



NAVAL WATCHKEEPING CERTIFICATES—NAVAL RESERVE OFFICERS.

Commonwealth Navy Orders

Some doubt appears to exist regarding the award of Watchkeeping Certificates to Naval Reserve Officers.

2. The Restricted Watchkeeping Certificate referred to in A.F.O's 3237/41, 4995/44 and Navy Order 256 of 1944 is required only as a qualification for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant during war and does not replace the Full Naval Watchkeeping Certificate referred to in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions—Article 261. The Full Naval Watchkeeping Certificate may be granted after three months' service at sea on Watchkeeping duties and is to be to the effect that the officer concerned is competent to take charge of a Watch at sea as a Lieutenant.

3. The standard required for this Naval Watchkeeping Certificate is the same as that for Lieutenant R.A.N. and is thus a high one. The Certificate is to be granted by the Commanding Officer of the ship in which the officer is serving, or by the Senior Officer on the recommendation of the Commanding Officer of the ship. It is not to be granted by an officer of lower rank than that of Lieutenant-Commander in Command.

4. Officers who have been granted this certificate are entitled to the Symbol (W.K.) against their name in the Navy List.

5. These instructions are contained in A.F.O. 3288/40, but, as *Full* Watchkeeping Certificates are being issued by Officers junior to Lieutenant-Commander in Command, they are repeated in this Navy Order for the information and guidance of all concerned.

CLAIMS FOR PILOTAGE.

The attention of officers is drawn to the following matters which should be kept in mind when forwarding claims for pilotage.

2. Claims, which should be forwarded quarterly, are to be rendered on Form AS. 454 to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Sydney.

3. Navigating Officers' claims require the certificate of their Commanding Officers. Where Officers in Command are claimants, the certificate of the Senior Naval Officer under whose orders the services were performed is required. In the case of a Flotilla the certificate of the Administrative Authority is required.

4. Pilotage is limited to six times in and six times out of any one port unless in a ship of a larger class.

5. Pilotage is payable only in respect of those ports mentioned in O.U. 5254/38 and Confidential Commonwealth Navy Order 151 of 1944.

6. Where it is considered that exceptional circumstances warrant the payment of pilotage in cases other than those mentioned in paragraph 5 hereof, pilotage claims should be forwarded to the Administrative Authority for his recommendation, and not to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Sydney, unless this latter is the Administrative Authority.

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST CHOLERA.

There is evidence that Cholera has been spreading south and east from epidemic centres. Spread to the New Guinea area is a possibility. The following procedures are therefore to be observed :---

A talk or lecture on the nature of Cholera and the methods of preventing its spread is to be given by all medical officers of ships and shore establishments north of Brisbane. A similar lecture is to be given to all drafts proceeding to tropical areas.

2. This disease is characterized by the sudden onset of vomiting and diarrhoea, accompanied by violent pains and cramps in the muscles. The stools are at first coloured, but, in the later stages, colourless fluid is passed resembling water with particles of rice in it. Fluid is rapidly drained from all the tissues and the patient shrinks visibly. The disease is commonly conveyed by water.

All excreta from the patient are dangerous and should be disposed of, preferably by burning. Failing this, they should be disinfected by adding equal quantities of strong disinfectant such as carbolic acid or lysol, and thrown overboard or buried as far as possible from human habitation and from the sources of water supply.

3. Medical officers of ships and establishments, or where no medical officer is borne, Commanding Officers are to ensure that all personnel

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serving in or proceeding to tropical areas have been inoculated against Cholera including stimulating doses.

4. The attention of all concerned is drawn to the necessity of ensuring that all water used for drinking and domestic purposes on shore in New Guinea and in ships where water is drawn from the shore is adequately chlorinated.

5. Any case suggestive of Cholera is to be immediately isolated and arrangements made for bacteriological investigation by the nearest competent authority. The Naval Board is to be informed without delay.

6. A supply of certain drugs, utensils, etc., will be assembled at Milne Bay, or the next advanced R.A.N. Medical Store Depot, to be available for issue only if required.

MILEAGE ALLOWANCE-PRIVATE MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS ATTENDING MEMBERS OF THE FORCES.

With reference to paragraph 3(i)(c) of Navy Order 218 of 1943, the following mileage rates are approved in the case of Civilian Medical practitioners attending members of the Forces:—

MILEAGE.

Country.—Two miles free. Beyond two miles (one way only)— 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.—5s. per mile; 8 p.m. to 8 a.m.—7s. 6d. per mile.

Metropolitan.—Two miles free. Beyond two miles (one way only)— 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.—3s. 6d. per mile; 8 p.m. to 8 a.m.—5s. per mile.

Mileage charges shall be calculated from the Doctor's surgery.

EMERGENCY WATER CONTAINERS.

Emergency water containers for use in life floats will shortly be available, on demand, from Royal Edward Victualling Yard, Sydney. and from all H.M.A. Victualling Depots. 2. Four 29-oz. cans of sterilized water, and four plastic drinking cups with embossed ring on the inside to indicate a measure of $1\frac{3}{4}$ fluid ounces, are enclosed in each container which is sealed and readily floats in salt water as long as it is watertight. To retain such buoyancy special care is to be taken, when opening cases or handling the containers, to guard against their becoming punctured or otherwise damaged. In this connexion it is important that the hand grip of the tear-off tops should not be used for lifting or other handling of the containers.

3. As the cans contain sterile water and are hermetically sealed, containers are on no account to be opened, except for the separate stowage of individual cans in life floats, if desired, until an emergency necessitating the consumption of the contents arises.

4. The containers (dimensions $9\frac{3}{5}$ -in. square by 5 9/16 in. high) about to be issued are too high to fit into the compartments of life floats provided with double gratings, and ships should make the best use of those containers, or the individual cans therein, for such life floats until special containers of reduced height become available at a later date when a further Navy Order in the matter will be issued.

5. Initial supplies of containers are to be demanded by $H.M.\Lambda$. Ships at the first opportunity up to the full requirements of life floats on board. In this connexion special attention is drawn to the provisions of paragraphs 9 and 10 of Section IV of A.F.O. 3111/1944. All supplies should be taken on charge in the Provision Account.

6. With reference to Navy Order 67 of 1944, the 29-oz. cans (and outer container) will also be supplied for use by aircraft operating from H.M.A. Ships in substitution for 35-oz. cans, the manufacture of which has been discontinued.

TEMPORARY COMMISSIONS IN THE SPECIAL BRANCH R.A.N.V.R. —SELECTION OF RATINGS FROM THE LOWER DECK.

The Naval Board have decided that Reserve and Hostilities Only ratings, of all branches, may be considered for promotion to commissioned rank in the Special Branch, R.A.N.V.R.

2. Officers of the Special Branch are employed on the following duties:-

Executive-Special. Operations-Special. Intelligence. Armament Store Accounting. Sea Transport. Naval Control Service. Rail Transport. Mercantile Movements. A/S Fixed Defences. Controlled Mining. R.M.S. & B.S. C.B.'s. D.E.M.S. (Gunnery duties). Boom Defence Service. Radar. Meteorological.

Other categories may be added as the necessity arises. Cypher officers are excluded from the above, promotion for this purpose being open to coders only, *vide* Navy Order 582 of 1943.

3. Forms C.W.1 should be commenced for ratings considered suitable for promotion to commissioned rank for any of the foregoing duties.

4. (a) Medical Standard.—Candidates must be free from any gross physical defect and must not suffer from any condition that is likely to become aggravated by duty, or render them incapable of carrying out their duty efficiently. Varicocele or varicose veins are not a cause of rejection unless very marked.

(b) Visual Standard.—The visual standard is as laid down in A.F.O. 2474/43, with the following modification.

Colour vision below Grade III can be accepted in respect of candidates recommended for employment on the following duties:-

> Executive duties on shore. Photographic duties. A/S Fixed Defences. Controlled Mining. Interpreter.

Special Branch Officers for employment on the following duties must have colour vision of at least Grade III :---

6. Executive—Special (Ex. S.).—Ratings who cannot be recommended for executive commissions on account of being below the medical standard required for the Executive Branch may be recommended for temporary commissions in the Special Branch of the R.A.N.V.R. to undertake general duties of an executive nature on shore. In addition, ratings who are 35 years of age or over may be recommended for temporary commissions in the Special Branch, irrespective of their medical category, if they are considered to be more suitable for employment in that branch than in the Executive Branch.

7. Ratings recommended for promotion in terms of this Order will be drafted to Flinders Naval Depot for a disciplinary course, together with any other course considered necessary, before final selection and promotion.

2. Naval Reserve Officers of the Permanent Lists, R.A.N.R. 6. The first selection of permanent Reserve Officers who are in the zone will be made for the promotions to be effected on 1st May, 1945.

RELEASE FOR UNIVERSITY STUDY.

Arrangements have been approved for the consideration of applications from serving personnel for release for University study. Only a very limited number of vacancies are available for all three Services.

2. Applications to resume or commence courses will be considered. The conditions of eligibility for consideration and the procedure of application in each case are:—

A. Applications for Release to Resume Courses.

(a) Reserved Faculties. Students, with over one year's service and whose pre-enlistment records were reasonable, may apply for release to resume interrupted courses in medicine, dentistry, engineering, science, veterinary science, agriculture and architecture.

- (b) Unreserved Faculties. Students whose pre-enlistment records were better than average may apply for release to resume interrupted courses in arts, law, economics or commerce, music or education, if—
 - (i) the course they desire to resume can be completed in not more than two years and they have had at least two years' service; or
 - (ii) the course they desire to resume can be completed in not more than three years and they have had at least three years' service.

Application Procedure.

Applicants should make application to the Commanding Officer and to the Registrar of the University. Each application should show---

- (i) The University at which enrolment is sought.
- (ii) The University attended before enlistment.
- (iii) The course followed and the standard reached before enlistment.
- (iv) The last year of University attendance before enlistment.
- (v) The date of enlistment for full-time service.

The letter to the University should mention that application for release has been made to the Commanding Officer.

Applications should be made without delay. No application received after 31st January can be considered.

B. Applications for Release to Commence Courses.

(a) Personnel who enlisted before reaching the age of 21, who have had three years' service, and who are qualified to commence University courses, may be considered for release.

Application Procedure.

Applicants should make application to the Commanding Officer and to the Registrar of the University. Each application should show—

- (i) The University at which he desires to commence a course;
- (ii) the course in which enrolment is sought;
- (iii) all particulars of his qualification to commence that course including the name of the examination, the State in which that examination was taken, the year of the examination and the school from which the applicant was a candidate. In addition, any details of the pass which the applicant can furnish should be shown;
- (iv) the applicant's age on enlistment; and
- (v) the date of enlistment for full-time war service.

The application to the University should show that the applicant has applied to his Commanding Officer.

Applications should be made without delay. No application received after 31st January can be considered,

(b) Other personnel who have had more than two years' service and who are qualified to commence University courses may apply to Universities for selection within the civilian quota.

Application Procedure.

A form of application for enrolment should be obtained from the Registrar of the University at which enrolment is sought. This completed application should reach the University not later than 31st January (excepting Western Australia, where the closing date is 19th January).

GASSING IN DEPTH CHARGES.

The amount of moisture in the charge contributes largely to the evolution of an inflammable gas from minol and torpex fillings.

2. Pending further instructions, all depth charges filled minol are to be examined, immediately before or during issue, for damaged or loose bungs which might permit ingress of water. Though the work need not be regarded as a laboratory operation, it should be carried out remote from the main stack of depth charges. Examination on a truck or at the quay, segregated from other charges, would be a satisfactory arrangement.

3. Any charges found with loose or damaged bungs are to be examined under laboratory conditions for moisture or gassing of the filling, a non-ferrous tool being used for removal of the bungs. If no gassing is found, and the filling is dry and if the depth charge is otherwise satisfactory, new bungs should be fitted and the depth charges accepted as serviceable. If any gassing is found, the store must be set aside and dealt with under Article 699c of Regulations for Naval Armament Services, Part II. The depth charge should be sentenced "unserviceable-to be dumped ", if the filling is found to be wet.

Ships to which magazines 97 rounds fitted with long catches are issued should fire them on all guns on which they will be used. Any gun on which failures occur is to be exchanged, if possible, or the long catch magazines returned and short catch magazines drawn instead.

ANTI-FLASH GEAR.

Anti-flash gear, when issued, is proofed in a solution of borax and boracic acid in water. Washing this gear removes a large proportion of this proofing and thus lowers its efficiency.

2. To retain the efficiency of anti-flash gear it is therefore directed, that, if washing is considered necessary for any reason, this gear is to be immediately reproofed in the solution referred to above. Battle dress shirts and trousers are also to be proofed, and reproofed each time washing is necessary. Ships concerned are to demand the necessary materials. Directions for proofing and reproofing of anti-flash gear are given in the Manual of Victualling, Volume I, Chapter 12, Article 5, paragraphs 5 and 6.

3. Officers and ratings whose duties preclude the wearing of antiflash gloves as at present issued are to cut away those parts necessary to allow wearing of gloves and still permit efficient performance of duty.

4. In action, battle dress trousers are to be worn tucked into socks.

5. Airtex type shirts should no longer be issued for battle dress.

FUZES, PERCUSSION, D.A., No. 230.

Future supplies of fuzes percussion D.A. No. 230 will be of the Mark V type which differs from Mk. IV only in the striker cover.

SUPPLY OF SPECTACLES-GENERAL CONDITIONS.

The following conditions relating to the supply of spectacles at Service expense are consolidated from various previous instructions and are to be adhered to in all cases.

2. (a) Reading Spectacles-

Glasses for reading may be supplied at the public expense to ratings of all branches irrespective of the age of the ratings, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

(b) Spectacles for constant wear-

Ratings (including W.R.A.N.S.) with the exception of those shown below (vide (b) (i)) are permitted to wear spectacles constantly and may be supplied with them at the public expense, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

(i) The following ratings are not permitted spectacles for constant wear :---

> Seaman ratings for general service (vide (b) (ii)). Signal ratings for general service. Stokers and leading stokers. W.R.A.N. visual signallers.

(ii) Seaman ratings on shore duties only and in immobile gate vessels (boom defence) may wear glasses constantly and be supplied at the public expense, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

The following seaman ratings :- Q.O. (in Cruisers and above). Radar, S.D., S.T.-may wear glasses at their specialist work, and be supplied at public expense, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

3. Officers of the Naval Forces (including the Women's Services of the R.A.N.), and members of the Auxiliary Services other than the Shore Wireless Service, are not entitled to the supply of spectacles at public expense unless spectacles are lost or damaged as a result of a casualty of the Service. The prescription for spectacles may, however, be loaned to these members in order that purchase may be arranged privately.

4. Approval for supply of spectacles is in each case to be obtained on Form A.M. 250z subject to supply being recommended by an ophthalmic specialist who should indicate whether the spectacles are required for near or distant vision. As a wartime measure, authority has been delegated to Naval Officers-in-Charge in each State of the Commonwealth for the grant or refusal of spectacles where the proposed supply is in accordance with the conditions contained hereunder. Form A.M. 250z is to be prepared in each case and submitted to the Naval Officer-in-charge, who, if the supply is in order, will approve and sign the form in lieu of the Director of Naval Medical Services.

At the end of each month, the forms A.M. 250z for those spectacles supplied during the month are to be forwarded to the Director of Naval Medical Services.

5. The supply of spectacles at Service expense is to be arranged through the qualified opticians under contract with the Department, and in accordance with the terms of the contract unless unnecessary delay would occur in adopting this procedure. In such instances, the commanding officer is to make satisfactory local arrangements for supply by a qualified optician and is to satisfy himself that the price is reasonable having due regard to the prices obtaining in the district where the purchase is made.

6. Seaman ratings with sea experience who are found to be below the proper visual standard should not be relegated to shore service if this can be avoided. As an alternative, application should be made for their employment or transfer as follows in the order given :---

- (i) Qualification as an S.D. Operator, S.T., for service in cruisers, and above. Q.O., Radar, or for training as an electrical, engine room, ordnance artificer or motor mechanic. These ratings, with the exception of S.D. Operators, are permitted the constant wearing of spectacles on duty. S.D. ratings may wear spectacles on duty only when in cabinets.
- (ii) Transfer as seaman to boom defence service, i.e., for draft to immobile gate vessels and shore service only.
- (iii) Transfer for further sea service to any other branch in which the constant wearing of spectacles is permitted.

It is the intention that each case should be judged on its merits. Transfer to the Supply Branch should be avoided unless for some reason in a limited number of cases the men concerned are particularly suitable for such a transfer. It should be noted that the spectacles supplied under this clause should correct to at least 6/6. 6/9.

7. In all cases where any doubt exists as to a member's eligibility for spectacles at Service expense, the matter is to be fully reported to the Director of Naval Medical Services and his approval obtained before any action is taken to arrange supply.

REPORTS OF SURVEY ON PROVISIONS OR OTHER VICTUALLING STORES-FORMS A.S. 330.

The attention of accountant officers, also commanding officers of ships where an accountant officer is not borne, is drawn to the procedure in regard to the preparation and rendition of form A.S. 330— "Report of Survey on Provisions or other Victualling Stores Damaged. Defective or Decayed".

2. Detailed instructions for rendering reports of survey are embodied in the printed form and particular care is to be taken to insert in each column of A.S. 330 the full details required. In this connexion the revised form referred to in paragraph 3 of Navy Order 602 of 1944 is to be brought into use immediately supplies are received.

3. Special attention is drawn to the necessity for the original copy to be despatched direct to the Director of Victualling, except in the case of reports of survey raised in tenders which, after signature of the commanding officer, are invariably to be forwarded immediately to the parent ship for examination and endorsement prior to transmission to Navy Office. As accounting for victualling stores in tenders is the direct responsibility of the commanding officer, the signature of a supply or other rating in certificates, &c., in this form will not be accepted.

4. Where destruction of stores is necessary, a certificate of actual destruction is to be inserted in the body of the form and signed by at least two officers witnessing such destruction.

5. Where condemnations of fresh provisions are due to refrigerator defects, a full explanation of the circumstances is to be stated either in A.S. 330 or in a covering memorandum and advice furnished of the action taken to effect repairs. 6. It has been noted from examinations of reports of survey submitted to Navy Office that considerable losses of emergency provisions stowed in ships' boats have occurred owing to deterioration. It is essential that such provisions be frequently inspected and changed as necessary, not only for the purpose of preventing deterioration but also to ensure that the contents of packages are in a fit state for consumption should the emergency for which they are provided arise.

7. In order to reduce, as far as is practicable, the present excessive condemnations of provisions which frequently arise in tenders owing primarily to A.S. 104, "Numbers and Contents Book", not being maintained, special care is to be taken in those ships to issue provisions strictly in order of their date of receipt on board. In addition, regular inspections of storerooms are to be made with the object of guarding against losses or damage on account of insect life, rust, defective or unsatisfactory stowage, &c.

8. Navy Orders 127 and 223 of 1944 are cancelled.

9. The necessary amendment to C.O.R. 1942, Volume I, Article 439, will be promulgated in due course.

If this report coincides with that required under sub-paragraph (d) above, confirmation and promotion should be dealt with in the one report.

(f) Acting Sub-Lieutenants (or Equivalent Rank):

To reach Navy Office immediately prior to attaining six months' seniority. Special reference should be made to the officer's fitness for promotion.

(g) Sub-Lieutenants (or Equivalent Rank):

To reach Navy Office immediately prior to attaining the necessary qualifying service for promotion to the rank of lieutenant or lieutenant (provisional).

(h) All Officers:

On recommendations being made under the following provisions :---

- A.F.O. 4067/44—Accelerated premotion to lieutenant rank.
- A.F.O's 4916/43, 4572/44, 4064/44 -" Qualified Officer " status,

A.F.O's 3927/44, 5140/44, Navy Orders 359/43, 10/45-Acting lieutenant-commander and lieutenant-commander.

A.F.O. 6080/43-Fighter direction officers (after six months' service).



R.A.N. NURSING SERVICE-ADMINISTRATION.

DISTINCTION MARKS FOR WOUNDED (WOUND STRIPES).

Members of the Royal Australian Navy, who since the beginning of the present war have been awarded a hurt certificate for a wound sustained through enemy action, may wear a stripe of gold Russia braid, 11 inches in length, sewn perpendicularly on the left sleeve of the blue coat or blue jumper to indicate each occasion on which the wearer has been wounded. Personnel whose names have appeared on the sick list or in any casualty list as having sustained a "qualifying" wound or other injury (including sequelae of immersion which necessitated hospital treatment, or treatment in a sick bay which, in normal circumstances, would have required treatment in hospital) are similarly entitled to wear a wound stripe.

2. The stripes of braid will be worn by officers on the undress coat only. The lower end of the first stripe will be in the position defined below :---

- (a) Officers who wear distinction lace or braid-on the left sleeve, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the curl.
- (b) Officers who do not wear distinction lace or braid-on the left sleeve in the same position as for sub-lieutenants.
- (c) Officers who wear a pilot's, observer's or airgunner's badgeon the left sleeve, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the badge.

Members of the Royal Australian Naval Nursing Service should wear the stripes 3 inches from the edge of the left sleeve.

3. Chief petty officers (including Wrans) will wear the gold braid $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the centre button on the left sleeve. Petty officers and ratings (including Wrans) will wear the gold braid in the middle of the left sleeve with the lower end 3 inches from the bottom of the sleeve.

4. Additional stripes of gold braid marking each subsequent occasion on which the wearer has been wounded will be placed in front of the first stripe at intervals of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

5. A wound stripe in red rayon has also been approved. This is to denote receipt of wounds in previous wars, and one such stripe only may be worn in respect of any number of wounds so sustained. It will be worn 1 inch to the rear of the first gold wound stripe.

6. A first issue of two stripes in respect of each qualifying wound is to be made gratuitously, and demands for immediate requirements should be forwarded to the Superintending Victualling Store Officer, Royal Edward Victualling Yard, Sydney, subsequent supplies being obtained as requisite. The articles are to be taken on charge in the clothing account and issues made in the usual manner per Form A.S. 105 suitably amended.

IV. As regards underwater explosives, the following procedure will be observed :---

 - (ii) Shore Bases and Naval Air Stations—but to be confined to explosives which have been held for two years or more.

GOWRIE SCHOLARSHIPS.

The trustees of the Gowrie Scholarship Trust Fund, Sir John Latham, Sir Robert Garran, Sir Claude Reading, and Chief Judge H. B. Piper, announce that the fund now amounts to $\pounds 139,578$. The public appeal is closed but further subscriptions will still be accepted. The trustees have now given consideration to the basis for award of scholarships in accordance with the trust deed.

2. The trustees propose to offer annually the following scholarships :--

Two post-graduate research travelling scholarships.

Four university or similar scholarships.

Ten secondary school scholarships.

It is hoped to make the first awards in 1945, to be effective as from 1st January, 1945. Eligible persons are past or present members of the armed and auxiliary forces engaged in the war and their descendants, as defined in the trust deed.

The full number of scholarships will be awarded only if there are candidates of sufficient merit.

3. Post-graduate Research Scholarships.—Research travelling scholarships of $\pounds \Lambda 475$ per annum will be tenable for two years at universities, &c., abroad.

Nominations for these scholarships may be made by the professorial boards of the Australian Universities. The scholarships will be awarded by the trustees after consideration of recommendations which the university vice chancellors' committee will be invited to make in respect of such nominations.

4. University and Similar Scholarships.—Scholarships of £A100 per anum for post-secondary education will be tenable for the normal period of the course desired to be taken at a university or other approved educational institution.

5. Secondary School Scholarships.—(a) Scholarships of $\pounds A50$ per annum will be tenable for two years at secondary schools or such other schools or colleges as the trustees may approve.

(b) No scholarships will be awarded during the compulsory period of education as defined by the laws of the various States except to applicants who have passed an examination of a standard which—

- (i) is substantially equal to that of the New South Wales intermediate certificate examination; or
- (ii) is such that in normal circumstances the applicant requires only two further years to complete a course of secondary education; or
- (iii) is of such other standard as the trustees may approve from time to time.

6. The scholarships which are tenable in Australia at universities, secondary schools, or other educational institutions will be awarded

by the trustees after consideration of recommendations made by such advisory committees in the various States as the trustees appoint for the purpose. Such advisory committees will take into account—

(i) teachers' reports;

(ii) any examination results;

(iii) the character and personality of the candidate;

(iv) the course of education the candidate proposes to complete; and

will report on the financial means of the candidate and his or her parents, if desired by the trustees in any particular case.

Advisory committees will be appointed in each State of the Commonwealth and the Australian Capital Territory to consider applications and to make recommendations for awards to be made by the trustees. For this purpose the trustees will invite the assistance of educationalists and persons interested in the welfare of service personnel, ex-service personnel and their children.

7. The trustees may, in special circumstances, extend the scholarships tenable in Australia for a further period not exceeding one year.

8. The trustees may terminate any scholarship at any time if the trustees are of opinion that the progress or conduct of the holder is unsatisfactory.

9. The number of scholarships to be awarded each year, and the basis of awards may be reviewed from time to time. The number of scholarships to be awarded will depend upon the income earned by the trust fund.

SINGLE 40 M.M. BOFORS MARK IIIA MOUNTINGS—SUPPLY OF SIGHTS CORRECTIONAL 40 M.M. A.A. MTGS. MK. V (AUST.).

5

Arrangements have been made for the supply of sights correctional (stiffkey sticks) to certain ships fitted with single bofors mountings, to replace the eveshooting sights at present fitted.

2. As used by the Army, these sights correctional are arranged so that the aim off is charged in 50 M.P.H. steps, and the rings of eyeshooting sights, which are fitted for use as an alternative, each represent 100 M.P.H. aim off at a range of 1,000 yards.

3. Eight sights have been supplied unmodified; the remainder will be supplied modified for naval use so that the aim off is changed in 50 knot steps and can also be changed in 25 knot steps by pressing the "levers applying speed" half way only. The aim off speed scale has been regraduated in knots.

4. In cases where unmodified sights have been supplied, arrangements have been made for the supply, without demand, of modified racks to give 50 and 25 knot steps as above, together with a new aim off speed scale, graduated in knots, which should be tack soldered over the existing M.P.H. scale.

5. All sights will be supplied with the Λ rmy type eyeshooting sights, in which each ring represents 100 M.P.H. aim off. Arrangements are being made for the supply of modification parts, but these will not be available for some time. As a temporary expedient, ships may fit a standard oerlikon foresight grid to the existing sight bar. This will give approximately the correct aim off (in knots) for a range of 2,000 yards. The sight should then be adjusted as follows:—

Tangent elevation at 2,000 yards at 30 deg.-0.55 feet.

Height of rearsight above centre of grid-0.3 inches.

The following instructions for the assembly and adjustment of the sights correctional have been extracted from Australian Military Forces D.M.E. Technical Instruction No. A.103-73.

6. Attention is directed to sub-paragraph (6) of these instructions. It is most important to see that all locking bolts have been removed before attempting to operate the sight. The locking bolts on the trainers side are particularly liable to be overlooked.

7. Instructions—

(1) The sights correctional Mk. V (Aust.) will be received by units broken down into the following sub-assemblies and attached accessories:--

- (i) Main frame assembly to which is attached—
 - (a) Four hexagon head set screws and spring washers, used for attaching main frame to gun.
 - (b) Four captive hexagon head set screws in plate at top of stalk tube, used for attaching head correctional assembly.
 - (c) In the jaws of torque tube are the wing bolts and nuts used for attaching lateral and vertical side bars.
- (ii) Lateral and vertical side bar assemblies.
- (iii) Head correctional assembly which includes three cheese head captive set screws, used for attaching gate assembly.
- (iv) Gate assembly.
- (v) Foresights.

(2) The following operations are necessary when installing the above equipment:-

- (i) The existing sight either Mks. I, II or III, is to be completely removed from mounting, including existing securing set screws.
- (ii) Place main frame assembly in position on mounting and secure with the four set screws and spring washers mentioned in sub-paragraph (a) above.
- (iii) Remove wing bolts and wing nuts, mentioned in subparagraph (c) above from jaws of torque tube and place lateral and vertical side bars in position, then replace wing bolts.
- (iv) Engage all locking handles.
- (v) Mount and secure head correctional assembly; this is mounted at top of stalk tube of main frame and is held in position by the four captive hexagon head set screws referred to in sub-paragraph ·(b) above.
- (vi) Mount gate assembly and secure to forward end of head assembly by the three captive cheese head screws referred to in sub-paragraph (1) (iii) above, also adjust and secure to respective side bars.
- (vii) Mount foresights in position and tighten wing nuts.
- (viii) It will be found that when this sighting unit is mounted, the gun will have a muzzle preponderance and will require re-balancing, this can be achieved by re-adjustment of the counter balance springs.
 - (3) Alignment of Sights (Ring Sights).
 - (i) Engage all locking handles.
- (ii) With the tangent elevation and lateral deflection scales set at zero, proceed with normal drill used in aligning the Mk. II sight.

- (iii) Adjustment is to be carried out on hind sights only. Provision is made for both vertical and lateral movement of hind sights on both sides.
- (4) Alignment of Head Correctional.
- (i) Disengage all locks.
- (ii) With the speed indicator set at zero, and the handle bar of the head correctional revolved through 360 degrees in a vertical plane, the foresights should remain stationary.
- (iii) If movement of the foresights is apparent, it is adjusted as follows:----
 - (a) Slacken off the set screws of the two bearing caps which secure handle bar to head correctional.
 - (b) Move handle bar longitudinally or radially with respect to bearing until a zero position in obtained, i.e. when handle bar is revolved as in (4) (ii), the foresights remain stationary.

(5) In fitting sights correctional Mk. V (Aust.) to mounting, initial alignment to gun is determined by the fit of the screws securing main frame. Final alignment is carried out as per sub paragraphs (3) and (4).

(6) It is most important that no operation of the head correctional or levers applying speeds be attempted until all locks have been disengaged, otherwise damage to the equipment will occur.

PRECAUTIONS TO BE OBSERVED WHEN RETURNING CHLOROSULPHONIC ACID MIXTURE DRUMS.

The attention of all concerned is drawn to the corrosive nature of chlorosulphonic acid mixture and to the fact that a certain amount must inevitably remain in the drum after use.

2. Before returning drums for refilling, therefore, it is essential that the bungs are tightened. In addition to preventing damage through leakage this precaution will ensure that the interior of the drum and the residue of the chlorosulphonic acid mixture are protected from attack by atmospheric moisture.

3. Care should also be taken to ensure that drums are loaded into lorries, railway waggons, &c., bung upwards.

R.A.N. WOMEN'S AUXILIARY SERVICES—SPECIAL ISSUE OF COUPONS FOR PURCHASE OF NIGHTWEAR.

A special issue of clothing coupons, sufficient for the purchase of one or two sets of nightwear (pyjamas and nightgown) may be granted to a member of the R.A.N. Women's Auxiliary Services, who—

- (a) is transferred from one extreme of climate to another, or
- (b) is serving in an area where winter-type nightwear is essential but who, prior to her present allocation, lived in a district where nightwear of that type was not necessary,

and who does not possess at least two sets of the type of nightwear required for her new area of service.

2. This special issue will be in addition to the annual maintenance issue and will be subject to the following:---

- (a) The commanding officer of the establishment concerned shall. after consultation with the senior representative present of the Women's Service of which the applicant is a member, determine whether the allotment of coupons is essential, having particular regard to the acute shortage of civilian clothing stocks.
- (b) The issue shall be authorized only when the member does not possess at least two sets of the type of nightwear required, and does not possess sufficient coupons to effect purchase.
- (c) The application, if approved by the commanding officer, shall be transmitted by the commanding officer to the Deputy Director of Rationing in the State concerned, and is to include the following information:---
 - (i) Name, rank or rating (official number where applicable).
 - (ii) Address for issue of special permit.
 - (iii) Number and type of garments to be purchased, i.e., nightdresses or pyjamas, and whether the articles required have short, long, or no sleeves; also, in the case of "tropical" pyjamas, whether trousers with legs of less than knee length are required.
- (d) The member shall produce the garment or garments purchased and the relative invoice for the inspection of the representative referred to in paragraph 2 (a) above.
- (e) A detailed record is to be maintained of all such special coupon issues.
- (f) A statement of the special coupon issues is to be rendered to the Director of Victualling at the end of each calendar month.
- (g) Not more than one such coupon issue is to be made to a member in any one rationing year.

BURSARIES FOR CHILDREN OF PERSONNEL KILLED OR DISABLED DURING THE PRESENT WAR.

The King George's Fund for Sailors has established a fund by which twenty bursaries tenable at public schools in New South Wales are to be made available each year to children of naval personnel killed or disabled in this war. (A public school does not mean a State school.)

