MEDICAL FORMS A.M.40 H.S., (COVER) (OUTSIDE) AND (INSIDE), A.M.41, A.M.41y-REVISION AND ADOPTION.

Forms A.M.40 H.S. (Cover) (Outside) and (Inside) have been revised and will, except as indicated in paragraph 3, be issued, on demand, by the Medical and Dental Store Officer, Sydney, when stocks of the old form are exhausted.

2. Form A.M.41v, Clinical Sheet—(4-hourly) has been established for use in Naval Hospitals, Sick Quarters and H.M.A. Ships, where deemed necessary, in place of the twelve-hourly type of Clinical Sheet (Form A.M.41). First supply will be made without demand to all concerned.

3. A first supply of Forms A.M.40 H.S. will also be issued, without demand, to H.M.A. Ships in which a Medical Officer is borne to permit a complete record of those cases on the Sick List which can only be adequately recorded on that form.

4. When Form A.M.40 H.S. is employed in one of H.M.A. Ships, an entry to that effect is to be made in the case record (Part 2) of Medical Officer's Journal.

5. Completed forms A.M.40 H.S. are to be forwarded by ships on paying off, or earlier if desired, to the Medical and Dental Store Officer, Sydney, for retention.

FORM A.M.41z-" RECORD OF TREATMENT."

The abovementioned Form has been established for use in the Royal Australian Navy and first supply will be made without demand to all H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments in which a Naval Medical Officer is borne.

2. In Naval Hospitals and Sick Quarters, Form A.M.41z is to be completed in all cases in which it is considered that a record of the case may be of value in subsequent treatment, except in cases of venereal disease, records of which are to continue to be recorded on other appropriate forms.

3. In H.M.A. Ships, the Form is to be used for cases where, in the opinion of the Medical Officer, it is desirable to record the treatment given for guidance in probable future illness.

4. Where a member is sent to any specialist under the provisions of C.O.R., Article 512, record of opinion of specialist and any treatment ordered should be made on Form A.M.41z or, alternatively, a copy of Form A.M.188, complete with such details, should be made for inclusion with Medical History Sheet.

5. Form A.M.41z should be attached to the patient's Medical History Sheet on discharge from the Sick List.

Petty Officers who become qualified to wear uniform of confirmed Petty Officers within a year of completing their engagement, but who do not undertake to re-engage for a further period of service may, if they so desire, be permitted to provide themselves with Class III. uniform at their own expense. FORM A.M.250z-APPLICATION FOR SPECTACLES.

The abovementioned Form has been established for use in the Permanent Naval Forces and first supply will be made, without demand, to all H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments concerned.

2. The recommendation of a Board of Medical Survey is no longer necessary for the supply of Spectacles, applications for which should now be made on Form A.M.250z, in duplicate, for ratings permitted to wear them, and for the treatment of patients in hospital where such supply is for the continuance of treatment. Both the original and duplicate copies are to be signed by the Medical Officer submitting the Form.

3. The duplicate copy of the Form, when signed by the recipient of the glasses, is to be returned to the Director of Naval Medical Services.

4. The report of the Eye Specialist is to be transcribed to Form A.M.250z, and the issue of glasses should be noted on the Medical History Sheet of the rating concerned.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROMOTION, R.A.N.

It has been decided to adopt to a modified extent the Admiralty Batch System for dealing with selective promotions in the Executive and Engineering Branches.

2. In submitting half-yearly recommendations for promotion, on Form S.596, Officers are to be grouped in yearly Batches, according to the calendar year of their seniority. Column (6) of the Form is to be subdivided under three headings, viz. :--

- (a) Order of merit in Batch.
- (b) Recommendation for immediate promotion (to be indicated by Star).
- (c) Order of merit for the Officers starred, irrespective of Batch.

PROCEDURE IN REGARD TO MUSTERS OF NAVAL STORES IN CENTRALLY STORED SHIPS AND NAVAL SHORE ESTABLISHMENTS.

With reference to paragraph 3 of Navy Order 151 of 1935, it has been decided to introduce a stocktaking book to be known as Form A.S.148z, and to discontinue the method of stocktaking referred to in paragraph 96 of the R.A.N. Supplement to B.R.4.

2. The stocktaking book is to be used to record all Naval Stores, excluding those on permanent loan, mustered during stocktaking. Particulars in regard to ledger page number, description and stowage of the stores may be copied into the stocktaking book from the ledger before muster of a particular range of stock is carried out, but the ledger balances are not in any circumstances to be inserted until after stocktaking for the day has been completed. Before the ledger balances are inserted in the stocktaking book, all transactions up to the time of stocktaking should be entered in the ledger.

3. The abstract on the inside cover of Form A.S.148z for recording the progress of musters is to be completed and forwarded to the Commanding Officer for notation on the first day of each quarter.

4. The new book is to be regarded as a subsidiary record to the Central Store Account and is to be available for inspection at all times. Closed books are to be retained pending audit of the Central Store Account, when they will be withdrawn by an Inspecting Officer and forwarded to Navy Office for retention.

5. Each stocktaking book will last for approximately three years, and first supply in accordance with the undermentioned allowances will be made by the Naval Store Officer, Sydney, without demand :---

ACTING PAYMASTER SUB-LIEUTENANT—PROMOTION FROM LOWER DECK.

With reference to C.O.R., Article 91, clause 3, a special Mathematics Paper for candidates for promotion to the rank of Acting Paymaster Sub-Lieutenant will be set in connexion with the Higher Educational Tests to be held in October, 1936, and March, 1937.

2. In the event of a candidate who is eligible in all other respects qualifying educationally in one or other of these examinations, it is proposed to arrange for a Professional Examination for Acting Paymaster Sub-Lieutenant to be held about May, 1937, and, if any candidate is successful in the Professional Examination, for the Selection Committee to sit shortly afterwards.

3. Particulars of educational and professional examinations, vide Navy Order 341 of 1922, are as follows :---

(a) Educational.

First Class Certificate in the Higher Educational Test, i.e., 75 per cent. of marks in each of the following subjects :—

> General Knowledge. English History. Geography. Mathematics (Syllabus appended).

WRITER RATINGS.

(1) Ledger and Ship's Office Work, Pay.

(2) Captain's Secretary's Work.

(3) Typewriting.

SUPPLY RATINGS.

The standard will be that of the Professional Examination for Warrant Rank for the Writer and Supply Branches.

Candidates who have qualified professionally for Warrant Rank will not be required to sit for this examination.

- (b) Practical applications of arithmetic and mensuration, e.g., the keeping of accounts in connexion with messing and stores, percentage, averages, paint required for given surface or canvas for sail, capacity of a storeroom drum or tank, weight of water in a flooded compartment or coal capacity of a bunker, ratio, proportion, variation.

PASSAGES TO AND FROM DARWIN AND THURSDAY ISLAND— CONCESSION.

1. With reference to Navy Order 120 of 1935, the following is an extract from passage regulations issued by Burns, Philp and Co. Ltd. :--

"Return tickets are available for 24 months from date of departure to date of embarkation for return voyage. Passengers holding return tickets and travelling after this period have to pay the difference between the return fare and double single fare. Passengers who paid full single fare and return within twelve months of landing are allowed 10 per cent. reduction on the single fare for the return journey."

2. In any case where the concession of 10 per cent. is available for departmental journeys the warrant for the return voyage should be endorsed "Return within twelve months."

3. The 5 per cent. rebate on Government passages is claimable in addition to this concession.

RETURN RAILWAY WARRANTS.

RETURN PASSAGES TO UNITED KINGDOM OF LOANED OR EX R.N. PERSONNEL.

