WELFARE COMMITTEES, 1932.

Decisions on the General Requests put forward by the Welfare Committees, 1932, are promulgated hereunder for information. The Class Requests and Decisions thereon will be promulgated later.

- 2. Requests have been received from three different sources, i.e., from the separate Committees held in the Squadron, in Flinders Naval Depot, and in H.M.A.S. *Penguin*. Similar requests, in several cases, have been put forward by the different Committees, who have gone to great pains to support their requests by detailed reasons. It has been decided to summarize the requests, and not to promulgate in full the various reasons advanced in their support.
- Certain requests submitted by the Welfare Committee in Penguin were couched in terms which were improper and subversive of discipline.
 The Naval Board decided that these requests could not be accepted or considered.
- 4. In regard to the financial position of Petty Officers and men of the R.A.N., it has to be remembered that the Financial Emergency Act was applied to the Navy, in common with the other Defence Services and the Public Service in general, at a time when the Government was faced with financial difficulties of the first magnitude.

In November, 1932, certain substantial concessions were granted by the Government, viz.:—

- (a) Travelling concessions,
- (b) Increase in Leave Allowance,
- (c) Increase in Child Allowance.

Shortly after these concessions were approved, the Welfare Committees' requests were received, and these, together with the representations and recommendations of the Naval Board, were carefully considered by the Government, who decided to restore a substantial portion of the reduction in active pay which had been imposed under the Financial Emergency Act. An increase, in current rates of active pay, at a flat rate of 10d. a day for Ordinary Seamen and above, with effect from 1st December, 1932, has been approved in accordance with this decision.

GENERAL REQUESTS.

Request.

Decision.

1. (a) That pay and allowances be restored to standard rates with effect from 16th July, 1931.

(b) That the restored rates be adjusted to provide for a minimum adult wage of £182 per annum, exclusive of victualling, marriage, or kit upkeep allowances, badge or non-substantive pay, or any assessed value of accommodation, medical or dental attention.

The Government has approved of the rate of active pay of Ordinary Seamen (and relative ratings) and above being increased by the sum of 10d. a day, as a partial restoration of the reductions made under the Financial Emergency Act. In the case of Ordinary Seamen, 2nd Class, and equivalent ratings, restoration of 5d. a day, i.e., the full amount of the reduction, has been approved.

Request.

1.—(continued.)

(c) That deferred pay be included in the basic wage solely on the condition that it is admitted to be a portion of a rating's actual pay and that he cannot be deprived of it in any circumstances.

(d) As an alternative to the above, that all allowances including deferred pay, in force prior to 16th July, 1931, be restored to standard rates as from 16th July, 1932, and that 50 per cent. of the reduction of substantive pay under the Financial Emergency Act be restored as from 16th July, 1932, the remaining 50 per cent. being fully restored as from 1st July, 1933.

Svol ment and the state

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Decision.

In arriving at this decision, the Government made the increases effective from 1st December, 1932.

The restored rates provide a total of £186 per annum based on the emoluments of an Able Seaman of three years man's time, as follows:—

Marriage Allowance is excluded. Non-substantive pay is also excluded as representing a margin above the normal wage for special qualifications.

No specific value for the purpose of assessment is placed upon service accommodation, medical or dental treatment.

The request that deferred pay should not be forfeitable in any circumstances is not approved. It should be observed that this liability to forfeiture can affect only an extremely small percentage of the personnel, i.e., those who seriously misconduct themselves.

Victualling Allowance has been included and also Kit Upkeep Allowance. These allowances represent a definite value to a rating. So far as Victualling Allowance is concerned, the amount included represents the approximate cost of food supplies only.

The rates of Victualling and Kit Upkeep Allowance will continue, as heretofore, to be adjusted as requisite according to prevailing issuing prices, which are themselves dependent upon the cost of commodities to the Department. Fluctuations in these allowances will not affect rates of Active Pay.

1.—(continued.)

(e) As a further alternative, that a Commissioner, with the status of an Arbitration Court Judge, be appointed to inquire into Naval pay, having regard to conditions of service in the R.A.N., and with power to determine the lowest living wage to be paid to the adult rating.

2. That Lodging and Provision Allowance be paid while on long leave, at standard rates, i.e., Lodging Allowance 1s. 6d., and Provision Allowance 3s.

That Kit Upkeep Allowance be increased to 10d. a day for ratings dressed as seamen, and 1s. a day for other ratings.

 That free travelling be allowed to ratings when travelling on long leave outside the metropolitan areas of capital cities.

5. That pay and allotments be paid fortnightly instead of twice a month as at present. Decision.

This is a question of policy and discipline, and, therefore, outside the purview of Welfare Meetings (vide Navy Order No. 99 of 1932, para. 5).

Payment of Provision Allowance at current rates (at present 2s. 3d. a day), while on long leave, has been approved as from 8th November, 1932. The request for payment of Lodging Allowance while on long leave cannot be entertained.

In accordance with the practice followed in the Royal Navy, the annual Kit Upkeep Allowance in the Royal Australian Navy represents half the value of the articles issued gratuitously on first entry, with the exception of a few special articles such as bedding, mackintosh, and kit bag, for which the annual replacement allowance is based on the normal life of the article.

For calculation of the Kit Upkeep Allowance this system has been employed for a number of years and the Naval Board do not consider that any alteration is justified.

Approval has been given for the issue of Service Warrants to ratings travelling to and from their homes, when on long leave, provided the return fare, 2nd class, exceeds 5s. (vide Navy Order No. 166 of 1932).

With a view to consideration of the introduction of fortnightly payments of pay and allotments, the Board arranged for accountancy and allotments forms to be amended when reprint became necessary; the additional expenditure now anticipated in the change is therefore not great. The Board have sought necessary Treasury approval Request.

6. That, where invaliding from the Service is involved, the recommendations of the Board of Survey be communicated to the rating concerned immediately after the Survey, and that the period on pay thereafter be extended to 14 days from date of receipt of Naval Board decision.

7. That the provisions of Article 198, clause 8, Naval Financial Regulations, under which payment in lieu of extended leave may be made to Officers and to members of the Auxiliary Services when discharged on retrenchment, be extended to ratings of the Seagoing Forces.