2. Each bursary will be to the value of £25 per annum and will be awarded under the following conditions:---

- (a) Tenable for three years subject to satisfactory term reports from the headmaster or headmistress of the school.
- (b) Bursaries can be continued after three years subject to the approval of the principal.
- (c) They are to be known as the "King George's Fund for Sailors' Bursaries" and are open to boys and girls whose fathers may have been killed or disabled in this war.
- (d) Application for a bursary should be made through the headmaster or headmistress at the school at which the boy or girl is attending, or intends to attend. The principal of the school must certify that the candidate is a desirable candidate from the educational angle. Such applications should be sent to the Naval Staff Office, Potts Point, Sydney, marked "School Bursaries," and should be in the hands of the receiving authority by 15th January.
- (e) Candidates should not be less than fourteen years of age as at 1st February.

3. Children under fourteen years.

The fund will be glad to assist financially in the education of boys and girls under the age of fourteen. Application for such assistance should be made in the same manner as for older children.

4. State Schools

There being no fees payable at State schools, bursaries will not be tenable at them. The fund will be glad to assist with grants for books, &c., where approved by the headmaster or headmistress.

5. The choosing of the final twenty to be awarded will be made by the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Sydney, in conjunction with the committee of the King George's Fund for Sailors.

MARRIAGE AND CHILD ALLOWANCES-STERLING PAYMENTS.

Under a pre-war arrangement with the Treasury, approval was given for payment of personnel serving abroad to be made in sterling subject to the provise that allotments payable in Australia would be charged at par.

Technically, marriage allowance was a credit to the account of the rating and where, in relatively few instances, there were allotments payable in England, they were paid in sterling at par.

2. As a war measure, the rates of marriage and child allowances have been considerably increased. The accounts of the other Services (Army and Air), wherever they may be, are kept in Australian currency, and, when members are serving abroad, they receive a further credit adjusting part only of their pay to sterling equivalent.

The R.A.N., however, has carried on under the old conditions, and the whole of the credits of personnel serving abroad have been treated as sterling, insofar as payments abroad are concerned, irrespective of whether they were "over the counter" or "by allotment."

3. An anomalous position arises also in that, when a rating is returned to Australia and leaves his wife and family at home, the whole of his credits are in Australian currency. Should he be allotting considerably more than the minimum requisite allotment, he is faced either with meeting the difference between Australian currency and his current steriling allotment from the residue of his own drawings or with reducing the allotment payable in the United Kingdom to the sterling equivalent of Australian currency.

4. The question has been raised as to the authority for payment of marriage allowance in sterling as, under the terms of the approval, these were payments to be made direct to the wives or in respect of children (as distinct from credits to the member).

5. It is realized that hardship may arise if such credits were reduced to Australian equivalent in respect of allotments now in force in the United Kingdom, and special approval has been obtained for continuance of present procedure in respect of existing allotments, subject to the following:—

Increases in child allowances for children born subsequent to 31st March, 1945, or credit of marriage and child allowances in respect of marriages contracted subsequent to 31st March, 1945, will be made in Australian currency. It will thus be necessary to credit the new marriage and child allowances at the sterling equivalent of the Australian rates whilst allottor and allottee both remain abroad.

(a) Should an allottor at present being credited with the full rates of marriage and child allowances in sterling remain abroad, but his wife take up residence in Australia, he will continue to be credited with such rates, on the allotment being re-declared payable in Australia. (b) An allottor marrying subsequent to the 31st March, 1945, remaining abroad, whose wife subsequently takes up residence in Australia, will be credited with the full rates of marriage and child allowances in sterling from the beginning of the pay period from which the Australian allotment commences.

(It will be seen that these ledger credits abroad at (a) and (b) are in effect made in sterling at par and the identical amounts are paid by way of allotment in Australia in Australian currency. Thus the member will receive no benefit by way of exchange.)

- (c) An allottor in receipt of the reduced sterling rates of marriage and child allowances, returning to Australia, whose wife remains abroad, will be credited with the full approved rates of such allowances in Australian currency from the date of receipt of pay in Australian currency. In these cases, transfer lists should clearly indicate that the rates of marriage and child allowance are to be increased to the Australian currency equivalent from date of the member's return to Australia.
- (d) An allottor, in receipt of full rates of allowances in sterling, returning to Australia and reverting to pay in Australian currency and subsequently going abroad (his wife being still abroad), will be credited with marriage and child allowances at the reduced rates in sterling from the date of receipt of pay in sterling.

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The attention of all concerned is to be drawn to the fact that anti-gas respirators are the personal responsibility of the officers or ratings to whom issued and are to be carried on their persons when travelling and not stowed in luggage compartments.

LEATHER SEA BOOTS-ECONOMY.

The following provisions of A.F.O. 4808/44 are brought to the notice of all concerned :---

"Leather sea boots are frequently returned to the victualling yards in a condition which necessitates scrapping sooner than should be necessary. These boots are not only costly but their production requires specially skilled labour and uses material which is already scarce.

2. If sea boots are not properly cared for, the leather soon deteriorates and they become hard and uncomfortable to wear. To prevent this, they should be regularly treated with dubbin or other suitable grease both while in store and in use; dubbin for the purpose can be demanded from the victualling yards. Sea boots that are not in use should be kept clean and if they become wet they should be dried slowly.

3. It is also essential that sea boots which become worn should be returned to a victualling yard while still in a repairable condition. The extent to which repairs can be executed is necessarily limited to replacement of the outer sole or heel and to minor restitching or patching. Boots should not, therefore, be worn down below the outer sole. If the leather should become hardened, the boots should be bumped out with paper to their proper shape and the leather revived by a generous use of dubbin or grease.

4. Sea boots returned to victualling yards should be tied togethe: in pairs.".

SUPPLY OF BOTTLED BEER TO H.M.A. SHIPS AND NAVAL ESTABLISHMENTS IN THE NEW GUINEA AREA.

With reference to Navy Order 538 of 1944, the prevailing conditions necessitate, in order to ensure a regular supply of beer to naval personnel in the New Guinea area, more especially to tenders, that beer be carried in H.M.A.S. Wilcannia in future for issue on repayment to such H.M.A. ships and to bases on shore.

2. Issues from Wilcannia will be made in complete cases under the general direction of the Naval Officer-in-Charge, New Guinea, and will be confined to the current A.M.F. ration for the New Guinea area, viz., two bottles per head weekly, up to one month's estimated require ments being issued in bulk, if desired, to each ship or base which can provide satisfactory storage for that quantity.

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3. The authorized issuing price of case supplies from Wilcannia is 1s. 3d. per bottle, less $8\frac{1}{3}$ per cent., and the issuing price to individual messes or ratings is to be maintained at the ruling Australian Army Canteens Service rate in New Guinea, at present 1s. 3d. per bottle. The $8\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. discount for case supplies is the equivalent of 5 per cent. discount normally allowed by the Australian Army Canteens Service at time of purchase, plus two thirds of the 5 per cent. monthly profit distribution. The canteen funds of each ship or base will thus benefit from sales ex Wilcannia to the same extent as if supply had been obtained from Australian Army Canteens Service sources.

4. In order to ensure that available stocks of beer in the New Guinea area are equitably distributed between the personnel of all Services, it is important that consumption in individual ships and shore bases from all sources does not exceed the authorized allowance of two bottles per head per week. The commanding officers of ships and bases, which obtain their full authorized supply of beer for a specified period from *Wilcannia*, in accordance with paragraph 2 above, should, therefore, take such precautions as are considered necessary during the period concerned to prevent encroachment upon stocks held by the Australian Army Canteens Service, with the object of maintaining the equitable distribution desired.

5. It is imperative, if the continued supply of beer ex Wilcannia is to be ensured, that all empty bottles should be preserved to the utmost extent and securely re-packed in the original cases, together with the straw or fibre envelopes, for return to Wilcannia on the next succeeding visit at the latest. To enable this procedure to be effected satisfactorily for delivery in due course to the brewers, all cases should be carefully opened to avoid damage. The extreme shortage of all such materials in Australia renders this course essential owing to the heavy drain on local resources to cope with regular shipments to the armed forces. Shipment of empty bottles should also be arranged, when possible, in other store ships or store carriers proceeding to Brisbane or Sydney, but, in such instances, the Superintending Victualling Store Officer or Victualling Store Officer at the port concerned should be advised on each occasion in order that collection from the ship and eventual return to the brewers may be arranged.

6. All profits resulting from bulk sales of beer by H.M.A.S. Wilcannia are paid to the credit of the R.A.N. Central Canteen Fund-see Navy Order 484 of 1944, Section D-after the completion of each voyage.

The following approved arrangements for the supply of cigarettes and tobacco to naval personnel proceeding on long leave, and to personnel discharged to civil life, are promulgated for general information :—

(a) Personnel proceeding on long leave.

Personnel proceeding on leave may be supplied with cigarettes or tobacco in the ship or establishment in which they are borne during the period of their leave, such supply to be calculated on a maximum issue of 105 cigarettes or 3 ounces tobacco per head per week.

- (b) Personnel discharged to civil life.
 - (i) Discharged naval personnel may, on application to the chairman of the Tobacco Distribution Committee in any State, arrange to secure a weekly quantity of eigarettes or tobacco from a retail tobacconist whom they nominate. Such ration does not normally operate until one month after application is made.
 - (ii) To cover the period between the date of a member's discharge and the date when supplies are made available through a retail tobacconist, personnel may draw, on discharge, up to 24 days' supply of cigarettes or tobacco on the basis indicated in (a) above. Such supply is to be drawn in the naval establishment from which the officer or rating is discharged.
 - (iii) In naval establishments where canteens are conducted by the Australian Army Canteens Service, or where supplies of cigarettes and tobacco are drawn from that source, personnel discharged who desire tobacco supplies are to be furnished with a written authority addressed to the canteen manager and signed by a responsible officer, indicating the date of discharge and authorizing an issue of the approved quantity of cigarettes and tobacco for a period of 24 days from date of discharge.

MEMBERS OF THE NAVAL FORCES UNDERGOING DETENTION OR IMPRISONMENT-MAINTENANCE OF THEIR WIVES AND CHILDREN

In cases where married members of the Naval Forces are detained awaiting trial and subsequently sentenced to imprisonment or detention with consequent cessation of pay, allotments are to be declared at or reduced to the standard rate plus marriage allowance from the pay period following the date of commencement of the waiting trial period. In all such cases marriage and child allowance (if any) are to be credited and the full amount of the allotment is to be charged. When such a member is to be retained in the Service on completion of his period of detention or imprisonment, the debit balance so accrued is to be recovered in suitable instalments upon his return to duty.

2. In cases where such members are subsequently approved to be discharged on completion of sentences, the question arises of liability for the maintenance of their wives and children in the interim.

3. It has been decided that where a member's sentence of detention or imprisonment is imposed for a Service offence, e.g., desertion, the Naval Department will accept, to a degree, liability for the maintenance of the member's legal wife and children if they are in indigent circumstances. Where, however, imprisonment or detention is imposed for a civil offence, the maintenance of such dependants will remain the liability of the State in which they are residing, assistance being rendered in both cases at the State rate in force. The term "legal wife and children" means his legal wife and any children for whom child allowance was being paid prior to the member's discharge on the basis that they were members of his household.

4. When approval for subsequent discharge of a member is given in such cases, action will be taken from Navy Office to advise the member's wife of the occurrence, and of the date upon which payment of her allotment will cease. Such allottee will also be informed that, if her financial position warrants it, immediate application should be made by her to the State Welfare Department in the State in which she resides (the address being stated) and that her case will be examined by them as to her eligibility for assistance. Necessary particulars will also be forwarded to the State Department from Navy Office, i.e., member's name, place of imprisonment, period of sentence, and copy of advice to wife, and later, date of member's discharge, where possible, in advance. The date of discharge should be communicated to the Director of Navy Accounts at least fourteen days prior to such date.

5. To allow of a period for the investigation of each case by the welfare authorities and to obviate distress, payment will be continued from Navy Office in respect of the wife for two pay days from date of such notification to the wife, at the standard rate of allotment plus marriage allowance.

6. The actual date of stoppage of allotment and marriage allowance of such cases will be communicated by the Director of Navy Accounts to H.M.A. ship carrying the account of the member.

FLYING OF THE DUKE OF GLOUCESTER'S STANDARD AND OF THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S FLAG.

The Official Secretary to His Royal Highness the Governor-General has advised that the following are the arrangements regarding the flying of the Duke of Gloucester's Standard and of the Governor-General's flag:—

1. His Royal Highness the Governor-General will fly his Personal Standard at Government House, Canberra, and at Admiralty House, Sydney, when in residence.

2. When His Royal Highness goes afloat in a barge or when he embarks in one of His Majesty's or His Majesty's Australian Ships the Governor-General's flag will be flown.

3. When His Royal Highness is inspecting Naval, Military or Air Establishments ashore the Governor-General's flag should be flown.

4. His Royal Highness will fly the Governor-General's flag on his car and aeroplane (the latter when taxi-ing only).

5. During long and fast journeys by car (when flags tear easily) the Governor-General's flag will be replaced by an oblong steel plate with a Governor-General's flag enamelled on it. This will be positioned above the front bumper bar in the centre of the radiator.

6. On motor cars, the flag will be flown from the roof with an enamelled Royal Crown just in front of the flag. The flag will only be flown on the motor car during the day and at night the Crown on the roof will be lit.

7. Description of the flags to be flown are as follows :----

- (a) Personal Standard.—This is the same as the Royal Standard, but it has the Duke's label on it. The label of His Royal Highness is "of three points argent—the first and third charged with a St. George's Cross, and the centre point with a lion passant guardant gu.". This label appears as a white bar running along the length of the flag at the top.
- (b) Governor-General's Flag.—The flag consists of "a Royal blue ground on which is the Royal Crest in gold with the words 'Commonwealth of Australia' in blue letters on a gold scroll below the Crest.".

With reference to paragraph 1—having in mind the desirability of extending the "life" of flags which are difficult to replace under war conditions, His Royal Highness will have his Personal Standard lowered at sunset and hoisted at 8 a.m.


8-INCH PUSHER HOISTS AXIS PIN OF TUMBLER LEVER OPERATING PAWL HOUSING GEAR.

2. The modification may be carried out by ship's staff if desired.



4. Except for advancement to signalman (C), advancements will be made by the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, to fill vacancies in fleet numbers.

5. One yeoman of signals (C) will be allowed in each staff totalling four or more ratings (including higher ratings). Any staff which totals two but less than four will be allowed a leading signalman (C).

6. Serving ratings may volunteer for transfer unless they have already qualified for any active service rating or non-substantive rate.

7. Rates of active and deferred pay will be the same as for ordinary signalman, signalman, leading signalman and yeoman of signals.

8. Convoy signal ratings may, if not employed on convoy duties, be paid the non-substantive allowance applicable to their respective substantive rating, provided they qualify in the usual way.

9. Ratings of the convoy signal section of the Communications Branch, who are qualified for equivalent rating in the general service, may volunteer to revert to general service, subject to manning requirements in the convoy signal section. Transfers to be authorized by the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, who will withdraw ratings for short course before discharge to general service if necessary.

NAVAL PERSONNEL DELAYED IN TRANSIT AND/OR AWAITING ONWARD PASSAGE BY RAIL ON COMPLETION OF LEAVE.

Information has been received at Navy Office to the effect that many instances are occurring of naval personnel returning to H.M.A. ships and depots, absent over leave, the main reason given being "delayed in rail transit".

2. It would appear that these delays could be attributed to any of the following reasons:---

(a) Failure on the part of personnel to report to rail transport officers immediately on arrival at R.T.O. Centres, in order to arrange return accommodation.

- (b) Failure on the part of personnel to report back to rail transport officers at such times as directed for the purpose of entrainment.
- (c) Service reasons (e.g., trains running late, thereby missing connexions at capital cities).

3. In order to rectify this matter the following procedure is to be adopted forthwith:----

- (a) All personnel before proceeding on leave are to be instructed to report to R.T.O. centres immediately on arrival at destinations in order to arrange necessary return rail accommodation.
- (b) All instructions issued by rail transport officers regarding rail travel are to be strictly complied with.
- (c) Any neglect by personnel in carrying out instructions, as contained in 3 (a) and 3 (b) above, is to be dealt with as a disciplinary offence.

4. Naval rail transport officers have been instructed to append (by means of a rubber stamp) on leave tickets or home leave passes and rail tickets held by personnel the following information:—

- (i) Time and date personnel report to rail transport officers to arrange return rail accommodation; and
- (ii) time and date personnel have been directed to report for entrainment.

5. Further, Naval rail transport officers have been instructed to forward direct to all commanding officers concerned full details of any delays, either Service or otherwise, occasioned by personnel departing from or passing through their centres.

2. Wherever possible, stocks of stamps should be maintained and care taken to ensure that all articles posted are fully prepaid.

3. In circumstances in which H.M.A. ships, for operational or other reasons, cannot obtain sufficient supplies of stamps to comply with this Order, postal articles should be clearly endorsed, preferably by means of a rubber stamp, as follows:---

"From H.M.A. Ship-No stamps available."

(Note.—The name of the ship should not appear on the envelopevide Navy Order 23 of 1944, paragraph 48.)

4. In such circumstances, postal regulations provide that the amount of normal postage only will be charged on receipt.

COMMONWEALTH RECONSTRUCTION TRAINING SCHEME.

In Navy Order 670 of 1944, promulgated at the request of the Industrial Training Division of the Department of Labour and National Service, the attention of all personnel was directed to the need for additional trade instructors to be appointed under the Commonwealth Reconstruction Training Scheme towards or after the cessation of hostilities. The need for instructors in the building trades was stressed.

2. Instructors in art and applied art, science and applied science, mathematical, commercial, needlecraft, and home management courses of various types will also be needed, and it is desired to give members of the Forces who desire to be considered for such appointments the opportunity of lodging applications for selection at a later date.

3. Generally, the services of these instructors will not be required until the cessation of hostilities or just prior thereto.

4. Instructors will be appointed as temporary instructors by the appropriate State Public Service Authority. Conditions of training and employment may be obtained, together with application forms, from the Deputy Director of Industrial Training in the State concerned.

5. Applicants are required to be fully qualified in the branch of technical work for which application is made and preferably to have had some experience as instructors. Selected applicants without satisfactory teaching experience may be required to undergo a short intensive course of training, during which the appropriate rates for instructors will be paid. 6. The addresses of Deputy Directors of Industrial Training are as follow:-

A.C.T.-Canberra Technical College.

New South Wales.—Sydney Technical College, Ultimo, Sydney. Victoria.—V.C.A. Building, Flinders-street, Melbourne. Queensland.—Department of Public Instruction, Brisbane. South Australia.—Education Department, Adelaide. Western Australia.—Perth Technical College, Perth. Tasmania.—Education Department, Hobart.

7. It is to be clearly understood that successful applicants will not necessarily be released, since release must at all times be determined by Service requirements.

DISCHARGE FROM THE R.A.N. ON ACCOUNT OF PHYSICAL UNFITNESS FOR SERVICE.

The conditions relating to the discharge of members of the R.A.N. on account of physical unfitness have been reviewed and are shown hereunder.

2. In regard to date of discharge from the R.A.N.-

- (a) A member on full time duty who, following examination by

 a Medical Board of Survey, is, in the opinion of the
 Naval Board, unfit for further service will, subject to the
 provisions of sub-paragraphs (b), (c), (d), (g) and (h)
 hereof, be discharged from the Service—
 - (i) When he is no longer, at the time, in need of further active medical treatment as an in-patient and is capable of—
 - (a) resuming his pre-enlistment occupation; or
 - (β) following some other occupation; or
 - (γ) being trained for some skilled occupation;
 - or
 - (ii) when the period of his treatment in a Service hospital or convalescent depot in Australia has totalled six months,

whichever is the earlier.

- (b) Where a medical board considers that the member's recovery or rehabilitation into civil life may be furthered by retention in a service hospital or convalescent depot for a further period or periods not exceeding a total extension of six months, recommendation may be made to the Naval Board that the member's discharge be postponed accordingly.
- (c) In special cases, such as those with severe amputation, or requiring special bone grafting, facio-maxillary or plastic

surgery treatment, the extension referred to in sub-paragraph (b) may be increased by the Naval Board to twelve months if such extension will further the member's recovery or rehabilitation into civil life.

- (d) A member suffering from an incurable malignant disease whose expectation of life is a matter of months, may, subject to the Naval Board's approval, be retained in a service hospital and his discharge postponed accordingly for as long as he is in need of active medical treatment up to twelve months after the expiration of the period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) (ii) provided that a further extension or extensions may be granted if necessary with the special approval of the Naval Board.
- (e) In cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, whether attributable to war service or not, the time of discharge will be governed by sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) above, and for the purposes of these sub-paragraphs, treatment in a repatriation or other civil institution will be deemed to be treatment in a service hospital or convalescent depot in Australia.
- (f) In cases of incurable or unmanageable mental disease, the provisions of sub-paragraph (e) will apply.
- (g) Subject to sub-paragraphs (d), (e) and (f) above, a member who is unfit for further service as a result of a preenlistment disability not aggravated by service or of chronic disease or constitutional inadequacy not related to service, is—
 - (i) If no longer in need of immediate active medical treatment and unsuitable for medical rehabilitation, to be discharged with Naval Board approval to the shore as soon as practicable, notwithstanding that the period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) (ii) has not elapsed.
 - (ii) Whilst in need of immediate active medical treatment or suitable for medical rehabilitation, to be retained, with Naval Board approval, until the period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) (ii) has elapsed, and then discharged, notwithstanding the provision of sub-paragraph (b) hereof.
- (h) In amputation cases, a member may be retained in the R.A.N. until an artificial limb has been supplied and he has been instructed in its use, provided that the maximum period of his retention shall not exceed that provided for under sub-paragraph (b) or in cases to which subparagraph (c) applies, the period provided for under that sub-paragraph. (See Navy Order 63 of 1942 re supply of artificial limbs.)

3. Arrangements are to be made for the attendance of a medical officer of the Repatriation Commission at invaliding surveys and the reason for recommending discharge or further treatment should be clearly stated on Form A.M.252Z. Such surveys should be held at convenient periods, but not less frequently than once a month if cases are awaiting decision.

With reference to C.O.R., Articles 557 (1) and 558 (6), as amended by Navy Order 280 of 1942, prescribing that survey of cases should be held after a period of 151 days' continuous treatment, where a reasonable probability of ultimate fitness for return to duty exists, it will not be necessary for the Repatriation Commission to be represented at such surveys.

4. The opinion of the medical officer of the Repatriation Department, as to the eligibility of the member for war pension, should be noted at the foot of page 4 of Form A.M.252Z.

5. Discharge from the R.A.N. will take place, as a rule, on a date 30 days from the date on which all papers relating to the case are forwarded to the Repatriation Commission from Navy Office. If the case is not one for reference to the Repatriation Commission, discharge will take place 30 days after the date of survey. These periods may be taken as convalescent leave, and the date for discharge will be notified from Navy Office, when approval for discharge is being communicated. In special cases (e.g., where a member is being invalided after a short period of service on account of a pre-existing disability which was not disclosed at medical examination prior to entry) discharge will take place in accordance with Article 200 of Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions—i.e., 14 days beyond date of survey.

Should any change take place in the medical condition of a member during the period of 30 days, necessitating further medical treatment beyond that period, Navy Office approval should be sought for an extension until the member again reaches the stage for discharge as stated in paragraph 1 of this Order.

6. For the information of medical officers, the following are the requirements necessary to establish a diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis:-

- (a) The tubercle bacillus to be found on at least two occasions in sputum which has been expectorated in the presence of a medical officer or nursing sister or responsible sick berth rating, or in the gastric contents or pleural fluid; or
- (b) The diagnosis to be agreed upon by a medical representative of the Repatriation Commission, who should be afforded the opportunity of seeing the case, attending the Board or examining the clinical records before the Board is held.
- 7. Provision of medical treatment and rehabilitation-
 - (a) Prior to discharge from the R.A.N., medical treatment and rehabilitation will be provided by the Navy Department, except in the case of patients suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis or incurable or unmanageable mental disease, who should be transferred to a Repatriation or other civil institution, as appropriate, as soon as practicable.
 - (b) After discharge from the R.A.N., treatment will be provided as follows:---

(i) Members entitled to Repatriation pensions-

Normally by the Repatriation Commission, except that, in order to meet special circumstances, the provision of treatment may be a matter of arrangement between this Department and the Repatriation Commission.

(ii) Members not entitled to Repatriation pensions-

By civil medical institutions, provided that, pending such accommodation being available, treatment may be continued in a service hospital.

8. Before any member who is an inmate of a service hospital and who does not become a Repatriation responsibility is discharged, arrangements are to be made for the continuation of any necessary treatment in a civil hospital as an in-patient or an out-patient, according to the requirements of the case. The cost of such treatment is not a liability of the Commonwealth beyond date of discharge from the Navy.

8

9. The following action is to be taken in respect of members surveyed for invaliding:---

(a) Non-Repatriation Cases-

- (i) When an unqualified recommendation of discharge "P.U.N.S." or "B.N.P.S." is made by the Medical Board of Survey and where the member concerned no longer needs active medical treatment and can be discharged without detriment to health, approval is given for such member to be discharged to home port and to proceed on convalescent leave until the expiration of 30 days after date of survey whilst awaiting the decision of the Naval Board. (See also paragraph (1) (a) of Navy Order 336 of 1943.)
- (ii) When the recommendation of the Board of Survey is qualified, i.e., in cases where a clear recommendation of discharge "P.U.N.S." or "B.N.P.S." is not given, or when any doubt as to ultimate disposal exists, the question of whether discharge is to take place or not will be decided by Navy Office, and a signal made accordingly. Pending receipt of this signal, members coming within this category are not to be sent on leave.

The ship or establishment in which the member is surveyed is to bear the ledger account for the period of travelling and leave involved, making all necessary adjustments, and finally close the account and render Form A.S. 1031Z, &c., to the Director of Navy Accounts. Advice of the disposal of the member concerned is to be forwarded immediately to Navy Office, the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, and the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the home port.

(b) Repatriation cases—

A member who the Board of Survey (including a Repatriation Medical Officer) considers should be referred to the Repatriation Department, should be sent to home port, if fit to travel, to await Naval Board decision regarding his or her discharge.

10. A member with no disability or whose degree of civil disability is negligible should be sent on convalescent leave as from date of survey, even though he is recommended for reference to Repatriation Department in respect of treatment. 11. To facilitate action in Navy Office, a signal is to be sent after survey for invaliding stating the names and official numbers of members surveyed who have been considered Repatriation cases and who have claims for pension in respect of a degree of civil disability.

12. Navy Orders 93, 440 and 485 of 1943 are hereby cancelled. (527/211/2117.)

THEFT AND MISAPPROPRIATION OF STORES AND SUPPLIES— PRECAUTIONS.

The attention of all concerned is drawn to the serious losses in supplies caused by theft and misappropriation.

2. While even isolated instances of theft are serious, the effect on the war effort of persistent stealing is far-reaching.

3. Commanding Officers, Naval Officers-in-Charge, and all concerned are therefore to take all possible precautions to prevent theft or misappropriation of stores and supplies. Such offences are to be viewed seriously and offenders promptly dealt with.

4. Particular attention is again drawn to the necessity for the utmost care in the packing, marking and addressing of stores. Continuous interest must also be taken, as far as practicable, in the movement of consignments from the time of despatch to delivery at destination. Disclosure of contents on packages should be avoided.

MEALS FOR R.A.N. PERSONNEL TRAVELLING BY TROOP TRAIN.

With reference to Navy Order 368 of 1944, the procedure in force provides for issue of Service meal warrants to cover all personnel travelling by troop train.

2. Such personnel may be divided into three categories, viz :--

(a) Those travelling on duty;

- (b) those on leave in excess of 48 hours;
- (c) Those on week-end or short leave of 48 hours or less.

3. As indicated in Navy Order 368 of 1944, categories 2 (a) and 2 (b) are provided for by non-credit, during period of troop train travel, of travelling, meal or leave allowances to which normally entitled.

Personnel in category 2 (c) are not entitled to be credited with any such allowances (vide Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 123) and the question of entitlement to supply of meals in such circumstances at Service expense has received consideration. It has been decided that, as regards such personnel victualled normally in a general mess, the cost of meals provided during troop train travel will remain a charge against the Commonwealth.

4. In circumstances, however, in which such a member is in receipt of provision allowance during the period of travel by troop train, the cost of meals supplied is to be recovered by ledger charge against the member's account.

5. Suitable advice for this purpose is to be furnished by the issuing authority to the accountant officer of the ship in which the member's account is borne.




A.M.S. VESSELS—ARRANGEMENTS FOR CAFETERIA SERVICE— MODIFICATIONS TO GALLEY.

W.R.A.N.S.-RE-ENTRY OF RATINGS.

The following conditions governing the re-entry of ratings into the W.R.A.N.S. have been approved :---

(a) Engagement—

(i) The prior approval of the Naval Board is required in each case before a rating may be re-entered into the W.R.A.N.S.

(ii) An applicant for re-entry is required to produce her former Service Certificate. If she cannot do so, a certified copy shall be forwarded by the Director of Navy Accounts after re-entry has been effected.

(iii) A fresh medical examination and the completion of a fresh form of engagement (R.A.N.R. 6) shall be required.

(iv) Subject to a vacancy existing in establishment numbers, re-entry may be effected in the rating of wran in the category and pay grouping held prior to discharge, otherwise the provisions of N.O.L. 432/224/341 (No. 34420) of 27th April, 1943, shall apply in full.

(v) Any rating higher than wran held during the previous engagement shall be forfeited on re-entry, but the time served may be counted as time in the rating on re-entry.

(b) Advancement—

(i) Provided re-entry is in the same category, former service in the rating may count towards qualifying time for advancement. Seniority is to be adjusted accordingly by the length of time spent out of the Service (vide Naval Account Regulations and Instructions, Article 93).

(ii) Ratings recommended for advancement during their former engagement must be recommended again before becoming eligible for advancement on re-entry and, if the conditions of advancement have been made more stringent since they left the Service, care should be exercised that re-entrants satisfy such conditions before being re-advanced.

(c) Good Conduct Badges-

Former service in the W.R.A.N.S. shall automatically count, in accordance with the usual conditions, for the acquisition of good conduct badges. Service in one or more of the other Australian Women's Auxiliary Services may, with the approval of the Naval Board, count in this regard on production of the appropriate documentary evidence.

(d) Uniform-

Ratings on re-entry shall be treated as first entries in respect of issue of kit.

A.M.S. VESSELS-PEACOCK AND SMITH EVAPORATING PLANTS.

It has been brought to notice that the evaporator coil terminals in a number of the earlier plants manufactured by Messrs. Peacock and Smith for the above vessels, vary in detail from those fitted to the majority of the plants.

2. In the first few plants the diameter of the screwed end of the terminals was 1 inch and the spigot on the securing nuts was $1\frac{3}{16}$ -in. diameter. In the later plants, these dimensions were $1\frac{5}{16}$ inch and $1\frac{11}{16}$ inch respectively.

3. No difficulty will arise until it is necessary to fit new coils of later manufacture, which will have been made to the larger sizes.

4. When these circumstances arise, the alternatives are-

- (a) To alter the terminals on the new coils.
- (b) To open out the holes on the outside of the steam and exhaust header on the evaporator body.

5. The course to be adopted must be decided by the facilities available at the time, but preference should be given to paragraph 4 (b) if possible, since the larger terminals are fitted to most ships, and base spares are also of this size.

BOILER COMBUSTION CONES MANUFACTURED FROM HEAT RESISTING STEEL.

There appears to be an excessive demand for replacement of heat resisting cast steel combustion cones in A.M.S. Vessels.

2. Combustion cones of heat resisting cast steel should last indefinitely, and only in rare instances should replacement be necessary, particularly as the supports of heat resisting steel are now fitted to the cone by welding.

3. Attention is therefore drawn to the necessity of conserving these items so far as possible, and to the provisions of Navy Order 91 of 1944 which provides for the return of defective cones to store for reconditioning, in all cases where replacement is found to be necessary.

MAINTENANCE OF REFRIGERATORS IN H.M.A. SHIPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS BY THE R.A.A.F.

Arrangements have been completed with the R.A.A.F. whereby that Service will undertake, at Australian Ports and Northern Bases, the maintenance and repair of all refrigerator units in H.M.A. Ships and establishments.

2. Defects in refrigerator units are to be brought to the notice of the Naval Officer-in-Charge concerned who will arrange with the local R.A.A.F. representative for the defects to be made good.

3. The R.A.A.F. will only supply such parts as may be necessary to make good defects and will not provide spare parts to complete sets of refrigerator spares normally held by ships and establishments.

FITTING OF STANDARD GRID SIGHTS TO 0.Q.F. 40 MM. BOFORS-SINGLE MOUNTINGS.