With reference to Navy Order 205 of 1930 outlining the conditions under which assistance was afforded by the Immigration Authorities in connexion with the passage to Australia of wives and families of personnel loaned from the Royal Navy, or entered direct from the shore in United Kingdom for Service in the Royal Australian Navy, advice has been received from the Secretary, Department of the Interior, that facilities do not now exist for the grant of assisted passages under the conditions referred to.

2. The circumstances in which passages at departmental expense will in future be granted to such personnel (or within limits to the wives and families) are as under :---

- (a) Personnel on loan from R.N. Passages for self allowed to whose loan period expires before date of retirement or of completion of R.N. engagement.
- (b) Personnel · serving on loan from R.N. whose loan period expires concurrently with or subsequent to the date of retirement or of completion of R.N. engagement.
- (c) Ratings as at (a) or (b) who may be invalided and elect to remain in Australia.
- (d) Ratings as at (a) or (b) whose discharge, free or by purchase in Australia is approved.

- United Kingdom at Commouwealth expense on termination of loan engagement.
- Passage for self allowed to United Kingdom at Commonwealth expense on termination of loan engagement; or passage to Australia in lieu for wife and family up to departmental cost of own passage. Either passage may be deferred for six months after termination of R.A.N. loan service.
- Passage to Australia allowed for wife and family as in (b) above up to departmental cost of own passage, which may be deferred for six months from date of discharge.
- Not entitled to passage to United Kingdom or to passage to Australia for wife and family in lieu,

- (e) Ratings on loan from R.N. whose loan period expires subsequent to date of termination of R.N. engagement, and who join the R.A.N. on termination of loan engagement.
- (f) Ratings on loan from R.N. whose loan period expires before date of termination of R.N. engagement and who during loan period transfer permanently to R.A.N.
- (q) Personnel entered direct from the shore elsewhere than in Australia.
- Not entitled to return passage to United Kingdom. The Department will, however, meet the cost of passage of wife and family up to the value of a return passage to United Kingdom for an equivalent rating, if arranged within six months of date of joining R.A.N.
- Not entitled to return passage to place of entry. Where ratings, who were married prior to engagement, are entered for five years or more, the Department will, however, meet the cost of passages for wife and family as in (e), provided application is made within two vears of entry.

Kingdom or to passage for wife

and family to Australia.

(h) Ratings discharged from R.N. Not entitled to passage to United whilst serving in H.M. Ship in Australian waters and entered in R.A.N.

3. Ratings who have a right to passage to United Kingdom at Commonwealth expense may be granted in lieu a passage for themselves to any place in Australia or territories administered by the Commonwealth, subject to production of evidence of intention to reside at the place to which the passage is required and cost not exceeding that of rating's own return passage to United Kingdom at departmental rates.

4. In every case where it is desired to take advantage of any of the alternative passages provided for above, a signed and witnessed request relinquishing all claim to a return passage to United Kingdom must be forwarded into office.

5. All passages to Australia of wives and families are to be arranged through Navy Office, or, in cases as at paragraph 2 (g) through the Naval Liaison Officer, Australia House. Where a rating brings his wife and family to Australia on his own responsibility and at his own expense, no refund of passage money will be made.

CALCULATION OF SENIORITY, ETC., AND TIME ALLOWED TO COUNT TOWARDS SENIORITY, PROGRESSIVE PAY, GOOD CONDUCT BADGES, AND LONG SERVICE AND GOOD CONDUCT MEDAL, WHERE A BREAK IN SERVICE OCCURS.

Where previous service is permitted to count on re-entry, seniority in rating or "man's time," &c., of a rating is to be arrived at by ante-dating, from the date of re-entry, the period of time allowed to count, in the order of years and actual number of days, i.e., completed years are to be deducted first, then the number of days.

2. When the days are ante-dated first, and a leap year is included in the period to be calculated, a difference of a day may be involved.

3. The following example will serve as an illustration of the correct method of calculation :--

A rating with former service—19th July, 1926, to 8th June, 1932 re-entered on 14th August, 1933.

Former service 19th July, 1926, to 8th June, 1932 = 5 years 326 days.

ARTILLERY FIRINGS AT DEFENDED PORTS-PROMULGATION OF WARNINGS TO H.M.A. SHIPS.

2

The following revised procedure in connection with the promulgation to H.M.A. Ships of warnings of artillery firings from Australian Defended Ports has been approved.

(a) At Sydney and Newcastle.

The Captain Superintendent, Sydney, will be informed, direct, by local Military Authorities, of projected firings and he is to inform H.M.A. Ships accordingly;

- (b) At other Defended Ports.
 - (i) Navy Office will inform H.M.A. Ships by W/T in the case of firings at all defended ports other than Sydney and Newcastle.
 - (ii) The District Naval Officers, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, and Western Australia and the Commanding Officer, R.A.N.R. Depot, Darwin, will be notified direct by the local Military Authorities and they are to inform Navy Office, by L/T, of projected firings in their respective districts.

Should one of H.M.A. Ships be at his headquarters port at the time of his receiving the warning, the District Naval Officer is to inform that ship direct, advising Navy Office in his L/T message that he has done so.

2. In normal peace routine, both the Captain Superintendent, Sydney, and Navy Office, will know the position and projected movements of all H.M.A. Ships in Australian waters, and the warnings will need to be passed only when it is known or expected that any of H.M.A. Ships will be in the vicinity of the port in question on the given day.

3. The form in which details of intended firings will be promulgated both to Merchant Shipping and to H.M.A. Ships has also recently been altered, and the details of the new system will be published shortly in Defence Notice to Mariners.

DEATH BENEFIT SCHEME.

For a number of years proposals have been submitted to the Naval Board from time to time for the introduction into the R.A.N. of a Death Benefit Scheme whereby a sum of money could be made available to the dependants of each rating in the event of his death whilst serving. The Naval Board has given full and careful consideration to this question, but has definitely decided that such a scheme is impracticable. 2. The following facts which influenced the Naval Board decision are promulgated for information.

3. The original scheme was that upon the death of any member of the R.A.N., there would be a compulsory levy of 1s. per head on all serving members, the resultant sum being handed to the deceased's dependants. The opinion of the Crown Solicitor on this was that such a compulsory levy could not legally be made.

4. Subsequently a revised scheme was drawn up whereby all levies were voluntary, the dependants of non-contributors to the scheme to receive no benefits. In such a scheme it would be necessary for the number of voluntary contributors to form a high percentage of the personnel of the R.A.N. over a number of years. On becoming a contributor, each rating would be required to give a written authority for such levies as arose to be deducted from his pay, but he could withdraw from the scheme at any moment. This is where the weakness lies.

Investigation into the career of similar schemes introduced in other parts of the world reveals the following to have been the sequence of events. On first introduction, considerable support is given and much enthusiasm shown. However, after paying several levies over a year or so, the younger and healthier members become dissatisfied and others realise that they or their dependants will obtain no return for their payments except in the event of their death in their present employment. A number of these then tend to withdraw from the scheme. Once a few members discontinue their subscriptions, others follow their lead. The value of the benefit to the dependant drops proportionately, at which the other contributing members become dissatisfied. A further fall in membership results—another reduction in the total sum available—further discontent, especially amongst those who have contributed for a number of years towards a larger sum—and so on until the scheme fails.

5. Fully realising the importance of the primary object of Death Benefit Schemes given in paragraph 1, and also the necessity for making prudent provision for the future, the Naval Board directs the attention of all personnel, especially those who are married or have other dependants, to the excellent facilities afforded by present day Insurance Companies and those provided under the Group Assurance System now in force in the R.A.N.