8. That the amount of purchase money for discharge be reduced by 20 per cent. and a refund of 20 per cent. made to all ratings who have been discharged by purchase since 16th July, 1931.

That all ratings be allowed to serve until reaching 50 years of age. Decision.

and have approached the Postmaster-General's Department as regards suitable arrangements for payment on a fortnightly basis.

The Board of Survey will be authorized in future to inform the rating concerned, at their discretion, of the nature of their recommendation in regard to invaliding. Intimation that he is being recommended for invaliding is sufficient to indicate to a rating that he should at once begin to investigate the possibilities of obtaining employment on shore, and the Board do not consider it necessary to extend the period of full pay allowed for this purpose under present regulations.

The special conditions attaching to retrenchment are of an emergency nature, and will in future be determined according to the circumstances prevailing when the emergency arises. Article 198 (8) of the Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions is being cancelled.

The payment required of a rating when allowed to purchase his discharge is intended to recoup the Government partially for the expense of his entry and training The actual expense involved is much in excess of the purchase money charged; but the scale of payment has been limited to that in force in the Royal Navy, where costs are much lower. The purchase money bears no direct relation to rates of pay.

The Board are unable to approve of any reduction in the current scale.

Extension of service to 50 years of age in all Branches would have the effect of blocking promotion to an extent which could not be accepted. In order to bring the ratings of the various Branches more into line with regard to ages of final retirement, it is the intention to reduce to the lowest practicable limit the age of entry for recruits in all Branches.

10. (a) That the qualifying age (35) for transfer to the Auxiliary Services be reduced, and ratings with a minimum of seven years man's time be regarded as eligible for transfer.

(b) That amongst equally qualified applicants absolute preference be given to men with purely R.A.N. service and that in any case no man in receipt of a pension of any nature from the Royal Navy be employed in the Auxiliary Services.

11. (a) That duty free tobacco be stocked for issue on repayment.

- (b) That should it be impracticable to provide tobacco duty free, stocks of duty paid tobacco be maintained and issued at cost.
- 12. That white canvas gymnastic shoes with crepe soles be made available for issue on repayment.
- 13. (a) That a globite suit-case, of maximum dimensions suitable to Service stowage, be stocked in substitution for the present article.
- (b) That the use of a small case suitable for week-ends, &c., when the full-size suit-case is not rerequired, be permitted.
- 14. That improved sleeping and messing accommodation be provided, viz.:—

(a) Messing space separate from sleeping space;

(b) Sleeping space to be fitted with bunks for all ratings and stowage of kits, &c.

(c) Additional recreational space to be provided.

Decision.

It has been decided to alter the qualifications for transfer to the Auxiliary Services to provide for a man being eligible after he has completed twelve years man's time. It has been the practice for some years past to give preference, where qualifications are in other respects equal, to candidates with the longest R.A.N. Service. It cannot be accepted that previous R.N. Service. regardless of length of R.A.N. Service, should militate against an applicant's selection. It is extremely improbable that under this procedure a rating in receipt of a R.N. Pension would be selected.

This has, on many occasions, been the subject of representations by the Naval Board, but without success up to the present. Efforts will be continued.

This request is under consideration.

As soon as present stocks of the type of gymnastic shoe now in use are exhausted, a new type of shoe with crepe soles will be stocked for issue on repayment.

A compressed fibre suit-case of the type desired will be stocked as soon as the state of stocks of the present Admiralty type of suit-case on hand permits.

A small case, suitable for weekend use and stowage in lockers on board ship, will be stocked in future.

In view of the many objections e.g., weight limitation, structural difficulties, &c., it is not practicable to approve of this request.

Request.

 That an improved system of secondary lighting be introduced in Destroyers.

16. That ratings below that of Petty Officer be granted better leave facilities.

17. (a) That members of the Seagoing Forces should be immune from all forms of State Income Tax, including Unemployment Relief Tax.

(b) That alternatively a cost of living allowance be paid to those members who are liable to such taxation to equate their net income with that of members employed in seagoing ships who are exempt from such taxation.

18. (a) That in future, one general meeting of representatives from all ships and establishments, rather than three separate meetings, should be arranged for.

(b) That the Welfare Representatives should continue to function as such from one general meeting to another, intermediate meetings being called as requisite. Any representative to be entitled to apply through his Commanding Officer for a request to be considered, the Rear-Admiral Commanding, H.M.A. Squadron, then convening a Welfare Meeting of the standing representatives, should he think fit, to deal with the request.

Decision.

In view of the age of existing Destroyers, this proposal cannot be entertained as regards those vessels.

The subject of this request affects the general arrangement of duties in the Service, and, in accordance with Navy Order 99 of 1932, paragraph 5, is outside the purview of Welfare Meetings.

The matter of incidence of taxation is one for the State and Federal Parliaments.

The Naval Board are not prepared to recommend this request for the consideration of the Government, as it is considered that there are insufficient grounds for so doing. Ratings normally obtain in turn periods of shore employment and the liabilities as well as the advantages attaching to such employment are eventually equalized.

The request for the formation of a standing Welfare Committee cannot be approved. The Board have had under review the general procedure in regard to Welfare representations and have decided to adopt the new procedure which has been introduced in the Royal Navy, as outlined in A.F.O. 2226/1932, under which representations may be put forward at any time through Divisional Officers. The necessary amendments to C.O.R. will be promulgated in due course.

It is the present intention that the first general review of Service conditions under the new system

shall be held in 1934.

PAYMENTS OF DEFERRED PAY TO BANK ACCOUNTS.

Several cases have recently occurred where members discharged to shore have requested that payment of Deferred Pay due on discharge be made to the credit of their respective Bank Accounts at office of issue of passbook, notwithstanding that the address given on discharge is different from that at which account has been opened—in some instances in another State.

2. It would seem that members may not be aware of the arrangements made for transfer of account as laid down in Naval Account Regulations and Instructions, Article 95, clause (1), which provides that where a member has a Bank Account at a place other than where he desires Deferred Pay to be made available, application for transfer of account (on Commonwealth Bank Form 14) should accompany Forms A.S. 1031z and 1031y into Navy Office.