Sets of parts for converting the eveshooting sights of single 40 mm. Bofors guns to Naval type will become available shortly, and will be supplied without demand for fitting by ship's staff. The sets will be of two types, for sights correctional Mark V and for Sight Bars Mark II. The principal difference is in the size of the bracket, rear sight. On receipt, sights are to be modified in accordance with D.O.T.M. diagram No. 80501 for Sights Correctional Mark V or No. 80502 for Sight Bars Mark II appended to this Order.

2. The grids being supplied are the same in both sets. They are of the same dimensions as an oerlikon grid. The base length is adjusted by the fitting of brackets, rear sight to give the correct aim off and tangent elevation for a range of 1,500 yards. The grids are of a plastic material, and will be supplied in boxes of twelve, one box per mounting, thus affording easy replacement. Further grids will be obtainable on demand from Gunmounting Depots. Spare grids are to be kept in the boxes supplied, until required for fitting.





RADAR STORES FOR H.M.A. SHIPS.

Instances have occurred recently in which supplies of Radar stores addressed to H.M.A. Ships and despatched to northern bases have failed to reach the addressee, necessitating the raising of further demands for similar items, and resulting in duplication of supply when the first shipment is eventually received on board.

2. Stocks of all Radar equipment are very limited and, to avoid duplication of issues and consequent wastage of equipment, Naval Officers-in-Charge at bases concerned are to take steps to ensure that such equipment is placed on board the vessel to which consigned as early as practicable after receipt at the base, in order that the equipment may be fitted when desired at any convenient port. This procedure is also essential to ensure that ships are fitted with such important equipment at the earliest possible date.

LIFE-SAVING EQUIPMENT-FLOTANETS.

Experience has shown that the 22 men type flotanets (approximate size 20 ft. x 10 ft.) issued to H.M.A. ships are not entirely satisfactory, mainly for the following reasons:—

(a) When thrown clear of the ship or when floating clear of a ship, the flotanet tends to roll up and men milling about in the water, especially in a lop, find it very difficult to unroll.

(b) A certain number of men can support themselves on the outer rows of cork, but as soon as weight is placed on the inner area, the flotanet again rolls up and tangles men within it.

2. Trials have now proved that the 22 men type flotanets can be made much more useful if they are cut into three sections (10 ft. x 6 ft.) each being capable of supporting six persons. The report of certain aspects of the trials of the reduced size net is summarized as follows for general information:—

- Test 1.—Six men attempted to board raft from one side. Result: Raft coiled up.
- Test 2.—Six men swam to raft; four detailed to hold each corner; two men boarded and were instructed to lie either end face down in prone position; this enabled raft to be kept spread thereby allowing the other four men to board. Result: Satisfactory.
- Test 3.—Six men on outside of raft; three men in prone position on back in raft with heads kept well clear of water. Result: Satisfactory for injured men.
- Test 4.—Six men on the outside of raft and six men in prone position on raft. Result: Satisfactory providing men on raft kept their *hands* behind head. Raft slightly submerged.
- Weather conditions at the time of test-Wind N.E. force 4, sea and swell 23.


3. Further issues of the 22 men type flotanets are not to be made and ships' requirements of flotanets are to be met by the existing small size, i.e., 9 men type, and/or the modified large net, i.e., 6 men type. Arrangements are to be made forthwith by ship's or base staffs, as appropriate, for modifications to all large size nets held to be effected by reducing to three sections and turning back the ends of the ropes where cut and splicing to the standing part; fitting loops at the corners and tow ropes similar to those fitted on existing flotanets (vide Diagram No. 0/1697 appended to this Order).

4. The existing approximate life-saving capacity of flotanets allowed to all ships will remain unchanged, and demands for any 6-men type nets found necessary to complete to authorized allowances as a result of modification of the 22-men type net should be forwarded to the nearest Naval Store Depot.

The following is an example of the present and revised allowances of flotanets:--

SUPPLY OF PROVISIONS TO H.M.A. SHIPS FROM UNITED STATES NAVY SUPPLY SHIPS AND DEPOTS.

The examination of victualling accounts rendered into office has disclosed that some of H.M.A. Ships have drawn from United States Navy Supply Ships items of provisions which are not included in the current R.A.N. Official Issuing Price List.

2. For the future guidance of all concerned it is notified that the United States Navy system of issuing unit rations is not applicable to H.M.A. Ships, as instructions promulgated by Comserfor Seventh Fleet, under date of 25th July, 1944, to Commanding Officers of U.S.N. Supply Ships and Depots, intimated, *inter alia*, that in the case of R.A.N. vessels the standard procedure of issuing the full balanced ration or unit was to be suspended, and that only such provisions as are actually allowed in the R.A.N. list are to be supplied when available.

3. Demands for provisions required from the above sources by H.M.A. Ships are to be prepared accordingly as necessary.

4. It has also been brought to notice that on occasions supplies of provisions have been obtained by H.M.A. Ships from United States Navy or Army sources and the quantities received have not been taken on charge, and accounted for in the normal manner for issue on repayment, merely because supply and receipt notes were not passed at the time. Such supplies are invariably to be recorded in the store accounts in future on the date of receipt and dealt with in all respects as ship's stores.

CORDAGE—PRECAUTIONS TO PREVENT DETERIORATION.

 $4\frac{1}{2}$ -in. manila motor boat falls, which had been fitted for four months, but which had been used infrequently, were being turned end for end in one of H.M.A. Ships, and it was discovered that the in-board end of the cordage had deteriorated through the formation of mould inside the lay of the strands. When this cordage was worked by hand, the yarns parted. A life-line of similar cordage parted when eight men pulled on it to turn out the boat.

2. Experience generally discloses that cordage of the quality now available for supply deteriorates quickly under tropical conditions, e.g., rains followed by intense heat. With a view to arresting this depreciation, boats' falls in ships in northern waters in particular should be turned end for end every six weeks to provide adequate ventilation.

FLYING OF THE DUKE OF GLOUCESTER'S STANDARD AND OF THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S FLAG.

The Official Secretary to His Royal Highness the Governor-General has advised that the following are the arrangements regarding the flying of the Duke of Gloucester's Standard and of the Governor-General's Flag:---

- (a) His Royal Highness the Governor-General will fly his Personal Standard at Government House, Canberra, at Admiralty House, Sydney, and at any other Government House where His Royal Highness may be in residence.
- (b) When His Hoyal Highness goes afloat in a barge or when he embarks in one of His Majesty's or His Majesty's Australian Ships, the Governor-General's Flag will be flown.
- (c) When His Royal Highness is inspecting Naval, Military or Air Establishments ashore, the Governor-General's Flag should be flown.
- (d) His Royal Highness will fly the Governor-General's Flag on his car and aeroplane (the latter when taxi-ing only).
- (e) During long and fast journeys by car (when flags tear easily), the Governor-General's Flag will be replaced by an oblong steel plate with a Governor-General's flag enamelled on it. This will be positioned above the front bumper bar in the centre of the radiator.
- (f) On motor cars, the flag will be flown from the roof with an enamelled Royal Crown just in front of the flag. The flag will only be flown on the motor car during the day and at night the Crown on the roof will be lit.
- (g) Description of the flags to be flown are as follows:—
 - (i) Personal Standard.
 - This is the same as the Royal Standard, but it has the Duke's label on it. His Royal Highness's label is "of three points argent—the first and third charged with a St. George's Cross, and the centre point with a lion passant guardant gu". This label appears as a white bar running along the length of the flag at the top.
 - (ii) Governor-General's Flag.
 - The flag consists of "a Royal blue ground on which is the Royal Crest in gold with the words 'Commonwealth of Australia' in blue letters on a gold scroll below the Crest".

2. With reference to sub-paragraph (a)—having in mind the desirability of extending the "life" of flags which are difficult to replace under war conditions, His Royal Highness will have his Personal Standard lowered at sunset and hoisted at 8 a.m.

3. Navy Order 91 of 1945 is cancelled.

FUZES-TIME MECHANICAL-MAINTENANCE OF PRE-SET FUZES.

Experience has shown that Fuzes Time No. 211 when set for lengthy periods in temperatures of over 95°F., cannot be re-set or set to safe with service key or fuze setter.

2. To overcome this "setting up", periodical setting of these fuzes, when stowed in ready use lockers and subjected to high temperatures, should be carried out but care is to be taken to ensure that its frequency does not impair the tensioning of the fuze.

3. Ships are to report, after experience has been gained, the interval between routine re-setting operations considered necessary to ensure efficient functioning of the fuzes without adversely affecting the tensioning.

RADAR STORES-SUPPLY, CUSTODY AND ACCOUNTING.

The following instructions, previously promulgated in a Navy Office circular memorandum, relative to the supply, custody and accounting for radar stores are promulgated for the information and guidance of all concerned. 2. Attention is drawn to the provisions of A.F.O. 1096/43 which require that radio sets and component parts including radar equipment, vide A.F.O. 2403/43, supplied to Yards and Bases for stock and issue, are to be dealt with as ordinary naval stores and held in the custody of naval store officers, or base supply officers, as appropriate. The provisions of this Order are applicable in the R.A.N., but there is no objection to small quantities of radar stores, essential for use during tests, and which are not included in the spares carried in ships, being held in the custody of the port radar officer on behalf of the store officer where this is considered necessary. Particulars of minimum quantities of such items required to be held should be reported to Navy Office. These minimum quantities are to be accounted for as follows:—

(a) Bases at which a Naval Store Officer is established.

A receipt for the stores held on loan should be furnished on Yard Issue Note (form D.184) by the radar officer to the naval store officer.

- (i) When issues are made, a receipt, in duplicate, is to be obtained on form A.S.134D by the radar officer from the ship concerned. The quadruplicate copy of the form A.S.134D should be handed to the ship's representative as an "advance" supply note, vide also B.R.4 Art. 12 (2). The remaining copies should be handed to the naval store officer and an equivalent quantity of stores obtained in lieu.
- (ii) When, for any reason, a similar quantity cannot immediately be obtained, a Yard Return Note (form D.83) should be raised to adjust the total quantity on loan from the naval store officer. Similarly, if the quantities on loan are increased, an additional Yard Issue Note should be furnished by the radar officer to the naval store officer.

(b) Other Bases.

The stores should be issued into the custody of the radar officer of the base, who should furnish a receipt on forms A.S.156 to the base supply officer. The procedure outlined in paragraph 2 (a) (i) above should be followed in respect of all issues made by the radar officer.

When for any reason a similar quantity of items to that for which receipted demands A.S.134D have been obtained cannot immediately be supplied, a Return Note Form A.S.1091 should be furnished by the radar officer to adjust the quantity of spares in his custody. Similarly, if the initial quantities are increased a receipt on form A.S.156 for the additional items should be furnished by the radar officer to the base supply officer.

Note.—It should be observed that issues of radar stores are normally to be made from stocks carried in the base naval store in accordance with usual procedure, except that the radar officer should authorize the ship's demands. 3. Full particulars of radar stores for various types of equipment are shown in the respective "E" Lists or Establishment Lists. These lists, which will be supplied by the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, vide Navy Order 311 of 1944, set out the items required :--

(a) for first fitting, i.e., components;

- (b) as spares and accessories to be carried in ships;
- (c) as spares to be carried at bases.

In regard to (a), the set or outfit, e.g., power supply, aerial, &c., comprising the components detailed in the "E" List, or Establishment List, is regarded for accounting purposes as a complete unit, and should be taken on charge as such in ship's naval store accounts—one ledger page being used for each set. The ledger page should be headed as follows, and show in the voucher column a reference to the registered number of the supply note:—

"Radar Set (or Outfit), Type Complete, as per Components shown in Establishment List No.....

4. Components comprising a set, &c., are shown in detail on the supply vouchers. In the case of first supply of a complete set, &c., such vouchers should be compared with the "E" List, or Establishment List, and bundled as supporting vouchers to the entry of the complete set as described above, the components of the set, &c., not being taken on separate ledger charge. The complete set should be issued on permanent loan, being described on the appropriate permanent loan list as "Radar Set (or Outfit) Type complete, as per Components shown in Establishment List No.....," a copy of the establishment list being maintained for reference purposes. Where subsequent supplies are made to replace components, the individual items should be taken on ledger charge separately in the usual manner. When issued in replacement of a component incorporated in a complete set, they should be written off charge outright in the ledger in a similar manner to items to replace defective fixtures.

5. Items referred to at 3 (b) should be dealt with in ships in a similar manner to ordinary naval stores, i.e., a separate ledger page should be raised for each item and, in the case of permanent items included in spares and accessories, these, if issued on permanent loan, should be dealt with on the normal vouchers and each item detailed separately on the permanent loan list.

6. When preparing demands and supply notes for radar stores, it is essential, to enable the ships to observe the proper accounting procedure, that such vouchers should indicate clearly the type of set for which required, and the category under which the items fall, i.e., whether permanent components, consumable components, permanent spares, consumable accessories, &c. In all cases, the voucher should also show whether the items are for first supply or as replenishment. 7. Items not included in "E" Lists, or Establishment Lists, required by base staffs for fitting an installation, and not accountable as ship's stores, should be demanded from the local store officer by the base officer concerned on Form A.D.184 (when demanded from a naval store officer), or on Form A.S.156 (when demanded from a base supply officer). Such vouchers should clearly indicate the authority for the demand, i.e., job number, Service, &c. It is necessary that the base staff should determine requirements of such stores and lodge demands in sufficient time to enable the items to be obtained, by local purchase or normal transport channels, well in advance of the date on which they are required.

8. Items referred to at 3 (c) required to be maintained at bases are generally as follows:—

- (i) R.N. base spares which include equipment for Admiralty type sets and embrace both R.N. and R.A.N. requirements. Particulars in regard to these spares are shown in Confidential Admiralty Fleet Orders, and the procedure to be followed in regard to demands therefor is set out in Confidential Commonwealth Navy Order 282 of 1944.
- (ii) Spares for U.S. Navy Type radar equipment. These items are held at U.S. Navy supply depots and requests for supply, when necessary, should be made to the appropriate U.S. Navy supply depots.
- (iii) Spares for Australian type equipments have been promulgated in Establishment List No. R.L.E.1, and distribution is being effected accordingly as supplies become available.

9. When new sets are required to be fitted in H.M.A. ships, the stores, including the first outfit of ship spares, will be supplied from one distributing centre, viz., Sydney. The sets to be supplied to various ships, and the order of priority for supply, are shown in the R.A.N. Priority List (R.A.P.) which is issued monthly to all Authorities concerned. This R.A.P. list is the only authority for supply of sets for first fitting in H.M.A. ships, and the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, will take action to supply in accordance therewith without reference to any other authority. Demands for complete sets should not be raised by any ship or establishment as demands for these sets will be raised by the Superintending Naval Store Officer. Supply will be a direct transaction between the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, and the ship concerned, but the packages containing the equipment will be consigned to the appropriate naval store officer or naval officer-in-charge for the ship concerned. The packages will be dealt with by store officers as "For Custody only," and where it is essential for delivery of a set to be taken by a base radar officer, he should sign for the packages on behalf of the ship. As receipts for the individual items are required to be furnished by the ship's supply officer to the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, close liaison between the radar officer and the ship's supply officer is necessary, and the latter officer is to satisfy himself that all the items have been correctly received.

10. It is to be particularly noted that supply will be made without demand by the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, only for sets required to be fitted in accordance with the R.A.P. List, and for the first supply to bases of base spares as shown in the list of base spares. After first fitting of a set, replenishment of spares as necessary should be demanded by ships from the appropriate naval store depot, or base naval store. Naval store officers, or supply officers required to hold base spares, should raise demands as necessary for replenishment of the first supply made without demand by the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney. Until stocks of base spares are built up to the authorized quantities, demands for *current* requirements will also require to be prepared by supply officers concerned.

REMISSION OF CUSTOMS DUTIES ON GOODS SENT OR BROUGHT TO AUSTRALIA BY NAVAL PERSONNEL.

8

In accordance with regulation 53 of the National Security (Supplementary) Regulations, customs duties are not chargeable on goods sent or brought to Australia by a member of the Naval Forces serving outside Australia, or a person ordinarily resident in Australia who is serving with the Naval Forces of the United Kingdom, or any gift sent to a member of the Naval Forces serving in Australia.

2. This concession has hitherto been applicable, with respect to any such person, to all goods not for sale or exchange and not exceeding in value ten pounds sterling in any period of twelve months.

3. Regulation 53 has now been amended by excluding from the concession the following goods:--

- (a) Goods being cigars, cigarettes, tobacco or spirituous liquors except in such quantities as the Comptroller-General of Customs considers to be reasonable to meet the immediate needs of the person to whom the goods are addressed or, if brought to Australia by a member of the Naval Forces in accordance with paragraph 1 above, to meet the immediate needs of that person.
- (b) Goods sent by means other than the post unless in special circumstances those other means are approved by the Comptroller-General of Customs.
- (c) Goods sent by any member of the Naval Forces in accordance with paragraph 1 above, the outside container of which does not bear the names of the sender and of his ship or base, unless, in any particular case, the Comptroller-General of Customs directs that it is unnecessary for those names to be borne on the outside container.

4. The quantities of cigars, cigarettes and tobacco which will be granted delivery free of duty in accordance with the provisions of the amended regulation to meet the immediate needs of the person to whom the goods are addressed or, if brought to Australia by a member of the Naval Forces to meet the immediate needs of that person, will be determined in each case in accordance with the attendant circumstances.

5. Commanding officers of ships and establishments outside Australia are requested to bring the revised regulations to the notice of personnel under their command and to take action wherever possible to ensure that they are observed.

RADAR CONTROL AND RADAR PLOT SCHEME-POLICY.

The following instructions supersede all previous instructions regarding the qualification, advancement and drafting of ratings employed on radar operating duties.

(a) Part I deals with interim substantive and non-substantive rates already established and with the transfer of these rates to the Seaman Branch.

(b) Part II deals with the new and permanent Radar Control and Radar Plot non-substantive ratings.

PART I-INTERIM RADAR CONTROL AND RADAR PLOT RATES.

2. All existing radar ratings at the date of issue of Navy Order 543 of 1944, viz.:-17th October, 1944, have been transferred to one of the following interim categories as from 15th May, 1944, or date of first qualifying if this were after 15th May, 1944.

This table shows only the rates to which ratings were actually transferred, that is, because there were no Petty Officers (Radar) qualified in seamanship, this category is not shown. Thus the table mentions only those categories which will actually be encountered.

(i) (a) The suffix (P) in columns 3 and 4 indicates a "provisional" non-substantive rate and that, although fully qualified in radar, ratings must qualify in plotting or gunnery before being confirmed in the new non-substantive rate. The additional instruction required for full qualification is to be given at the first opportunity.

(b) Any rating, who fails to qualify, will revert to the next lower non-substantive rate from the date of failure and may not be recommended for further course until twelve months after date of failure. This lower non-substantive rating may be "provisional" or "fully qualified" at the discretion of the "Authority to give rating." In the case of R.C.3 (P), who fail to qualify, the provisional rate may be retained or deprived on the recommendation of "Authority to give rating" to the Commodore Superintendent of Training.

(ii) (a) Ratings, whose names appeared on the roster for advancement to leading seaman (Radar) before 17th October, 1944, will be drafted by the Commodore Superintendent of Training to H.M.A. Radar Training Establishment for a qualifying course for R.P./R.C.2. On completion, results are to be forwarded to the Commodore Superintendent of Training who will make advancements for those who qualify to leading seaman (Radar) antedating seniority to the date of first recommendation.

(b) In addition, they will be granted the provisional non-substantive rate of R.C.(P) or R.P.(P) as from 15th May, 1944, if antedated before this date, or from the date of seniority as leading seaman (Radar) if anticipated date is after 15th May, 1944.

(c) The non-substantive rate R.P. or R.C. will be granted from the date of qualifying after an R.P.2 or R.C.2 course, if the rating has not passed professionally in seamanship. (d) If the rating has passed professionally, the non-substantive rate will be R.P.2

or R.C.2. (iii) The rates of pay for interim rates are shown in Table C.

(iv) Every endeavour should be made to qualify ratings in plotting and fire control for R.P.3 and R.C.3 respectively at sea. Plotting and fire control courses for higher non-substantive rates must be carried out at H.M.A. Radar Training Establishment and/or Flinders Naval Depot, as the case may be.

3. All ratings shown in columns 2 and 3 of Table A, who are medically and visually fit, are required to transfer to their equivalent seaman branch rating as soon as possible. Men, who have defective colour vision or who wear glasses, are eligible for transfer if their vision is not below Standard 3. Ratings in ships should be given every opportunity to qualify in seamanship.

4. All ratings are to be qualified professionally for their equivalent seaman rating and, as soon as qualified, transfers are to be authorized by Commanding Officers and reported on Form S.161. On transfer. the non-substantive rates as shown below are to be granted :---

(i) Transfers to Leading Seaman or Petty Officer will be made on an "acting" basis in the same manner as the remainder of the Seaman Branch except that, on confirmation, their seniority is to be antedated to their original seniority as Petty Officer (Radar) or Leading Seaman (Radar).

(ii) Ratings reverted during their acting time will be reverted to Petty Officer (Radar) R.P.(P), Leading Seaman (Radar), R.P. &c., previously held and their names reported to the Naval Board. If reverted after confirmation as Petty Officer or Leading Seaman, they will be reverted or disrated to the next lower substantive rate but are to retain their non-substantive rate provided reversion or disrating was not due to non-substantive inefficiency.

5. After final transfer to the Seaman Branch, all ratings will from then onwards be advanced in accordance with existing provisions for the Seaman Branch.

6. In no case is any rating to suffer a decrease in pay due to transfer to the new conditions of service.

7. Ordinary Seamen on transfer will only normally be entitled to an acting non-substantive rate but, in order that they should not suffer a consequent decrease in pay, they are to be paid 3d. per diem nonsubstantive pay continuously until rated Able Seaman.

PART II-RADAR CONTROL AND RADAR PLOT NON-SUBSTANTIVE RATES.

8. (a) The following non-substantive ratings were instituted on 15th May, 1944, and are open to Seaman ratings only:---

Radar Control Ratings-

1st class (R.C.1). 2nd class (R.C.2). 3rd class (R.C.3).

Radar Plot Ratings-

1st class (R.P.1). 2nd class (R.P.2). 3rd class (R.P.3).

(b) R.C.1 and R.C.2 are eligible for selection for Gunner's Mates under the conditions laid down in A.F.O. 627/42.

(c) R.P.1 and R.P.2 are eligible for selection for Plotting and Radar Instructor (P.R.I.) with a rate of pay of 2s. per diem. Further instructions will be issued, in due course, defining the precise duties of Plotting and Radar Instructor and the syllabus of the qualifying course.

9. For complement, qualifying service and pay purposes, the "provisional" rating during the interim period counts the same as for an equivalent fully qualified rating.

10. The standards of knowledge required, and duties, are shown in Table F of A.F.O. 5394/44. Rates of non-substantive pay and qualifications required are shown in Table D.

11. Recommendations for all R.C./R.P. courses should be forwarded to the Commodore Superintendent of Training on Form A.S.1303 with a copy to the Commanding Officer, H.M.A. Radar Training Establishment.

Navy Order 360 of 1944 is no longer applicable to Radio Mechanics (S), whose advancement is to be governed by the rules hereunder:-

Advancement.—(a) Leading radio mechanics (S) may be advanced to petty officer radio mechanic after serving a minimum time of one year's combined service as a leading radio mechanic, and leading wireless mechanic, provided that they—

- (i) are recommended by Commanding Officers as being suitable to hold a petty officer's rate;
- (ii) pass a practical technical examination conducted by a qualified signal officer, radar officer, commissioned or warrant telegraphist (or officer promoted therefrom) the passing percentage required being the same as that for a petty officer telegraphist.

(b) The standard of technical proficiency required is to be comparable to that laid down in A.F.O. 885/43 for W/T2 technical practical, for equipment installed in shore stations and light craft for which petty officer radio mechanics (S) may be responsible as base maintenance and fitting-out staff. (See paragraph 2.)

(c) Leading radio mechanics (S) who have already been advanced under the provisions of Navy Order 360 of 1944 are to re-qualify by passing the above examination—the date of confirmation being back dated to their original seniority as petty officer radio mechanic if successful.

ROYAL NAVY PERSONNEL IN AUSTRALIAN SERVICE HOSPITALS.

The following procedure is to be adopted in respect of Royal Navy and Royal Marine personnel who undergo treatment in Australian Service Hospitals.

2. All casualties which have been caused by enemy action should be reported to Vice-Admiral (Q), British Pacific Fleet, stating the nature of the injury and whether dangerous, serious or slight.

3. All seriously and dangerously ill cases, and deaths, should be reported to the Vice-Admiral (Q), British Pacific Fleet. The diagnosis, and a weekly statement of progress, should also be communicated in the case of seriously or dangerously ill personnel.

4. The Vice-Admiral (Q), British Pacific Fleet, should be notified when an officer is admitted to hospital together with the diagnosis and estimated time during which the officer will be unfit for duty. Discharges from hospital should be notified similarly and the disposal of the officer given.

5. On the discharge of patients from hospital, a resume of the case notes should be forwarded to the Vice-Admiral (Q) British Pacific Fleet.

2. The flags and pennants to be used in flag-hoist signalling are shown in plates 2-7 and 3-7 of Communication Instructions (DNC.5) and their detailed dimensions in U.S. standard sizes are given in the appendix to the Flag Book (H.O.89).

3. Flags common to British-U.S. usage are :--

(a) Blue Flag.

(b) Screen Flag (Pilot Jack).

(c) Black Pendant.

The U.S.-British Flag "BUS" should be retained on board.

4. H.M.A. Ships and Establishments are to forward demands to the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, for U.S. Flags necessary to complete to the above-mentioned allowances. Supply will be effected in the following order of priority as soon as stocks become available :---

- (1) Silo Signal Station, Fremantle.
- (2) H.M.A. Ships (including Auxiliary Vessels) in forward areas.
- (3) Port War Signal Stations.
- (4) War Signal Stations.
- (5) Signal Stations (other than (1)).
- (6) H.M.A. Naval Establishments.
- (7) H.M.A. Ships (including Auxiliary Vessels) other than (2)). (476/201/711.)

SIGNALS-INDICATIONS OF PRECEDENCE AND THEIR USE.

United States Indications of Precedence have been adopted in the South-West Pacific Area, in accordance with A.C.N.B. 270504 January. It is apparent that their correct usage is not widely understood.

2. The following remarks are intended as a guide to all concerned, but particularly to originators of signals. Full instructions are contained in D.N.C. 5 (Communication Instructions) Article 2012, 6263 (not yet held by all authorities).

(a) Operational or Administrative Traffic.

- (i) In wartime it is necessary to handle operational traffic ahead of all administrative traffic, regardless of the relative precedence assigned.
- (ii) This means that originators must decide in regard to every signal, whether it is Operational or Administrative. In most cases this decision presents no difficulty, but instances will arise where there is doubt where the line should be drawn. In such cases the general urgency of the message and its bearing, if any, on the successful prosecution of an operation should be borne in mind.

(iii) The Operating Signal QPE.

This Operating Signal, meaning "This is an Operational message", is provided to enable the division between Operational and Administrative traffic to be made by the originator, in such a form that it will be instantly noticeable to all who handle the traffic.

It is the responsibility of Originators to place QPE on message forms immediately after the precedence. All signals (except O and OP messages: see (b) (iii) below) which originators decide are Operational rather than Administrative, must therefore bear QPE.

The marking of signals "QPE" must not be left to the communication ratings, or other persons concerned with the handling of messages. The decision lies with the originator only. "QPE" forms a definite part of the *Precedence* of the message.

(b) Rules for the Order of Precedence.

- (i) All Operational traffic precedes Administrative traffic.
- (ii) The highest precedence allowed to Administrative traffic is *Priority*.
- (iii) It is therefore unnecessary to distinguish Operational traffic, of precedence enemy contact Urgent and Operational Priority, by the operating signal QPE, as Administrative traffic never bears these indications of precedence.

(c) Degrees of Precedence.

(i) There are therefore virtually nine degress of precedence. viz.:--

(ii) The effect of leaving QPE off a message is seen from the following example:—

An Operational message designated Priority should be 4th Precedence, but if QPE is omitted, it is automatically degraded to 7th Precedence.

(d) Message Handling.

All sections of the communication branch are to ensure that traffic is handled strictly in accordance with the above degrees of precedence.

MERCUROUS GREASE—NOT TO BE USED WITH BRASSES AND BRONZES.

Attention is directed to A.F.O. 4645/42 which refers to the prohibition of the use of greases containing mercury with any brass or bronze articles subject to stress, owing to the tendency of the mercury to develop season cracking in these materials.

2. The propeller nut of an A.M.S. vessel was recently found to be seriously cracked, and on investigation it was found that a mercurous grease had been used in the nut at the previous docking. 3. Ships' officers and base staffs are to ensure that the provisions of A.F.O. 4645/42 are strictly observed, and unless it is definitely known that mercurous grease was not applied at the previous docking, all (brass) propeller nuts are to be removed for examination on each occasion of docking. If traces of mercurous grease are found, the propeller should also be drawn for thorough cleaning and examination for any signs of cracking.

4. The mercurous grease can be readily identified by its bluish-grey colour and its characteristic smell.

SEASICKNESS TABLETS-ISSUE TO SERVICE AFLOAT.

It has been established that hyoscine is the most effective substance available as a seasickness remedy.

2. Given by the mouth in the form of hyoscine hydrobromide, gr. 1/100, as a prophylactic measure, it can be expected to reduce the incidence of seasickness by 50 per cent. without producing deleterious side effects or reducing fighting efficiency. It can be repeated in doses of gr. 1/200 at intervals of six hours for a maximum period of 48 hours.

3. As it reduces sweating, it should be used with caution where there is a danger of heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

4. The prophylactic dose of gr. 1/100 should be taken, if possible, one hour before rough weather is expected.

5. The drug will be issued in "oral" tablets containing gr. 1/200 of hyoscine hydrobromide. (Directions for use, vide paragraph 2.)

6. The tablets will be supplied to all ships affoat and will be issued on the directions of the medical officer except where no such officer is borne, when the tablets will be under the charge of and issued by the commanding officer, who is to ensure that the drug is stored under lock and key.

7. The tablets will be issued on the following scale to the service afloat only:--

8. All new units supplied should contain the requisite number of tablets, and medical and commanding officers of ships already carrying units of medical stores should demand supplies from the most convenient issuing medical store depot.

9. R.A.N. Medical Technical Instruction re Seasickness, already issued to Medical Officers, will be issued from Navy Office to the commanding officers of all small vessels not carrying a medical officer.

REPAYMENT CLOTHING FOR TENDERS.

In addition to the maintenance of an emergency stock of specified clothing as set out in (A) below, it is now approved that the immediate requirements of any tender for repayment articles of clothing, when available in a victualling store issuing ship, may be drawn on a cash basis in accordance with the procedure set out in (B) below.

(A) Maintenance of Emergency Stocks of Specified Items in Certain Tenders.

(i) For the remainder of the war period, destroyers, frigates, sloops and A.M.S. vessels, when operating in forward areas (including Northern Territory), may maintain, for emergency issue on repayment, a limited quantity of each of the following articles, in addition to soap and cap ribbons only which have hitherto been authorized:---

Boots, leather.	Stockings.
Brushes, tooth.	Shorts, khaki.
Caps, white duck.	Shirts, khaki.
Shoes, black leather.	Towels, white.
Singlets.	Cap covers, khaki.
Socks.	Suits, combination.

(ii) The maximum quantities to be maintained are not to exceed one month's estimated requirements of each article, and issues should be confined to occasions when individual requirements are not obtainable from the parent ship, or other H.M.A. ship or naval establishment where a supply officer is borne, or from a victualling store issuing ship. To guard against deterioration in small ships, however, all articles in store should, as a general rule, be issued within three or four months from date of receipt.

- (iii) Commanding officers concerned are to ensure that such stores are placed in a suitable secure stowage space. They will be directly responsible for the safe custody of, and satisfactory accounting for, such stores (vide K.R. & A.I., Article 1853A) and that, where applicable, the general procedure specified in C.O.R., Article 481, is observed. In this regard, Form A.S.1048 is to be used as a credit voucher in Form A.S.462 (Parts II and III) thereby dispensing with Form A.S.107. As far as is possible, issues should be restricted to urgent requirements and then only in the circumstances stated in paragraph (ii) above. Cash takings for sales recorded in Form A.S.1048 are to be paid by commanding officers at the first opportunity to the supply officer of any H.M.A. ship or establishment, the official receipt obtained being affixed to the credit voucher (Form A.S.1048). The cash taken for sales of clothing is not to be left in the custody of the supply rating after an issue has taken place. It is to be handed over on the same day to an officer for custody. and should be checked by an officer with Form A.S.1048 to ensure that the correct charge is made for each item and that the gross total is correct. The form should be signed by the supply rating making the issue and by the officer receiving the cash.
- (iv) Stocks of repayment clothing are to be checked at least once a month, and a monthly certificate of stocktaking is to be signed by the commanding officer, or officer delegated by him for victualling duties, and attached to Form A.S.462 (Parts II and III) for subsequent rendition to Navy Office. In this connection, opportunity is to be taken by parent ships for stocktaking to be carried out in accordance with paragraph 3 of Navy Order 373 of 1941.
- (v) The necessary forms should be obtained by demand in the usual manner, or in an emergency from the supply officer of a ship or establishment. Additional copies of the clothing price list are, if required, to be obtained from the Director of Victualling, Navy Office.
- (vi) When a demand is made on a victualling store issuing shin for articles of clothing to create or complete the approved emergency stock in a tender, supply and receipt notes are to be passed in the normal manner, no cash being collected for such transactions.

