicable as frequent musters of stores have taken place since the transfer to Central Storekeeping. Differences in stocks must be adequately explained and a statement such as "errors in issuing and accounting" is not sufficient explanation of mistakes involving, in some cases, differences amounting in the aggregate to comparatively large sums. Such a statement cannot, in future, be accepted as a satisfactory explanation except in the case of stores in which difficulties are normally experienced in issuing in exact quantities. "Found in Ship" is not a full explanation of surpluses of stores; brief circumstances attending their discovery should be stated.

2. When a discrepancy included in a Report of Stocktaking relates to an item on permanent loan, the fact should be indicated, particulars of the loan list concerned, &c., being stated.

3. The Central Storekeeping system affords ample facilities for accurate storekeeping, and, if the Instructions are complied with and care exercised in issuing stores, discrepancies in stocks—the frequent occurrence of which indicates that the storekeeping work is not satisfactory—will be considerably reduced.

CHARGES AGAINST CENTRAL STOREKEEPING VALUATION ALLOWANCES.

Examination of Central Store Accounts discloses that stores expended for special purposes, e.g., Landing Parties, and stores issued to Departments of a ship for trial purposes, are not being valued and recorded in the Valuation Ledger.

2. It is the intention that all issues of consumable Naval Stores in Centrally Stored Ships and Establishments should be valued and recorded in the Valuation Ledger, and, except where specific instructions to the contrary have been issued, charged against the appropriate Valuation Allowance.

3. Expenditure of consumable Naval Stores for Landing Parties is to be recorded in the Valuation Ledger, and shown under a separate heading in the Quarterly Statement of Expenditure (Form S.1095A) under the Executive Department, but is not chargeable against the Valuation Allowance.

4. Expenditure of stores supplied to Departments for trial purposes is to be recorded in the Valuation Ledger and charged to the Valuation Allowance concerned. In cases where the use of stores supplied for trial purposes involves expenditure in excess of that normally incurred by the use of stores which they replace, particulars of the excess expenditure should be furnished in the Quarterly Returns (S,1095A).

TRAVELLING CONCESSIONS DURING LEAVE.

Approval has been given to the grant to members of the Royal Australian Navy (Seagoing) of transport at Commonwealth expense for a journey to and from their homes within the Commonwealth on two occasions in each year. The concession operates from 8th November, 1932, and is subject to the following conditions :—

- (a) The transport must be by rail where such is available.
- (b) Steamer warrants may be issued to members proceeding to Tasmania.
- (c) No payment will be allowed in lieu of the concession.
- (d) Transport at Commonwealth expense will be granted only during periods of Home Service Leave or Foreign Service Leave as defined in C.O.R.
- (e) The concession will not be granted until the expiration of a period of three months from date of entry, or re-entry when break in service has occurred, or in respect of leave granted immediately prior to discharge from the Service. The provisions of Article 166 of the Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions will apply as regards travelling on final discharge.
- (f) Transport concession is restricted to cases where the cost of return journey to and from his home exceeds 7s. 6d. based on 1st class fare in the case of an officer, or 5s. based on 2nd class fare in the case of a rating.
- (g) Warrants should not be issued in respect of journeys within the suburban area of a capital city.
- (h) The class of travel allowed will be as set out in Regulations for personnel travelling on duty.
- (i) Sleeping berths (except for trans-continental railway) and charges for booking seats are not allowed at Departmental expense.
- (j) For the purposes of this concession the definition of "home" is as shown in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 162.

2. Travelling warrants issued in accordance with this concession should be marked across the face "Travelling Concession." This should be done by means of an india-rubber stamp. Warrants for return journey should be issued at the same time as forward warrant is issued.

3. Commanding officers are to exercise such check as is considered necessary to verify the correctness of particulars of "home" address, and special attention should be given in this connexion to reported changes in locality of residence.

Personnel on Leave at Date of Grant of Concession.

3

4. Subject to satisfactory proof that the journey to home was undertaken in conformity with above conditions personnel who proceeded on leave on or after 8th November may be refunded the amount of the fare allowable under this concession.

So far as personnel who proceeded on leave prior to 8th November are concerned, provided that Commanding Officer is satisfied that official warrant was not obtained, refund of cost of return journey only may be made.

5. Where application is made to a District Naval Officer for a warrant to return to ship or depot under this concession, warrant on the chargeable form should be issued and the usual procedure in regard to such warrants observed. The advice to ship, however, should show clearly that application was for a concession warrant.

The advices of issue should be examined by the ship concerned and Director of Navy Accounts informed in regard to each such warrant, whether the terms of the concession are applicable (in which case no charge should be made), or whether a charge has been made against pay of the member concerned.