6. The advantages of an insurance policy over any Death Benefit Scheme lie chiefly in that the policy still continues after discharge from the Service, whereas in the event of the death of a many-year contributor to the Death Benefit Scheme shortly after his discharge from the Service, his dependants would not be entitled to a benefit. Further, Insurance Companies pay bonuses from time to time, a definite sum is ensured in return for the money invested, and policies can be obtained at a rate best suited to the means of the investor.

7. As one of the objects of the proposed Death Benefit Scheme is to make available a sum of money to a deceased rating's dependants as soon as possible after death, it is pointed out that the early payment of amounts due from naval funds to the member's estate is facilitated by the execution of a will and the filing of it at Navy Office or with solicitors or relatives.

ENROLMENT OF OFFICERS AND MEN ON COMMONWEALTH AND STATE ELECTORAL ROLLS.

The attention of officers and men is directed to their obligations under the Commonwealth and State Electoral Acts,

2. Compliance with electoral requirements is the individual responsibility of each officer and man concerned. The position in regard to enrolment on Electoral Rolls is as follows :---

- (a) Each officer and man serving in the Permanent Naval Forces, who has a bona fide place of living on shore in an Electoral Division, should enrol for the Division in which his place of living is situated.
- (b) Each officer and man serving in the Permanent Naval Forces, who has no bona fide place of living on shore, should enrol as set forth in paragraph 3 of this Order for the Division allotted to the Home Port of the ship in which, for the time being, he is serving. If any such officer or man subsequently establishes a bona fide place of living on shore, he should take steps to transfer his enrolment to the Division in which his place of living on shore is situated.
- (c) When an officer or man, who has no bona fide place of living on shore, is transferred from a "Melbourne Home Port" ship to a "Sydney Home Port" ship, or vice versa, he is required, unless his transfer is of a purely temporary nature, to transfer his enrolment to his new Home Port Electoral Division.
- (d) As joint Commonwealth and State rolls are in use in Victoria and New South Wales, one claim only is necessary to secure both State and Commonwealth enrolment in those States.

3. The following statement shows the Home Ports to which the sea-going ships of the Royal Australian Navy are at present allotted, and the Divisions in which officers and men serving therein, who have no bona fide place of living on shore, should enrol:—

TRAVELLING WARRANTS-ALTERATION IN FORM.

Attention is directed to the necessity for careful preparation of warrants where it is necessary to alter the normal form for any reason. Where tickets are required for limited purposes the printed form should be definitely amended in such cases by deleting all words which may appear to authorize tickets other than that for which the warrant is issued. For example, if it is found necessary to issue a warrant to authorize the issue of a sleeper and reserved seat only (the actual rail ticket having been authorized on another warrant) the words between "issue" and "tickets" must be deleted and warrant would then read :---



Melbourne to Sydney for sleeper and seat only."

2. In cases where warrants are issued for return journeys and sleepers and reserved seats are required for the forward and return journeys in addition to actual rail ticket, the warrant should indicate clearly that reserved seats and sleepers are required for both journeys. The Railways Booking office will then issue the seats and sleepers tickets for the forward journey and travel coupons for similar reservations for the return journey. EXTENSION OF SERVICE FOR RATINGS BEYOND 22 YEARS MAN'S TIME.

It has been the policy of the Naval Board for a number of years to regard twenty-two years from date of commencement of man's time, whether in R.N., R.M. or R.A.N., as the limit beyond which no rating should be allowed to serve. This period normally comprises a first engagement of twelve years and two subsequent re-engagements of five years each, and where a break in service has occurred, it includes time out of the service.

2. The Board have now decided that, as a temporary measure for 2 years, ratings of all branches, holding leading rate or above, may, if specially recommended by their Commanding Officer and found after a strict medical examination to be physically fit, be allowed to re-engage for three years after completion of 22 years from commencement of man's time, or until reaching the age of 45 if earlier. 3. At the end of two years, viz., on 1st April, 1938, the matter will be reviewed by the Naval Board, having regard to the manning position and the effect of this extension upon advancement generally.

5

4. If in April, 1938, it is decided to extend the operation of the system, ratings who have been allowed the three years' extension, may, subject to similar conditions, if not then 45, be allowed to re-engage for a further two years or until reaching 45 if earlier.

5. Leading rates and above who have been discharged since 30th September, 1935, on completion of 22 years man's time, will be eligible for re-entry in the rating last held, provided that :---

(a) vacancies in Fleet numbers exist;

(b) their previous records justify special consideration; and

(c) they pass a strict medical examination.

If unable to re-enter in their former rating, owing to lack of vacancy, they may be allowed to re-enter in the next lower rating in their Branch in which a vacancy does exist. All previous service will be allowed to reckon in such cases for Roster purposes.

6. Ratings who are discharged on completion of 22 years man's time after 31st March, 1936, will, if allowed to re-enter, do so under the usual conditions of re-entry in the R.A.N., viz., in the relative rating of A.B., *vide* Navy Order 191 of 1934.

7. Instructions for the guidance of Medical Officers in conducting the medical examination referred to in paragraph 2, will be issued in due course. It is notified in this connection that ratings of all branches, who are 40 years of age or over, may be allowed to wear glasses for reading purposes.

CLASSIFICATION OF MESSAGES NOT BEARING AN INDICATION OF PRIORITY—" DEFERRED SERVICE MESSAGES."

SKIN SPECIALIST, SYDNEY.

Dr. George Raffan, M.D., F.R.C.S. (Ed.), has been appointed Skin Specialist in Sydney, and in addition to ordinary consultations for skin diseases will afford the following classes of treatment :---

(a) Radium.

(b) X-ray.

(c) Thalium Acetate.

(d) Injections, intravenous and intramuscular.

(e) Lumbar Puncture.

(f) Cautery.

(g) Carbon dioxide snow.

2. Officers and, in exceptional cases, men will be treated at Dr. Raffan's consulting rooms at "Craignish," 185 Macquarie-street, Sydney.

3. The fee for consultation in ordinary cases not involving specialist treatment indicated above will be $\pounds 1$ ls. for the first visit, and 10s. 6d. for each subsequent visit. Rates of charges for special treatment will be as advised separately to all concerned.

4. In the case of men requiring Radium treatment, as this is not available at the Repatriation General Hospital, Randwick, cases may be admitted to Royal Prince Alfred Hospital after referring the patient to the Skin Specialist at the former hospital. Radium treatment will be given at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital as an out-patient or as an in-patient according to circumstances.

5. Payment for cases treated at Dr. Raffan's private rooms is to be made to Dr. Raffan and for those treated at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, to the Ragium Clinic of that hospital.

6. The procedure laid down in C.O.R., Article 512, is applicable to the abovementioned cases.

LEAVE CONCESSION WARRANTS-RAIL FARES WHERE WARRANTS ARE LOST, ETC.

A number of instances has occurred of applications for refund of cost of rail journeys consequent upon loss of leave concession warrants or rail tickets or omission to obtain a warrant before proceeding on leave.

2. It is the responsibility of each member to obtain the necessary leave concession warrants to which he is entitled, prior to departure from the ship or depot when proceeding on leave. (In cases where doubt exists as to eligibility for the concession, regulations provide for the issue of chargeable railway warrants pending Naval Board decision on the claim.)

3. In the event of loss of concession warrant (or railway ticket) application should be made to Commanding Officer of the ship in which the member is serving (if loss occurs prior to commencement of journey) or nearest District Naval Officer, for issue of a chargeable warrant.

Applications for re-credit of the charge should be forwarded to Navy Office accompanied by a full statement of the case for Naval Board consideration.