(B) Requirements of Repayment Clothing of Tenders when available from a Victualling Store Issuing Ship.

- (i) The normal clothing requirements for immediate use by personnel of any tender (including those holding an emergency stock of repayment articles), when available from a victualling store issuing ship, are to be issued separately for cash only, the following detailed procedure being observed :—
 - (1) The tender concerned is to prepare a nominal list, in duplicate, showing the specific articles required by each person, sizes and fittings being indicated as necessary.

- (2) The nominal list is to be approved by the commanding officer, if he is satisfied that supply is necessary, and forwarded, in duplicate and by hand, to the deputy victualling store officer of the victualling store issuing ship concerned together with the total cash involved.
- (3) Supply of such repayment requirements available is then to be effected in bulk for issue to individuals in the tender, and the cash received brought to account in the issuing ship. The original nominal list approved by the commanding officer is to be attached to the official receipt as a supporting voucher to the victualling store issuing ship's cash account and the official receipt number noted on both copies of the nominal list. The duplicate copy is to be returned to the commanding officer for his information and transmission by first available post direct to the Director of Victualling, Navy Office.
- (4) Any articles not available for issue are to be deleted from both copies of the ship's nominal list, and cash concerned returned to the tender.

2. In regard to (A) and (B) above, it will be seen that it is intended, when any tender contacts a victualling store issuing ship in forward areas, that the normal clothing requirements of the ship's company shall be drawn, whenever possible, from the issuing ship and for cash only. At the same time, however, any authorized emergency stock maintained on board should, if necessary, be replenished to the approved quantity by normal supply and receipt notes in accordance with (A) above, no cash collections being effected.

3. The procedure set out in (A) and (B) above is not intended to restrict in any manner the normal procedure by which tenders now obtain, as opportunity offers, their requirements of repayment clothing from H.M.A. ships or establishments which they may contact from time to time.

4. Navy Orders 664 of 1943 and 492 of 1944 are cancelled.

MOTOR VEHICLE REAR VISION MIRRORS.

Instances have occurred recently where accidents in which naval motor vehicles were involved were primarily due to the non-effectiveness of the rear vision mirror. In each instance, the mirror was mounted on the inside of the windscreen and the driver's view was obscured by an obstruction on the rear portion of the vehicle.

2. With a view to avoiding such accidents in future, all motor trucks which normally carry high loads and vehicles fitted with gas producers or other fittings liable to obscure the driver's view in internally fitted rear vision mirrors are to be provided with an additional external mirror providing a clear view under all conditions.

3. Particulars of vehicles in which an additional mirror is fitted in accordance with this Order should be forwarded to Navy Office in order that vehicle fixture lists may be amended as necessary.

STORES RATING (A.S.).

It has been decided, as a temporary war measure, to adopt the rating of <u>Stores</u> Rating (A.S.) to meet requirements in the various Armament Stores and Armament Store Issuing Ships.

2. Rating will be open only to personnel serving under R.A.N.R., or R.A.N.V.R., engagements.

3. (a) Stores ratings R.A.N.R. and other R.A.N.R. or R.A.N.V.R. personnel will be allowed to transfer to the new rating subject to recommendation and vacancies existing, retaining their present relative rate.

(b) Transfer is not open to men holding non-substantive ratings other than those unfit for general service and is in all cases subject to manning requirements.

4. As the positions to be filled are mainly in northern bases, ratings must be medically fit for tropical service.

5. Direct entries from shore will be in the rating of Stores Probationer (A.S.).

6. Advancement.

Stores Probationer (A.S.) to Stores Assistant (A.S.).

Probationary time to be a minimum period of three months including four weeks' training at Spectacle Island. Advancements to be made on completion of probationary period.

Stores Assistant (A.S.) to Leading Stores Assistant (A.S.).

- (a) Authority to give rating—Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.
- (b) Nine months' service as <u>Stores</u> Assistant (A.S.) not including probationary time.
- (c) Certificate of proficiency in A.S. duties.
- (d) Recommended on Form A.S. 507.

Leading Stores Assistant (A.S.) to Stores Petty Officer (A.S.).

- (a) Authority to give rating-Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.
- (b) Twelve months' actual service as Leading Stores Assistant (A.S.).
- (c) Certificate of proficiency in A.S. duties.
- (d) Recommended on Form A.S. 507.All advancements to be on a temporary basis.

7. Rates of pay to be those as laid down in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions for Supply (or Stores) Branch.

8. Applications for transfer are to be dealt with in accordance with Navy Order 251 of 1943, including recommendation, stating time served in Armament Store duties.

9. Time served actually performing the duties in Armament Store prior to transfer to Supply or Stores Assistant (A.S.) may be counted as service as Stores Assistant (A.S.) for advancement purposes. In exceptional cases, ratings who possess special qualifications but who do not comply with the conditions of paragraph 6 above may, subject to Naval Board approval, be advanced to Leading Stores Assistant. (A.S.) and/or Stores Petty Officer (A.S.).

10. In the event of a rating's being transferred from Armament Store duties, he is to be automatically reverted to the rating held immediately prior to transfer to Supply or Stores Assistant (A.S.); direct entries from shore are to be reverted to Stores Assistant.

SUPPLY OF SPECTACLES-GENERAL CONDITIONS.

The following conditions relating to the supply of spectacles at Service expense are consolidated from various previous instructions and are to be adhered to in all cases.

2. (a) Reading Spectacles-

Glasses for reading may be supplied at the public expense to ratings of all branches irrespective of the age of the ratings, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

(b) Spectacles for Constant Wear-

Ratings (including W.R.A.N.S.) with the exception of those shown below (vide (b) (i)) are permitted to wear spectacles constantly and may be supplied with them at the public expense, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

(i) The following ratings are not permitted spectacles for constant wear:---

> Seaman ratings for general service (vide (b) (ii)). Signal ratings for general service. Stokers and leading stokers. W.R.A.N. visual signallers.

 (ii) Seaman ratings on shore duties only and in immobile gate vessels (boom defence) may wear glasses constantly and be supplied at the public expense, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

The following seaman ratings:-Q.O. (in Cruisers and above), Radar, S.D., S.T.-may wear glasses at their specialist work, and be supplied at public expense, when recommended by an ophthalmic specialist.

3. Officers of the Naval Forces (including the Women's Services of the R.A.N.), and members of the Auxiliary Services other than the Shore Wireless Service, are *not* entitled to the supply of spectacles at public expense unless spectacles are lost or damaged as a result of a casualty of the Service. The prescription for spectacles may, however, be loaned to these members in order that purchase may be arranged privately.

4. Approval for supply of spectacles is in each case to be obtained on Form A.M. 250z subject to supply being recommended by an ophthalmic specialist who should indicate whether the spectacles are required for near or distant vision. As a wartime measure, authority has been delegated to Naval Officers-in-Charge in each State of the Commonwealth for the grant or refusal of spectacles where the proposed supply is in accordance with the conditions contained hereunder. Form A.M. 250z is to be prepared in each case asd submitted to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, who, if the supply is in order, will approve and sign the form in lieu of the Director of Naval Medical Services. At the end of each month, the forms A.M. 250z for those spectacles supplied during the month are to be forwarded to the Director of Naval Medical Services.

5. The supply of spectacles at Service expense is to be arranged through the qualified opticians under contract with the Department, and in accordance with the terms of the contract unless unnecessary delay would occur in adopting this procedure. In such instances, the commanding officer is to make satisfactory local arrangements for supply by a qualified optician and is to satisfy himself that the price is reasonable, having due regard to the prices obtaining in the district where the purchase is made. 6. Seaman ratings with sea experience who are found to be below the proper visual standard should not be relegated to shore service if this can be avoided. As an alternative, application should be made for their employment or transfer as follows, in the order given:—

- (a) Qualification as an S.D. Operator, S.T., for service in cruisers, and above. Q.O., Radar, or for training as an electrical, engine room, ordnance artificer or motor mechanic. These ratings, with the exception of S.D. Operators, are permitted the constant wearing of spectacles on duty. S.D. ratings may wear spectacles on duty only when in cabinets.
- (b) Transfer as seaman to boom defence service, i.e., for draft to immobile gate vessels and shore service only.
- (c) Transfer for further sea service to any other branch in which the constant wearing of spectacles is permitted.

It is the intention that each case should be judged on its merits. Transfer to the Supply Branch should be avoided unless for some reason in a limited number of cases the men concerned are particularly suitable for such a transfer. It should be noted that the spectacles supplied under this paragraph should correct to at least 6/6 6/9.

7. Experienced ratings, whose vision has been found to be below that required for their particular rating, but is corrigible to normal with the aid of glasses, and who, in the opinion of the Board of Survey, are capable of carrying out any of the duties mentioned in paragraph 6 (α) of this Order or of being transferred to any other branch, are to be placed in Category "B" for drafting purposes and not in Category "E." A notation of his defect is to be placed in each rating's Medical History Documents.

8. In all cases where any doubt exists as to a member's eligibility for spectacles at Service expense, the matter is to be fully reported to the Director of Naval Medical Services and his approval obtained before any action is taken to arrange supply.

KEROSENE COOKING STOVES IN SMALL CRAFT.

An accident has occurred aboard a small craft fitted with a kerosene cooking stove, resulting in a rating's receiving severe burns, which later proved fatal.

2. The burner of the stove had been heated by means of the priming cup in readiness for starting up, but the flame in the primer had died clown before the burner was sufficiently hot to vaporize the kerosene. The operator attempted to reprime the cup by pouring the methylated spirit from an old quart grease tin which was used as a container for the priming fuel. The container exploded and the rating received very severe burns, which later caused his death. 173-175

3. Too much stress cannot be laid upon the necessity for exercising every care in connexion with the operation of kerosene stoves.

- 4. The following instructions are to be observed :--
 - (a) The bulk supply of methylated spirit, used for priming, is not to be kept in the galley.
 - (b) Only sufficient fuel for one priming is to be taken into the galley, in a suitable small container, and, before attempting to reprime, the operator is to satisfy himself that no trace of flame or smouldering carbon remains around the burner.
 - (c) The burner is not to be used if the flame produced is not of a clear blue colour.
 - (d) Connexions between the fuel tank and burners are never to be uncoupled without first releasing the air pressure from the fuel tank.
 - (e) Cooking utensils and stoves are to be kept scrupulously clean, and the spilling of fat is to be avoided.

5. Commanding Officers are to warn crews of the dangers associated with the use of kerosene cooking stoves, and are to ensure that vigilance is exercised at all times in connexion with their use.

GENERAL MESSING IN SMALL SHIPS—SUPPLY OF STAINLESS STEEL TRAYS.

With reference to paragraph 3 of Navy Order 626 of 1944, owing to the urgency of obtaining adequate initial supplies of stainless steel food trays to meet the immediate requirements of H.M.A. Ships in which general messing with the cafeteria method of food service is being installed, it has been necessary to accept first deliveries of those trays in an unpolished condition. 2. Such trays, when received from a victualling yard or depot, can be suitably polished on board and a satisfactory finish is obtainable by the use of a fine emery cloth.

3. The more appetising appearance of food on polished trays renders it most desirable that polishing should be effected on board before, or as soon as possible after they are brought into use and it is intended that action be taken accordingly by each ship concerned, when practicable.

4. Subsequent deliveries of these trays will be made from properly polished sheet metal which will render unnecessary any polishing after receipt on board. Previous supplies of unpolished trays will then be replaced as opportunity offers.

DELEGATION OF POWERS AND ORDER MADE UNDER NATIONAL SECURITY REGULATIONS.

The following are promulgated for information :--

(Commonwealth Gazette, No. 84, dated 26th April, 1945.)

National Security Act 1939-1943.

(a) DELEGATION OF POWERS BY MINISTER.

Whereas by section 17 of the National Security Act 1939-1943 it is provided that any Minister of State may in relation to any matters or class of matters, or in relation to any particular State or part of Australia, by writing under his hand, delegate all or any of his powers and functions under the Regulations (except this power of delegation) so that the delegated powers or functions may be exercised by the delegate with respect to the matters or class of matters, or the State or part of Australia, specified in the instrument of delegation:

Now therefore I, Donald Cameron, the Postmaster-General, for and on behalf of the Minister of State for the Army, do hereby delegate to every officer who shall at any time during the continuance of this delegation be holding the office or performing the duties of the office of Chief of the Naval Staff, the powers and functions conferred upon the Minister by Regulations 54 and 55 of the National Security (General) Regulations insofar as the exercise of such powers and functions is necessary for Naval purposes.

NATIONAL SECURITY (GENERAL) REGULATIONS.

(b) ORDER UNDER REGULATION 55.

Whereas by Regulation 55 of the National Security (General) Regulations, it is provided that the Minister of State for the Army may by order authorize, subject to any restrictions and conditions imposed by the order, the use of any land specified therein for naval, military, or air force purposes, during the period specified in the order; and any such order may, so far as appears to that Minister to be necessary or expedient for the purposes thereof, provide—

- (a) for entitling persons using any land in pursuance of the order to do such acts in relation to the land as are specified in the order; and
- (b) for prohibiting or restricting the exercise of rights of way over that land, and of other rights relating thereto, which are enjoyed by any person, whether by virtue of an interest in that land or otherwise:

And whereas by Instrument of Delegation dated the thirteenth day of April, 1945, made in pursuance of section 17 of the *National Security Act* 1939-1943, the Postmaster-General for and on behalf of the Minister of State for the Army delegated to me the powers conferred on the Minister by Regulation 55 of the National Security (General) Regulations:

Now therefore I, Guy Charles Cecil Royle, acting in pursuance of the said Regulation and Instrument of Delegation do hereby order as follows:—

1. I hereby authorize the use of the land described in the Schedule to this Order as a bombardment range for practice firings by warships, during the period commencing on the thirtieth day of April, 1945, and ending on the day on which this Order shall be withdrawn.

2. During the period specified in the preceding paragraph, no person shall enter or be on the said land.

SCHEDULE.

All that area of land (including land covered with water) in and adjacent to Jervis Bay, in the State of New South Wales, situated between 150 deg. 48 min. 10 sec. and 150 deg. 52 min. 04 sec. E. Long., and 35 deg. 01 min. 48 sec. and 35 deg. 04 min. 12 sec. S. Lat.

POST-WAR EMPLOYMENT.--DISCLOSURE OF TOP SECRET, SECRET OR CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION ABOUT EQUIPMENT, ETC., TO CIVILIAN FIRMS.

A.F.O. 6687/1944—Post-War Employment—Disclosure of Top Secret, Secret or Confidential Information about Equipment, &c., to Civilian Firms—is reprinted hereunder. The principles set out therein are to be observed by personnel of the Royal Australian Navy.

2. Australian personnel are, however, subject to the restrictions imposed by the *Crimes Act* 1914-1941 and not to the *Official Secrets Acts* 1911-1939.

3. In regard to paragraph 3 of the A.F.O., cases of exceptional difficulty should be referred to the Naval Board for instructions.

"Their Lordships' attention has recently been drawn to the fact that certain civilian firms, in considering the post-war employment of such of their personnel as are at present serving in H.M. Forces, have sent out a form of questionnaire in which these personnel are requested to give details of the type of work on which they have been engaged during their period of service in H.M. Forces. Before answering questions of this nature, it is important that personnel should remember their obligations with regard to the disclosure of information acquired by them during their period of service in H.M. Forces.

2. All officers and ratings, including members of the W.R.N.S., who in the course of their duties have had access to Top Secret. Secret or Confidential equipment of any kind whatsoever, whether during the development, manufacture, trial or completed stage, are reminded that they are bound by the Official Secrets Acts 1911-1939, and that information concerning such equipment which they may have acquired during their service in the Navy or to which they may have had access as a result of that service, must not be published or communicated either directly or indirectly to another person in any form, except in the course of official duties. It is also pointed out that Naval personnel are subject to the restrictions imposed by the Official Secrets Acts both while serving and after they have left the Service, and that any infringement of these Acts renders them liable to serious penalties.

3. Personnel are therefore warned that they should exercise great discretion in filling in any questionnaires such as are referred to in paragraph 1 of this Order. In cases where there is any doubt whether information which it is desired to give is permissible, the advice of their Commanding Officer should be sought, who will if necessary refer the matter to the appropriate superior authority. In cases of exceptional difficulty, the matter should be referred to the Admiralty for instructions.".

PUBLICITY-ASSISTANCE FOR WAR CORRESPONDENTS.

To assist in obtaining publicity of a desirable type for the work of the Royal Australian Navy, the Commanding Officer of each H.M.A. Cruiser, L.S. (I), Destroyer and Frigate, is to detail an officer whose special duty it will be (in addition to his normal duties)—

- (a) to extend guidance and assistance to any War Correspondents and/or Photographers who may be authorized to visit the ship;
- (b) to assist, if necessary, in arranging despatch of their stories or photographs to the nearest censorship authority for release; and
- (c) to furnish to the Director of Naval Intelligence, Navy Office, Melbourne, or to the nearest officer of the R.A.N. Naval Information Section, any material of Naval publicity interest which may arise.

2. Similarly, an officer is to be detailed in each H.M.A. Naval Shore Establishment where no Staff Officer (Intelligence), or Naval Intelligence Officer is borne; but, where an officer is appointed for intelligence duties, the duties set out in paragraph 1 above are to be allocated to him.

3. The names of the officers selected for these duties are to be reported to the Naval Board as soon as possible.

VICTUALLING STORE ISSUING SHIP "MERKUR"-RESPONSI-BILITY AS BETWEEN THE MASTER AND THE DEPUTY VICTUALLING STORE OFFICER IN RELATION TO STORES MAINTAINED FOR ISSUE.

The Deputy Victualling Store Officer in the Victualling Store Issuing Ship *Merkur* is responsible for the safe custody and preservation of all naval and victualling stores maintained on board for issue to H.M.A. Ships and other approved services, also for all arrangements in connexion with the procurement of such stores and their receipt and issue, or other disposal, in accordance with standing instructions issued by the Director of Victualling. 2. The master is responsible for all matters relating to the navigation and safety of the ship, for the safe and proper stowage of the cargo, and for the control of the crew and any D.E.M.S. ratings on board. He is also responsible for maintaining in efficient working condition all cargo handling gear and appliances, for the loading and discharge of stores as may be required by the Deputy Victualling Store Officer and for all work incidental thereto, such as handling of beams and hatches, size and make up of cargo slings, &c.

3. Signals and other correspondence for *Merkur* should be addressed as follows:—

Deputy Victualling Store Officer-

All matters in connexion with Service stores maintained for issue, the Naval supply staff borne, and general questions concerning the employment of the ship in so far as they affect storing and supply arrangements. The Deputy Victualling Store Officer will keep the master fully informed, as necessary, concerning such matters. Master—

All matters concerning the sailing, navigation and safety of the ship; responsibility for the ship's crew and D.E.M.S. ratings, and for the care and maintenance of ship's stores. The master will keep the Deputy Victualling Store Officer fully informed of the ship's projected movements.

 - (b, A receipt should be furnished by the Supply Officer (Naval Stores), on the triplicate copy of the Form A.S. 331 for the items returned to the base naval store.
 - (c) The stores should be surveyed by a board of officers, comprising the Supply Officer (Naval Stores), and the Technical Officer, i.e., Engineer Officer, Shipwright Officer, &c.,

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of the base, who should furnish their recommendations as to the disposal on the original and duplicate copies of the survey voucher, Form A.S. 331. The recommendations of the surveying officers are to be approved by the Naval Officer-in-Charge before action to implement such recommendations is taken.

(d) The approved disposal of stores will generally come under one of the following categories and the action to be taken in respect of each is as follows:---

(i) Stores to be repaired locally.—Such items are to be taken on charge in the base naval store account for serviceable naval stores and also in the account of repairable stores direct from the duplicate copy of the survey voucher A.S. 331. When issued for repair, a receipt is to be obtained from the Head of the Department concerned on Form A.S. 549, and on return to the naval store after repair, a receipt is to be furnished on another Form A.S. 549, the relevant columns of the account of repairable stores being completed as requisite.

A pro forma of the account of repairable stores which should be kept by the Supply Officer (Naval Stores), is appended.

In this connexion, it will be observed that on receipt of repairable stores, the items will be entered in the serviceable stores ledger, and until the item has been again made serviceable it will be necessary to refer to the account of repairable stores to ascertain whether any of the serviceable stores stock is out for repair. When the item has been received from repair, the appropriate columns of the account of repairable stores should be completed, but no entry in the serviceable stores ledger will be necessary, the item having been entered therein when received in a repairable condition.

(ii) Return to Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney.—Such items should be taken on charge from the report of survey, Form A.S. 331, in a special ledger on Forms A.S. 151. The items should be returned to the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney, for survey, an application for survey being raised as necessary by the Supply Officer (Naval Stores), and the special ledger credited in due course from the receipted (triplicate) copy of the survey voucher Form A.S. 331.

(iii) Not Repairable—Bring to Arisings.—Such items are to be brought to arisings in cases where the latter can be utilized and the appropriate certificates as to arising: produced, i.e., copper old, steel old, &c., completed by the Supply Officer (Naval Stores), on the reverse side of the original and duplicate copies of Form A.S. 331. The arisings are to be taken on charge in an arisings ledger direct from the duplicate copy of the survey voucher, Form A.S. 331.

(iv) Not Repairable—No further Service Use, &c.—In such cases, the items should be transferred to the Army Salvage Organization. A receipt should be obtained from

the Army representative on Form A.S. 549, one copy of which should be attached to the original and duplicate copies of the survey voucher A.S. 331. The registered number of the A.S. 549 should be inserted on the Form A.S. 331 and a cross reference also made on the Forms A.S. 549.

(v) Useless, no value, and not acceptable to the Army Salvage Organization.—Such items are to be destroyed in the presence of a responsible officer who is to complete and sign the certificate of destruction on the back of the original and duplicate copies of the survey voucher Form A.S. 331. In all cases where destruction of naval stores has been approved, the local auditor is to be informed, by memorandum, of the items to be destroyed, at least seven days before the date on which it is proposed to destroy the stores, in order that his representative may witness the destruction if desired.

(vi) Items surveyed under categories (d)—(iii), (iv) and (v) above, should be carefully reviewed before approval to the recommendations of the board of survey is given on Forms A.S. 331 and covering Naval Board approval is to be obtained in respect of the disposal of these items.

Note.—Some use for practically all unserviceable items irrespective of condition can be found by the salvage organization and, before an item is destroyed, it should be established that it is not acceptable to the salvage depot. As a general rule, destruction should be limited to items in respect of which such disposal is essential, e.g., where immediate action is necessary to avoid fire risk, infected articles, &c.

(e) Duplicate copies of Forms A.S.331 and vouchers A.S. 549 for the above-mentioned transactions should be bundled in the usual manner as supporting vouchers to the base naval store accounts. The original Forms A.S. 331, together with copies of Forms A.S. 549 as appropriate should be forwarded to the Director of Naval Stores monthly under cover of Return A.D. 74/74A.

BOILER WATER—HYDROMETER, SENSITIVE, GLASS—PATTERN 37_{Δ} .

Supplies of hydrometers, sensitive, glass, pattern 37A, have recently been received from overseas graduated from S.G. 1,000 to S.G. 1,005 with twenty intermediate divisions, and some confusion has been caused thereby.

2. In these hydrometers, the S.G. 1,000 mark corresponds with the usual 0° graduation at 100°F. and S.G. 1,005 with the customary 2° density mark. Each of the twenty divisions on the hydrometer marked in terms of specific gravity corresponds with the tenths of a degree marks on the usual type of instrument.

3. Engineer Officers are to ensure that Engine Room personnel understand that boiler water densities can be read directly in tenths of a degree from either instrument.

4. In connexion with boiler water densities, it is important that they should always be taken with the water at a temperature of 100°F. and correctly reported. The careless use of the words "one" or "two," &c., when "point one" or "point two" is intended leads to misunderstanding and confusion as to the actual meaning of hydrometer readings.







EXTRA ISSUES-FRUIT AND TOMATO JUICES.

With reference to C.O.R. Articles 423 and 424 concerning extra issues of provisions in H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments, approval is given to a daily issue of fruit juice or tomato juice, as provided in paragraphs 3 and 4 below, when Naval personnel are serving on shore or afloat North of 20 degrees South latitude.

2. These juices are to be issued in addition to the ordinary lime juice ration, which it is intended shall be continued as a general daily issue in the tropics as hitherto, the time of issue of the additional daily beverage being so arranged as not to conflict with the normal lime juice issue.

3. The approved daily issue of these juices is to be one of the following:---

The remarks column in the foregoing scale has been inserted for general guidance as to the method of issue, and may be departed from as desired.

4. Stocks of these juices are to be maintained in approximately equal quantities to enable the daily issue of each juice to be made in rotation, it being intended that for reasons of health all personnel should regularly partake of the approved daily issue in order to reduce, as far as is practicable, the deficiency of vitamin C content in the current daily diet in advanced areas under existing conditions.

5. Stocks of orange and grapefruit juice are not yet available at Royal Edward Victualling Yard, Sydney, and the several Victualling Depots. When supplies are received in due course, this juice will be substituted, on exhaustion of present stocks, for pineapple juice owing to the latter's low vitamin C content. Pending the issue of a further Navy Order on the subject, orange and grapefruit juice should not, therefore, be demanded.

TEMPORARY COMMISSIONS IN THE SPECIAL BRANCH R.A.N.V.R.-SELECTION OF RATINGS FROM THE LOWER DECK.

The Naval Board have decided that Royal Australian Naval Reserve and Royal Australian Naval Volunteer Reserve ratings and those ratings entered since the commencement of hostilities under "hostilities only" engagements, of all branches, may be considered for promotion to commissioned ranks in the Special Branch, Royal Australian Navai Volunteer Reserve. 2. Officers of the Special Branch may be employed on the following duties:-

Executive-Special. Operations. Intelligence. Armament Store Accounting. Sea Transport. Naval Control Service. Rail Transport. Mercantile Movements. A/S Fixed Defences. Controlled Mining. R.M.S. and B.S. C.B's. D.E.M.S. (Gunnery duties). Boom Defence Service. Radar. Meteorological.

Other categories may be added as the necessity arises. Cypher officers are excluded from the above, promotion for this purpose being open to coders only. Vide Navy Order 582 of 1943.

3. Forms C.W.1 should be commenced for ratings considered suitable for promotion to commissioned rank for any of the foregoing duties. On commencement of Forms C.W.1, Forms C.W.1A should immediately be prepared and copies of these forms forwarded to the Secretary, Naval Board, and to the Commodore Superintendent-of-Training, Flinders Naval Depot. The original Forms C.W.1 and C.W.1A should be retained, and should follow the rating concerned when drafted to a new ship or establishment.

4. Medical Standard.—Candidates must be free from any gross physical defect and must not suffer from any condition that is likely to become aggravated by duty, or render them incapable of carrying out their duties efficiently. Varicocele or varicose veins are not a cause of rejection unless very marked.

5. Visual Standard.—The visual standard is as laid down in A.F.O. 2474/43 with the following modification.

Colour vision below Grade III can be accepted in respect of candidates recommended for employment on the following duties:---

Executive duties on shore.

A/S Fixed Defences.

Controlled Mining.

Special Branch Officers for employment on the following duties must have colour vision of at least Grade III :--

Radar.

Meteorological.

6. Executive—Special.—The following are the conditions to be complied with by authorities when commencing Forms C.W.1 recommending ratings for this category of the Special Branch R.A.N.V.R.:—

- (a) Ratings between the ages of 19½ years and 30 years will be eligible for consideration if below the medical standard required for the Executive Branch.
- (b) Ratings of 30 years of age or over are eligible regardless of medical category.

When recommending ratings for this Branch, authorities should bear in mind that there is no shortage of officers for this type of executive duty on shore, and consequently this category will be reserved for those cases in which it is considered to be of advantage to the Service to promote a rating who would otherwise be ineligible for commissioned rank.

7. Radar.-Upon receipt by the Naval Board of duplicate copies of C.W. Forms, they will eventually be forwarded to the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Watson, who will investigate the rating's technical qualifications. If satisfied that the rating concerned is technically qualified, the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Watson, will then pass that information to the Commodore Superintendent-of-Training who, when vacancies occur, will arrange for the rating concerned to be drafted to Flinders Naval Depot to undergo a Special Branch course and for final decision as to whether selected to fill those vacancies existing for Radar Officers.

8. Ratings recommended for promotion in terms of this Order should have attained the minimum age of 191 years, and, where vacancies exist, these ratings will be drafted to Flinders Naval Depot after preliminary selection by the Commodore Superintendent-of-Training, who will then arrange for a disciplinary course, together with any other course considered necessary, before final selection and promotion is effected.

CINEMA BRANCH-ADOPTION IN THE R.A.N.

A new branch to be known as the Cinema Branch is being introduced in the R.A.N. as a wartime measure. Ratings will be known as "cinema operator" (with the equivalent status of able seaman) and the usual higher ratings. Training will be arranged by the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.

2

2. Duties and Employment.—The cinema branch will embrace all types of work connected with instructional training films, e.g.:—

- (a) Operation of all cinema projectors including dome A.A. teachers, laying and training teachers, &c., also running repairs and routine maintenance.
- (b) General repairs and overhaul by specially trained maintenance parties under command of cinema maintenance officers.
- (c) Training of cinema operators.
- (d) Work on production of films, if and when this phase of cinema work is undertaken in the R.A.N.

3. Recruitment and Transfer.—As stated in Navy Circ. 645I of 8th September, 1944, selected ratings, on satisfactory completion of training course, will be transferred to cinema operator or the equivalent to their present ratings in that Branch. Ratings of all branches other than artificer, artisan and mechanic, with satisfactory ability and general good conduct will be eligible for tranfer to the new branch. Transfers will be subject to manning requirements and will be effected only on the approval of the Naval Board. It is not intended at this stage to make provision for direct entry from shore in the cinema branch.

4. Training and Advancement.—Ratings selected for transfer to the cinema branch will undergo an initial course of thirteen weeks' duration at Finders Naval Depot, on successful completion of which transfer will be effected as provided in paragraph 3 above.

Advancement to leading rates and above will be authorized by the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, and will be contingent on receipt of recommendation for advancement on Form A.S. 507, vacancies in fleet numbers and subject to compliance with the following conditions:—

- (i) To Leading Cinema Operator.
 - (a) Six months' service as cinema operator and/or wireman C/P.
 - (b) Passed professionally for leading cinema operator after course of eleven weeks' duration at Flinders Naval Depot.
 - (c) Conduct V.G. during preceding six months.
 - (d) To be rated acting leading cinema operator. Confirmation as leading cinema operator will follow on completion of twelve months' satisfactory service.

COVERS BREECH RIFLE No. 2.

Covers, breech, rifle, No. 2, have been introduced into the Royal Australian Navy for protecting, against sand and mud, the actions of 0.303-in. rifles (other than rifles, M.L.E., line thrower, and rifles, No. 1, strengthened for firing grenades). Supplies are available for issue on the following scale:-

- (a) H.M.A. Ships with an allowance of twelve or more 0.303-in. rifles-one to every two rifles.
- (b) R.A.N. Beach Commando Units-30 per commando.
- (c) Darwin. Thursday Island, and bases in New Guinea-one per rifle.

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2. In addition to the allowances shown in paragraph 1, spare covers will also be supplied on the following basis:--

50 per cent. of the covers allowed for R.A.N. Beach Commando Units referred to in paragraph 1 (b) above.



AMERICAN 40 mm. AMMUNITION CLIP MARK 3—DEFECTS IN MANUFACTURE—STOPPAGES.

Reports have been received that American 40 mm. ammunition clips Mark 3, in which the saddle extended an excessive amount beyond the reinforcement, have caused jamming in the loaders of 40 mm. machine gun mechanisms.

2. To prevent gun stoppages caused by defective clips, clips Mark 3 are to be examined, and whenever the overhang of the saddle exceeds 1/16 in., the excess metal should be removed by filing or grinding. (*Vide* diagram appended to this Order.)