3. In the circumstances it is desired that members be duly acquainted with the position when Form 1031x is being prepared.

CENTRAL STOREKEEPING—REGISTRATION OF LEDGER PAGES.

The system at present in force in Centrally Stored Ships and Establishments, whereby particulars of ledger sheets are recorded in ledger certificates pasted on the covers of ledger binders, and ledger page numbers are allotted by Inspecting Officers, has been under review.

- 2. As, under present conditions, the ledger certificates do not meet all requirements and the existing system involves delay in the allocation of ledger page numbers until an audit is carried out, it has been decided to institute a new system of registration of ledger pages. The main features of this system are:—
 - (a) A register in the form of a binder and loose-leaves will be supplied to each ship and establishment. This register will comprise:—
 - (i) Particulars of pages contained in the ledgers (Form A.S. 155α).
 - (ii) Particulars of unused ledger pages (Form A.S. 155b).
 - (b) Serially numbered blank ledger sheets will be supplied to the Central Store Officer by the Inspecting Officer on each occasion of audit.
 - (c) All new ledger sheets inserted in Central Store Ledgers will be given a ledger page number by the Central Store Staff.
- 3. The following details in regard to the installation and operation of the new system, which will be applied in each ship and establishment on the next occasion of an audit by an Inspecting Officer, are promulgated for information and guidance:—
 - (a) Particulars of the ledger page numbers of all ledger sheets in the ledgers will be inserted in the Register of Ledger Pages by the Inspecting Officer.
 - (b) A supply of blank ledger pages sufficient to meet requirements of the ship until the next audit will be serially numbered by the Inspecting Officer and handed to the Central Store Officer. At the same time particulars of the serial numbers of these sheets will be inserted by the Inspecting Officer in the appropriate section of the Register.

(c) When a new ledger sheet is required the ledger page number allotted by the ship and other requisite particulars are to be inserted in the Register.

- (d) When ledger pages are transferred from one ledger to another a suitable reference is to be made on the Register Sheets concerned.
- (e) When ledgers are opened the ledger pages will be arranged in the order in which the stores shown thereon appear in the Rate Book of Naval Stores and then numbered consecutively by the officer who prepared the ledgers. The following system is to be applied in regard to the numbering by the Central Store Staff of ledger pages raised after the opening of the ledgers:—
 - (i) New ledger pages are to be inserted in ledgers in the position determined by the order of the store concerned in the Rate Book of Naval Stores.

- (ii) Numbers are to be allotted as follows:-
 - (a) New items of stores added by allotting the number of the previous page with the addition of "A" for the first additional item, "B" for the second and so on.
 - (b) Additional pages for an item of stores by allotting the number of the original page with the addition of the figure (1) for the first additional page, (2) for the second, &c.
- (f) The Register of Ledger Pages will be checked by Inspecting Officers during periodical audits.

In order to minimize the number of ledger sheets inserted in the ledgers from time to time the consumable ledger sheet (Form A.S. 151) has been revised to enable entries to be made on both sides of the sheets, and a supply of the revised forms will be made to each Ship and Establishment when the new system of registration of ledger pages is instituted.

SIGNALLING BETWEEN H.M.A. SHIPS, SERVICE AIRCRAFT, AND BRITISH MERCHANT SHIPS—SUMMARY OF REPORTS FOR 1932.

Reports (Form S.174) furnished in respect of Signalling Exercises conducted by H.M.A. Ships and Service Aircraft with British Merchant Ships during 1932 have been analyzed, and the following summary, with remarks, is promulgated for information.

2. General.—A total of 109 exercises with Merchant Vessels was carried out during the year, as compared with 187 for the previous year. There were two failures to establish communication. A similar number of failures was recorded in 1931. While fully appreciating the fact that opportunities for these exercises vary considerably with ships' itineraries, berths, &c., the Naval Board view with concern this very appreciable falling off in the number of exercises carried out during the past year. It is thought that this may be due, in part, to the orders contained in paragraph 3 of A.F.O. 86/1933, which deal with exercises carried out in harbour. Although possibly such exercises are carried out under somewhat artificial conditions, they afford more scope for a thorough exercise than those carried out at sea. especially as, in the latter case, ships are usually on opposite courses, and time admits of a few stereotyped flag hoists or phrases only. The initiative for arranging exercises in harbour should not, therefore, be left absolutely to the merchant vessels. Exercise signal communication should not, however, be opened up in harbour except at the request of a merchant vessel, but opportunity should be taken wherever possible of communicating with merchant ships by boat message with a view to finding out whether a convenient opportunity for a signal exercise will present itself during the ship's stay in harbour. Such messages should be couched in terms which make it clear that an exercise is desired only if convenient to the merchant vessel's harbour routine and work, &c.

3. H.M.A. Ships.—The following table indicates the number of exercises conducted by each of H.M.A. Ships:—

4. Service Aircraft.—The only exercise carried out by Service Aircraft with British Merchant Ships was that conducted by Aircraft A9/1 (temporarily attached to H.M.A.S. Canberra) with R.M.S. Moldavia on 17th October, 1932. This exercise was successful, though Canberra considered that the 10-in. Signalling Projector used by Moldavia was not entirely satisfactory for communication with Aircraft, and that the position of the S/P was unsuitable. Ship's officers suggested that the S/P be mounted on a portable tripod to overcome the difficulty.

5. Merchant Shipping.—Of 78 ships exercised, 36 are on the Australian Registry. Allara, Canberra, Montoro, Myrmidon, Nankin, and Themistocles were exercised on three occasions, and eighteen other ships on two occasions each. Ships belonging to the Adelaide S.S. Company and the Orient Line recorded eleven and ten exercises respectively.

6. Whilst the signalling of the merchant ships has been of a good standard generally, the following exercises have been selected as indicating outstanding signalling efficiency on the part of the Merchant Ships concerned:—

Serge Jumpers, without cuffs, are abolished as an article of kit in the R.A.N., but ratings now in possession of these garments are permitted to wear them out if they so desire. No further issues of these Jumpers are, however, to be made gratuitously or on repayment, and remains in all Ships should be returned to the Royal Edward Victualling Yard at the first opportunity.