4. As it is very desirable that all such travelling be authorized by warrant, requests for refund of cost of fares paid by personnel will be considered in future only in cases where it was not possible to obtain a warrant in respect of the journey undertaken.

TRAVELLING CONCESSIONS FOR LEAVE—CHANGES IN USUAL PLACE OF RESIDENCE.

SURVEYING RECORDERS.

The following instructions relating to Surveying Recorders in the Royal Australian Navy are promulgated for information and guidance :---

1. General Remarks.—Surveying Recorders form part of the authorized complements of surveying ships. Details of allowances payable will be found in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 70 (61); the qualifications necessary for the three classes are given in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Appendix XII., Part 25.

2. Training and Advancement.—(a) Commanding Officers should encourage volunteers to qualify for the non-substantive rating of Surveying Recorder, and should detail a suitable officer to afford instruction when required. Qualified recorders should be encouraged to try and pass for the higher classes. Ratings who wish to obtain, or who possess and desire to retain, higher Gunnery, Torpedo or S/D non-substantive ratings should not. however, be qualified as Surveying Recorders.

(b) Names of ratings on first qualifying for this non-substantive rating are to be forwarded to the Officer-in-Charge, Hydrographic Branch, and to the Captain Superintendent of Training, who will enter them on the rosters kept by them.

Reports are similarly to be forwarded on advancement in class, and to the Officer-in-Charge, Hydrographic Branch, on transfer to other ships or detached parties.

(c) A notation as to their qualifications is to be inserted on page three of the service certificates of qualified Surveying Recorders.

(d) Second and third class Surveying Recorders are to be examined for advancement in class at the expiration of two years' paid employment in their existing grades. Ratings who do not desire to be examined, or who do not qualify for advancement after this period, will be relieved if other qualified recorders are available. They will, however, remain on the roster and will be available to fill vacancies provided they are recommended on Form A.H. 1 for further employment, but such ratings will not usually be employed again if others are available.

3. Reports on Qualifications.—Reports on Form A.H. 1 on the qualifications of recorders who are paid an allowance for this non-substantive rating are to be rendered annually, and also on the occasion of the supersession of the Commanding Officer or discharge from the ship. Should a recorder have been less than three months in the ship, he will not be reported on, but Form A.H. 1 is to be rendered with "less than three months in the ship" inserted in the report space. These reports are not intended to preclude Commanding Officers from forwarding reports at other times if they wish specially to recommend a recorder for advancement.

4. Drafting.—(a) Arrangements for the drafting of recorders will be made by the Captain Superintendent of Training, under the Drafting Regulations as laid down for surveying ships.

When vacancies for recorders arise during a commission, they will be filled from the unpaid qualified recorders on board, as authorized by the Commanding Officer, who will inform the Officer-in-Charge, Hydrographic Branch, and the Captain Superintendent of Training of the action taken.

If no unpaid qualified recorders are borne, the Commanding Officer will apply to the Captain Superintendent of Training for reliefs in the same manner as for other ratings.

(b) The arrangements detailed in the preceding paragraph do not absolve the Commanding Officers of the responsibility of representing shortages in recorder complement to the Captain Superintendent of Training in ample time before departure for the surveying grounds, with a view to their being made good.

5. Payment of Allowances.—Payment of allowances, as laid down in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, to qualified Surveying Recorders up to the number allowed by complement is authorized by the Commanding Officer.

6. Movements.—The Captain Superintendent of Training will keep the Officer-in-Charge, Hydrographic Branch, informed of all movements of all qualified Surveying Recorders serving on the station. Qualified recorders after two years' unemployment as such will first be required to undergo re-examination before re-employment as recorders.

MAILS—CONVEYANCE BY AIR MAIL.

It has been ascertained that the arrangements set out in Admiralty Fleet Order 990/36 apply to English mails for H.M.A. Ships.

2. The Admiralty advise that the procedure adopted is as follows. In all cases (ordinary and air mulls) the General Post Office, London, acts upon daily advices received from the Admiralty respecting the movements of H.M. and H.M.A. Ships, and consequently it is essential for the successful operation of the new air-mail system that Admiralty should be kept as fully informed as possible of the latest projected movements of ships, vide paragraph 4 of Admiralty Fleet Order 990/1936.

3. Further, it is advised that acceleration of air mails can only be gained if the port at which the ship will be on the date of the arrival of the air-mail is known at the General Post Office on the date of despatch from London, i.e., no diversion by air is possible once a particular letter has left London.

4. It will be observed that the only advantage to be gained by the pre-payment of the increased air postage is when the writer of a particular letter is unaware of the movements of the ship in question, and then subject only to the Admiralty (and General Post Office) also being aware of latest projected movements.

PRIVATE TELEGRAMS FOR PERSONNEL OF H.M.A. SHIPS SERVING ABROAD.

International Telegraph Regulations provide that the charges for a message are expended on receipt of the message at the Telegraphic Office of destination.

It is therefore necessary that private messages addressed to personnel of H.M.A. Ships serving abroad—which are transmitted by cable or commercial wireless telegraphy—should only be forwarded when the exact location of the ship addressed is known.

2. When H.M.A. Ships are in United Kingdom waters, it will be sufficient to address private messages to London, e.g., Able Seaman Thomas, Warship Sydney, London.

3. When H.M.A. Ships are serving on foreign stations, the Australian Post Offices, Cable Companies and Amalgamated Wireless (A/sia) Ltd. will not accept messages for personnel of such ships unless the location (Telegraph Station, *vide* International List) has been ascertained from the local naval authority or is otherwise definitely known.

4. The applicant for such information should be advised to communicate with Navy Office (by letter or prepaid telegram) when local naval authorities are not aware of the present or anticipated future movements of H.M.A. Ships abroad.

TINNED BUTTER.

Supplies of Tinned Butter to H.M.A. Ships for sea stocks are to be restricted to the utmost extent, and purchases will only be arranged by the Victualling Yard, through which all supplies must be obtained, for special reasons to be stated in the body of the demand.

2. Only exceptional circumstances will justify supplies of Tinned Butter to ships fitted with cold storage, but in the case of vessels not so fitted the maximum quantity supplied at any time is not to exceed, in the absence of Navy Office approval, 1 lb. per head for the total personnel borne.

3. When tinned butter is supplied to a ship in future, it will be the direct responsibility of the ordering officer to arrange issues on board so as to avoid loss to the Crown by deterioration, and, unless special circumstances prevail, returns to the Victualling Yard will not be accepted.

4. It is to be specially noted by ordering officers that, to obtain the most satisfactory results when not stowed in a refrigerated space, Tinned Butter should be consumed within 30 days of receipt on board.

REVIEW OF SERVICE CONDITIONS, 1935.

In accordance with Navy Order 128 of 1935, a review of Service conditions in the Royal Australian Navy was commenced in September. 1935, being conducted under the Divisional System on the lines laid down for similar reviews in the Royal Navy.

2. Requests submitted individually through Divisional Officers were considered by Ships' Committees, presided over in each case by the Captain of the ship or establishment. The requests and the remarks of the Ship Committees were then reviewed by a Fleet Committee under the Presidency of the then Rear-Admiral Commanding, H.M.A. Squadron, who forwarded the requests, accompanied by the reports of the Ship and Fleet Committees and his remarks thereon, to the Naval Board.

3. The reports and requests have since been very carefully reviewed by the Naval Board and decisions with explanatory remarks are now promulgated for general information.