MEDICAL AND DENTAL STORES-SUPPLY OF, IN NEW GUINEA AREA

Demands from ships and depots in New Guinea area are to be made on Naval Medical Store, Madang, and not on the Medical and Dentai Store Officer, Sydney, or U.S.A. sources. Until such time as dental stores are held at the Medical Store, Madang, demand for these is to be made on the Medical and Dental Store Officer, Sydney.

2. In cases of extreme emergency when stores cannot be obtained from R.A.N. sources, a small demand to meet the particular case only may be made on the Australian Army or R.A.A.F. store in the area.

In forward operational areas where medical and dental stores from Australian sources are not available, they may be obtained from Australian Army, R.A.A.F. or R.N. stores or Allied sources provided (a) the need is urgent, and (b) they (or stores of a similar nature) are not available from Australian sources, e.g., American type syrettes are not to be demanded when the Australian type is available.

SUPPLY OF OFFICERS' UNIFORMS, INCLUDING W.R.A.N.S. OFFICERS AND R.A.N. NURSES.

The prices for the supply, by the Commonwealth Government Clothing Factory and the outfitters operating under an agreement with the Department, of officers' uniforms, including uniforms for W.R.A.N.S. officers and R.A.N. nurses, have been increased as shown in the schedule to this Order.

2. With the exception of greatcoats and shoulder straps, detachable, for R.A.N. and R.A.N.R. (S) Officers, it will be seen that separate prices are shown for hand-sewing and machine-sewing of lace on uniforms, and it is necessary that officers should, when ordering uniforms, specify clearly whether hand-sewing or machine-sewing of lace is required. MACHINERY SPARES—ARRANGEMENTS FOR STORING AND ISSUING, ETC., IN MOBILE BASES, BASES AND ESTABLISH-MENTS OTHER THAN THE CENTRAL MACHINERY SPARES DEPOT, SYDNEY.

This Order is applicable to the following mobile bases, bases and establishments:---

- 2. (a) Mobile bases will be informed of their authorized establishments from time to time.
 - (b) Main overhaul bases are to endeavour to carry stocks up to the establishments authorized for the engines which they are maintaining.
 - (c) Base spares depots are to maintain stocks in accordance with authorized establishments for top overhauls of the engines of certain craft working out of the port.
 - (d) Forward bases will be given special authorizations.

3. Navy Order 666 of 1944 is to be read in conjunction with this Order and, unless qualified by this Order, will be applicable.

4. It is emphasized that machinery spares are very scarce and there is no immediate prospect of appreciable improvement in their supply. This will inevitably result in available stocks being rationed, so that it is unlikely that, in the near future, full establishments will be possible. As a general policy, it will be necessary for vessels to forward requisitions to machinery spares depots for all machinery spares required, whether for first supply or for replenishments.

- 5. (a) It will be necessary at all ports except Sydney for existing stocks of machinery and machinery spares to remain on charge in naval store accounts until such time as the base machinery spares depot is ready to operate. Information thereof will be promulgated by Navy Order as each depot becomes available for use.
 - (b) Notwithstanding the preceding sub-paragraph (a), after the date of this Order, all requisitions for machinery and machinery spares are to be raised and forwarded by the appropriate base engineer officer to the Central Machinery Spares Depot, Sydney.

The base engineer officer is to receive and store all such supplies (except *existing* stocks now on charge in naval store accounts), authorize issues and keep a record of all receipts and issues in a manuscript book pending receipt of the card accounting equipment.

- 3
- (c) When each machinery spares depot has obtained its card accounting system, binning, &c., and is ready to operate, as indicated by the base engineer officer, all stocks of machinery and machinery spares on charge in naval store accounts are to be transferred to him on Forms S.549. The Naval Board is to be informed as each transfer is completed.
- (d) Shipping at all ports except Sydney is to be continued by the existing organization pending instructions for variation.

6. Information.


General principles for receiving, storing, issuing and accounting for machinery spares are set out in six brochures, bound as one document, which were compiled by the General Motors Corporation, Detroit, U.S.A., for the U.S. War Department, a copy of which will in due course be forwarded to each base for information. These brochures are not to be considered as instructions, but as supplementing information given in Navy Orders, &c.

- 7. Selection of suitable store space.
 - (a) At Main Overhaul Bases.

The preferred layout for a small 570 bin store is shown on diagram No. 500/27, appended to this Order. This arrangement can be increased proportionately to suit the local commitment for machinery spares.

The essentials to arrange for are-

- (i) A receiving section, preferably with suitable lifting and traversing equipment. The space should be adequate for stacking incoming packages awaiting opening up, receiving and putting away.
- (ii) A storage section with suitable bins, racking and stacking area.
- (iii) A despatch section, including facilities for boxing up, if parts have to be sent away from the depot.
- (iv) For security, the store should preferably be a separate building fitted with proper lockup facilities. If it is in a building which is to be used for other purposes, an adequate area should be partitioned off. Chain wire fencing from the full height from floor to ceiling or roof may be used for this purpose. It is essential that packages immediately on arrival are taken into the receiving section, so as to be stored out of the weather and safe from pilfering while awaiting inspection, opening up, receiving and storing, &c.
- (v) The building should be well constructed, weather proof, with concrete, bitumen-covered or wood floors and reasonably free from dust nuisance.
- (vi) The equipment required for the purpose of operating the store is set out in the appended diagram, and the steel shelving, binning, and "Kardex" equipment, should be requisitioned from the Central Machinery Spares Depot, Sydney.



(b) At Base Spares Depots.

At the depots, arrangements are to be similar to those at main overhaul bases.

(c) At Forward Bases.

At forward bases, the requirements vary considerably. The minimum requirement is that the machinery spares should be stowed in a lockable box kept under cover and raised off the ground so as to permit the free circulation of air. Store structures or arrangements should comply with tropic proofing requirements, the chief of which are—

- (i) a sound roof;
- (ii) a dry floor (adequate drainage is important);
- (iii) adequate ventilation within the structure and between packages; and
- (iv) security against pilfering.

8. System of records and forms.

(a) At forward bases, the minimum requirement is that an acceptance of the particular package and its contents must be given on the return copy of the store invoice to the depot making supply.

- (b) At other bases, the system of accounting is to be as follows:-
 - (i) The operations of receiving, recording, storing and issuing are to be fully covered.
 - (ii) The proper forms to use are listed in the attached Schedule, which also covers the correct end use, and are to be demanded from the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney.
 - (iii) On receipt of packages, a proper receiving report is to be made out (Form M.S./D.E.(N) B-28). If there are discrepancies in quantities or damage, "over," "short," and "damage" reports are to be made out and forwarded to Navy Office. (Forms M.S./D.E.(N) 30A-30B-30c).
 - (iv) In the store, bins, racks and stacking areas are to be properly indexed by a location system and machinery spares inwards are to be tagged with parts tags (Form M.S./D.E.(N) 15) ready for putting away while in the receiving station.
 - (v) Stock movements are to be recorded on a "Kardex" system (Form M.S./D.E.(N) B-1) on which are to be recorded items received, issued, balances remaining and location in the store.
- (vi) Issues are to be made only against Form M.S./D.E.(N) B-20 for internal services, and Form M.S./D.E. (N) B-22 for external services, which must be authorized by the base engineer officer, or, for mobile bases, by the engineer officer of the ship.
- (vii) Inspectors will visit depots, establishments and mobile bases to examine the methods in use and report on the machinery spares stores generally.

9. Parts lists for internal combustion engines of all types are being prepared and will be issued when completed to ships, bases and establishments. These lists will be amended from time to time and will be as under—

List "A"-On board spares.

List "B"-Top overhaul base spares.

List "C"-Major overhaul base spares.

10. Upon receipt of the information contained in these lists, existing spares carried are to be checked and discrepancies noted. All deficits are to be requisitioned on Form M.S./D.E.N.(N) 17. Any surplus is to be reported.

CESSATION OF HOSTILITIES IN EUROPE.

The following message has been received from the Admiralty on the occasion of cessation of hostilities in Europe:---

"On the occasion of the cessation of hostilities in Europe the Board of Admiralty desire to convey to the Australian Commonwealth Naval Board their sincere appreciation of the very valuable services rendered and still being rendered by the Royal Australian Navy in the war at sea. They recall in particular the gallant actions fought by units of the Royal Australian Navy in the Mediterranean as well as in the Pacific and Indian Oceans.

2. They also wish to extend their gratitude to the Australian Commonwealth Naval Board for their welcome and constant assistance to the British Pacific Fleet.

3. They look forward to the continued co-operation of the Royal Australian Navy in bringing about the early defeat of Japan, the sole remaining member of the Axis, and thus finally liberating the world from fear and aggression.".

2. The Naval Board have thanked the Admiralty for their message and replied :---

"The Royal Australian Naval Forces are proud to have shared in the triumph of sea power which assured the decisive defeat of Germany and her European Allies. The Commonwealth Naval Board would express their admiration and gratitude to the gallant officers and men of the Royal Navy for their outstanding contribution to victory by their skill and relentless courage over more than 5 years of desperate conflict. We are greatly heartened by the presence of the British Pacific Fleet, and welcome the opportunity for continued association and co-operation in the defeat of Japan.".

RELIEF OF PERSONNEL AND LEAVE-NORTHERN AREAS.

In view of the circumstances attending conditions of service on shore in Darwin and at other places in northern areas (as specified in paragraph 12 of this Order), and in vessels employed in such areas which do not periodically proceed to southern bases for refit, it has been decided that personnel will normally be relieved after completing 12 months' service, as far as the necessary reliefs are available.

2. Personnel so relieved will be granted leave on the expiration of their period of service.

3. In the case of personnel drafted to shore service at places to which this Order applies, who have previously been serving affoat in sea-going ships stationed in northern areas, continuous sea service between the latitudes of 15° North and 15° South since the last long leave and immediately prior to the commencement of shore service within these latitudes shall be deemed to be portion of the qualifying period for relief from such shore service, and shall be taken into account when calculating the date of relief.

4. Similarly, continuous shore service in one or more places to which this Order applies shall be deemed to be portion of the qualifying period for relief from such shore service, and shall be taken into account when calculating the date of relief.

5. Personnel who have already taken interim leave from an area covered by this Order will not be regarded as due for relief until they have completed 15 months' service exclusive of time absent from the area on leave.

6. A monthly return is to be rendered by the commanding officer to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, giving the names of ratings who will complete 12 months' service in the area within the ensuing 2 months, and indicating any who volunteer for further 12 months' service in the area.

On receipt of this return, the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, is to cause the commanding officer concerned to be furnished with information regarding those ratings who will be relieved when due, or the anticipated dates of relief, after completion of the 12 months' period.

7. A similar return in respect of officers is to be rendered to Navy Office and action will then be taken in respect thereof on the lines indicated in the preceding paragraph.

8. On receipt of information that personnel will not be relieved at the expiration of 12 months' service or within 3 months thereafter, immediate consideration should be given to the grant of leave, and up to 24 days exclusive of travelling time may be granted if personnel can be spared without relief.

9. Personnel proceeding on leave are to travel by the most expeditious route, utilizing service aircraft if accommodation is available, and passage to destination is thereby expedited.

10. Darwin personnel, other than Queensland natives, should proceed on leave and return via Adelaide utilizing service air transport if available, otherwise by rail and road via Alice Springs. Queensland natives are similarly to proceed via Townsville if travelling by overland route, or direct to and from Brisbane if travelling by service aircraft. *Melville* is to inform *Torrens, Magnetic,* and *Moreton.* respectively, of the numbers travelling and the dates of expiration of leave; return passages are to be arranged accordingly.

11. Personnel on leave from Thursday Island and bases outside the mainland are, on completion of leave, to be sent to *Penguin* to await return passage. This instruction is to apply to personnel taking leave from Brisbane or Townsville unless the respective Naval Officers-in-Charge are aware of an early opportunity for direct sea passage or air passage is ordered. Depots concerned are to be advised of numbers travelling and dates of expiration of leave, and return passages are to be arranged accordingly. 12. The instructions contained in this Order are applicable to Darwin, Thursday Island, Port Moresby, and any other bases which may be established in New Guinea or elsewhere between the latitudes of 15° North and 15° South, and the respective commanding officers will take action accordingly.

13. Navy Orders 410 of 1942, 680 of 1944, and 105 of 1945 are cancelled.

TEMPORARY ENGINEERING COMMISSIONS—SELECTION OF RATINGS FROM THE LOWER DECK.

The Naval Board have decided that engine room artificers and ordnance artificers, R.A.N.R. and motor mechanics R.A.N. (H.O.) may now be considered for promotion to commissioned rank in the engineering branch, R.A.N.V.R.

2. Forms C.W.1 may be commenced for suitable ratings at any time.

3. Ratings who have the requisite technical knowledge, character, personality and powers of leadership may be recommended without regard to any particular educational standard.

4. Recommended candidates will be drafted to Flinders Naval Depot for disciplinary and technical courses as requisite before final selection and promotion to commissioned rank.

5. On satisfactory completion of the technical courses and recommendation, candidates will be promoted to midshipman (E) (O.P.) R.A.N.V.R., if under the age of 19¹/₂, and acting sub-lieutenant (E) (O.P.) R.A.N.V.R., if over $19\frac{1}{2}$.

Candidates who have attained the rating of E.R.A., 4th Class, or O.A., 4th Class (confirmed), or motor mechanic 3rd Class, or higher rating, will be promoted direct to the rank of temporary sub-lieutenant (E) R.A.N.V.R. Care should therefore be exercised in ensuring that the candidate's correct rating is reported.

Further promotion in the R.A.N.V.R. will be in accordance with the conditions laid down in A.F.O. 4995/44.

6. Successful candidates on completion of courses and on promotion will then be appointed additional for training to vessels, similar to those in which they will subsequently be employed, for a period not exceeding six months. Such appointments will normally be to sloops, frigates, and minesweepers, although appointments may be made to other types of vessels from time to time. During this period of training afloat and when the officer is considered fit in every respect, the commanding officer is to award a certificate, to be known as the small ship certificate, as follows:—

"(Rank).....is con-

sidered fit to carry out the duties of the Engineer Officer of-

(a) a small steam or Diesel ship; or

(b) a small steam ship; or

(c) a small Diesel ship;"

in whichever form is applicable having regard to the officer's training and experience. (a) denotes that the officer has experience of both steam and Diesel ships, and is equally competent to serve as the engineer officer in either type.

A copy of the certificate is to be forwarded at the same time to the Naval Board.

If at the end of the six months' period the Commanding Officer does not consider that the certificate can be awarded, a report on the officer is to be forwarded to the Naval Board.

7. Candidates who fail to attain a sufficiently high standard at the end of any of the above courses or who show they are unsuitable for promotion during the courses will revert to their previous duties.

8. Officers promoted under this scheme will be paid executive branch rates of pay until the certificate in accordance with paragraph 6 above is obtained. They will receive (E) rates of pay from the date of the award of the certificate.

PROCEDURE IN REGARD TO SUPPLY, REPLENISHMENT AND ACCOUNTING FOR NAVAL STORES IN RADAR AND A/S REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE VESSELS.

The following procedure is to be observed in connexion with the supply, issue, accounting, etc., of A/S radar, and other naval stores required to be carried in radar and A/S, repair, and maintenance vessels as stock for issue for repair, etc., of A/S and radar equipment of other vessels.

2. As these craft are not issuing vessels, only such small quantities as are required for maintenance purposes are to be carried on board. The quantities considered essential for this purpose should be worked out by the A/S or radar officer concerned and the supply officer of the naval store issuing ship or the parent ship or base.

3. The quantities referred to in paragraph 2 are to be drawn from the naval store issuing ship or the parent ship or base, but will remain on the charge of the supply officer. The items will not be written off charge in the naval store account of the naval store issuing ship or the parent ship or base pending issue for the repair, etc., of other vessels.

4. In the case of repair, etc., vessels for maintenance of escort vessels, the supply officer of the naval store issuing ship, parent ship or base, should detail a stores rating from his store staff to proceed

7

in the repair, etc., vessel to make issues as necessary and obtain the requisite receipts, which should subsequently be posted in the naval store account of the naval store issuing ship, or the parent ship or base, from which replenishment of items carried in the repair vessels is to be effected.

5. (a) In the case of repair, etc., vessels for maintaining M.L. flotillas, the quantities referred to in paragraph 2 are to be drawn from the supply officer of the parent ship or base on temporary loan, a receipt being furnished by the commanding officer of the maintenance vessel on forms A.S.1092. Such items will remain on charge in the naval store account of the parent ship or base until written off charge therein from receipts obtained from M.Ls. to which issued by the maintenance vessel for repair, etc., purposes.

(b) Receipts for issues of consumable naval stores from the maintenance vessel should be obtained in counter books, forms A.S.149. In the case of permanent naval stores, receipts for issues should be obtained by the commanding officer of the maintenance vessel on form Λ .S.156 and, where issues are made in lieu of permanent items returned, receipts for the latter items should be furnished by the commanding officer of the maintenance vessel on form A.S.1091.

(c) On completion of each routine voyage, vouchers on forms A.S.149 and A.S.156 should be produced by the commanding officer of the maintenance vessel to the supply officer of the parent ship or base for all stocks issued.

Similar quantities of items to those shown thereon should be supplied to the maintenance vessel, thus maintaining in the vessel the original quantities issued on loan *vide* paragraph (b) above.

The issue vouchers referred to should be used to write the item involved off charge in the naval store account of the parent ship or base, any necessary amendments in the inventory naval store accounts of the M.Ls. to which supplies were made being also effected. (*Vide* Navy Order 632 of 1943.)

(d) In the case of unserviceable, etc., items returned to the maintenance vessel ex M.Ls., the items returned, together with the appropriate forms A.S.1091, should be transferred by the commanding officer of the maintenance vessel to the supply officer of the parent ship or base. The supply officer of the parent ship or base should at intervals check the duplicate vouchers A.S.1091 in the bound books held in the M.Ls. to ensure that all returns to the maintenance vessel have been duly transferred to him.

(e) It is the responsibility of the supply officer of the parent ship or base to ensure that the storekeeping procedure is fully carried out, and he should issue explanatory notes, etc., as necessary for the information of personnel of the M.Ls. and maintenance vessel.

6. The above procedure applies only to items drawn for issue for repair, etc., of equipment for other ships and does not affect the ordinary naval stores required for operation and maintenance of repair ships, which should be dealt with in accordance with the procedure applicable to vessels of this type.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS IN CINEMA PROJECTION ROOMS.

In view of the possibility of phosgene gases being generated when Pyrene (carbon-tetrachloride) extinguishers are used on film fires, it has been decided to replace that type by CO_2 extinguishers.

2. Extinguishers CO_2 type should be demanded from the nearest Naval Store Officer, and Pyrene type returned.

3. Master control switches for projectors are to be placed outside the projector room door in an accessible position, vide paragraph 12 (b) of A.F.O. 5938/43.

4. An operator is to be in constant attendance at the projector whenever it is running. Should rewinding be necessary during the showing of the film, a second person must be present at the projector in order to open the switches in the event of fire or breaks in the film.

0.Q.F. 40-MM. BOFORS MARK I*—SPRINGS STRIKER INNER AND OUTER.

A number of 40-mm. Bofors guns of Australian manufacture has been issued to Service with the inner and outer striker springs wound to the same hand. This is unsatisfactory, as the inner spring is not properly supported, entailing a risk of premature fatigue, fracture of the springs and of jams, which may cause serious damage to the breech mechanism.

2. All component springs striker are therefore to be examined to ensure that the inner and outer springs are wound to opposite hands, i.e., left hand inner and right hand outer, or right hand inner and left hand outer, and exchanges affected as necessary.

3. Demands for springs are to be forwarded as necessary to the nearest naval armament depot. Whenever single springs are demanded, the demand is to specify whether springs wound to right or left hand are required.

A.M.S. VESSELS—REPLACEMENT OF 20 mm. OERLIKONS MARK IIIA BY MARK VIIA.

GUNMOUNTINGS 40 mm. BOFORS MK. IIIA-MODIFICATION OF EARLIER PATTERN PEDESTALS.

Defective training has been reported in 40 mm. Bofors mountings fitted with the earlier pattern pedestal.

2. This pedestal can be identified in that the vertical sides are solid, and are not fitted with light metal inspection plates.

3. Training ball races have been found immersed in water, as no drain holes had been drilled through the top of the pedestal to coincide with the drain holes in the base ring of the mounting.

4. All training ball races of mountings fitted earlier pattern pedestals are to be examined as soon as possible, and any defective balls replaced.

5. The tops of the pedestals are to be drilled with sixteen $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch drain holes on a pitch circle of $22 \cdot 44$ inches diameter. Each hole is to be equi-distant between the holes for the bolts securing the mounting to the pedestal.

6. In addition, if not already fitted, a light metal cover plate with a leather washer is to be fitted over the centre hole in the mounting to prevent water entering. Four screwed holes will be found for securing this cover plate, but to facilitate fitting a $\frac{3}{3}$ -in. B.S.F. top should be passed through the holes and $\frac{3}{3}$ -in. B.S.F. screws fitted.

CONSERVATION OF TIRES. TUBES AND RUBBER GOODS.

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234. Issue of Mess Gear and Blankets to Naval Personnel Travelling. C.5255/45.

ISSUE OF MESS GEAR AND BLANKETS TO NAVAL PERSONNEL TRAVELLING.

The following are the approved arrangements for the issue of mess gear to personnel travelling by troop train and road transport throughout the Commonwealth:—

- (a) Between Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane.—It is not necessary for loan issues to be made to personnel travelling between these points.
- (b) On Other Routes.—Personnel are required to be in possession of mess gear when travelling—
 - (i) between Adelaide and Perth by troop train;
 - (ii) between Adelaide and Darwin by troop train and road transport;
 - (iii) between Melbourne and Adelaide by troop train;
 - (iv) north of Brisbane by troop train; and
 - (v) between Townsville and Darwin by troop train and road transport.

2. Arrangements have been made with the New South Wales Railways Department to issue cutlery to Naval personnel travelling by rail in that State. To ensure that issues are properly accounted for, the following instructions are to be incorporated in orders issued by the Railway Transport Officers at Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane to officers or ratings in charge of drafts travelling between Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane:—

Issue of Mess Gear.—On arrival at troop train feeding points between Melbourne and Brisbane, the officer or rating in charge of draft is to carry out the following procedure:—

- (i) Report to the manager of the railway refreshment room for issue of the required number of knives, forks and spoons, give attached receipt to the manager of the railway refreshment room and issue articles to personnel. Where necessary, collection and distribution may be arranged through a number of suitable ratings, personnel being warned to guard against losses by non-return.
- (ii) Arrange for collection of cutlery on completion of the meal and obtain a receipt from the manager of the railway refreshment room for delivery to the Railway Transport Officer at next capital city.
- (iii) Any shortages to be immediately investigated and instructions issued to the ratings responsible for the loss to report to the Railway Transport Officer at the next capital city immediately on arrival. If personnel responsible cannot be determined, the value of cutlery (knife 2s. 2d., fork 1s., spoon 10d.) is to be collected from the draft in equal shares and remitted to the Railway Transport Officer.

3. Requests for the supply of mess gear, as per the following pro forma at (a), are to be made at each refreshment room, separate receipts for return being obtained, as in pro forma (b), from the manager of each refreshment room at which meals are supplied:-

4. The issue and collection of mess gear at Melbourne, Perth, Brisbane, Adelaide and Townsville will be made by the respective Railway Transport Officers. At Darwin and Cairns the respective Naval Officers-in-Charge will make necessary local arrangements.

5. The issue of mess gear to personnel departing from Melbourne for Adelaide, Perth or Darwin (via Adelaide) by troop train, and its collection from personnel arriving in Melbourne, via Adelaide, is normally the responsibility of the Railway Transport Officer at Melbourne. Personnel proceeding from Fremantle to Townsville, via Brisbane, will be issued with mess gear at Perth which is to be handed in on arrival at Melbourne and a further issue made at Brisbane before departure for Townsville.

6. Personnel, other than those referred to in paragraph 7, travelling to destinations in South Australia and Western Australia by means of special trains departing from Flinders Naval Depot during leave periods are, however, to be issued on loan with mess gear, blankets and water bottles, as necessary, at Flinders Naval Depot prior to departure. Items issued in this manner are to be retained by the personnel concerned whilst on leave and are to be collected at Flinders Naval Depot on their return.

7. Personnel on "Draft" or "Leave and Draft" who travel on these special trains from Flinders Naval Depot, are, on arrival at Melbourne, to be issued with loan gear by the Railway Transport Officer at Spencer-street Station, to whom a nominal list of personnel concerned is to be forwarded by Flinders Naval Depot at least 24 hours before the time of departure of the train from Melbourne.

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8. The Railway Transport Officer at Brisbane is to issue mess gear to personnel travelling northward from Brisbane by troop train, and is to collect such gear from personnel arriving at Brisbane by troop train from Townsville, Cairns or Darwin, irrespective of their final destination.

9. Form A.T. 801z (in triplicate) is to be utilized for the purpose of recording details of all issues made by Railway Transport Officers, provision being made therein for the signature of each member of the draft so supplied. This form is now being revised and first supplies will be distributed without demand, when available.

10. Where drafts for more than one destination are travelling on the same train, separate Forms A.T. 801z are to be prepared by the responsible Railway Transport Officer for each draft. The original and duplicate copies are to be given to the officer or senior rating in charge of the draft, for delivery to the Railway Transport Officer responsible for the collection of the gear, with necessary instructions to ensure that the forms are handed to the Railway Transport Officer immediately on arrival at the point where the gear is to be collected. The triplicate copy is to be retained by the issuing Railway Transport Officer.

11. The receiving Railway Transport Officer is to check all items handed in against issues recorded on Form A.T. 801z, receipt the duplicate copy and return it to the issuing Railway Transport Officer. All cases of failure to return gear are to be promptly investigated, and any discrepancies noted on the back of the form in accordance with the printed instructions shown at the foot of the duplicate copy.

12. In cases where personnel are diverted to a destination other than that originally intended, or where personnel travel to an intermediate station at which a Naval Railway Transport Officer is not established, the following procedure is to be followed :--

- (i) Diverted Personnel.—The Railway Transport Officer at the point where the diversion occurs is to obtain, from the officer or rating in charge of the draft, Form A.T. 801z prepared by the issuing Railway Transport Officer, amending it as necessary in respect of the personnel diverted and notifying the issuing Railway Transport Officer accordingly. A new Form A.T. 801z is then to be prepared in respect of the gear held by personnel diverted and forwarded to their ultimate destination. For example, where a portion of a draft travelling from Melbourne to Fremantle is diverted to Darwin after arrival at Adelaide, the Railway Transport Officer at Adelaide is to amend Form A.T. 801z prepared by Railway Transport Officer, Melbourne, by endorsing both copies with a note that the personnel have been diverted. The new form is to be forwarded to Naval Officer-in-Charge, Darwin, and Railway Transport Officer, Melbourne, informed accordingly.
- (ii) Personnel Travelling to Intermediate Stations.—When issuing gear to personnel travelling on leave to intermediate stations, e.g., Kalgoorlie, such personnel are not

to be included in Form A.T. 801z. They are to sign separate receipts for the articles issued and are to be instructed to retain such gear whilst on leave, surrendering it to the issuing Railway Transport Officer on their return.

13. The cash value of any mess gear and blankets issued on loan to personnel travelling and subsequently lost by neglect is, when practicable, to be recovered from the personnel responsible by the Railway Transport Officer to whom, and at the time, the draft reports on com pletion of their journey. Where responsibility for loss cannot be directly attributed to any particular member of the draft, the total value of the articles lost is to be apportioned equally amongst all personnel concerned and recovery effected direct from each person whenever possible.

14. The Railway Transport Officer is to issue an official receipt for all amounts collected by him. Where an amount represents value of deficient mess gear apportioned amongst a number, the receipt is to be issued to the member in charge of the draft.

15. All moneys so collected are to be paid over by the Railway Transport Officer on the day of receipt, or at the first opportunity subsequently, to the Accountant Officer of the nearest Naval Establishment, accompanied by a list showing details of the articles lost, their value and, in the case of deficient mess gear the total number of persons from whom value has been recovered.

16. The Railway Transport Officers at Melbourne and Brisbane are to forward, for the information of the Railway Transport Officer, Sydney, a copy of any similar list relating to recoveries at their centres in respect of mess gear lost between Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane.

17. Where recovery of the cash value of losses is impracticable, losses are to be dealt with on Form A.S. 126—Stores lost by Neglect which is to be prepared in quadruplicate by the receiving Railway Transport Officer. Three copies are to be forwarded to the Accountant Officer of the ship or establishment to which the officer or rating is appointed or drafted, and the quadruplicate copy retained. In the case of losses of mess gear by personnel travelling between Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane, an additional copy of Form A.S. 126 is to be prepared and forwarded to the Railway Transport Officer, Sydney, for information.

18. The rates to be charged for mess gear, blankets and water bottles lost by neglect are :---

19. Each Railway Transport Officer is to maintain a record of issues and receipts of loan gear, which is to be forwarded monthly to the Accountant Officer of the Establishment to which he is attached.

20. Loan blankets are to be issued by Railway Transport Officers to all Naval personnel desiring same for use during any interstate rail journey. Such issue is compulsory in all cases where personnel travel by troop train and road transport on the following routes:--

(a) Between Townsville and Darwin (via Mount Isa);

(b) Between Adelaide and Darwin (via Alice Springs); and

(c) Between Adelaide and Perth.

21. The issue of blankets is to be made in accordance with the general procedure applicable to loan issues of mess gear.

22. The issue of water bottles by Railway Transport Officers is to be confined to personnel travelling on leave by troop train and road transport on the routes specified in paragraph 20 above. Webbing gear is not to be included in issues of water bottles made by Railway Transport Officers.

23. The issue of water bottles to personnel on draft is to be made by the drafting depot or ship in accordance with Navy Order 296 of 1940, as amended by Navy Order 84 of 1942. Instructions in regard to accounting for these issues are contained in Navy Order 246 of 1942.

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DARWIN NAVAL BASE ORGANIZATION.

The following is the organization of the Darwin Naval Base:-

(a) All local defence and auxiliary vessels based on Darwin excepting boom vessels and A.M.S. vessels, are tenders to H.M.A.S. *Melville* for the following purposes:—

Discipline.

Pay. Personnel.

Victualling.

Naval Stores.

With the exception of the boom vessels, all are under the operational control of the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Darwin, who will also deal direct with these vessels respecting engineering, gunnery, electrical, W/T and similar matters. Correspondence on these subjects should be addressed to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, and, in the case of local defence vessels, a copy should be forwarded to *Melville* for information.

- (b) A.M.S. Vessels based at Darwin are independent commands with pay and victualling accounts carried out in *Melville*.
- (c) The Boom defence depot together with boom working vessels and boom gate vessels is a separate entity under the command of the Boom Defence Officer. Pay and victualling accounts are carried in H.M.A.S. *Melville*.
- (d) The appointment of Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Melville is distinct from Naval Officer-in-Charge, Darwin.
- (e) Shore establishments other than the boom defence depot are administered by the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. *Melville*.

2. Confidential Commonwealth Navy Order 112 of 1943 and Navy Order 197 of 1943 are hereby cancelled.

REPORTING OF MOVEMENTS OF PERSONNEL.

Instances are still coming under notice of failure by H.M.A. ships and establishments to comply with the instructions contained in Navv Orders 156 of 1941 and 257 of 1942 as amended by Navy Order 201 of 1943 regarding the reporting of movements of personnel.

2. Up-to-date records of the whereabouts of all personnel are essential not only for drafting and general administrative purposes but also for the prompt re-direction of private mail for personnel and attention to inquiries from next of kin, &c. Failure to report all such movements as they occur also result in considerable unnecessary investigation, and avoidable delays. 3. The standing instructions in this connexion are consolidated hereunder for information and guidance of all Commanding Officers, who are to take all steps necessary to ensure strict compliance therewith.

4. H.M.A. Ships and Establishments in Combat Areas.—(a) Signals. —All entries in and discharges from H.M.A. ships and establishments in combat areas are to be reported by signal addressed to the Naval Board and repeated to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, as soon as possible after the movement has taken place. Subject only to the requirements of W/T silence, such signals which should contain the following information should be despatched on the date of the movement:—

- (i) Movement Signal No. (Consecutive No.)-See footnote.
- (ii) Surname and initials and category (e.g., R.A.N., R.A.N.R., &c.), of officers.
- (iii) Official numbers of petty officers and men. These should be repeated separately in all cases, e.g., 23894 (R) 23894, P.A.3912 (R) P.A.3912, S.4597 (R) S.4597 and Not in groups, e.g., Not 23894, P.A.3912, S.4597 (R) 23894, P.A.3912, S.4597.
- (iv) Particulars of movement, i.e., from or to as the case may be, permanent movements being indicated by (A) and temporary movements by (B).

Where discharge to ultimate destination is made via a ship or establishment or by passenger ship, the full movement should be shown, e.g., To "Penguin" for "Swan."