2. On and after 1st April. 1934, Serge Jumpers, without cuffs, are not to be worn. Ratings dressed in Class II. uniform will, therefore, require to be in possession of Jumpers, with cuffs, by that date.

3. The above alteration in uniform will not apply to the R.A.N.R. or R.A.F.R. at the present time. WELFARE COMMITTEES 1932-CLASS REQUESTS.

With reference to Navy Order 6 of 1933, dealing with the General Requests put forward by the Welfare Committees, 1932, the following decisions regarding the Class Requests received are promulgated for information:—

Request.

Decision.

GROUP I.—SEAMEN.

1. That Seaman Petty Officers, if not previously advanced, be rated Chief Petty Officer, on completing 9 years' service as Petty Officer, subject to recommendation.

The number of Chief Petty Officers of the Seaman Branch borne is limited by an establishment which is based upon the number of positions in which Chief Petty Officers can be suitably employed. Automatic promotion to Chief Petty Officer, regardless of requirements, cannot be entertained. Petty Officers in the R.A.N., during 1932, have been promoted at an average seniority of 10 years and 4 months; in the R.N., the latest figures (A.F.O.1677/1932) give the average seniority on promotion as 13 years and 4 months.

2. That Seamen (Q.O.) be classed as Daymen and work solely with Ordnance Artificers.

It is not considered that Able Seamen (Q.O.) should be classed as Daymen. They are primarily Seamen, and cannot therefore be relieved entirely of Seamen's duties.

GROUP II.—SIGNAL AND W/T RATINGS.

- 3. (a) That section 38 of the Commonwealth Public Service Act 1922-24 be amended to include the Postal Department and Amalgamated Wireless Ltd. as Departments under the Act for the purpose of employment of ex-Naval ratings.
- (b) That ratings possessing P.M.G.'s Radio-Operators Certificates be placed on A.W.A. rosters according to date of passing and grade of certificate, a rating still serving sacrificing his turn on the roster, except as provided in (c).

Negotiations are proceeding with the authorities concerned, and the result will be promulgated in due course. Request.

(c) That the portion of section 38 of the Commonwealth Public Service Act 1922-24 relating to full period of enlistment be waived, in order to permit of ratings within one year of termination of engagement being granted Free Discharge in order to accept the positions.

- 4. That a Signal rating whose eyesight falls below the standard required for his rating be granted preference in transfer to another Branch, irrespective of vacancies existing at the time.
- 5. (a) That Telegraphist Air Gunner non-substantive allowance be increased to 2s. per diem.
- (b) That an Arm Cuff Badge be supplied similar to that issued in the Royal Navy.
- 6. That the active pay for the Communication Branch be brought into line with that of Writer and Supply ratings.
- 7. That Garden Island Signal Station be manned by Active Service ratings.

Decision.

Such cases, as they occur, will be considered on their merits.

- (a) It is intended to adhere to the general basis for the standard scale of R.A.N. duty allowances, viz., the scale laid down by the Admiralty for the R.N., unless there are very strong reasons to the contrary. Such reasons are not considered to exist in this case.
- (b) A supply of Cuff Badges similar to those in use in the R.N. will be made available at an early date.

Not approved. The pay of the Communication Branch is based upon that of the Seaman Branch, a certain allowance being made for the fact that non-substantive pay is not obtainable to the same extent in the Communication Branch.

Approved in principle. The reorganization of the Garden Island V/S & L/T Station is under consideration, having due regard to—

24. (a) That the two-sided system be adopted in the Supply Branch.

(b) That Supply ratings who fail to qualify be not allowed to re-engage.

(c) That a course of instruction be instituted to enable singlesided ratings to obtain the necessary qualification.

(d) That ratings complete two years, one on each side, without deviation, a roster being kept for the purpose.

Preference will normally be be considered for vacancies in the given to Supply ratings, if applicants from this Branch, possessing adequate experience and thoroughly recommended, are available.

Under consideration.

It has been decided that, for the future, in all examinations for advancement in the Supply Branch (i.e. to Supply Petty Officer and to Warrant rank) candidates will be required to qualify in both Stores and Victualling. L.S.A's, now on the roster for advancement who have qualified on one side only will, if their turn for promotion in a vacancy comes within 12 months from the date of this Order, be advanced provisionally, but they will not be confirmed unless they pass in the other section within 12 months of date of provisional advancement. Supply Petty Officers and Supply Chief Petty Officers now serving who are qualified on one side only will not be required to qualify on the other side.

Re-engagement is subject to recommendation by Commanding Officer, and it is not proposed to impose further definite restrictions (e.g., two-sided qualification) in regard to re-engagement.

It is not considered necessary to institute a course for this purpose.

Arrangements will be made to ensure that, as far as practicable, Supply ratings who are obliged to qualify on both sides for advancement are employed alternately on Stores and Victualling duties throughout their service.

Request.

25. That Supply Assistants be advanced to Leading Supply Assistant after a maximum period of four years, irrespective of vacancies existing.

26. (a) That a shorthand course for Writer ratings be instituted, or, failing the establishment of such courses, ratings be allowed to make their own arrangements to qualify in short- mainly in their own time. hand, the whole or part of the cost of same being refunded on qualifying.

(b) That, on qualifying, the shorthand allowance be paid continuously, subject to requalification as necessary, whether actually employed or not.

(c) That a shorthand allowance intermediate between the two present grades be authorized, i.e., 1s. per day for qualification of 100 words per minute.

27. That Writer ratings be employed in clerical positions in the Office of Defence Liaison Officer (Naval), at Australia House, London.

28. That examination higher rating be held twice yearly, and that all papers be set by one examining Officer.

Decision.

Promotion to the Leading Rate in certain Branches is at present much slower than it has been in the past in the R.A.N., and is slower now in some Branches than in others. In all Branches, however, promotion is still obtainable in the R.A.N. earlier than in corresponding Branches in the R.N. The Board are not satisfied that any special action to expedite promotion in advance of vacan-. cies is justified at the present time. The position is, however, being carefully watched, and will be periodically reviewed by the Naval Board.