4. To obviate the necessity for lengthy replies to certain requests which cannot be approved, the following explanation is furnished regarding certain broad principles, which, in accordance with settled policy, govern such matters as pay and allowances, dress, qualifications for promotion, &c. :-

- (a) It is the practice for R.N. and R.A.N. ships to work in close association both on the Australia Station and abroad. It is essential, therefore, that the Royal Australian Navy should be organized as closely as possible in conformity with the Royal Navy.
- (b) As regards active pay, with a higher scale of pay in the R.A.N. (particularly as regards the rates applicable to lower ratings) it has not been practicable to maintain the full margins between lower and higher ratings that exist in the Royal Navy scale, but the best has been done in this respect within the range available.
- (c) It is the policy to maintain similarity with the Royal Navy as far as practicable in regard to margins between the pay of one Branch and that of others.
- (d) Although it is not possible to retain exact similarity with the Royal Navy as regards incremental increases, the conditions under which increments are payable are based on Royal Navy conditions.
- (e) With regard to allowances in the nature of pay, such as non-substantive allowances, it is the policy to follow Admiralty practice generally both as regards the rate of such allowances and the conditions under which they are payable.

This policy applies also to allowances such as tropical pay, allowances for working in confined spaces, and hard-lying money.

- (f) Allowances which represent reimbursement of expenses incurred. such as travelling and provision allowances, are based on local conditions.
- (g) Except in such details as are normally left to the discretion of the Commander-in-Chief of a Station, it is the policy to adhere strictly to R.N. regulations in regard to uniform.

R.A.N. Band ratings, having no exact counterpart in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines, are subject to local regulations.

Request.

1, 2, 3, 4, 5. That the present issue of leave concession warrants may be reconsidered.

Decision.

It is evident from the terms of the regulations in regard to the requests preferred under this heading that the reasons underlying the grant of this concession are not understood or have been overlooked.

> The chief object of the concession when introduced was to afford personnel who were married some relief from the financial strain involved in making provision to meet the cost of fares to and from the homes of their families during periods of leave. It should be remembered that, though the concession has been established as a permanent one, it was introduced consequent on the financial difficulties which married ratings were experiencing by reason of the reduction in pay brought about by the Financial Emergency legislation.

> The concession was not granted with the intention that it should be used, apart from domestic considerations, as a holiday leave pass.

> The Naval Board have given careful consideration to these requests, but cannot approve of any general extension of the concession.

> Approval has been given, however, to a widening of the definition of the term 'guardian " to meet the case of a rating-

(a) who has no guardian (as at present defined), but who has a relative or some other person who has taken a parental interest in his upbringing and general welfare, or

(b) whose parents have died subsequent to his joining the service and who still has family associations (e.g., brothers and sisters) in his home town. Each case will be dealt with on its merits.

As regards such ratings now serving, applications for grant of the concession should be forwarded for Board consideration and are to contain full particulars of the rating's domestic relationship subsequent to the death of his parents. Where parents have died after the rating's entry into the service it should be stated whether any consequential position approximating guardianship has arisen as regards a brother, sister, or other relative.

In such cases a chargeable warrant should be issued and application for the concession, giving full particulars of the circumstances, submitted for Naval Board consideration.

It has been decided that, as a temporary measure for 2 years, ratings of all Branches, holding Leading rate or above, may, if specially recommended by their Commanding Officer and found after a strict medical examination to be physically fit, be allowed to re-engage for 3 years after completion of 22 years from commencement of man's time, or until reaching the age of 45 if earlier.

At the end of 2 years the general question will be reviewed, having regard to the manning position and the effect of this extension upon advancement generally.

Decision.

The right of a State Government to claim Income Tax and Unemployment Relief Tax in respect of income earned within the State Territory cannot be questioned, and no just cause can be shown why Naval ratings should be exempt from the obligations devolving upon any other Australian citizen.

The Naval Board sympathize with the nature of this request, but regret that, as the matter was governed by Financial Emergency legislation, it is beyond their power to alter the position.

(a) See reply to request No. 16, in which approval is given to an increase in the victualling allowance of 1d. as from 1st July, 1936, without variation of the existing fixed issuing rates for provisions. The messing allowance is thus increased to 8d. as from that date.

(b) Approval is given for the addition of bacon and beef sausages to the range of fresh meats, and for certain additional substitutes for preserved meat, viz., salmon, herrings in sauce, and sardines.

(c) It is the Service policy to insist on a certain standard ration forming the basis of the daily victualling, thus ensuring that ratings consume a variety of wholesome foodstuffs to keep them physically fit. To afford a certain variation from this routine diet, it has been the practice to allow messes to be credited with the full victualling allowance on Saturdays and Sundays in harbour. It has been decided to extend this practice to include Saturdays and Sundays at sea.

(d) Approval is given for the gratuitous issue to the Ship's Galley of the following condiments regularly used in the galley :--

Dripping-2 oz. per head weekly.

Salt-2 oz. per head weekly.

Pepper-2 lb. per 100 victualled monthly.

Soda Bicarbonate-as required.

The necessary amendments to regulations have already been made.

16. That Victualling Allowance be increased to the pre-Financial Emergency rate of 1s. 9d. per diem.

Decision.

As from the 1st July, 1936, the Victualling Allowance has been increased to 1s. 6d. without any variation of the existing fixed issuing prices for provisions. This increase. involving no variation of present issuing rates, will result in the purchasing value of the Victualling Allowance for General Mess purposes being equal to that which prevailed prior to 1931, when the allowance was 1s. 9d. and the issue rates were proportionately higher than at present.

For Flinders Naval Depot and Penguin. however, the maximum amount authorized for General Mess purposes will be 1d. per head per diem less than the standard rate. This procedure was in operation prior to 1933, and it has been decided to revert to this course to ensure, as far as is practicable. a uniform standard of General Messing in all ships and establishments.

17. That a Supper and Weekend Allowance in respect of meals not consumed on board, as payable in the R.N., be introduced in the R.A.N.

Since the inception of General Messing in the R.A.N., payment in lieu of meals has been authorized only when a leave period exceeded 48 hours, and such leave was not confined to a week-end.

An increase of 1d. a day to the Victualling Allowance will take effect from 1st July, vide reply to Request No. 16 and in the circumstances it is not considered that any further expense to the Government in respect of Victualling, such as would be involved in payment of Supper and Weekend Allowances as in the R.N., is justified.

18, 19. That Hard-lying Money be payable in respect of service in H.M.A. Destroyers.

This cannot be approved. Hard-lying Money in the R.A.N. is paid under the same conditions as in the R.N., and Destroyer service in Australia is considered to be no more arduous than that in the Home Fleet or, for example, China. See paragraph 4 (e).

20, 21. That excise free toissue in shore establishments.

Up to the present the Government's bacco be made available for approval in regard to the supply of excise free tobacco in shore establishments and harbour ships has not been obtainable.

Request. 22. That Kit Upkeep Allowance be increased.

23. (a) That the quality of certain articles of kit be improved, articles specifically complained of being :-

(i) Overalls-material too heavy and bad fit.

(ii) Socks-poor shape.

(iii) Suits-difficulty in obtaining a good cut from Clothing Factory.

(iv) Black Ties — poor quality.

(v) Gold Badges - poor quality backing.

(vi) Cap Covers - poor quality.

Decision.

The Board consider that there is no justification for such increase. A carefully devised procedure, based on that followed by Admiralty, for arriving at a fair estimation of the Kit Upkeep Allowance was introduced in the R.A.N. in 1928, and the greatest care is taken to ensure that, when from time to time the clothing price list is amended, the Kit Upkeep Allowance is so adjusted that ratings are not adversely affected thereby.

(a) (i) The material now utilized is considered to be the most suitable for the purpose, being similar in all respects to that used by Admiralty in overall garments.