NOTE.—As regards (i)—except in ships and establishments in which this is already being shown the signal is to contain the preamble Movements Signal No. (....).

(b) Form A.S. 165.—All entries and discharges are also to be prepared daily as the movements occur and despatched as under by first air mail.

- (i) Original to Director of Navy Accounts (Personnel Movements), Navy Office, Melbourne.
- (ii) Two copies to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot. The remaining copy of the return is to be retained in the ship or establishment, but in the case of H.M.A. ships whose pay accounts are kept elsewhere, a carbon copy of the return is to be prepared and despatched to the ship or establishment in which the accounts are kept.

5. H.M.A. Establishments in Australia and Tenders Thereto.—All movements of personnel to or from H.M.A. establishments in Australia or tenders thereto are to be reported on Form A.S.165 on the day on which the movement occurs, original copy being forwarded to the Director of Navy Accounts (Personnel Movements), Navy Office, Melbourne, and two copies to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.

In the case of tenders in which Forms A.S.165 are rendered direct, a carbon copy of the form should be sent to the parent ship.

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Where such tenders proceed temporarily to a combat area or in any case in which report by Form A.S.165 is not immediately practicable, the movements are to be reported by signal addressed to the Naval Board and repeated to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, and Form A.S.165 forwarded by first air mail thereafter.

6. Nominal Lists of Personnel.—In the case of H.M.A. ships which are transferred for operational purposes from a base in Australia to a base in a combat area, a nominal list of personnel borne at the date of transfer is to be prepared in triplicate, the copies being despatched by first air mail as under:—

- Original to Director of Navy Accounts (Personnel Movements), Navy Office, Melbourne.
- One copy each to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, and the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the ship or establishment in which the pay accounts are kept.

7. General.—Naval Officers-in-Charge will be responsible that tecords of personnel movements maintained locally are kept in such a manner as to permit of prompt and accurate advice to Navy Office should occasion arise—of the whereabouts of all personnel serving under their administrative control (including those borne in vessels whose accounts are carried in the establishment). The importance of the strict observance of this procedure cannot be too strongly impressed upon the officers responsible for the keeping of such records.

The greatest care is to be taken to ensure that Forms A.S.165 are forwarded daily as movements occur, and that the information furnished therein is complete and correct in every particular. All movements of officers are to be included in Forms A.S.165. Incorrect spelling of names and incorrect initials in these returns entail unnecessary work in Navy Office and in Flinders Naval Depot, and can easily have farreaching effects. It is important that official numbers be shown but in any case in which same are not known the full Christian names of the members concerned are to be shown in the return.

As the general purpose of Forms A.S.165 is to enable up-to-date records to be maintained both in Navy Office and in Flinders Naval Depot of the actual whereabouts of personnel (irrespective of where their pay accounts are kept), all movements of personnel from one ship or establishment to another for victuals only are to be included in such returns.

It is essential that all movements of personnel of H.M.A. ships occurring on the day of departure from port (including absentees on sailing) be communicated by signal and/or Form A.S.165, as appropriate, on that day, arrangements being made as necessary with the Naval Authorities at the port for transmission of the message.

In regard to personnel discharged to leave, the following general principles are to apply:---

Personnel due to rejoin ship at same port on completion of leave. --Signal and/or Form A.S.165 necessary only if personnel fail to rejoin ship.

- Personnel to rejoin ship at another port on completion of leave.— Signal and/or Form A.S.165 to be rendered showing discharged days' leave and further signal and/or Form A.S.165 on return of member to ship.
- Personnel to join another ship or an establishment on completion of leave.—Signal and/or Form A.S.165 to be rendered showing discharged to . . . days' leave and to (name of ship or establishment to which transferred). Completion of movement to be communicated by signal and/or Form A.S.165 by ship or establishment to which personnel transferred.

8. In all cases of doubt, the consideration to be borne in mind is the possibility of casualties and the consequent necessity for complete information of the actual whereabouts of personnel being available in Navy Office at the shortest notice.

BADGES FOR WAR SERVICE.

The Commonwealth Government have decided that Official Badges relative to service in the Royal Australian Navy during the present war shall be issued as follows:---

- (a) Returned from Active Service Badge.
- (b) General Service Badge.
- (c) Exemption Badge (Medically Unfit).
- (d) Exemption Badge (Reserved Occupation).
- (e) Female Relative's Badge.
- (f) Mother's and Widow's Badge.

2. Conditions under which the above-mentioned badges are to be issued are as set out below :---

(a) Returned from Active Service Badge.

This badge will be issued to all officers and men of the R.A.N., R.A.F.R., R.A.N.R.(S.), R.A.N.R., and R.A.N.V.R., and to members of the Women's Royal Australian Naval Service, and Royal Australian Naval Nursing Service, also to members of the Mercantile Marine who serve under a T.124 Agreement, and Canteen Staffs, who were mobilized and have rendered appropriate service in a ship of war at sea for a period of at least 28 days since the commencement of hostilities, or have served in a sphere of war operations. This is subject to the reservation that eligibility for the badge will accrue irrespective of the period of service in the event of engagement in actual warlike operations against the enemy. Service ashore in the following areas will qualify for the badge :—

Northern Territory, north of parallel 14.5° South*-from 19th February, 1942.

^{(*} This includes the Darwin area.)

Mandated New Guinea—from 4th January, 1942. Papua—from 2nd February, 1942. Torres Strait Islands—from 19th March. 1942.

The badge will only be issued to personnel eligible for the award who have been discharged from the Service since the commencement of hostilities. The badge will not be issued until the termination of hostilities to the other eligible personnel who are still serving.

These badges are not to be worn by personnel when in uniform.

Persons Ineligible—

Personnel who desert or who are dismissed, or discharged for disciplinary reasons will not be eligible to receive the badge.

(b) General Service Badge.

Persons Eligible-

- (i) Members of the R.A.F.R., R.A.N.R.(S.), R.A.N.R., R.A.N.V.R., and Officers on the Retired or Emergency Lists of the Royal Australian Navy who have not jet been mobilized.
- (ii) Members of the R.A.F.R., R.A.N.R.(S.), R.A.N.R., R.A.N.V.R., and Officers on the Retired or Emergency Lists of the Royal Australian Navy who have been demobilized and who are not eligible for the award of "the Returned from Active Service" Badge, except in the case of members demobilized because they are in Reserved Occupations. Such personnel will receive the "Exemption" Badge (Reserved Occupation).
- (iii) All Officers and men of the R.A.N., R.A.F.R., R.A.N.R.(S.), R.A.N.R., and R.A.N.V.R., who have been discharged "Below Naval Physical Standard" or "Physically Unfit for Naval Service" (not due to misconduct) and who are not eligible for the award of "the Returned from Active Service" Badge.

(c) Exemption Badge (Medically Unfit).

In view of the fact that medical rejection for the Navy does not necessarily mean that a volunteer is permanently medically unfit for the A.I.F. or other War Service, the issue of this badge will be under the sole control of the Army, and volunteers rejected as medically unfit by the Navy would have to be certified as medically unfit for the A.I.F., and Air Force also, before becoming entitled to receive the "Exemption" Badge (Medically Unfit). The badge will not be issued to persons with manifest disease or deformity.

(d) Exemption Badge (Reserved Occupation).

This badge will be issued by the Service in which the volunteer wishes to enlist upon presentation by him of a Certificate from the Man-power Authorities indicating that he is in a reserved occupation. The badge will only be issued to persons who volunteer, unconditionally, to serve overseas with any service, when called upon at any time during the war, who are medically fit for service and who are in all respects eligible for enlistment or appointment.

- (i) This badge will be issued to the wife and/or mother or to the nearest female relative of any member who is now entitled or will become entitled to a "Returned from Active Service" Badge.
- (ii) Badges issued on account of one member on service will have one star attached. Badges issued to mothers will have additional stars attached for each additional child on service, the wife of a member on service receiving a star on account of her husband as well as a star on account of each child on service. One badge only will be issued to the one female relative.
- (iii) If a member be married or a widower, the badge will be issued to the nearest female relative in accordance with the following degrees of relationship:--
 - 1st—If a member be married, the badge will be issued to his wife. The mother of a married member may also receive a badge on his account; or
 - 2nd—If a member be a widower, the badge will be issuable to the eldest daughter living. The mother of a widower may also receive a badge on his account; or
 - 3rd—If a member be a widower without a mother or daughter his eldest sister may receive the badge.

1st-Mother; 2nd-Eldest sister.

Where there are twin sisters the badge will be issued to the elder twin sister.

- (v) In the event of a member not having any female relative as described above, it will be necessary for him to nominate in writing the nearest blood relation.
- (vi) Female guardians of legally adopted children will be eligible to receive the badge.

Application for this badge should be made direct, by the wife or mother or nearest eligible female relative, to the Secretary to the Naval Board, Navy Office, Melbourne.

(f) Mother's and Widow's Badge.

This badge will be issued to the mother and/or widow of a member of the Naval Forces killed in action or died of wounds or from other causes whilst on service or as a result of such service. Stars will be attached to the badges as under:---

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A widow of a deceased member who is also a mother of a deceased member or members will receive one badge only with a star on account of each deceased son as well as a star on account of the deceased husband.

Female guardians of legally adopted children will be eligible to receive the badge.

Application for this badge should be made direct by the mother or widow to the Secretary to the Naval Board, Navy Office, Melbourne.

3. Replacement of Badges.—Badges lost or destroyed will not normally be replaced. Departures from this principle will be permitted only in very exceptional circumstances.

4. Issue of Badges.—Badges will be numbered in sequence and, with the exception of the "Exemption" Badge (Medically Unfit), will be issued by Navy Office.

The following badges will be issued on loan and will be returned in the following circumstances:—

Returned from Active Service Badge.—On a member being re-engaged for further service.

General Service Badge.—On a member being mobilized.

- Exemption Badges (Medically Unfit).—On a person being passed as medically fit for engagement in the Navy, Army or Air Force.
- (Reserved Occupation).—On a person being permitted to engage for Naval Service.

5. The issue of the following badges has been suspended since September, 1942:-

General Service Badge. Exemption Badge (Medically Unfit). Exemption Badge (Reserved Occupation).

6. Navy Orders Nos. 280 of 1940 and 313 of 1942 are hereby cancelled.

DISPOSAL OF RESTRICTED, REPAIRABLE OR UNSERVICEABLE AMMUNITION.

Naval Officers-in-Charge of outports are reminded that quantities of restricted, repairable or unserviceable ammunition should not be allowed to accumulate. Quantities of such ammunition held should be reported to Navy Office from time to time for disposal instructions.

2. In the case of small quantities of unserviceable ammunition in a dangerous or doubtful condition, or for which suitable isolated storage is not available, the ammunition may be dumped or destroyed forthwith. A report of the action taken is to be forwarded to Navy Office for covering approval. When large quantities are concerned, instructions should be sought before disposal, if necessary by signal, particulars of the state of the ammunition being furnished.

In future, H.M.A. Ships are to observe the following procedure when it is desired to land hedgehog projectiles:—

- (a) The local Armament Supply Officer is to be notified by signal.
- (b) The signal is to confirm that:—
 - (i) fuses are safe for handling;
 - (ii) that Naval Magazine and Explosives Regulations, Article 48, have been complied with.
- (c) Particulars of defects found are to be clearly marked on boxes.
- (d) Wetted rounds are to have date of wetting clearly marked on packages.

SUPPLY OF CLOTHING TO CIVILIAN CREW OF R.A.F.A. "KURUMBA."


The Master of R.A.F. Kurumba is authorized to purchase, as necessary, from any H.M.A. ship in which a supply officer is borne, or from a R.A.N. Victualling Store Issuing Ship, immediate requirements of khaki shirts, khaki shorts, khaki trousers, black leather boots and black leather shoes in order to meet the needs of members of the crew during their service in Kurumba whilst absent from Australia.

2. To enable the Master to obtain such requirements, members of the crew are to tender the value of their individual requirements to the Master, together with completed Form A.S.80 for transmission to the supply officer concerned. A supply of Forms A.S.80 is to be maintained for the purpose in *Kurumba*. The Master is to keep a record of the issues made to each individual and forward a copy thereof quarterly to the Director of Victualling.

3. The value of the clothing is to be assessed at the prices shown in the current issue of the "Official Memorandum—Prices of clothing maintained for issue on repayment to Ships' Companies," and the Master is to ensure that any supplies made are restricted to immediate requirements on all occasions.

PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATIONS FOR ADVANCEMENT TO PETTY OFFICER AND LEADING SEAMEN.

2

The examinations are to be conducted by examination boards consisting of officers appointed by flag officers commanding squadrons (or senior officers present). The composition of the boards and the method of conducting the examinations rests with the convening authority, who shall decide on the number of officers who are to comprise a board and whether more than one board will be required.

Normally, the minimum examination board, which should include an officer from the candidate's ship whenever possible, should be composed of—

- 1 Commander (as President),
- 1 Navigating Officer,
- 2 Lieutenant-Commanders or Lieutenants,
- 1 Boatswain,

but occasions may arise on outlying stations when it may not be possible for a board so constituted to be assembled. Subject to local conditions, the maximum number of candidates examined by one board should be eight. Professional examinations for leading seaman may be carried out by ship or flotilla boards, instead of by squadron boards.

2. Whenever possible, examination boards are to be composed of officers serving in sea-going ships, and are to be conducted in ships where all facilities for carrying out these examinations are available. Flag and senior officers ordering the assembly of boards for candidates in shore establishments and stationary ships, at home or abroad, are to take the necessary steps to ensure this procedure.

3. In certain circumstances, it may not be possible to convene a squadron examination board, as detailed above, until a considerable time has elapsed since the date on which a candidate's application for examination was forwarded by his commanding officer; should this period exceed three months, he is to be examined by the officers of his own ship in lieu of a squadron board.

Under war conditions, full use should be made of this provision, and the period of three months laid down may be reduced as necessary at the discretion of flag and commanding officers.

Squadron boards should, as far as practicable, be strictly squadron or flotilla boards, submarine candidates when possible being examined by the latter.

4. Squadron boards should be assembled at intervals, normally, of not less than once a quarter, but more often should exigencies, such as the meeting of ships and drafting changes, prove this to be desirable.

5. Normally, the president of a board should not be required to examine candidates in a particular subject. He may, however, do so if he wishes, particularly when any doubt arises as to the suitability of a candidate.

SYLLABUS FOR EXAMINATION OF LEADING SEAMAN FOR PETTY OFFICER.

SECTION I.- ABILITY TO TAKE CHARGE.

General.

(a) To take charge of a class in—

- (i) Squad drill.
 - (ii) Physical and recreational training.
- (b) To tell off a party of men for work of the following nature and carry it out:—
 - (i) Getting out kedge anchors.
 - (ii) Working derricks.
 - (iii) Handling awnings.

SECTION II.—TECHNICAL ABILITY.

Rigging.—Ability to instruct in, and demonstrate practically, any of the following:—

(a) All knots, splices, bends, hitches, and other practical rigging normally taught to seamen, vide Chapter 3 of Seamanship Manual, Volume I.

Note.—President to set test job in hemp and wire, and candidates to be examined in practical rigging at the examination.

- (b) (i) Types and uses of all hawsers.
 - (ii) How to calculate working and breaking strains of hawsers.
 - (iii) Different types of tackles, their uses, and how to fit them.
 - (iv) Boats' falls and fittings, fitting and reeving, and securing. All fittings on davits.
 - (v) Care and maintenance of all hawsers and blocks.
- (c) Rigging sheers and derricks. To be done practically—with spars (small) in particular—
 - (1) Head lashing.
 - (2) Passing strop.
 - (3) Splay and heel tackles.
 - (4) Lead of topping lift.
 - N.B.-Knowledge of holdfasts on shore not necessary.
- (d) Target work. To be confined to a general knowledge of towing arrangements, and setting and furling sails.
- (e) Thorough knowledge of standing and running rigging, as generally fitted in His Majesty's ships.
- (f) Repair of canvas gear and elementary sailmaking.

Boat Work.

- (a) Handling of boats under power, sails, and oars.
- (b) Ability to instruct a crew of inexperienced ratings under oars and sail.

- (c) Hoisting, lowering and securing a seaboat.
- (d) Knowledge of boats' falls, fittings and gear, and duties of coxswain.
- (e) Practical knowledge of temporary repairs by boat's crew to boat's hull, mast and fittings.

Note.—Where it is found impracticable to carry out the examination in boatwork, commanding officers are to certify on Forms A.S.441 that the candidates are proficient in this subject.

General Duties.

- (a) To be able to steer a ship and instruct men in the duties of helmsman and telegraphman.
- (b) Sufficient knowledge of compass, chart reading, laying off courses, and uniform system of buoyage; to undertake quartermaster's duties and coxswain of drifter and picket boat.
- (c) Practical knowledge of methods of sounding and taking charge of a sounding party.
- (d) Writing up log-book. Reading a barometer.
- (e) To be able to use a boatswain's call for calls in normal daily use.
- Rule of the Road.—Practical knowledge of the regulations for preventing collisions at sea.

Anchor Work.

- (a) A practical working knowledge of working anchors, cables and capstans under all circumstances.
- (b) A practical knowledge of laying out anchors; weighing anchors from a boat.
- (c) All forms of forecastle work, including "bringing to" and tending wires.
- (d) Duties when in charge of an anchor watch.

Watertight Fittings .- Practical knowledge of-

- (a) Operating of W.T. doors and valves, and their application to fire and collision.
- (b) Elementary shoring and its uses. Note.—This examination should be carried out by an executive officer.

Organization.

- (a) To describe any evolution carried out in candidate's ship, including a general knowledge of paravanes, where fitted.
- (b) General duties of a petty officer, e.g.-
 - (1) Captain of a top.
 - (2) Petty officer of day.
 - (3) Regulating, &c.

Signals.

- (a) To be able to interpret any signals in the Boats' Signal Book with the aid of the book.
- (b) Sufficient knowledge of semaphore and morse lamp to make and read a message at a slow rate (four words per minute).

SYLLABUS FOR EXAMINATION OF ABLE SEAMAN FOR LEADING SEAMAN.

SECTION I.—ABILITY TO TAKE CHARGE.

General.

- (a) To take charge of a class in-
 - (i) Squad drill.
 - (ii) Physical and recreational training.

- Watertight Fittings.—A practical knowledge of operating watertight doors and valves and their application to fire and collision and damage in action.

Organization.

(a) Duties of leading hand of a mess.

(b) Care and maintenance of decks and paintwork.

Signals.

- (a) To be able to interpret any signal in the Boats' Signal Book with the aid of the book.
- (b) Sufficient knowledge of semaphore and morse lamp; to make or read a message at a slow rate.

Examination.

In Section I, no marks are to be awarded. Candidates are to be "Passed" or "Failed".

The award of a pass is to be qualified, e.g., V.G. (85 per cent. and above), Good (70 per cent. to 85 per cent.), and Fair (below 70 per cent.) to indicate the standard reached by each man. In order that full consideration may be given to the opinion of the officers of the candidate's ship, Form A.S.264 is to be written up specially for the examination and signed by the commanding officer. Candidates should be judged on their general bearing, the manner in which they set about the tests given to them and in which they give their orders and see them carried out. Technical knowledge is of secondary importance in this part of the examination. Attention is drawn to the fact that an able seaman passing for leading seaman must not be expected to show that power of command which is expected in a candidate for petty officer, and allowance should be made for his cultivating this during his time as leading seaman.

In Section II, marks are to be awarded in accordance with the following scales:-

Maximum Marks required

The knowledge required of candidates in all subjects is primarily that which they can have reasonably acquired in the type of ship in which they are serving, or, if serving ashore, in which they were last serving. It may be assumed that a man who shows he is well up in subjects connected with the ship in which he is serving can and will become equally efficient when he is drafted to one of another type.

7. When a rating applies to be examined, his commanding officer is to satisfy himself that the candidate possesses the necessary qualities which, with further experience, if necessary, will fit him to make an efficient petty officer or leading seaman, respectively. Provided that the man is otherwise qualified and that there is a reasonable prospect of his passing the examination at the time of his application, the commanding officer will forward his application for examination by the squadron board to the administrative authority or to the senior officer present in the case of ships on detached service. Should, however, a candidate be considered unsuitable by his commanding officer, his application is to be considered null and void.

8

8. (a) Provided that a rating is successful in both sections of the examination, the date on which he applied for examination will be the basic date of passing professionally, for record and all other purposes. In order to provide a permanent record of their basic dates, candidates' applications are to be made in the normal service manner through the request book.

(b) A rating who is successful in Section I—ability to take charge —but fails in not more than two technical subjects (Section II) may be re-examined in the subject or subjects in which he failed by his own ship's officers after not less than one month. If then successful, his basic date is to be the date of the squadron, ship or flotilla board examination. If he is failed by his ship's officers, he must, subject to sub-clause (d), be re-examined by a squadron board if for petty officer, for which re-examination he may not apply until two months have elapsed since the date of failure by his ship's officers. This date of application will be his basic date if he passes on re-examination.

(c) A rating who fails in Section I and/or in more than two subjects in Section II is to be re-examined by a squadron board, for which he may not apply until two months have elapsed since the date of his failure. This date of application will be his basic date if he passes on re-examination.

(d) A rating who fails at the third attempt to pass the squadron board examination for petty officer may not apply for re-examination by a squadron board until nine months have elapsed since the date of his third failure by a squadron board. This date of application will be his basic date if he passes. Subject to sub-clause (b), failure at the fourth attempt at the examination for petty officer is to be final.

(e) There is no limit to the number of times an able seaman may be re-examined.

9. On completion of the examination, Form A.S.441, in original, is to be forwarded to the candidate's ship, the commanding officer of which is to insert the basic date of passing the examination. The form is then to be forwarded to the Commodore of the appropriate depot, care being taken that the passing of the examination is noted on the candidates' service certificates or history sheets, and in the ledger. Forms relating to men who fail are to be retained with the men's service certificates.

When a rating fails in not more than two subjects in Section II of the examination and is recommended for re-examination by ship's officers, Form A.S.441 is to be retained in the ship until the re-examination has taken place, and the form then dealt with as for success or failure in the usual way.

Failures are to be noted on Form A.S.264 (Divisional Record Sheet).

10. Attention is drawn to C.A.F.O. 2287/44 the provisions of which are applicable to the R.A.N.

11. A revised Form A.S.441 complying with the above syllabi and instructions is in course of preparation.

12. Navy Order 215 of 1943 is cancelled.

NAVAL CENSORSHIP.

GUIDE TO CENSORABLE MATTER.

19. With a view to indicating the type of information which is classed as censorable matter, the following list has been compiled. Personnel are not to write or otherwise record or pass such information regarding:—

- (i) the past or future movements or the position at time of writing of any ships, whether warships or merchant ships, unless such past movements have been published in the Allied Press, except where a Commanding Officer has given permission to personnel, under the conditions laid down in paragraph 20 (b), to mention that they have visited a particular port. This prohibition is to be regarded as covering such movements or locations even though they be only rumoured or surmised, and also covers disclosures of movements or locations by means of references to persons whose location may be known to the addressee of a letter;
- (ii) the routine under which ships' companies are being worked;
- (iii) the conditions of and arrangements at any ports visited;
- (iv) plans of future operations whether rumoured, surmised or known;
- (v) the conditions of the writer's ship or any other ship and of the crews. This does not in any way prohibit general comment on life in ships or establishments, particularly as it relates to the individual, providing it does not convey information of specific value to the enemy, or general encouragement to him;
- (vi) actions or engagements, except as provided hereunder-
 - (a) Where an engagement in which ships of the Royat Australian Navy participated has been officially announced to the Press, commanding officers of participating vessels are authorized to establish a minimum period of not less than thirty (30) days after which personnel under their command may indicate in personal correspondence that they took part in the announced engagement and relate their personal experiences therein. The period of thirty (30) days mentioned above is a recommended minimum and commanding officers may establish longer periods when security requirements so dictate.
 - (b) Whenever any ship of the Royal Australian Navy is identified by name in an official communique or Press release announcing its participation in an engagement, the commanding officer may waive the unexpired portion of such time period as may have been established by him in accordance with paragraph (a) above.

- (c) Where the identity and location of mobile assault units engaged in a specific operation have been officially announced to the Press, landing or
 - officially announced to the Press, landing or assault force commanders are authorized to permit all personnel of the announced units and personnel of units attached thereto for the assault phase, including corps and group staffs, to disclose in their personal correspondence their location and relate their personal experiences during the assault phase of the operation. Upon completion of the assault phase, to be determined by the transfer of command from the landing or assault force commander to the occupation force commander, such personnel may continue to relate their personal experiences which occurred during the assault phase, but thereafter disclosure of location of personnel at the time of writing shall be prohibited.
- (d) Where practicable, commanding officers of the ships concerned will be advised by signal whenever an announcement in the press has been made of the matters referred to in paragraphs (a), (b) or (c) above.
- (e) As actions, involving only an individual ship or a small detached group of ships (e.g. bombardment of coastal targets in support of Army advances) are unlikely to be published in the Press, the commanding officer may grant permission to personnel of the participating ship or ships to mention such actions in their correspondence. In such case, the action may be described only in the most general terms, e.g. "We bombarded a Japanese village the other day." Mention is not to be made of the date or place of such action, nor of the identity of units of the Army or Air Force supporting the action or in support of which the action took place.

The Naval Board and the Naval Officer-in-Charge ashore, where mails are landed for censorship, are to be notified by signal whenever permission to mention such actions has been given, in order that shore censors may be aware of the relaxation.

- (f) The commanding officer may not grant personnel permission to mention in their correspondence any action against enemy submarines.
- (vii) personnel casualties—except with the express permission of the commanding officer;
- (viii) losses of or damage to ships of any sort prior to any official announcement;

- (ix) information concerning aerodromes, fortifications, searchlights, listening posts, barracks, camps, W/T, telephone, signal or cable stations, wharves, docks or any information relating to the activities of other Services;
- (x) criticism of the Naval, Military or Air Force of His Majesty or any of His Majesty's Allies, in such a manner as to bring them into disrepute; or
- (xi) information that may convey to the enemy the efficiency of any other branch of the Fighting Services.

20. (a) It is strictly forbidden for any Naval personnel, unless permitted by other paragraphs of this Order, to-

- (i) keep a diary of any written record of events;
- (ii) post or give to any other person to post or deliver or receive for posting or delivery a private letter, parcel or postcard other than through the Naval channels prescribed in this Order;
- (iii) send, or give to, or request any other person to send a private telegram without first obtaining the approval of the officer detailed for censorship duties;
- (iv) originate a telephone call other than a local call, without the prior approval of the officer detailed for censorship duties;
- (v) use note paper bearing any mark which indicates the locality in which a ship is or has been except insofar as this may be permitted by sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph;
- (vi) send a photograph, picture, postcard or souvenir of a place visited by the ship or send any other article which might disclose a ship's location, past or future movements, without the approval of the Commanding Officer except insofar as this may be permitted by sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph; or
- (vii) use any form of code whether in the shape of letters, figures, signs, symbols or plain language.

Sub-paragraphs (ii), (iii) and (iv) shall not apply to personnel in establishments where censorship has been suspended, or to personnel on long leave.

(b) After the departure of a ship of the Royal Australian Navy from a port, commanding officers are authorized to establish a minimum period of not less than thirty days after which personnel under their command may indicate in personal correspondence or by the use of notepaper which bears a mark indicating the locality of the port in question or by the mailing of photographs, pictures, postcards or souvenirs, that they visited the port in question. The period of thirty days mentioned above is a recommended minimum and Commanding Officers may establish longer periods when security requirements so dictate.".

CONDUCT OF EXAMINATIONS (NON-SERVICE).

5

Owing to the increased number of personnel taking examinations through the various educational institutions under the R.A.N. Education Service, it has been found necessary to introduce a uniform procedure. In order to minimize the work of officers connected with the conduct of these examinations, and at the same time ensure that the validity of the examinations will not be jeopardized, commanding officers are to see that the instructions laid down hereunder are adhered to strictly.

2. Students who are eligible to sit for examination will be sent an examination entry form some time before the date of examination. This form is to be completed and returned in accordance with the regulations of the examining institution.

3. Examination question papers will be forwarded through the Director of Education and Vocational Training to the commanding officer of the ship concerned, and receipt of these question papers is to be acknowledged on Form A.S.1303 to the Director of Education and Vocational Training.

4. All worked examination papers are to be forwarded through the commanding officer to the Director of Education and Vocational Training in a confidential envelope, and receipt of papers will be acknowledged by the Director of Education and Vocational Training by letter through official mail channels. Under no circumstances are worked examination papers to be returned direct to the educational institution conducting the examination. If examination papers are received direct from an educational institution, the matter is to be reported without delay to the Director of Education and Vocational Training, and the examination is to be proceeded with in accordance with the instructions hereunder.

5. All examination papers, worked and unworked, are to be treated as *Confidential Papers*, and forwarded in accordance with rules governing forwarding of confidential papers.

6. Sub-paragraph (i) of paragraph 11 of this Order—" Instructions to Supervising Officers"—details the correct procedure for the return of worked papers. It is essential that this procedure be carried out in every detail.

7. If a candidate signifies his intention of not sitting, the question papers must be returned unopened to the Director of Education and Vocational Training. Papers so forwarded must be accompanied by a letter from the commanding officer giving reasons for the candidate's failure to sit.

8. In the event of a candidate's being drafted to another ship or establishment prior to sitting for the examination, the question papers and stationery should be forwarded immediately to the commanding officer of the candidate's new ship or establishment for necessary action. If in doubt, papers are to be returned forthwith to the Director of Education and Vocational Training by fastest available method, with an explanatory letter, telling why the papers have been returned. 9. If, through Service conditions, a candidate is prevented from sitting for an examination on the proper date, he may take the examination at the earliest opportunity following that date, providing the conditions laid down in sub-paragraph (j) of paragraph 11 of these instructions are complied with. The decision will rest with the examining institution as to whether his examination papers can be accepted.

10. The provisions of this Order notwithstanding, if a candidate is able to present himself on the day of examination at the place where the examination is normally held, either while on leave, or with the permission of his commanding officer, he may sit for the examination in the same manner as a civilian, providing necessary arrangements can be made. As soon as a candidate knows that he or she can sit as a metropolitan candidate, he or she should notify the Director of Education and Vocational Training, so that arrangements can be made, unless the shortness of the time demands that the civilian authorities be approached direct. If this happens, the Director of Education and Vocational Training should be notified as soon after as possible.

11. Instructions to Supervising Officers.

(a) The supervising officer must remain in the room during the whole of the examination, but, if compelled or required to leave for any reason, should not do so unless proper supervision is arranged for.

(b) A candidate should not be permitted to leave the room unless adequate supervision is arranged during his absence.

(c) No books or memoranda should be assessible to candidates under examination unless specified in special instructions.

(d) No one except candidates and those officially connected with the examination are allowed to enter the examination room.

(e) Strict silence is to be enforced, and candidates should be seated in such a way as to guard against copying or any possibility of collusion.

(f) Examination papers will be forwarded to the commanding officer in a sealed cover indicating the name of the candidate and the subject. The seal is to be broken by the supervising officer in the presence of the candidate at the time appointed in the time table, or as shown on the outer envelope, for the particular subject.

(g) Supervising officers should make sure that candidates' worked papers are correctly filled in by the candidates, i.e., examination number, subject, and paper (first or second).

(h) The papers in each subject must be initialled by the supervising officer in the top right-hand corner of the first page as soon as they are received from the candidate.

(i) The answers for each paper should be forwarded immediately after each examination in the addressed envelopes supplied. Two special envelopes will be supplied for this purpose, viz., an inner envelope addressed to the university or college conducting the examination, and an outer envelope marked "CONFIDENTIAL," addressed to the Director of Education and Vocational Training, 341 Collins-street, Melbourne. The inner envelope will indicate the subject, candidate's examination number (if applicable), and date and time of examination. Supervisors will initial the inner envelope as a guarantee that the examination has been held under the conditions laid down. This envelope will then be returned in the outer envelope to the Director of Education and Vocational Training. Outer envelopes will also bear the name of the candidate, the name of the subject and, when there is more than one paper, the number of the paper (e.g., first paper, or second paper). Supervisors are to ensure that papers are returned in the correct envelopes.

Mathematical tables supplied to the candidates should be returned under separate cover to the same address.

(j) Should Service conditions render it impossible for the candidate to sit for the examination on the date shown on the official time table for the working of the paper, he shall be permitted to take the test as opportunity offers, provided the worked papers are accompanied by a statutory declaration from the candidate and a letter from the commanding officer explaining the circumstances. The statutory declaration shall be to the effect that the candidate had no knowledge of the contents of the paper at the time of his sitting for the examination.

NON-SUBSTANTIVE RATINGS-RECOMMENDATIONS.

2. In this regard, it is pointed out that the substitution of a Bofors for an Oerlikon requires an increase of one A.A.2 and one A.A.3 for each mounting so exchanged.