It is not intended to institute courses for instruction in shorthand. Ratings wishing to qualify are expected to acquire the necessary knowledge at their own expense, and

The Naval Board have approved of the procedure now in force in the R.N. being adopted. A limited establishment of shorthand typists will be allowed and qualified ratings borne on the establishment will be paid continuously so long as they retain their efficiency. Qualified ratings supernumerary to the establishment will be placed upon a roster according to date of qualification, and vacancies on the paid establishment will be filled from this roster as they occur.

Not approved.

It is not at present proposed to vary the existing procedure of filling these clerical positions by civilians.

New procedure, under which examinations for higher rating in the Supply Branch will be held twice yearly and examination papers will be standardized, has recently been introduced, vide Navy Order 176 of 1932.

29. That the professional examination for Supply Chief Petty Officer be re-introduced.

30. That a Leading Writer failing in one or more subjects in examination for P.O. Writer be re-examined only in the subjects in which he failed.

31. That extra pay be granted to Supply ratings who are qualified in both Stores and Victualling.

32. That Junior Writer and Supply ratings be granted improved messing accommodation.

33. That a larger mess be provided for Regulating Petty Officers in Cruisers and Albatross.

GROUP VIII.—COOK, STEWARD, BUTCHER, AND BAND RATINGS.

34. That Bandsman's No. 1 Tunic be issued as an article of loan clothing and replaced as necessary. Decision.

The present system is considered quite satisfactory, and it is not proposed to re-introduce the examination for Supply C.P.O. which was recently abolished.

In examinations for higher rating in all Branches a candidate either passes or fails. No provision is made for re-examination only in the subjects in which a candidate fails: the whole examination must be taken again. It is considered undesirable to vary the usual procedure in the case of candidates for Petty Officer Writer. This request is therefore not approved.

Supply Assistants are required to qualify in both Stores and Victual-ling as part of the normal qualifications of their rating. It is not considered that the dual qualifications give any Supply ratings justifiable claim to an allowance, which is not payable in the R.N. in similar circumstances. Except in Destroyers centrally stored, no rating is called upon to perform duty in both sections concurrently, and the dual qualifications do not involve additional work or responsibilities.

No sufficient reason is considered to exist for departing from the Regulations in regard to messing, as laid down in K.R. & A.I.

The existing messes are adequate for messing purposes. The provision of a mess large enough to furnish sleeping as well as messing accommodation is not practicable.

The question as to whether the kit upkeep allowance can be regarded as sufficient in the case of Band ratings, having in view the value of their kit and the "life" of the various articles of their uniform, as compared with the value and "life" of the articles comprising the kit of other Class III. ratings, is being investigated, and decision will be promulgated in due course.

Request.

35. That the full normal duties of Cooks and Stewards under treatment for V.D. include employment such as Mess Deck Sweepers and Cooks of messes.

36. That Leading Stewards, passed for P.O. Steward, be granted an increment after six years as Leading Steward.

GROUP IX.—SICK BERTH RATINGS.

37. That Sick Berth P.O.'s and Leading S.B.A's. passed for higher rating be advanced after two years from date of passing.

38. That the allowance now paid to Zymotic Ward Attendants be extended to ratings employed in attending upon V.D. cases.

39. That an allowance be paid to the ratings employed as Writers to S.M.O.'s at F.N.D. Hospital and H.M.A. Ships and Establishments, Sydney.

40. That the provisions of K.R. & A.I. in regard to the payment of Wardmaster Allowance be fully applied to the R.A.N., i.e., that the allowance be payable whether or not a Warrant Wardmaster is borne.

Decision.

While it is realized that Cooks and Stewards suffering from Venereal Disease are at a disadvantage as compared with other ratings suffering from the same complaint, the special nature of their work makes it impossible to give them full-time employment (outside the normal duties) in ships; although it may be possible to employ such cases on whole-time work when serving in Shore Establishments.

No V.D. rating should, in any case, be employed as Cook of a Mess.

Not approved. The scale of pay for all Branches provides for only one increment in the case of Leading Rates. It is not proposed to introduce a further increment in one Branch to meet abnormal circumstances temporarily prevailing.

It is not proposed to introduce automatic promotion to the Sick Berth Branch. This method of promotion has recently been abolished in the Writer Branch. See also reply to Request No. 25. (Similar Request as regards Supply Branch.)

A similar request has previously been not approved on the ground that attendance upon Venereal cases is part of the normal duties of a Sick Berth rating. The request has been given further consideration, but the Board are not prepared to depart from the previous decision.

Not approved.

Under consideration.

 That a Messman be detailed for Sick Berth Messes in Ships.

42. That separate messes be established in Sick Bays for Sick Berth Staff and patients.

- 43. That Sick Berth ratings be borne on the Staffs of District Naval Officers.
- 44. That each rating be trained in one of the Specialist Branches, and that a rating borne in lieu of a Specialist rating be paid the appropriate allowance.
- 45. That examinations for advancement be held at definite periods, the examination papers being set by a Central Board, in lieu of the present system of examination on individual application.

Decision.

Approved where circumstances permit, but on the understanding that a Messman, if detailed for the Sick Berth Mess, is not to be permitted to attend in any way upon patients.

The establishment of separate messes within the Sick Bay for the Sick Berth Staff and for patients is not practicable. Approval is given, however, for Sick Berth Petty Officers and Sick Berth Chief Petty Officers to join one of the Chief Petty Officers' or Petty Officers' messes should they desire to do so.

The very limited Establishment allowed for the District Staff precludes the making of any such appointments for the present.

The training of Sick Berth ratings as Specialists must necessarily be limited to Service requirements. The Establishment of Specialists maintained provides for the positions actually required to be filled, and for a proportion of spare numbers in addition.

In view of the necessity for an oral and practical examination in addition to the written examination, it is not practicable to arrange for all examinations to be carried out at one centre. Close supervision by the D.N.M.S. ensures uniformity of standard in the examination papers.