A revised scale of measurements has recently been introduced in the R.A.N. It is considered that Overalls made according to the new scale will provide a range of sizes suitable to all requirements.

(ii) No further purchases of thin woollen socks will be made. Black cashmere and white cashmere socks of local manufacture. which have been supplied for a number of years, are considered to be quite satisfactory in every way.

(iii) The cut and finish of Clothing Factory made-to-measure suits is a matter which is periodically investigated, and steps are now being taken to re-examine the position and remedy any existing defects.

(iv) The former type of black tie for ratings has now been abolished-vide Navy Order 60 of 1936.

(v) All Gold Badges for the R.A.N., with the exception of officers' cap badges, are obtained from Admiralty. In recent supplies a lighter cloth has been used by Admiralty as backing, also a thinner canvas. It is considered that the recent Badges are an improvement on the former type and no alteration is therefore proposed.

(vi) The material used for Cap Covers in the R.A.N. is identical with that used by Admiralty, and it is considered that it gives reasonably satisfactory wear. The question of providing a better material is, however, being investigated.

(vii) Gilt Buttons - poor quality.

The R.N. procedure in regard to supply of tools was adopted in the R.A.N. as from April, 1924. Under this system all Artificers and Artisans on entry are required to equip themselves with a minimum set of tools at their own expense, in accordance with the general custom of their respective trades. Any tools required by Artificer and Artisan ratings in excess of the prescribed compulsory minimum kits are provided by the Service as part of the ship's equipment.

Decision.

It is considered that this system is satisfactory. Steps are being taken to ensure that the establishment of additional tools provided by the Service is adequate and is kept abreast of modern practice.

Gratuities payable on award of the Long Service and Good Conduct Medal are the same in the R.A.N. as in the Royal Navy.

As regards benefits accruing on and after retirement, the R.N. Pension system provides for additions to the basic pension rates in respect of G.C. Badges, L.S. and Good Conduct Medals, &c. In the R.A.N. deferred pay accrues in respect of service without relation to conduct awards.

It has been established that the deferred pay system is generally preferred to a pension system by R.A.N. ratings as a whole, and no change in this respect is contemplated.

Approved insofar as Fleet numbers and the drafting situation permit.

It is considered that the present regulations (C.O.R. Article 130) are suitable to requirements and should remain unaltered.

The establishment is at present fixed at 3 higher grade and 3 lower grade Shorthand-Typists. It has been approved to increase this establishment to 4 higher grade and 4 lower grade non-substantive ratings. Payment of the Shorthand allowance is continuous, subject to periodical regualification.

133. That Writers be permitted to qualify as Shorthand Writer on completing probationary period their (approximately 41 months from date of entry), instead of on completion of 3 years' service as at present.

134. That Chief and Petty Officer Writers be supplied with personal copies of C.O.R., N.F.R. & I., and Naval Account Regulations and held responsible for their correction.

135. That the rates of pay increased.

136. That the distinguishing badge for Stewards be changed to the old style.

137. That dress for W/T ratings be changed from Class II. to Class III. uniform.

138. That ratings of the Regulating Branch be given preference for entry into the Naval Dockvard Police.

Decision.

As regards the limitation of numbers, Shorthand-Typists are in a precisely similar position to other non-substantive ratings, i.e., a maximum establishment, which may not be exceeded, is laid down, but normally-as is the case with Shorthand-Typists at present-the number of qualified ratings borne falls short of the numbers allowed.

It has been approved that Writers will be allowed to qualify as Shorthand-Typist after completing one year's service from date of entry.

Provided that proper care and supervision are exercised in regard to the correction of office copies of regulations, all requirements should be met and the necessity for personal copies need not arise.

See paragraph 4 (e). The existing rates for charge of mess traps be are considered adequate for the responsibilities involved.

An examination of charges for loss of mess traps over a period of years shows that such charges have not been high when compared with the allowances paid for the period. No reason is therefore seen to justify a departure from existing allowances or procedure for recovering the value of losses.

Ratings of all Branches, if recommended as suitable, are eligible for entry into the Dockyard Police. It is not proposed to give preference to ratings of the Regulating Branch, who, equally with ratings of other Branches, are also eligible for entry into the Auxiliary Services as Boatmen.

139. That a rating who re-enters the Service after an absence of over 5 years may reckon good conduct badges formerly held in the same badges.

140. That ratings compulsorily retired on completion of the maximum service wealth Public Service or for other Commonwealth employment.

141. That Communications Branch ratings compulsorily retired for age be considered for employment on the Coding Staff at Navy Office.

142. That Writer ratings be employed on the staffs of District Naval Officers.

143, 144. That provision be made for the employment of Sick Berth ratings in the . Auxiliary Services on the staff of R.A.N.R. Depots.

145. That Shipwright ratings Depots for repair of boats.

Decision.

Absence for a longer period than 5 years entails forfeiture of previous service for all purposes, unless specially remitted in particular cases. A rating leaves the Service at his own wish and if he allows manner and period as a man 5 years or more to elapse before re-entry who has been deprived of his he must be prepared to accept the consequences.

Representations in regard to the more extensive employment of ex-service ratings under Commonwealth and State Departallowed be eligible for ap- ments have been made to the Government pointment to the Common- and are at present under consideration.

> Ex-ratings of the Communications or any Branch who desire employment in the Commonwealth Public Service should register their names with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of their State, notifying Navy Office that they have done so. This will enable employment to be offered to them should their services be required in Public Service positions.

It should be noted that no additions to the peace-time coding staff at Navy Office are necessary.

Appointments on the clerical staff of District Naval Offices are Public Service appointments and it is not practicable to vary the existing arrangements for filling them.

This is under consideration.

The amount of work in connexion with be employed at R.A.N.R. the maintenance of boats at R.A.N.R. Depots is not sufficient to justify the entry of Shipwrights as such. Shipwrights are eligible for entry as Boatmen and at the present time several are serving in that capacity.

Request.

146. That representations be made to the requisite authorities that Higher Torpedo Ratings, i.e., E.As., T.G.Ms., and L.T.Os. be considered to have the necessary qualifications to sit for the "B" and "B1" Grade Electricians' Licences in Victoria and corresponding grades in other States.

147. That Writer ratings be employed in clerical positions in the office of the Naval Liaison Officer, Australia House.

148. That ratings within 6 months of expiration of their engagements be drafted to their home ports.

149. That a suitable type of light mask goggles be provided for men sawing and blowing tubes and working in funnels.

150. That drafting changes involving Sydney port division ratings being sent to Flinders Naval Depot and vice versa be reduced to a minimum.

151. That result of negotiations mentioned in item 3 of Commonwealth Navy Order 39 of 1933 be now promulgated. (S. & W/T ratings-Employment after discharge in Commonwealth Public Service-P.M.G's. Department, &c.).

Decision.

The eligibility of ratings of the R.A.N. for Electrical Licences and Permits issued by the State Electricity Commission of Victoria and similar controlling bodies in other States is being investigated.

It is not considered practicable to vary the present procedure under which these positions are filled by civilians.

Under present procedure ratings are drafted to their home ports at least 6 months prior to completion of 22 years' service. It is impracticable similarly to consider the convenience of ratings who voluntarily take their discharge on completion of shorter periods.

Arrangements have been made for the addition to the establishment of naval stores for engineering purposes in H.M.A. ships of masks fitted with filters for the protection of men cleaning boiler uptakes and funnels and when sawing and blowing or sweeping boiler tubes externally. Goggles pattern 389 as already supplied to ships are regarded as suitable for Stokers cleaning boilers and funnels.

This is already covered by drafting regulations.