3. The attention of all commanding officers is drawn to paragraphs 11 and 14 of the above-mentioned A.F.O.

4. In the R.A.N., men recommended for 3rd class rates should equal the number of 3rd class rates allowed by complement.

EXAMINATION FOR ADVANCEMENT OF W.R.A.N. SICK BERTH RATINGS.

Examinations for advancement of W.R.A.N. sick berth ratings are to be held twice a year, in February and August. The numbers (but not names) of candidates sitting for (a) sick berth petty officer, and (b) leading sick berth attendant, are to be reported to Navy Office not later than the 15th January, or 15th July. Nil returns are to be rendered.

2. The written examination papers will be set by a medical officer at Flinders Naval Depot, and will consist of two papers covering the syllabus laid down on Form A.S.1237, except that question 15 is to be deleted and substituted by a question on elementary gynaecology. The oral and practical test will be the same as for male sick berth ratings.

3. The written examination papers will be forwarded to examination centres by the Director of Naval Medical Services. The oral and practical examination is to be carried out as soon as possible after the completion of the written examination, and the results noted *in figures* on Form A.S.1237. These forms in duplicate, together with the worked papers, are then to be forwarded to the Director of Naval Medical Services.

4. Candidates will be required to obtain in the oral as well as in the written examination the standard of marks required for a pass, but, where a candidate obtains marks 10 per cent. below the percentage prescribed in either the practical or the written parts of the examination, she will be considered as passed if she obtains sufficient marks in the other portion of the test to bring her total marks up to the prescribed percentage.

5. Each candidate will be allotted an examination number, and only the distinguishing number, and not the candidate's name, is to be shown on the worked papers. The examination number allotted to each candidate should be shown on Form A.S.1237 as well as the rating's name in order that, when the papers have been corrected, each rating's identity will be known in Navy Office to enable the final results to be published without delay.

GUNNERY PRACTICES IN SMALL SHIPS.

It has become apparent from the ammunition returns that certain small ships are not carrying out any firing practices.

2. While it is realized that it is very difficult and at times even impossible for small ships and local defence craft to carry out organized target practices, it is essential that all weapons be fired occasionally in order to ensure their adequate maintenance and to give the gun's crews some idea of how their weapons sound and behave.

3. The periods between actual firings should not normally exceed one month. An improvised target should be used if no other be available.

R.A.N. WOMEN'S SERVICES—EXTRA DUTY ALLOWANCES NOT PAYABLE.

It is promulgated for general information that no authority exists in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions for payment of nonsubstantive and extra duty allowances to members of the R.A.N. Women's Services.

2. In certain establishments, wran stewardesses have incorrectly been credited with the allowance for "care of mess traps" and, in addition, applications have been received for payment to wrans of the allowances provided in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Articles 73 and 82, for shorthand writers and for telegraphists performing "special duty".

. 3. When there is no alternative, wran stewardesses may be deputed to the duty of "care of mess traps", although an extra allowance is not payable; but the instructions contained in the Manual of Victualling, Chapter XIII, for charges against pay in respect of deficiencies which may occur are not to be applied to them. The provisions of Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 9, are, however, to be observed, where applicable.

4. It is a Governmental direction that the greatest possible measure of uniformity in pay and conditions of service is to be preserved between the Women's Services of the Navy, Army and Air Force. The rates of active pay, which are similar in all such Services, have accordingly been established in groups to provide for variation in nature of duties and qualifications held.

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LEDGER PAGES AND REGISTER FORMS (NAVAL STOREKEEPING).

Stocks of Naval Storekeeping Forms A.S.123A, A.S.146, A.S.151, A.S.153, A.S.155A, A.S.155B, A.S.155C, A.S.155X, A.S.155Y, and A.S.155z are now maintained at Melbourne, Fremantle and Brisbane as well as Sydney, and H.M.A. ships and establishments should demand ledger pages and register forms at the most convenient port.

2. Ledger pages, forms A.S.123A, A.S.146, A.S.151, and A.S.153, all of which require to be serially numbered and initialled by an inspecting officer (naval storekeeping) before issue, should be demanded by memorandum from the authority concerned at the appropriate port, viz.:—



SUPPLIES OF NAVAL STORES TO R.N. FORCES AT AUSTRALIAN PORTS.

The following particulars of arrangements for dealing with requirements of naval stores at Australian ports for R.N. ships and allied vessels including R.N. vessels manned by R.A.N. personnel, viz., 21st and 22nd M/S Flotillas and "N" and "Q" Class Destroyers are promulgated for information :--

- Sydney.—All supplies will be made from the R.N. Naval Store Depot.
- Brisbane.—Pending the establishment of an R.N. Naval Store Depot at Brisbane, demands for naval stores required by R.N. ships should be forwarded direct to the R.N. Naval Store Depot, Sydney.
- Fremantle, Melbourne, Adelaide.—R.A.N. Naval Store Depots at Fremantle and Melbourne and the Base Naval Store at Pt. Adelaide will meet demands of R.N. ships based on or refitting at these ports. In addition, these depots will satisfy demands by visiting R.N. vessels to the extent that stocks permit. In cases where the latter ships are not proceeding to a main storing port and it is essential for replenishment to be made at Melbourne, or Adelaide in particular where large stocks are not maintained, demands which cannot be satisfied are to be forwarded by the R.A.N. depot to the Superintending Naval Store Officer (R.N.), Sydney, for supply from the R.N. Naval Store Depot, Sydney, direct to the ship concerned. Arrangements made should in each instance be communicated to the ship.
- Darwin, Townsville.—As stocks of naval stores will not permit other than small casual supplies, demands from R.N. ships other than for casual supplies should be forwarded by ships concerned direct to the R.N. Naval Store Depot, Sydney, until R.N. stocks are established at other ports.
- Other Ports.—Demands from R.N. ships should be forwarded by ships concerned direct to the R.N. Naval Store Depot, Sydney, until R.N. stocks are established at other ports.

KHAKI DRILL SERVICE DRESS FOR OFFICERS.

With reference to the Uniform Regulations for Officers of the Fleet, as contained in the Appendix to Admiralty Navy List, the Naval Board have approved that khaki drill service dress may be worn as an optional dress by R.A.N., R.A.N.R. and R.A.N.V.R. officers in shore establishments, or otherwise employed ashore, when khaki tropical dress would normally be worn or instead of No. 10 dress on informal occasions at night.

2. When worn, khaki drill service dress is, except for the distinctive R.A.N. gilt buttons, to conform to the following particulars contained in R.N.T.M. (A), No. 3, relating to the wearing of this dress by officers of the British Pacific Fleet whilst in Australia:--

- (a) The jacket is to be the same pattern as the military service dress with belt of the same material, and blue shoulder straps are to be worn.
- (b) Trousers are not to have cuffs or other turn up.
- (c) Khaki shirt and black tie are to be worn, shoes being either black or brown.
- (d) Khaki cap cover is to be worn.

3. The necessary arrangements for the supply of this dress are being made with the naval outfitters operating in the several States under the current agreement for the supply of officers' uniforms, also with the Commonwealth Government Clothing Factory, and details and prices will be promulgated in Navy Orders at an early date. Meanwhile, R.A.N. officers may place their orders with the outfitters referred to, who at present supply officers of the British Pacific Fleet and are utilizing a standardized khaki drill material, Naval requirements of which are procured by outfitters from Army stocks.

KIT BAGS, HAMMOCKS, ETC.—LOSSES DURING TRANSPORT— LABELLING AND MARKING.

Many claims have been received for compensation in respect of kit bags, hammocks, &c., lost whilst in transit by rail. On investigation, it has been found that, in numerous instances, the losses have been due to—

- (a) insufficient or incorrect marking and labelling of the items; and
- (b) failure on the part of ratings to realize fully their responsibilities in connection with their kits whilst on draft.

Accompanied Baggage.

2. It is to be made clear to all ratings, that although they may, whilst on draft, become separated from their kit bags, hammocks, &c., they are not relieved from the responsibility of sighting them from time to time and taking every precaution to prevent their loss. A sense of personal responsibility on the part of every man is a natural and essential requisite and every one must realize that, if he abandons his own personal supervision of his belongings, he cannot subsequently expect others to find missing items or the Service to make good consequent losses. On the other hand it is equally important that all care and vigilance should be exercised by responsible persons in ships and establishments to ensure that compensation for losses occurring beyond the control of ratings is reduced to a minimum.

3. In order to facilitate the restoration of articles which may become lost in transit and from which labels have become detached, immediate steps are to be taken by commanding officers of ships and establishments to have all kit bags, hammocks, tool chests, suitcases, &c., belonging to ratings attached to their command, permanently marked with the ratings' names and initials, official numbers, and home ports. With regard to kit bags, experience has shown that it is more advantageous to mark this item along the side instead of at the bottom of the bag, as markings in the latter position are subject to mutilation and sometimes complete obliteration whilst the bag is in transit. Kit bags, therefore, are to be marked along the side.

4. Prior to draft from ships and establishments, the effects of ratings are to be inspected to ensure that the following instructions have been complied with, viz.:--

- (a) that each item is permanently marked with a rating's name, official number and home port, as directed in paragraph 3;
- (b) that a label, setting out that the following details, and no others, is securely attached to each item :---

Name	
RatingOfficial No	
Destination	

(Rail Station only)

(c) that other out-of-date labels and railway stickers are removed or effectively cancelled;

(d) that kit bags, tool chests, suitcases, &c., are securely locked;

With regard to (d), unless kit bags, tool chests and suitcases are securely locked during transport, responsibility will not be accepted by the Department for loss by theft of any portion of the contents.

Unaccompanied Baggage.

5. Unaccompanied baggage landed by a ship to a shore establishment is to be dealt with as set forth in paragraph 4 and, in addition, the reason for the landing of the baggage is to be noted in capital letters on the outside of each package, as follows :--

Signalled advice of the landing of the baggage, and the reason therefor, is to be forwarded to the establishment where landed, and where onward transmission is required, repeated to naval establishment at point of destination.

6. Unaccompanied baggage required to be sent by rail to a naval establishment in another State is in all cases in future to be despatched through the Military Forwarding Organization and the consignment of such baggage by goods train, as directed in Article 243, clause 3, Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, is to be discontinued. Consignments handled by Military Forwarding Organizations are promptly despatched by troop trains which run daily between Melbourne, Sydney, and Northern States, and tri-weekly between Melbourne and Western States. In cases of extreme urgency, however, Military Forwarding Officers will arrange for packages, of a weight not exceeding 112 lb., to be despatched by passenger train on representations being made, but, having in view the frequent running of troop trains as indicated above, and the higher rates of freight prevailing for consignments by passenger train, this method of transport must not be resorted to unless extreme urgency exists.

7. The location of Military Forwarding Officers in the capital cities of each State is as follows:---

Melbourne.—602 Little Collins-street, Melbourne. Sydney.—21 Pier-street, Sydney. Brisbane.—Railway Parcels Office, Roma-street, Brisbane. Darwin.—Care of Army Movement Control, Darwin. Hobart.—Anglesea Barracks, Hobart. Adelaide.—137 North-terrace, Adelaide. Perth.—Railway-terrace, Perth.

At other centres, the local Military Rail Transport Officer performs the functions of Military Forwarding Officer.

8. When despatch of baggage through Military Forwarding Organization is desired, the commanding officer of the naval establishment concerned is to arrange for the items properly marked, locked (where applicable) and labelled as indicated in paragraphs 4 and 5, to be delivered to the local Military Forwarding Officer for onward transmission, a detailed receipt being obtained for the packages comprising the consignment. The despatching establishment will then communicate to the receiving establishment, by signal, particulars of the packages consigned, stating names, ranks or ratings, official numbers, and, in cases where consignments originate from the despatching establishment, reason for despatch.

9. When baggage is delivered to Military Forwarding Organization for despatch to *Huon*, in which case transmission by sea becomes necessary, kit bags, suitcases and packages, are to be packed in bulk cases and a list of the items contained therein is to be enclosed in each case. The total weight of each case with contents must not exceed 2 cwt. Hammocks are not to be cased but are to be wired in bundles not exceeding six.

10. Confirmation of transmission of baggage through Military Forwarding Organization is to be forwarded by the despatching naval establishment on Form D.80, two copies being forwarded by post to the receiving establishment and care taken to ensure that one copy is returned receipted within a reasonable time. The names of the personnel concerned and official numbers of ratings should invariably be shown on Form D.80.

11. On the arrival of the baggage at point of destination, the local Military Forwarding Officer will notify the commanding officer of the naval establishment concerned who is to arrange for the packages to be collected at the earliest possible moment and for the Form D.80 referred to in paragraph 10 to be receipted and returned to the despatching naval establishments. Care is to be taken that baggage collected from the Military Forwarding Officer is closely examined before acceptance and that the attention of that officer is drawn to any visible signs of the packages having been tampered with *en route*.

12. Should baggage become lost in transit, the despatching establishment, on receipt of advice from the receiving establishment, is to notify the local Military Forwarding Officer who, in accordance with instructions issued by Army Movement Control Headquarters, will take necessary action in the endeavour to locate the baggage, and, if not successful, lodge a claim with the Transportation System concerned for the value of the missing items. When notifying the Military Forwarding Officer of the non-receipt of baggage, an estimated value of the missing consignment should be furnished.

13. It is very necessary that advices of despatch of baggage should be kept constantly under review and that inquiries to trace same are made immediately it is found to be missing. Written replies should be obtained wherever possible. If it be established that the baggage has been lost, all correspondence including signals is to be forwarded to Navy Office with the claim for compensation, which should give full details of the items lost.

Baggage Store Arrangements.

14. When kit is deposited in a baggage store at a shore establishment, a receipt must in every case be given by the senior rating in charge of the store. In the event of subsequent loss, this receipt will require to be produced by the rating concerned in support of a claim for compensation. When kit is landed by a ship in the absence of the rating, the receipt is to be retained on board and attached to any correspondence relating to the loss of kit.

15. Where not already in operation, a baggage register is to be introduced to record all packages received in baggage stores, accompanied or unaccompanied, as follows:—

(a) Date received;

(b) from whence received;

(c) name of owner;

(d) rank or rating;

(e) official number;

(f) description of items and condition;

(g) reason for stowage;

(h) rack in which stowed;

(i) date of withdrawal;

(i) Signature of person to whom delivery is made.

16. An alphabetical register is also to be introduced to record particulars of kits inquired for by other ships and establishments of which no trace is found when the inquiry is made, in order that the inquiring ship or establishment may be immediately informed should the missing kit subsequently come to hand.

17. It is observed, from returns rendered in accordance with the instructions contained in Navy Order 216 of 1943, that unclaimed effects of ratings have been held in baggage stores at certain shore establishments for long periods. With a view to the disposal of these items, commanding officers of the establishments concerned are to arrange for a list of items held, setting out fullest information available as to ownership, to be prepared and forwarded as early as possible to the Commodore Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depot, for advice as to the present appropriation of the ratings.

18. In cases where ownership of unclaimed baggage is not clearly indicated on the outside of the packages as required by standard instructions, or on the labels attached thereto, the packages are to be opened in the presence of a responsible officer and the contents examined for any information which might lead to ownership being determined. A list of the contents of each package opened is to be prepared on Form A.S.98 or A.S.98A and placed in the container. This list must be signed by the officer in whose presence the package was opened who will certify as to the contents disclosed on opening the package, place of examination and reason for inspection of contents. The package should then be securely fastened and a label attached thereto setting out all information available as to ownership.

19. In future, baggage of personnel is not to be finally stowed in a baggage store unless ownership is clearly indicated and it is known that the stowage of such baggage is authorized. When baggage is received and the whereabouts of the owner are unknown, packages are to be kept under review pending definite advice as to disposal. Should no advice be received within a reasonable period, the Commodore Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depot, is to be contacted in the matter with a view to the items being restored to the rightful owner with a minimum of delay, or in the case of a rating who has been discharged "Run," "S.N.L.R.," "Dead," &c., disposed of as set forth in the relevant Regulations and Instructions.

20. A Return of unclaimed effects of personnel held in baggage stores at shore establishments is to be rendered quarterly to the Director of Victualling, Navy Office, Melbourne (copy to the Commodore Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depot), i.e., on 1st January, 1st April, 1st July and 1st October each year. It is important that these returns be forwarded as early as possible after the due date. "Nil" returns are required.

21. C.O.R., Article 407, Navy Orders 57, 216 and 677 of 1943, and Article 243, clause 3, Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, are hereby cancelled.

- (iii) When allocated to a specific duty, which is considered to justify the non-substantive rate of Q.R.1. Approval for rate and pay is, in this case, to be obtained from the Naval Board.

3. The non-substantive pay of 1s. 6d. per diem is not payable concurrently with other gunnery allowances or training allowances.

4. The non-substantive rating of Acting Q.R.1 (S.V.) may be granted to ratings qualified in accordance with paragraph 2 above with retrospective effect to 1st July, 1943, but not earlier.

PROPELLER SHAFTING-REPAIR BY WELDING.

In order to limit the deterioration of propeller shafting by corrosion, it has been decided that repairs by welding will be permitted on shafting of 28/32 ton steel.

2. Unless it is reasonably certain that the shafting is in good condition, it is to be thoroughly cleaned as soon as practicable after docking and an examination made to determine the extent to which repairs are desirable. 3. Isolated pitting in excess of about 3/16 inch in depth may be repaired by welding *in situ*, the welding being dressed off flush with the body of the shaft after completion. When such repairs are carried out, a report with sketches is to be forwarded to the Naval Board for information.

4. Where extensive pitting is found in circumferential bands such that the cross section of the shaft is appreciably reduced, it will be necessary for the shafting to be withdrawn, and for the defective area to be turned down to sound metal and completely re-built by welding. The length of shaft machined must be sufficient to allow longitudinal runs of welding to be deposited in the "N.S.E.W." method and must not be less than 12 inches.

5. As this procedure requires special welding technique, and since there are limits beyond which the diameter must not be reduced by turning, Naval Board approval is to be sought by signal before such repairs are made. The signal should state the location of the defects, the approximate area affected and the minimum diameter to which it would be necessary to machine the shaft to remove the band of pitting.

6. Welding repairs to shafting of 34/38 ton steel (as fitted in modern cruisers and destroyers) will not be permitted for the present.

PALMER LLH PETROL ENGINES-OPERATING SPEEDS.

Reports of excessive engine wear have been received from frigates and other ships carrying motor boats fitted with the Palmer LLH Engine.

2. It appears that a contributory cause of this trouble is the overspeeding of the engine which may arise from the unavoidable use of high octane motor spirit in forward areas.

3. In order to minimize trouble from this cause, arrangements should be made in boats concerned for the fitting of a stop pin in the throttle quadrant in such a position as to limit the maximum speed of the engine, when using high octane spirit, to 1650/1700 R.P.M.

4. The stop pin should be arranged so that it may be removed when normal grades of fuel are in use.

FUMIGATION OF H.M.A. SHIPS.

Medical journals recently received in Navy Office disclose a considerable increase of infestation by rats and also in some cases by fleas, bugs, etc., in H.M.A. ships.

2. It appears hardly necessary to point out the very grave danger of rat infestation in the case of H.M.A. ships operating in or arriving from areas where plague is endemic or where sporadic cases may, from time to time, occur showing that the rat population is affected by the bacillus of plague. 3. The only satisfactory method of eliminating rats is by complete fumigation of the whole ship. This procedure is to be carried out at the earliest possible opportunity by any of H.M.A. ships in which rats have been observed and especially if the ship has returned from areas referred to in the foregoing paragraph.

4. Commanding officers are to ensure that an item for fumigation is inserted in the ship's main defect list for annual refits or more frequently if considered necessary.

5. Special care is also to be taken in regard to the provision of adequate rat guards and in the disposal of garbage when alongside.

6. In cases of doubt, the representative of the Commonwealth Department of Health should be consulted.

LIFTING APPLIANCES ON H.M.A. SHIPS-LABEL PLATES.

A recent accident to a derrick, which was being used to lift a load in excess of the authorized working load, has drawn attention to the necessity for fixing suitably engraved label plates to all lifting appliances on H.M.A. ships so that ships' officers will have this information immediately to hand. This applies especially to derricks and davits.

2. Fitting out authorities are in all cases to ensure that these plates are fixed in a prominent position to derrick posts and davits. A typical layout is shown below:—

LEAVE-R.A.N. WOMEN'S SERVICES.

The following instructions, which are to govern the grant of recreation leave, leave without pay and leave on compassionate grounds to present serving members of the Women's Royal Australian Naval Service and the Royal Australian Naval Nursing Service are promulgated for information and guidance. Previous instructions in this regard are cancelled.

Recreation Leave.

2. Recreation leave and travelling leave may be granted to members of the R.A.N. Women's Services in accordance with the conditions prescribed for members of the sea-going forces.

3. Recreation leave is to be calculated on the basis of 24 days a year plus necessary travelling time.

4. Leave for the current year (24 days) may be taken as convenient, and the amount of leave granted is not necessarily to be limited to the leave credit already established for part of such year.

5. Leave accruing from 1st July, 1942, at the rate of 24 days a year or 2 days for each completed month if not taken, shall be carried forward. Payment in lieu of any balance of leave not taken shall be made after final discharge.

6. Home leave passes but not leave concession warrants may be issued.

Compassionate Leave.

7. Subject to the conditions set out in paragraphs 8-12, both inclusive, of this Order, naval officers-in-charge or commanding officers may grant leave on compassionate grounds with full pay plus necessary travelling time without prior reference to the Naval Board.

- (a) Death, imminent death or dangerous illness of husband, child or parent, or other near dependent relative;
- (b) urgent private reasons of an exceptional or personal nature not connected with the immediate resumption of civil employment. Cases of serious prejudice in business, domestic or financial affairs of a member shall be considered as a legitimate ground for granting compassionate leave only when the member's presence will materially affect the situation. Marriage is not a ground for the grant of compassionate leave.

9. The amount of leave so granted to a member (which shall be confined to that which is absolutely necessary) shall be subject to a maximum period of full pay of 28 days exclusive of the requisite travelling time on each such occasion and shall be apportioned as follows:—

(a) The first 7 days (or portion thereof where the period is less than 7 days) shall be treated as compassionate leave and shall not be debited against recreation leave.

- (b) Any further period shall be treated strictly in the following order, as:-
 - (i) a debit against recreation leave at credit up to the end of the current leave year;
 - (ii) a debit, up to eight days only, against recreation leave to accrue in the next leave year;
 - (iii) additional compassionate leave.

10. Where an extension of such leave is required beyond the maximum of 28 days or where leave is required for reasons other than those specified in paragraph 8 and recreation leave for the current year has been exhausted, such leave shall be without pay and granted in accordance with paragraphs 13-18, both inclusive, of this Order.

11. It shall be the responsibility of the commanding officer to inquire into the circumstances of each application for the grant of compassionate leave and, if practicable, to obtain a certificate or other evidence which is to be forwarded to the Naval Board together with his report of the matter. This report is to include details of the apportionment of the leave in addition to full information of the compassionate circumstances warranting the grant of such leave.

12. Where it is necessary to avoid delay in dealing with an application for compassionate leave, such leave may in the first instance be debited against recreation leave and a corresponding credit allowed if and when the bona fides of the application is established.

Leave Without Pay.

13. Naval officers-in-charge may grant leave without pay on urgent private domestic grounds to members of the R.A.N. Women's Services, up to a maximum of 14 days plus necessary travelling time, in any period of 12 months, without prior reference to the Naval Board.

14. The grant of such leave is to be reported as early as practicable to the Secretary, Naval Board, by letter, advising the number of days granted and the date of commencement of the leave.

15. The necessary travelling time granted is to be without pay.

16. Where an application is made for leave without pay in excess of 14 days plus necessary travelling time, the prior approval of the Naval Board is to be obtained before such excess leave is granted.

17. Leave without pay will count as part of a member's period of service, but will not count towards seniority for promotion or advancement or towards the requisite qualifying time for eligibility for credit of deferred pay.

18. A member under 21 years of age shall be permitted to count periods of leave without pay towards the requisite qualifying time for the increased rate of active pay provided that, where any continuous period of leave so granted exceeds two calendar months, the period in excess thereof shall not be permitted to count.

LANDING CRAFT SIGNALMEN (SIG. L.C.)—INSTITUTION OF HIGHER NON-SUBSTANTIVE RATES.

The provisions of A.F.O. 3499/44 have been adopted in the Royal Australian Navy with the following exceptions:--

- (a) The 1st class rate will not be instituted at present.
- (b) Standards of knowledge will be based on U.S. systems of signalling and will be as indicated below.

2. Landing craft signalmen, who qualified in H.M.A.S. Assault, will be regarded as holding the 3rd class rate.

3. It is intended that each Australian Landing Ship, Infantry, shall carry two landing craft signalmen, 2nd class. The scheme of complement will be amended in due course. Landing craft signalmen may be promoted to fill vacancies in higher non-substantive rating in their own ship.

4. The authority for promotion is the commanding officer. The rating's service certificate is to be noted, and the Commodore Superintendent of Training is to be informed by letter.

5. Courses for higher rate are to be conducted in the ships in which ratings are serving.

6. Standards of knowledge are to be as shown in the following table:---

ADVANCEMENT OF RATINGS TRAINED IN COMBINED OPERATIONS.

The following conditions of service have been approved for ratings entered for, and serving in, the Combined Operations Organization.

2. Ordinary seamen required for combined operations training will be selected from ordinary seamen who have completed one month's disciplinary course at Flinders Naval Depot and will then be appropriated to combined operations camp as required. In view of the disadvantage to which these ratings will be subjected as compared with ordinary seamen who complete the full new entry course at Flinders Naval Depot and thus have the opportunity of gaining one month both in scamanship and gunnery, vide Navy Order 355 of 1941, the Naval Board have approved of the following conditions of advancement to able seaman of ordinary seaman selected for combined operations training:—

- (a) On completion of the combined operations training course of two months, ordinary seaman may gain up to two months' time on examination in combined operations courses which include seamanship, boat work, small arms training, pilotage and signals, according to the scale:-
 - 85 per cent. and over (V.G.I.)-two months.
 - 75 per cent.-84 per cent. (V.G.)-one month.
 - 74 per cent. and below-nil.
- (b) Twelve months' service as ordinary seaman, including 4 months' sea service minus any time gained in accordance with (a). In exceptional cases, commanding officers may reduce the necessary service of an ordinary seaman to 11, 10 or a minimum of 9 months (in addition to time gained as at (a)), thus making possible a minimum of seven months' service. The due dates for advancement in all cases to be reckoned from the commencing date of service as ordinary seaman.
- (c) An ordinary seaman, who has not completed four months' sea service including time allowed under paragraph 4, is only eligible to be advanced to acting able seaman on the completion of twelve months' service as an ordinary seaman. Confirmation and antedating in respect of time gained in accordance with (a) and (b) may be effected however on completion of four months' sea service.
- (d) Ordinary seamen who may be returned to general service before completion of the two months' course referred to in (a) above will be subject to general service conditions of advancement. A maximum of one month's seniority for seamanship and one month for gunnery to be awarded by the commanding officer of the next sea-going ship under same conditions as if courses were completed in depot. Similarly ordinary seamen returned to general service after completion of training will be subject to general service conditions of advancement, unless such return was due to causes outside the rating's own control, in which case particulars should be reported to the Naval Board for decision.

3. Vacancies for leading seaman, leading signalman, leading telegraphist, leading stoker, petty officer, yeoman of signals, petty officer telegraphist, and stoker petty officer will be filled from personnel serving within the Combined Operations Organization and will be subject to the following conditions:—

To leading seaman, leading signalman. leading telegraphist, and leading stoker:-

- (a) Authority of Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.
- (b) Vacancies in fleet numbers of combined operations organization.
- (c) Recommendation on Form A.S.507 (owing to limited opportunities for confirmation a Form A.S.507 may be rendered for acting able seamen).
- (d) No professional or time qualification.
- (e) Advancement to be in the provisional acting temporary rating.
- (f) Acting provisional temporary rating to be held only while serving in Combined Operations Organization including period up to 30 days whilst in hospital or on sick leave; ratings reverted to general service revert to the last confirmed substantive rating held.

To petty officer, yeoman of signals, petty officer telegraphist, and stoker petty officer:---

- (a) As for leading seaman and leading stoker.
- (b) Vacancy in fleet numbers of combined operations organization.
- (c) Authority of the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.
- (d) Recommendation on Form A.S.507. Recommendations are to include particulars of any civil employment or hobbies which may have contributed to the efficiency of the rating.
- (e) Advancement to be in the provisional acting temporary rating.
- (f) Acting provisional temporary rating to be held only while serving in Combined Operations Organization, including period up to 30 days whilst in hospital or on sick leave; ratings reverted to general service revert to the last confirmed rating held.

4. Combined operations ratings on shore abroad may count their shore service as sea time for advancement purposes, but other qualifications of a professional nature (whether examinations or certificates) may not be waived in connexion with general service advancement.

5. On completion of combined operations courses, a return of the results of the examinations is to be rendered to the Director of Navy Accounts and the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, setting out the percentages in various subjects and time gained by each rating. Names of ratings reverted to general service should also be indicated on this return.

BANDSMEN—EMPLOYMENT IN LIEU OF R.C. RATINGS— ALLOWANCE—A.F.O. 909/45.

4. In ships where band, regulating, writer, stores, steward or cook ratings are filling a duty for which R.C. ratings are authorized and complemented, but not borne, an extension of the higher fire control allowance is hereby authorized on the following scales:—

NAVAL STORE ISSUING SHIP—SUPPLY OF NAVAL STORES FOR ESCORT VESSELS IN THE NORTHERN AREA.

H.M.A.S. Whangpu has been fitted as a Naval Store Issuing Ship and supplied with a comprehensive range of naval stores. The stocks carried are primarily to replenish escort vessels and M.L's but requirements of larger vessels will be met when necessary to the extent possible. 2. As from 19th June, 1945, demands for naval stores required by H.M.A. Escort Vessels, &c., in the vicinity of H.M.A.S. Whangpu should be lodged with the naval store issuing ship. Demands should be lodged at mainland bases or naval store depots only when it is impracticable owing to their location for escort vessels to draw requirements from the naval store issuing ship.

3. Demands for naval stores for these vessels at present held at bases or naval store depots will be supplied by the depot holding the demands and such items should not be re-demanded from the naval store issuing ship. When the vessels visit shore depots, the ship's storekeeping officer should take the opportunity to review and cancel as necessary outstanding demands.

4. All demands from H.M.A. ships for requirements of naval stores should be prepared on Forms A.S.134D and lodged in the naval store issuing ship in quadruplicate. In the case of periodical replenishments, the demands should be forwarded to the naval store issuing ship a reasonable period before the stores are actually required. It is necessary for all demands for consumable stores to show particulars of prior expenditure and stock held on the date of preparation of the demand and care should be taken to ensure that these particulars are included in order to avoid delay in satisfaction of demands. B.R.4, Article 14, refers.

5. Unserviceable naval stores returned to the naval store issuing ship for survey should be accompanied by a requisition for survey (Form A.S.331) and a demand (Form A.S.134D) for items required in lieu.

6. The procedure at present applicable to H.M.A. ships in regard to supply and return of naval stores at naval store depots is to be observed in regard to all transactions with the naval store issuing ship.



CLASS ADVANCEMENT OF ARTIFICER AND ARTISAN BRANCHES.

Various requests have been received for approval to advance R.A.N.R., ratings of the artificer, shipwright and artisan branches to a higher class in less time than that required under the present regulations by virtue of their having been—

- (a) advanced to 3rd class at an earlier date than usual under the then existing R.A.N.R. Regulations,
- (b) entered in a higher class under the terms of Navy Order 276 of 1940, paragraph 10.

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2. It is pointed out that the R.A.N.R. Regulations were "peace time" requirements for advancement and that a much higher standard and more actual service experience is required when mobilized.

3. Ratings receiving early advancement under (a) and (b) of paragraph 1 have been given the benefit denied to other members of their branches.

It is not, however, the intention that such benefits under (a) of paragraph 1 should be carried to subsequent advancements to a higher class, e.g., any rating advanced to the 3rd class after less service than that required by normal Regulations will have to serve the full combined time necessary for further advancement.

Similarly, a rating advanced under the conditions of (b) of paragraph 1 will have to serve the full time necessary for further advancement, irrespective of the actual time served in the next lower class.

RESTRICTED ISSUES OF FRESH MILK AND MILK PRODUCTS.

In confirmation of message T.O.O. 010326 June, as amended by message T.O.O. 060727 June, 1945, the following sub-paragraph is to be inserted at the end of section B of Navy Order 265 of 1944:-

" (vii) Milk.