EXERCISES IN CODING AND "I" METHOD TRANSMISSION AND RECEPTION BETWEEN NAVAL SHORE W/T STATIONS.

Exercises in Coding and "I" method transmission and reception are to be carried out by Navy Office and Garden Island W/T Stations in accordance with the following instructions:—

(a) Preparation of Exercise Messages.

Drafting.—Officers are to draft the messages initiating these Exercises. The text should relate to topical subjects, but not to political, current Service (particularly Naval) or other controversial matters, or to Confidential Books.

Messages should be so worded as to require a reply—the nature of which will be immediately available to the ratings on watch at the Receiving Station.

Replies.—These may be prepared by ratings, but should be of sufficient length to require the use of not more than 20 code groups (10 G.T.C. double groups).

General.—It is not intended that the texts of the messages should form part of the Exercises, but they should conform to Coding Instructions for the drafting of messages.

Coding.—Two messages—one in Peace Code (of 40 to 60 groups) and one in G.T.C. (of 20 to 30 double groups)—are to be coded by the normal Coding Staff (if possible, in rotation) for transmission in accordance with paragraph (b) below.

Coding may be carried out at any time in advance of the times of transmission, provided a time limit is placed on the Coders.

(b) Transmission.

Exercise Messages addressed to Shore Authorities only (one each in Peace Code and G.T.C.) are to be transmitted as follows:—

Navy Office W/T Station 0900K—Tuesdays.
Garden Island W/T Station—0030K—Thursdays.

It is essential, to avoid interference with Service traffic, that transmissions commence at the times shown.

(c) Method of Transmission.

"I" method.—The instructions contained in A.S.P. 111, Article 10, are to be followed, except that only one frequency is to be used. The frequency chosen should be in accordance with atmospheric conditions, and the location of H.M.A. Ships at the time.

Service traffic is not to be delayed for these exercise messages, and their transmission is to cease if they are not cleared by 1030K in the case of Navy Office W/T Station's routine, and 0200K in the case of that of Garden Island.

(d) Interception by H.M.A. Squadron.

W/T Guards in H.M.A. Squadron (and any ships acting independently for W/T purposes) should record these messages.

MESSING ALLOWANCE IN SHORE ESTABLISHMENTS.

Amongst the General Requests submitted by the Welfare Committee, 1932, for Flinders Naval Depot, was included a request to the effect that the standard of general mess menu in the Depot should be improved, both in quality and variety, by expending the full amount of the messing allowance, i.e., 1s. 4d. per man per diem, in lieu of the reduced allowance of 1s. 3d. per diem at present applicable to Shore Establishments.

2. This request could not be accepted as properly coming within the purview of the Welfare Committee in that it related to a particular Establishment, and it was not therefore included amongst the General requests dealt with in Navy Order 6 of 1933. The Naval Board have, however, given consideration to the question raised, and their decision is promulgated hereunder.

4. On account of the more frequent week-end and short leave given over an extended period to ratings in Shore Establishments than is normally possible in Sea-going Ships, it has been found that this common standard of victualling can be maintained at Flinders Naval Depot and in Penguin at an average cost of 1d. per man per diem below the cost in Sea-going Ships.

5. It has now been decided that from the 1st April, 1933, the same average cost will be applied to Shore Establishments as in Sea-going Ships. Thom the lower was been and no

ALLOTMENTS TO WIVES AND/OR DEPENDENT CHILDREN.

With reference to C.O.R., Article 199, clause 3, the following instructions relative to stoppages or reductions of allotments of ratings in favour of their wives and/or dependent children are to be observed in the Royal Australian Navy.

2. When a rating requests to stop his allotment, endeavour should be made to discourage him from doing so unless the Captain be satisfied of the validity of his reasons for discontinuing payment (K.R. & A.I. Article 1756, clause 2). If, however, the man persists in his request contrary to the Captain's advice, stoppage should be approved, but he should be informed that, in the event of the Naval Board deciding to enforce the provisions of Section 98a of the Naval Discipline Act, deductions from pay may be ordered continuously from the date the allotment has been stopped.

3. Whenever stoppage has been approved, the Captain is to forward to the Naval Board a report on the case: the report should include a statement of the rating's own reasons for his request, supported by any documentary evidence available, together with the Captain's observations on the merits of the case insofar as he is able to form an opinion from the information in his possession.

When considered desirable, stoppages may be signalled and, when this method of communication is employed, brief mention of the reasons should be made, regard being had to the provisions of C.O.R., Article 265a—Code transmission of personal details. The written report should be forwarded as soon as possible afterwards.

4. The foregoing instructions apply also to a request for the reduction of an allotment if the reduced amount payable should fall below the limits specified in Section 98A, sub-section 2, of the Naval Discipline Act.

5. Except in cases where the rating is discharged from the Service, no allotment ordered by the Naval Board to be declared in pursuance of Section 98A of the Naval Discipline Act is to be stopped or reduced below the appropriate rate prescribed by the Act without the approval of the Naval Board, provided that in cases where the rating is sentenced to detention or imprisonment, or placed on reduced pay, the Commanding Officer may take appropriate steps to prevent the rating becoming in debt to the Crown, the action taken being communicated to the Naval Board immediately for covering approval.

In the event of the pay of the allottor (as defined in sub-section 5 of Section 98A) being increased, the amount of the allotment should be increased proportionately.

On transfer to another Ship or Establishment of a rating who has a compulsory allotment in force, the transfer list should indicate that the allotment is compulsory (and therefore subject to the conditions outlined in this paragraph).

6. The power given to the Naval Board by sub-section 2 (a) of Section 98a of the Naval Discipline Act to order compulsory deductions from pay in the absence of valid Court Orders or Decrees will only be used in rare and exceptional circumstances, as it is desirable that such matters should be determined by a magistrate, after hearing evidence for both parties on oath. Any such order will generally be for a limited period only, sufficient to allow the parties concerned to obtain appropriate relief in a Court of Law, and shall be without prejudice to any action which either the husband or wife may take in the latter connection. FORTNIGHTLY SYSTEM OF PAYMENT OF PAY.