It has been ascertained that the Commonwealth Public Service Act cannot apply to Amalgamated Wireless Ltd., which is not a Department under the Act. An extension of facilities for employment of Naval ratings under the Commonwealth Public Service Act has been advocated by the Naval Board, and the matter is under consideration by the Government.

152. (a) That a Petty Officer who transfers to the Auxiliary Services and later returns to the Seagoing Service shall not be allowed to count time spent in the Auxiliary Services towards seniority.

(b) That a Petty Officer who has left the Service and rejoins within five years should. on again reaching the rating of Petty Officer, not be allowed to count any previous seniority for advancement to Chief Petty Officer.

Decision.

(a) A rating who transfers from the Seagoing to the Auxiliary Services cannot be placed in the same category as a man who voluntarily takes his discharge from the Service. The former transfers at his own request, but he does so for the good of the Service as much as for his own benefit. Vacancies in the Auxiliary Services have to be filled and ratings of the Seagoing Service are invited to volunteer for them.

Cases of ratings returning from the Auxiliary Services to the Seagoing Service are very rare and their return would not be approved unless it were of advantage to the Service. In such exceptional cases, it is not considered that the rating should be penalized by any loss of seniority. His return to the Seagoing Service creates a vacancy in the Auxiliary Services for the transfer of a Petty Officer or Chief Petty Officer in his place, and the exchange may have very little effect upon promotion rosters.

(b) The position of an ex Petty Officer as regards seniority, if he re-enters within five years of discharge and regains his former rating, is governed by King's Regulations, i.e., former service as Petty Officer counts for all purposes. No justification is seen for departure from regulations in this respect.

CLAIMS FOR THE SUPPLY OF ELECTRICITY TO H.M.A. SHIPS FROM SHORE.



EDUCATIONAL TEST H.

It has been decided to re-introduce in the Royal Australian Navy the Educational Test II.

2. The examination will be held half-yearly—in June and December, and may be taken only by Ordinary Seamen at sea. The first examination will be held in December, 1936.

3. The syllabus of the Educational Test II. will be that laid down in C.O.R., Appendix I., for Grade I. ratings, instead of that contained in K.R. and A.I., Appendix XII., Part 21, Section II. The examination will consist of two papers—

- I.-Mathematics-to be taken in the forenoon; and
- II.—General Paper in Navigation, Mechanics, Magnetism and Electricity—to be taken in the afternoon.

HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION FOR NAVAL PATIENTS IN AUSTRALIA (APART FROM PRIVATE HOSPITALS).

With reference to the treatment of Naval personnel in approved hospitals in Australia, apart from private hospitals, Navy Order 155 of 1934 has been revised as shown in the following list.

2. In arranging admission of patients to hospital, preference is to be given in accordance with the provisions of C.O.R., Article 508, and, when forwarding claims for payment in respect of hospitals not on the approved list, the action indicated in C.O.R., Article 508, clause 2, is invariably to be observed.

3. In those cases where there is no indication given in the list that officers are received the omission signifies only that such hospitals cannot supply accommodation of a type suitable to the various ranks of officers. If the admission of an officer to hospital is required, enquiries are to be made if the hospital concerned can make available, at the time, the type of accommodation prescribed in C.O.R., Article 508, clause 1 (c), as amended by R.I. Series 7/34.

4. When information is obtained as to changes in rates of treatment and other particulars contained in the list of hospitals, details are to be reported to Navy Office to enable the necessary amendments to be promulgated in Navy Orders.

5. All hospitals shown in the list, other than Naval Wing, Prince of Wales Hospital. Randwick, Sick Quarters, Garden Island, and Flinders Naval Hospital, are to be regarded, for the purposes of medical returns, as "Civil" hospitals.

WESLEY COLLEGE, MELBOURNE—ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP FOR SAILORS' AND SOLDIERS' SONS, 1937.

The "O.W.C.A. War Memorial" Scholarship, tenable at Wesley College, Melbourne, is open for 1937. This Scholarship, the value of which is thirty (30) guineas per year, covers the cost of tuition for three (3) years. There is no age limit for the Scholarship for the sons or dependants of sailors and soldiers.

2. The sons or dependants of members of the Naval Forces who rendered service at sea during the Great War or of persons who have rendered Naval service other than the foregoing are eligible for consideration. Preference is, however, given to a son or dependant of a member of the Royal Australian Navy and of the Australian Imperial Expeditionary Forces (Naval or Military) who lost his life in action or died of wounds received in action.

CENTRAL STOREKEEPING AND ACCOUNTING.

As a result of a recent audit at Navy Office of Central Store Accounts, the following particulars are issued for information and guidance :---

Incorrect Use of Ships' Bundle Date Stamp.—A large number of overissues was disclosed, and was found to be due to the use of the Bundle Date Stamp to indicate the date vouchers were posted to the ledger instead of the actual date of receipt or issue of stores. Correct accounting for stores in these circumstances is impracticable and action should be taken in all Centrally Stored Ships and Establishments to ensure that the following procedure, referred to in Article 150 of B.R.4, is closely observed :—

> "Immediately on receipt or issue of stores the vouchers are to be stamped with the Bundle Stamp, showing the date of receipt or issue, and the transactions posted under this date in the ledgers."

Over-issues offset against Subsequent Supplies.—In certain instances quantities over-issued as per ledgers have been offset against supplies subsequently received from the Dockyard, in which circumstances actual stock in the store is larger than is indicated by the ledger balance. Over-issues should be adjusted by means of Form A.S. 148 immediately they are disclosed, and the ledger balance extended after receipt of a supply from the Dockyard is not in any circumstances to be reduced by the quantities previously over-issued as per the ledger.

Counter Book—S. 149.—At present, space for insertion of the date is provided only at the top of Form S. 149, but in some cases one form is used for issues during two or more days. In order that the actual date of issue of stores may be determined, a form not completely filled in at the close of a day's transactions should be ruled off and bundle stamped with the date of issue of the stores, similar action being taken as the remainder of the form is filled in.

ISSUES OF NAVAL STORES OF A SEMI-PERMANENT NATURE.

Since the transfer of a large number of permanent stores to the consumable category in accordance with Admiralty Fleet Order 932/1934, expenditure of certain items has increased considerably, and it has been found that issues in excess of those returned to the Central Store in an unserviceable condition and those required for first outfit have been made.

2. The attention of responsible officers is drawn to the provisions of Article 44 (2) of B.R.4 in regard to items of a semi-permanent nature, and Central Store Officers should ensure that, except where demands indicate that items are required as first supply for a new service, issues are generally only made in lieu of returns of the broken or used articles.

3. Separate demands (Form S.156) should be furnished for semi-permanent stores required other than in lieu of unserviceable items returned to the Central Store, and the demands should clearly indicate that the items are a first supply and the specific purpose for which they are required.

2. First supply will be made without demand to H.M.A. Ships, Naval Establishments, Reserve Districts, and Port Divisions.

3. The use of Form D. 145D is to be discontinued, the newly adopted Form A.M. 254z having displaced it. Upon receipt of the supply of the forms mentioned above, all copies of forms previously employed in connexion with surveys are to be returned into Store.

4. The following procedure is to be observed in the conduct of Medical Surveys. Prior to holding a Medical Survey. a list of officers and men who are considered by the Senior Medical Officer concerned to be fit subjects for survey is to be forwarded on Form A.M. 251z to the Senior Naval Officer afloat or ashore according to where the survey is to be held.