With reference to Navy Order 26 of 1933, a fortnightly system of payment of pay and allowances to Seagoing personnel will be instituted as from 1st April, 1933.

- 2. The present procedure in regard to keeping of Ships' quarterly ledgers will not be varied.
- 3. The following amended Article 83 of Naval Account Regulations and Instructions will be promulgated in due course:—

"83. FORTNIGHTLY PAYMENTS OF PAY AND ALLOWANCES.

- Payments to officers and men shall be made on every alternate Thursday.
- (2) The amount payable shall be the amount (disregarding pence) at credit of the member's account on the day of payment less the full amount of any fortnightly allotment in force.

In cases where monthly allotments are in force, sufficient credit shall be retained on a *pro rata* basis to meet the ultimate liability.

In compiling the amount due, allowance is to be made for any other authorized abatement accrued but not actually brought to account.

- (3) The Naval Board may, in special circumstances, approve of payment being made on days other than the regular pay day."
- 4. The first payment will be made on Thursday, 13th April, and will represent thirteen days' pay only. The allotment payable in respect of this pay period, however, has been declared on a fourteen-day basis, and cases may arise where deduction of the full amount of the allotment would result in a member receiving very little or no pay at the first payment. In the circumstances, approval is given for the first two payments in April to be based on half of 27 days' pay and allowances—less the full amount of the fortnightly allotment.

FORM S.220—TUBERCULOSIS PATIENT SENT TO HOSPITAL—USE OF.

With reference to Navy Order 43 of 1933, Form S.220 is to be rendered in duplicate, and is to be forwarded to the Senior Medical Officer of the Naval Hospital or Sick Quarters to which a tuberculosis patient is discharged. Where possible this Form should accompany the other medical documents sent to the Naval Hospital or Sick Quarters.

2. If a tuberculosis patient is discharged to a Civil Hospital, both copies of Form S.220 are to be forwarded direct to the Director of Naval Medical Services.

3. When a rating is first medically surveyed, Form S.220 is to be attached to the Report of Medical Survey.

4. Before a patient is discharged to Hospital, he is, where possible, to be interrogated as to any contact with a known or suspected case of tuberculosis. Any information so obtained is to be inserted on Form S.220, care being taken to give the name, quality and Official Number of the contact, or suspected contact, and all details as to nature of the association. The back of Form S.220 is to be used for this purpose.

TRAVELLING CONCESSIONS DURING LEAVE.

Examination of warrants issued for leave concessions under the conditions in Navy Order 166 of 1932 shows that many instances have occurred where the provisions of the Navy Order have been disregarded.

The greater portion of irregular issues has occurred in connexion with condition (j) of the above Navy Order. The definition of "home" as defined in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 162 (3), must be strictly observed and officers responsible for issue of warrants should not interpret the definition other than literally.

2. The following are examples which have occurred of irregular issues of warrants under the terms of Navy Order 166 of 1932 :—

(a) To unmarried personnel proceeding on a journey other than to home of parents, e.g., warrants were issued in some cases to unmarried personnel to visit relatives or friends.

The definition of "home" allows warrants only in cases where visits are made to parents.

As regards visits to guardians, the only members entitled to such issues are those under 21 years of age.

(b) To a place (where wife is visiting) other than the usual place of residence.

Change of usual place of residence will not entitle the issue of a warrant unless the change is definitely a permanent one.

(c) To a member, whose marriage occurred when on leave, to return to his ship.

Until a member has established a home as defined, the concession is not applicable.

3. Concession warrants issued in future must show clearly the relationship which exists between the member and the person or persons visited, and should be completed after the words "purpose of" by the addition of the words "visiting the home of (a) wife and/or family, (b) parents, (c) guardian", as the case may be. Where the warrant provides for tickets for more than one member, the above details should be shown on the line immediately below the member's name in the body of the warrant.

4. The established principle should not be departed from that wherever practicable ratings should be sent on leave from the Port nearest to their homes, e.g., ratings whose homes are in Sydney should not be sent on leave from ship in Melbourne.

The necessity for the exercise of economy in all arrangements for putting the concession into effect is impressed on all concerned.

Advantage should invariably be taken of railway excursion and concession fares wherever possible, warrants being issued for return tickets if saving can thereby be effected.

6. The Naval Board direct that strict attention be paid to the information given in this Order in connexion with the future issue of concession warrants. Officers responsible should not issue warrants when any doubt exists as to the eligibility of the applicant under the approved conditions. If desired by the member, where doubt exists as to eligibility, a chargeable warrant may be issued, and the matter referred to Navy Office for decision.

INJURIES TO BONY STRUCTURE—X-RAY PHOTOGRAPHS REQUIRED.

PROSECUTIONS-PROOF OF DOCUMENTS.

The following copy of a memorandum from the Secretary, Attorney-General's Department, is notified for information:—

"In a matter which has recently been under consideration, the vital point to be proved before a prosecution could succeed was that a certain document of an incriminating nature had been handed by a member of the public to a particular officer of the Commonwealth.

The document was of such a nature that it could not afterwards be identified positively by the officer merely on an inspection of its form or contents. The document passed through many hands in different departments before the question of prosecuting the member of the public was finally dealt with, and it was then found that, to succeed in a prosecution, it would be necessary to call as a witness every person who had had, at any time, custody of the document since it was first received, in order to prove that the document produced in Court was the actual document handed to the officer by the member of the public.

The necessity for such an expensive, involved and unsatisfactory method of proving the identity of the document could have been avoided if the officer to whom it had first been handed, had placed on the document his initials or some mark by which he could afterwards positively identify the document as the one which had been handed to him.

In future, therefore, whenever a questionable document or article is discovered or received by an officer who may later be required to prove the discovery or receipt of that particular document or article, the document or article should be initialled or marked by the officer in such a way that he could, if required, subsequently swear positively to the identity of the document or article."

RIFLES, M.L.E., FITTED WITH HEAVY BARRELS.

A new rifle with a heavier barrel was brought into use by rifle clubs on 1st July, 1933, simultaneously with the adoption of Mark VII. Ammunition. In order that clubs formed in H.M.A. Ships may be in a position to compete on even terms in matches with civilian rifle clubs, arrangements have been made to obtain a small stock of rifles with heavy barrels.

ASTIGMATIC LENSES FOR RANGEFINDERS.

With reference to Admiralty Fleet Order 2452/1932, the procedure to be followed in connection with the supply to H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments of lenses for correcting astigmatism in rangetakers, is as follows:—

- (i) The Medical Officer of the Ship or Establishment concerned should arrange for the examination of Rangetakers by an Ophthalmic Specialist at Repatriation General Hospital, Randwick or elsewhere and should then, in conjunction with the Gunnery Officer, furnish a demand to the Central Store Officer for any lenses required.
- (ii) The Central Store Officer will demand the lenses from the Naval Store Officer, Sydney. Full particulars including the Specialist's prescription and the name, etc., of the rating for whom the lenses are required are to be furnished with the demand.
- (iii) The Naval Store Officer, Sydney, will arrange supply of the lenses and also the marking of the lenses and engraving of containers as indicated in paragraph 1 (v) of Admiralty Fleet Order 2452/1932, and the marking of the lens or container with the degree of correction. The Specialist's original prescription will be returned by the Naval Store Officer with each lens supplied.
- (iv) On receipt in the Ship or Establishment concerned, each lens should be issued outright by the Central Store Officer. The issue voucher is to be receipted by the rating receiving the lens and countersigned by the Medical Officer, who should check the issue of the lenses to individual rangetakers by comparison with the report from the Ophthalmic Specialist.
- 2. Except as modified above, the provisions of Admiralty Fleet Order 2452/1932 are generally applicable to the Royal Australian Navy. Any lenses not yet returned to the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, in accordance with paragraph 2 of Admiralty Fleet Order 2452/1932 should be returned forthwith.

TRAVELLING CONCESSIONS DURING LEAVE.

With reference to Navy Order 70 of 1933, consideration has been given by the Naval Board to instances where, in connexion with Christmas Leave period, travelling warrants were granted which were not in conformity with instructions issued on the matter.

- 2. These issues have been allowed to stand, but in future where warrants are issued which are not in conformity with conditions laid down, it will be necessary to consider the matter of charge against officers responsible.
- 3. The following decisions given on cases which have arisen recently are promulgated for information and guidance:—
 - (a) Warrants to visit home of guardian may be issued only to personnel under 21 years of age. A relative with whom a member lived during childhood and who has been regularly visited during the member's service in Royal Australian Navy may be accepted as a guardian for purpose of the concession.
 - (b) Ratings proceeding to Hobart from Sydney on leave should normally travel by the direct steamer route. In cases where it is not practicable for approximately the full period of leave to be taken in Tasmania, the Sydney-Hobart via Melbourne route may be used for journey in one direction only.
 - (c) A member who is a widower or is legally separated from or deserted by his wife, or divorced, may be granted concession warrant to and from home of child provided he has an allotment in force payable either directly to the child or to a guardian on behalf of the child and that he is the sole support of the child. Warrant may not be issued to home of the member's parents unless it is also the bona fide home of the child and the foregoing conditions are fulfilled.
 - (d) The travelling concession is applicable to journeys to and from "home" as defined, i.e., the usual place of residence of the person whom the member is entitled to visit and to no other place. It does not apply to journeys to or from a place where the parent, guardian or wife may be resident temporarily.
 - (e) In cases where divorce proceedings have been instituted, a rating would not be entitled to a concession warrant to visit his parents until the decree nisi is made absolute.
 - (f) A widower without children may be granted concession warrant to visit the home of his parents.



CELLULOID STORES OR COMPONENTS OF STORES.

If subjected to high temperatures, celluloid stores are liable to become unstable and may be a serious fire risk. They should consequently always be stored in a cool place and without any wrapping.

- 2. Acid fumes evolved by unstable celluloid constitute a further storage risk as they have a corrosive action on metals, fabrics, and paper.
- 3. Stores or components of stores which are made of celluloid should be inspected periodically and, if showing signs of discoloration, loss of translucency, pitting, blistering, or brittleness, should be returned to store to be tested for stability.

CENTRALLY STORED SHIPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS—SYSTEM OF ACCOUNTING FOR CABIN FURNITURE AND BEDDING.

In order to simplify the system of accounting for Cabin Furniture and Bedding, it has been decided to amend the procedure referred to in Navy Order 64 of 1932 as follows:—

(a) Forms A.S. 1099 (Outside and Inside) to be utilized as cabin inventories for all Naval Stores except bedding.

(b) Separate forms A.S. 1099 (Inside only), in triplicate, showing the name and rank of the officer concerned to be utilized as bedding lists, the last column of the forms being suitably amended to provide for the signature of the officer. The original is to be used to support ledger entries, the duplicate being retained by the Central Store Officer and the triplicate handed to the officer to whom the bedding is issued.

(c) In the event of an officer already in occupation of a cabin being transferred to another cabin, the bedding list will be kept open, the items shown thereon remaining on loan to that officer

irrespective of the cabin occupied.

(d) When an officer finally leaves the ship, the existing procedure in respect of the loan list for cabin furniture will apply. In the case of bedding, the Central Store Officer will receipt both copies of the bedding list, the duplicate being filed in support of entries in the loan ledger and the triplicate handed to the officer concerned.

2. The revised procedure will obviate the necessity for raising issue and receipt vouchers on forms S. 156 and S. 1091 for bedding, except where alterations are made in the quantity of bedding on loan to an officer, during the period of his appointment to a ship or establishment.

3. Whilst it is desired that the revised procedure be put into operation as early as practicable, it is unnecessary to make any alterations in the existing procedure until such time as a change in the occupancy of a cabin is involved.

With reference to Navy Order 184 of 1931, the additional charge to cover cost of exchange involved in settlement of radio traffic accounts which are adjusted outside the Commonwealth is to be calculated as from 1st January, 1934, on the basis of a percentage addition of 85 per cent. to the total cost of the message under the rates laid down in Naval Account Regulations and Instructions, Article 42. Variations of the percentage addition will be notified in Navy Orders.