5. Before a member, whose case is to be reported upon on Form A.M. 252z (see paragraph 6 hereunder), appears before the Board of Survey, the Medical Officer bringing the case forward is to ensure that Form A.M. 254z is fully understood and completed by the member. The nature of the disability for which the officer or man is being surveyed is to be explained to him and all facts and statements set forth by each patient are to be investigated carefully and verified by reference to the member's Medical History Sheet, Hurt Certificates (if any), and, as far as practicable, from other official sources of information. Form A.M. 254z (Statement Form) is not to be completed for a subsequent survey unless the patient desires to make additional statements.

6. Form A.M. 252z (late A.M. 145) is to be used for the following type of cases :---

- (a) All cases where invaliding is recommended.
- (b) When a reasonable probability of ultimate fitness to return to duty has ceased to exist.

- (c) All officers and ratings invalided from abroad or returned from abroad for health reasons. (See C.O.R. 517 (3))
- (d) Patients recommended invaliding to United Kingdom or another station. (See K.R. and A.I., Article 1351 (4), and paragraph 14 hereafter.)
- (e) All cases of serious injury or disease amongst members of the R.A.N., R.A.F.R., R.A.N.R. (Sea-going), R.A.N.R., and R.A.N.V.R., and those which are considered attributable to service or aggravated to the extent of attributability and in which the question of compensation may arise. (See C.O.R., Article 517 (6))
- (f) Cases who have been under medical treatment for a period of six months.

Form A.M. 188 which accompanied the patient to hospital is not, in future, to be sent with Medical Survey Report. Relevant matter therein should, however, be transcribed to the Report of Survey.

7. Form A.M. 252z (late A.M. 145) is, as a rule, to be signed by three Medical Officers in the case of Surveys in Naval Hospitals or Sick Quarters. At other places, e.g., on board ship or in Reserve Districts, two Medical Officers will suffice, one of whom should be the Senior Medical Officer present. If, owing to exceptional circumstances, a second Medical Officer is not available, a survey may be held by the Medical Officer present.

8. Form A.M. 253z (Interim Report) is to be used for non-invaliding surveys in the case of the following classes of patients, Form A.M. 254z being completed only when special circumstances necessitate a statement by a patient on his own case :--

- When the sickness of the patient has been of 91 days' duration, but the necessity of immediate invaliding has not arisen. (See C.O.R., Article 517 (1), and A.C.D. 613 (9))
- (2) When further hospital treatment is recommended in respect of cases (b) to (f) inclusive of paragraph 6 of this Order.
- (3) Those recommended Shore Service and periodical reports during currency of such.
- (4) Termination of Shore Service.
- (5) Recommended Sick Leave beyond the ordinary convalescent leave allowed by Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 183.
- (6) Discharge to duty prior to next survey falling due.
- (7) Supply of abdominal belts or other surgical appliances for personal use and to be retained after completion of Hospital Treatment. (Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 177)
- (8) Change of Branch.

Form A.M. 253z, Interim Report, is to be rendered monthly after the original complete survey (A.M. 252z) for those cases indicated at (a) and (b) of paragraph 6 above, and also monthly in the case of members recommended Shore Service, *vide* (3) of this paragraph.

Form A.M. 253z is normally to be signed by at least two Medical Officers. If, owing to exceptional circumstances, a second Medical Officer is not available, the signature of one Medical Officer will suffice.

9. In the case of members stationed at Naval Reserve Districts or Port Divisions who have been medically surveyed and subsequently become fit for duty, the District Naval Officer or Commanding Officer concerned should not in ordinary cases obtain a second Medical Officer to conduct a medical survey if extra expense is involved. It will be sufficient if the Reserve Medical Officer concerned completes Forms A.M. 253z and A.M. 255z indicating, inter alia, date of discharge to duty.

10. At the conclusion of the sitting of the Board of Survey, a summary of all Surveys (Interim or Final) is to be made on Form A.M. 255z. The distribution of the latter form is to be effected as follows :-

Original to D.N.M.S. with appropriate attachments (under confidential cover).

Copies to-

Senior Naval Officer approving survey (on Form A.M. 251z). C.S.T. (if not the officer approving survey).

11. Authority for discharge invalided will be given by signal from Navy Office, followed by letter, and will be sent to all concerned.

In order to obviate delays, patients who are found fit for full duty in all respects by Medical Boards of Survey are to be discharged for duty forthwith in anticipation of Naval Board approval.

12. In those cases where return to duty is qualified by a recommendation, e.g., light duty, shore service, &c., decision will be forwarded by signal from Navy Office and the member should be retained on the sick list until receipt of Naval Board decision.

In all cases where the period of treatment on full pay has expired or is about to expire, this fact should be stated when forwarding survey papers to Navy Office.

13. Where a disability or disabilities noted in Question 18 of Form A.M. 252z is, or are, considered to be attributable to service, care is to be taken by each Medical Board of Survey that, after investigation of the circumstances, the assessment of such co-existing disability or disabilities is given in words and figures to enable consideration of the grant of compensation under the provisions of Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 130, in addition to any compensation that may be payable under Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 127.

14. When medical surveys are conducted on members of the Royal Navy or of Dominion Navies, report of Invaliding Survey is to be rendered in quadruplicate and Interim Surveys in duplicate.

INCOME TAX RETURNS.

The following points in regard to the rendering of Federal and State-Income Tax Returns by Officers and Men of the Royal Australian Navy are promulgated for guidance in preparing personal returns.

- (a) Officers may claim a deduction in respect of the cost of upkeep of uniform. The amount of such a deduction is limited to eighteen pounds (£18) annually.
- (b) Kit Upkeep Allowance of ratings is regarded as income to the recipient and should be included in returns. This income may, however, be set off by a deduction of the amount actually expended up to a maximum of the full amount of the allowance credited.
- (c) Recent legislation requires the inclusion in returns of the value of victuals supplied and no subsequent deduction in regard thereto can be claimed. Victualling Allowance should therefore be included in Officers' and Men's personal returns. Leave and Provision Allowances must also be shown where such are paid in lieu of victuals.
- (d) Personnel on exchange service are liable for Federal Income Tax in respect of the amounts credited during periods of service outside Australia.
- (e) Income received in sterling should be expressed in returns in terms of Australian currency equivalent (i.e., converted by the addition of exchange from sterling to Australian money).
- (f) Personnel serving in H.M.A. Ships affoat are not required to render State Income Tax Returns in respect of their Naval income.

2. Statements are rendered to the Taxation Department by Navy Office showing the actual amount credited to each member in the Ships' ledgers in respect of each year ended 30th June. Pay and allowances of all descriptions (e.g., Specialist, Lodging, Provision, Leave, Kit Upkeep Allowances, &c.), are shown in the statement, also the amount of Victualling Allowance where the member was not in receipt of allowance in lieu. To avoid the occurrence of queries from the Taxation Department care should be taken by Officers and Men to include in their personal returns all allowances credited to them during the Financial Year.

3. Navy Orders 145/1929, 87/1931, and 52 and 116 of 1935 are cancelled.

PILLION PASSENGERS ON MOTOR CYCLES.

The practice of carrying pillion passengers on motor cycles is considered to involve abnormal risk of injury and to conduce to accident to a greater extent than a motor cycle without such a passenger. Motor cycle insurance policies do not cover claims arising from injury to a pillion passenger carried by the insured person. The risk is one which insurance underwriters are not prepared to cover.

2. Owners of motor cycles are therefore warned against the practice of carrying pillion passengers, in view of the risk of incurring heavy financial liabilities in the event of injury to the passenger in an accident for which no other person can be held responsible.

3. Naval personnel are hereby expressly forbidden to proceed on duty journeys as pillion passengers on motor cycles, and the Naval Board will accept no responsibility in regard to driver or passenger for injury or death arising from an accident sustained while riding as such.