Subject to paragraphs 2 to 6 hereunder, inclusive, the issue of fresh milk and milk products to general messes and repayment messes is not to exceed the following :---

- (a) All sea-going ships, also shore-based personnel in operational areas north of Australia—one half pint of fresh milk or 4 oz. of unsweetened condensed milk or 1¹/₄ oz. of full cream dried milk per head daily.
- (b) All harbor ships and personnel at mainland bases one half pint of fresh milk or 3 oz. of unsweetened condensed milk or 1 oz. of full cream dried milk per head daily.".

2. The daily ration for female personnel is to be one pint of fresh milk, when available, or 5 oz. of unsweetened condensed milk or $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of full cream dried milk.

3. Fresh milk for sick mess personnel may normally be issued on a basis of one pint per head daily, but in individual cases the ration may be increased up to a maximum of two pints per head, and more in special cases, at the discretion of the naval medical officer concerned.

4. Issues for cadet midshipmen at the Naval College may be made up to a maximum of $1\frac{1}{2}$ pints per head daily.

5. The foregoing allowances are to include the daily requirements of milk for cooking and for all other purposes, excepting approved extra issues referred to in C.O.R., Article 423. 6. The use of tinned milk or dried milk is permitted under (b) above only to the extent necessary to provide the equivalent of the deficiency of fresh milk on occasions when the full authorized ration of fresh milk is not available.

7. Summarized weekly issues of fresh milk and milk products are to be included in the weekly statement of rationed items referred to in B, sub-section (i) (f) of Navy Order 265 of 1944.

NAVAL PERSONNEL PROCEEDING ON LEAVE OR DISCHARGED— SUPPLY OF CIGARETTES AND TOBACCO.

With reference to Navy Order 82 of 1945, it is notified for general information that, as from 1st July, 1945, the maximum quantities of tobacco and cigarettes to be supplied to personnel proceeding on long leave and to personnel discharged to civil life are as follows:—

(a) In Darwin area.

3 oz. of tobacco or 105 No. cigarettes per head per week.

(b) In all other areas in Australia.

Males— $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of tobacco or 85 cigarettes per head per week.

Females—70 cigarettes per head per week.

Personnel discharged to civil life.

Personnel may draw, on discharge, up to 24 days' supply of cigarettes or tobacco on the basis shown in paragraph 1 (b) above.

H.M.A. M.Ls., H.D.M.Ls. AND A.S.R. BOATS—FORMS A.D.495 (REPORT OF DOCKING) AND FORM A D.488 (PROPELLERS AND UNDERWATER FITTINGS)—PROCEDURE.

On each occasion of docking of H.MA. M.Ls. at all docks (or slips), the naval refitting authority is to prepare the above forms in quadruplicate for distribution as follows:—

Original—To the administrative authority of the craft, for transmission to the Naval Board.

Duplicate-To the administrative authority of the craft.

Triplicate—To be retained by the refitting authority concerned. Quadruplicate—To boat for retention in ship's book.

2. This procedure applies when docking (or slipping) at all docks (or slips) and the distinction indicated on the forms is in abeyance during hostilities.

REPATRIATED PRISONERS OF WAR-MEDICAL HISTORIES.

All repatriated prisoners of war are to be medically examined upon their first reception into an R.A.N. establishment. This examination should be directed towards ascertaining whether any medical treatment is required during the first period of leave, whether any disease exists which might constitute a danger to other persons, or whether any condition or disease exists which should be reported to the Commonwealth Department of Health in accordance with Navy Order 330 of 1941. Further interrogations for the purpose of recreating medical history sheets are to be deferred until the commencement of the rehabilitation course.

2. Medical history documents are to be recreated for all repatriated prisoners of war during their rehabilitation course and these are to be completed as fully as possible with details supplied by the repatriated men, who are to be warned of the possible implications for their future treatment of neglect to advise any illness or disability suffered by them in prisoner of war camps.

ORDNANCE Q.F. 40 mm. BOFORS-LIQUID IN RECOIL BUFFER.

Recoil buffers of ordnance Q.F. 40 mm. Bofors of all types are to be filled with oil D.T.D. 44p instead of glycerine and water to conform to Admiralty practice.

2. All ships mounting this gun are to demand, as first supply, one gallon of this oil per gun.

3. If oil D.T.D. 44p is not available, a mixture of 60 per cent. glycerine and 40 per cent. water may be used instead (in cold weather use 80/20 mixture). Buffers filled with glycerine and water should be drained and refilled with D.T.D. 44p as soon as adequate supplies are available. Glycerine and water and D.T.D. 44p must not be mixed. Buffers are to be thoroughly drained before refilling with a different type of liquid.

4. When buffers are filled with glycerine and water, the letter "G" 1 inch high is to be painted on the buffer near the filling plug, in white paint. The "G" is to be painted out when the liquid is changed to D.T.D. 44D.

5. A reference to this Navy Order is to be inserted in all copies of A.B.R. 171 against paragraph 57.



REPLENISHMENT OF NAVAL STORES-H.M.A. SHIPS.

It has been noted that, on occasions of periodical replenishment of naval stores, a tendency exists, particularly in A.M.S. Vessels, to overstock, quantities being demanded in excess of those authorized for the storing period based on past expenditure.

2. This position was to an extent unavoidable in the case of ships in remote areas as requirements were, as a rule, supplied from mainland depots. Conditions have now altered as a result of the naval store issuing ship being in operation, which enables escort vessels in northern New Guinea waters to replenish with naval stores regularly at short notice.

3. It is necessary to conserve available stocks of naval stores to meet all requirements, and demands on the naval store issuing ship should in future be limited to requirements for the normal storing period, having due regard to foreseen abnormal expenditures. Discretion should be exercised in replenishing stocks of stores liable to deterioration, particularly in tropical climates.

4. Attention is also drawn to Navy Order 287 of 1945.

With reference to the Uniform Regulations for Officers of the Fleet, as contained in the Appendix to Admiralty Navy List, the Naval Board have approved that blue working dress (No. 5A) may be worn as an optional dress by R.A.N., R.A.N.R., and R.A.N.V.R. officers in shore establishments, or otherwise employed ashore in Australia, when blue dress is the rig of the day.

CONDEMNATIONS OF PROVISIONS IN SHIPS AND NAVAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

With reference to Confidential Commonwealth Navy Order 16 of 1944 and Navy Order 36 of 1945, the attention of all officers concerned is again drawn to the necessity for exercising strict supervision over stocks of fresh and dry provisions maintained and for rigid compliance with regulations, instructions and Orders relating thereto.

2. It is apparent from an examination of Forms A.S. 330 and provision accounts (Forms A.S. 83 (1) and A.S. 462z) that the various instructions issued for the purpose of reducing losses to a minimum are in many cases not being fully observed, and abnormal condemnations are still occurring, especially in small ships, which would have been avoided, or much reduced, if adequate supervision and care had been exercised in the required control of stocks carried. More serious notice will be taken in future, therefore, to such omissions which cause or contribute to losses.

3. In order to guard satisfactorily against avoidable waste of fresh provisions, it is essential that accountant officers, also commanding officers of ships in which an accountant officer is not borne, should take every precaution to ensure that demands for requirements are on all occasions rigidly restricted in the case of each item to the period for which the total quantity will remain wholesome under the prevailing storage conditions. In this connection, attention is specially drawn to the general instructions contained in C.O.R., Article 421 (1942 Edition), non-observance of which in future will necessitate the imposition of penalties under Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 9, in the event of condemnations resulting from excessive quantities carried. 4. In regard to the treatment, preservation, storage, &c., of provisions generally, special attention is also drawn to Part II of Volume I of the Manual of Victualling, and particularly to Chapter V thereof relating to cold storage. The precautions prescribed therein to guard against losses, and the care to be exercised in order to ensure effective preservation of provisions of all descriptions normally carried in H.M.A. Ships, must be closely observed on all occasions if the application of Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 9, is to be avoided.

5. Hitherto the greatest percentage of losses on board—especially in sea-going tenders—has been in the various descriptions of refrigerated meat, and these losses have been mainly due to excessive quantities carried. It is therefore directed that in future, the maximum meat stocks maintained in tenders in refrigerated storage are to be limited to requirements, calculated on the approved weekly ration, for thirty (30) days, except when for operational or other special reasons a greater quantity is specifically authorized by higher authority.

6. Parent ships are to take immediate steps to ensure that Volume I of the Manual of Victualling is supplied to any sea-going tender which does not possess a copy of that publication for guidance and ready reference.

COMPENSATION FOR WATCHES LOST BY NAVAL PERSONNEL AS A RESULT OF A SERVICE CASUALTY—OFFICER AND RATINGS.

With reference to Admiralty Fleet Order 6813/44, Section III, paragraph 1 (b), it has been decided to adopt in the R.A.N. forthwith a revised procedure for dealing with claims in respect of watches lost by naval personnel as a result of a Service casualty, and the maximum sum of £1 authorized therein for payment to ratings in respect of such ioss is no longer operative.

2. In future, claims by officers and ratings for watches lost as a result of a Service casualty will be dealt with by the Naval Board and particulars of any watches included in claims by ratings for loss of kit dealt with by commanding officers in accordance with the instructions contained in Navy Order 561 of 1944 are to be extracted and forwarded to Navy Office for consideration of the Naval Board.

- (a) a description of the watch;
- (b) cost when new;
- (c) date and place of purchase; and

W.R.A.N.S.-MARKS OF RESPECT.

W.R.A.N.S. officers are to be addressed by junior W.R.A.N.S. officers and ratings as "Madam."

2. Within the W.R.A.N.S., salutes are to be given as in the Royal Navy (K.R. and A.I. Articles 151-154) except that hats will not be removed. During the playing of the National Anthem indoors, members of the W.R.A.N.S. will stand to attention without saluting.

3. Naval salutes as a matter of discipline are to be exchanged ashore as follows:---

- (b) On other occasions the exchange of the Naval salute will be governed by the ordinary rules of courtesy.

COMMUNICATION BRANCH RATINGS-NON SUBSTANTIVE RATES.

As it is essential to have all higher communication ratings qualified to the same professional standard in order that they may be available for general service, it has been decided that all higher R.A.N.R. communication ratings are to qualify for the compulsory active service non-substantive rating corresponding to their substantive rate, such qualification to be carried out before the 31st December, 1945, e.g., yeomen of signals and petty officer telegraphists must pass a No. 2 lower standard examination.

2. Active service chief yeomen and chief petty officer telegraphists are required to pass the No. 2 higher standard examination, but in view of the period R.A.N.R. chief yeomen and chief petty officer telegraphists mobilized as such have already served in their rating, they will only be required to pass the No. 2 lower standard examination.

3. As it is realized that certain R.A.N.R. ratings may find difficulty in passing the required examination, a special course of three weeks will be arranged in H.M.A. Signal School. On receipt of this Order, names of ratings desiring to qualify are to be reported to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, who will then arrange for such ratings to be drafted into Flinders Naval Depot for a course.

4. Ratings who, due to their age and lack of experience in modern signalling, feel that they would be unable to attain the desired standard may apply, through their commanding officers, for a "free" discharge, copy of applications to the Naval Board to be forwarded to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot.

5. The names of ratings who fail to pass the examination after undergoing a course are to be forwarded to the Naval Board with recommendations regarding their retention in the Service in lower substantive ratings.

CIVILIAN IDENTITY CARDS AND CERTIFICATES OF SERVICE.

The following instructions regarding civilian identity cards are to be observed when personnel (male and female) enter the Naval Service or are demobilized or discharged.

On Entry.

- 2. (a) On mobilization, the civilian identity card is to be surrendered.
 - (b) Each identity card surrendered is to be cancelled by the collecting authority and returned to the Commonwealth Electoral Officer in the capital city of the State where mobilization takes place.

- (c) If on mobilization the identity card is not surrendered, particulars of the name and civilian address of the person concerned, together with reasons for not surrendering the card, should immediately be forwarded to the Common
 - wealth Electoral Officer referred to in sub-paragraph (b) above.

3. It is essential that the above instructions be strictly observed, but it is important that no person be required to surrender an identity card until actual mobilization for service.

Or Demobilization or Discharge—Issue of Certificate of Service and Application for Civilian Identity Card.

4. Any person who is discharged from the Naval Service is to be informed of the obligation to register and obtain an identity card. Such registration should be made immediately on discharge on Form C.R.I.

5. Officers discharged or demobilized.—A certificate in the following terms will in future be issued to all officers upon discharge or demobilization from the Royal Australian Navy and Reserves (including Women's Services).

7. When a rating who has been demobilized is remobilized, the civilian identity card is to be collected, cancelled and returned to the Commonwealth Electoral Officer concerned.

CONCESSION MESSAGES TO NAVAL PERSONNEL.

Private telegrams of an *urgent* nature (CONAVS) may be sent by next of kin to personnel serving in H.M. and H.M.A. Ships and in Naval Establishments overseas under the following conditions:—

- (a) Telegrams to be lodged at any telegraph office.
- (b) The address of such messages to contain the following information:—

Rank or rating. Name of addressee. Name of ship. "Conay."

- (c) The charge to be paid by the sender to be 2d. per word, with a minimum of 1s. 0d. as for six words, the words contained in the address not being charged for.
- (d) The message not to exceed twelve (12) paid words.
- (e) The limit allowable to any one applicant to be a normal maximum of two (2) per month.
- (f) The text to relate solely to urgent private affairs, and not to contain congratulations, greetings, nor terms of endearment, and to be expressed in plain English language. This condition is essential as the messages are despatched through service channels of communication, and such traffic must be reduced to a minimum.
- (g) The signature for transmission to include a surname.

2. (a) This arrangement does not apply to messages to personnel serving in the following shore establishments to whom ordinary telegrams may be sent:—

(b) Ordinary telegrams will also be accepted for despatch to personnel serving in the following shore establishments, but they will be forwarded from the mainland by airmail:---

Messages of an urgent nature, however, viz.: births, deaths or matters demanding an urgent reply, will be treated as "Conavs" by the Postal Authorities and forwarded to Navy Office for transmission by W/T. The charge for such messages will be as in paragraph 1 (c) above.

3. It is desirable that personnel should advise their next of kin of the foregoing arrangements.

From Naval Personnel.

4. Each officer and man may send one private telegram per month over naval W/T channels to addresses in Australia only, subject to the following conditions:--

- (a) Text of messages to conform to the conditions set out in sub-paragraph 1 (f), and not to exceed twelve (12) words.
- (b) The name of ship, squadron or unit, rating or rank of sender not to be mentioned.
- (c) Address to be as short as possible.
- (d) Charge for text and address to be one penny a word, and if address exceeds five words no charge for extra words.
- (e) Telegrams to be written on service message forms. They will be censored before transmission.

5. A record is to be maintained in the ship showing name of sender and payment made.

6. The service is dependent on availability and capacity of service W/T channels and incidence of Service Traffic, which must always take precedence over private telegrams. Delivery cannot be guaranteed.

7. Navy Office, Melbourne, will pass messages to addressees.

8. The accountant officer is to take on charge in his cash account, moneys collected, and attach duplicates of messages in support of the entries in his cash accounts.

9. A.F.O. 1370 of 1941 is applicable to R.N. ratings now serving in H.M.A. Ships and Establishments. Telegrams are to be passed to Navy Office for transmission to Admiralty.

10. Navy Orders 114 of 1941, 127 and 333 of 1942, and 514 of 1943 are cancelled.

TELEPHONE TRUNK LINE CALLS BY NAVAL PERSONNEL.

The concession of half rates for telephone trunk line calls from any Post Office where trunk line facilities exist is available to Naval Personnel, including members of the Women's Services.

2. In cases where there is no reasonable doubt that a caller in uniform belongs to the Forces, a trunk line call will be permitted at concession rates without the production of some form of identification, otherwise a leave pass or pay book, in the case of ratings, or a certificate of identity from a ship or establishment, in the case of officers, must be produced.

3. The call must be paid for at the time of booking, and made from the Post Office.

4. Where a group of men visit any centre under the control of an officer or non-commissioner officer, the senior officer shall arrange with the Postmaster concerned to accept cash calls from members at the reduced rate.

5. Where a telephone exchange is not open continuously, no reduction in the usual re-opening fee of 1s. 6d. will be allowed.

6. These concessions extend to private trunk line calls originated by members of the forces from Service clubs established in various parts of Australia under the control of the Australian Defence Canteens Service. Calls will be originated on the club's official telephone service and arrangements for booking, supervision, and payment of calls will be made by the club staff.

INCOME TAX.

With reference to paragraph 4 (c) of Navy Order 453 of 1944, the following additional particulars are promulgated for the information of all concerned:—

Deductions allowable.

(a) Rebates in Respect of Dependent Wives and Children Overseas.

Where a member of the Royal Australian Navy marries whilst serving abroad, and his wife is simply remaining outside Australia awaiting arrangements to be made for her passage to rejoin her husband in Australia, the member concerned may claim the concessional rebate in respect of his wife and any children of the marriage, subject to other requirements of the Income Tax Department being complied with. Full particulars of the claim should accompany the Income Tax Return.

- (b) Taxation of Pay in lieu of Leave and Pay in lieu of Furlough.
 - (a) Deferred Pay, Marriage and Dependant Allowances admissible in respect of the grant of pay in lieu of either leave or furlough are exempt from taxation.
 - (b) Where, however, a member is, upon final discharge from the Royal Australian Navy, granted pay in lieu of leave or furlough, the payment will be treated as a retiring allowance paid in a lump sum, and 5 per cent. only of the Active Pay and Allowance included in the grant will be regarded as assessable income.
- (c) Superannuation Contributions paid by the Commonwealth— Liability to Tax.

In any case where superannuation contributions of Commonwealth employees serving in the Forces during the war period are paid by the Commonwealth, the Department of Taxation has decided that the amount of the employee's contributions paid by the Commonwealth to the Superannuation Fund, forms part of the employee's assessable income in the year in which the amount is paid to the Fund.

For the purpose of the allowance of the concessional rebate of tax, the employee, in such cases, will be regarded as having paid the amount of the Superannuation Fund.

(d) Special Allowances—Personnel serving in Zones "A" and "B".

Under a recent amendment of the Income Tax Assessment Act, provision is made for special deductions as under:---

(a) Zone "A". Personnel serving in Darwin and H.M.A.S. Carpentaria come within the area prescribed as Zone "A" and are entitled to a special deduction of £40, provided the member has served in the area for a period of more than one half of the year of income whether continuously or not.

- (b) Zone "B". Personnel serving in Cairns and Townsville come within the area prescribed as Zone "B" and are entitled to a special deduction of £20, provided the member has served in the area for a period of more than one half of the year of income whether continuously or not.
- (c) In any other case (within Zones "A" and "B")—such an amount not being less than Twenty Pounds nor more than Forty Pounds, as, in the opinion of the Commissioner, is reasonable in the circumstances, will be allowed as a deduction.

The Schedule of deductions has been distributed which makes provision for the above special allowances in respect of personnel serving within the prescribed Zones, and deductions should be made in accordance with the scale where necessary.

Personnel serving in Australia outside Zones "A" and "B" are subject to the normal scale of deductions as advised to H.M.A. Depots and Establishments.

SIGNALS--INDICATIONS OF PRECEDENCE AND THEIR USE.

United States Indications of Precedence are in force in the South West Pacific Area.

2. Full instructions, which are contained in D.N.C. 5 (Communications Instructions) Article 2012, 6263, are amplified hereunder, particularly for the originators of signals:—

(a) OPERATIONAL OR ADMINISTRATIVE TRAFFIC.

- (i) In wartime it is necessary to handle operational traffic ahead of all administrative traffic, regardless of the relative precedence assigned.
- (ii) This means that originators must decide in regard to every signal, whether it is Operational or Administrative. In most cases this decision presents no difficulty, but instances will arise where there is doubt where the line should be drawn. In such cases the general urgency of the message and its bearing, if any, on the successful prosecution of an operation should be borne in mind.
 - (b) RULES FOR THE ORDER OF PRECEDENCE.
- (i) All operational traffic precedes administrative traffic.
- (ii) Operational Priority.—Operational messages are defined as those affecting or which may affect movements of ships, aircraft, or ground forces within 48 hours.
- (iii) The highest precedence allowed to administrative traffic is priority.
- (iv) All messages, operational or administrative, must be given the *lowest* precedence necessary to ensure they reach all addresses in time.
 - (c) DEGREES OF PRECEDENCE.
- (i) There are virtually six degrees of precedence, viz .:--

LANDING OF FIREARMS IN AUSTRALIA.

It has been established that Service weapons of both Allied and enemy origin have been concerned in a number of recent murders and shootings in Australia.

2. It has been suggested that arms find their way into the country in the following ways:---

- (a) Being brought in as souvenirs by Service personnel returning from battle areas.
- (b) In parcels, sent as souvenirs, to friends or relatives.
- (c) By aircrews arriving from forward areas.
- (d) By crews of merchant vessels which visit forward areas.
- (e) By an evidently organized system of inclusion in supposedly empty packages for return to the mainland.

3. Commanding officers are to take any steps they consider necessary to ensure that officers and men do not bring or send any machine gun, sub-machine gun, concealable firearm or any type of ammunition into Australia. CORRECTION OF ADMIRALTY CHARTS IN H.M.A. SHIPS.

BASE A/S STAFF ORGANIZATION.

The instructions which follow, having been approved by the Naval Board and Vice-Admiral (Q), British Pacific Fleet, are to be observed by all concerned.

2. At ports where R.N. A/S Maintenance Staffs are borne, the R.N. and R.A.N. Staffs are to work as one, pooling all available resources. In matters of local administration and port duties the R.N. base A/S Maintenance Officers are to be guided by the instructions of :--

(b) The local Naval Officer-in-Charge at other ports.

3. The Base Staff will be responsible for the maintenance of all A/S equipment (Asdics, echo sounding and hydro-phones) in H.M., H.M.A. and Allied (except U.S.N.) ships based at, or visiting a port, except as laid down in paragraph 5.

4. The Senior Officer of the Base Staff will be responsible that the above work is carried out, through his respective Naval Officer-in-Charge, to the Australian Commonwealth Naval Board and the Vice Admiral (Q), with the exception of Sydney where the Base Staff will work under the orders of the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. *Rushcutter*, who will be responsible, through the Flag Officer-in-Charge, Sydney, to the Australian Commonwealth Naval Board and the Vice Admiral (Q).

5. When a specialist A/S Officer (or A/S Maintenance Officer) on the staff of a ship's administrative authority is present, he will be responsible for the maintenance of the A/S equipment in that ship, unless the administrative authority requests the base staff to undertake the work.

6. All correspondence, signals and reports are to be originated in the name of the local administrative authority.

7. A report is to be rendered by the administrative authority on the first of each month to the Australian Commonwealth Naval Board and the Vice Admiral (Q), copy to Commanding Officer. H.M.A.S.

Rushcutter, of all fittings and maintenance work completed, and work taken in hand, in the area for which the Base Staff is responsible. Where applicable, reports should be divided into three parts:--

CUSTOMS TREATMENT OF GOODS BROUGHT BACK TO AUSTRALIA BY RETURNING AUSTRALIAN SERVICEMEN.

Import licences will be issued, where required, for any goods which returning Australian Servicemen may bring back with them, provided such goods are not intended for sale or exchange.

2. The grant of an import licence does not, of course, exempt the goods from any Customs duty that may be payable. A special concession has been made to members of the Forces enabling them to bring back goods (other than tobacco and spirituous liquors) to the value of £10 without payment of duty. However, where the value of the goods exceeds £10, duty is payable at the same rates as if the goods had been imported commercially.

3. The duties applicable to items such as complete motor cars or radio sets are high and personnel who may be contemplating importing such goods are advised to study the duty of such items before making any decision.

4. The Australian Customs Representatives at Australia House, London, and at 630 Fifth-avenue, New York, are in a position to advise Servicemen on questions of duty.

R.A.N. DAMAGE-CONTROL AND FIRE-FIGHTING SCHOOL.

A Damage-Control and Fire-fighting School for the training of officers and ratings has been set up as part of the establishment of H.M.A.S. *Penguin* (Balmoral Naval Depot). The School is for use of the R.A.N. and the British Pacific Fleet.

2. Courses :---

- (i) Damage-control-Officers-Limited to 30.
- (ii) Damage-control-"Key" Ratings-Limited to 30.

These Courses run alternately commencing at 0845 on Wednesdays with a 3 days' Fire-fighting Course and continuing from 0845 Monday to 1130 Saturday the following week. (Officers and "Key" ratings are required to do this Preliminary Fire-fighting Course, unless this has been done within the past 12 months.)

- (iii) Fire-fighting-1-Day Course.-Officers and ratings-limited to 30.
- (iv) Fire-fighting—Advanced Course.—Officers and selected ratings—limited to 30.

A two-days' course commencing at 0845, Mondays and Tuesdays only. This course is for officers and ratings who have done the 1-day course.

3. The syllabus of the courses follows closely that of the British Damage Control schools and Fire-fighting schools. American and Australian equipment is included.

4. Applications for courses should be made to H.M.A.S. *Penguin*. Applications from shore establishments should be made at least seven days before the commencement of the courses required. Applications from ships should be made as early as possible to enable preference to be given them. Preliminary inquiries may be made by telephone to the school—Number XM3021, Extension 72.

5. Accommodation for a limited number of key ratings is available in H.M.A.S. *Penguin.* If accommodation is desired it should be stated in the application. There is no accommodation available for officers. Ratings who are not accommodated should bring bag dinners. Officers' and ratings' Fire-fighting classes should bring overalls, soap and towels. Washing facilities are available, including hot and cold showers. Oilskins and sea boots can be provided at the school.

W.R.A.N.S.-ADVANCEMENT TO CHIEF PETTY OFFICER WRAN.

- (d) The Officer-in-Charge of the Section, when making a recommendation to the Selection Board, must be satisfied that the rating has maintained the theoretical knowledge required to pass the professional examination for the Petty Officer rate, and is able to apply it to good practical effect.
- (e) The Selection Board, before making its recommendation, must be satisfied that the rating possesses qualities of leadership, initiative, resource, tact and industry well above the average, and is likely to make a good Chief Petty Officer Wran.



KIT BAGS, HAMMOCKS, ETC.—LOSSES DURING TRANSPORT— LABELLING AND MARKING.

With reference to paragraph 6 of Navy Order 264 of 1945, it has been reported that, at certain centres, Military Forwarding Officers have refused or are reluctant to accept, for consignment by rail, unaccompanied baggage of Naval personnel in cases where the total weight of the packages belonging to an individual member exceeds 112 lb., as provided in Military Regulations for Army personnel.

2. The Department of the Army has been contacted in the matter, it being pointed out that, in many instances, e.g., officers, artificer and artisan ratings, Naval personnel are required to be in possession of, and to transport from ship to ship, baggage of a total weight much in excess of the maximum allowed for Army personnel. As a result of the representations made, advice has been received that instructions are in course of issue to Military Forwarding Officers which will provide for the acceptance for consignment of all baggage of Naval personnel, irrespective of weight, handed in by a competent Naval Authority.

3. Steps are however to be taken by responsible officers at despatching naval establishments to ensure that authorized Service effects only are delivered to Military Forwarding Officers for consignment at Government expense, and that these items are packed, where possible, in the normal Service containers, i.e., kit bags, hammocks, tool chests, suit-cases or trunks.

4. It is also notified that a Military Forwarding Officer is located at Townsville and can be contacted at the following address, viz.:---

EMPTY AMMUNITION PACKAGES-RETURN OF.

It is essential that empty ammunition packages are returned to Australia from forward areas as soon as possible after firings in H.M.A. Ships or after emptying when ammunition is issued to Ships with bottlerack stowage. The types of package particularly required at the earliest possible date at the factories for re-filling are those containing ammunition used for bombardment and long-range A.A. firing, and these should be given priority in transport. These packages comprise—

Cases, magazine for 8-in. and 6-in. cordite.

Ammunition boxes for 4-in. fixed ammunition.

Cartridge and Shell boxes for 4.7 in.

2. Whilst there is less urgency, every opportunity should be taken to return 2 pdr. packages, but packages for Bofors, Oerlikon and other S.A.A. should only be returned if space is available without detriment to packages of higher priority.

3. Naval Officers-in-Charge in forward areas and the Commanding Officers of Armament Store Issuing Ships should see that every opportunity of freight to the mainland for "Empties" is utilized. Armament Store, Naval Store and Victualling Store Issuing Ships and Carriers and other Auxiliary vessels are to load these stores whenever space is available. Consigning officers should supply the freightship with a bill of lading stating approximate quantities and measurements of the cargo, and when practicable with issue vouchers to be handed to the consignee. A certificate that the packages are empty is also to be handed to the Commanding Officer or Master.

4. Empty packages should be consigned to the Naval Armament Supply Officer, Brisbane; Superintending Armament Supply Officer, Sydney; or Naval Armament Supply Officer, Maribyrnong, according to the destination of the freightship. Brief particulars should be signalled to the consignee when shipment is effected.

5. Empty fired cartridge cases are to be dealt with in a similar manner, priority being given to the return of 4.7 in. and 4 in.

The Government desires to emphasize that the success of the forthcoming Fourth Victory Loan is most important and that subscriptions should be made voluntarily by all sections of the community.

2. Approximately 750,000 of Australia's population are in the fighting services, and it is desired that every opportunity should be given to them to invest their savings in what is regarded as the best and safest investment in the Commonwealth.

3. Such money invested in War Loans not only bears the highest rate of interest now available, but also helps the finances of the country. Bonds and War Savings Certificates are always readily negotiable, and provide a valuable addition to deferred pay and other savings which may be required to assist in re-establishment in civil life after the war.

4. Bonds in the Fourth Victory Loan may be purchased outright for cash or by instalments. Care must be taken to ensure that each subscriber makes application for bonds on the appropriate form and indicates therein his wishes in regard to the disposal of the bonds. In addition, Service personnel may make allotments of pay at any time as continuous subscriptions for the purchase of bonds in Commonwealth loans—

(a) Outright Purchase.—Cash subscriptions for outright purchase of Bonds should be lodged with the Supply Officer, who will issue an official receipt for each amount received. Amounts should be taken on charge in the Cash Account, and credited to "Trust Fund—Other Trust Moneys." A voucher charged to "Trust Fund—Other Trust Moneys." should then be prepared in favour of the Registrar of Inscribed Stock at the capital city branch of the Commonwealth Bank in the State in which the bond application

will be lodged, and forwarded under cover of Form N.A.5 to the Certifying Officer of the capital city in that State, for payment.

- (b) Instalment System.—Approval is given for the use of the allotment system where purchase by instalments is desired. Such allotments are to be declared on Form A.S.63, at a monthly rate, at not less than 10 per cent. of the face value of the bond, in favour of the Registrar of Inscribed Stock at the capital city branch of the Commonwealth Bank in the State in which the bond application will be lodged. The bond application, in such cases, should bear a notation that a monthly allotment has been declared. Payment of these allotments ceases when the full amount applied for has been reached.
- (c) Service Allotments for Continuous Subscription to Commonwealth Loans.-Allotments for this purpose shall be declared at fortnightly rates of not less than 5s. in favour of the Commonwealth Bank in the capital city of the State in which purchase of the bonds is desired. Forms A.S.63 should clearly indicate that the allotment is for continuous subscription to Commonwealth Loans. Simultaneously with the declaration of the allotment a form of application (pro forma appended) must be completed by the applicant and forwarded, attached to Form A.S.63, to the Director of Navy Accounts, Navy Office. These allotments will be paid by the Bank, to a special account in the member's name, on which interest will be allowed at the rate borne by the Bond selected for purchase by the member. As the sum of £10 accumulates in the account, the Bank will purchase a £10 Commonwealth Treasury Bond and place it in safe custody for the applicant.

Allottors should clearly understand that these allotments will continue to be paid until stoppage advice is received, or where, for Service reasons stoppage is necessary. In either event, the balance of the amount subscribed which has not been invested may be credited to the member's bank account or paid to him whichever he desires.

Where ships in which a Supply Officer is not borne are absent from base, amounts may be paid to the Supply Officer of any H.M.A. Ship or Naval Depot.

All completed bond application forms, whether for cash purchase or for purchase by instalments, should be sent direct to the Registrar of Inscribed Stock in the particular State, with an intimation that a cheque covering the cash payments will be forwarded from the Sub-Treasury.

5. The Fourth Victory Loan will open on September 25th, 1945.

Replacement of tools lost, broken or worn out may be made from Service sources, on repayment, providing the Commanding Officer is satisfied that the circumstances are such that replacements cannot be obtained from commercial sources.

4. Issues to "hostilities only" ratings will be a personal issue, but will remain the property of the Crown. Articles lost, broken or worn out will be replaced from the naval store, subject to the value of any tools lost, or damaged by misconduct or neglect, being recovered in accordance with K.R. and A.I., Article 1936,

HONOURS AND AWARDS—THE 1939-45 STAR, THE AFRICA STAR, THE ATLANTIC STAR, THE AIR CREW EUROPE STAR, THE ITALY STAR, THE FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR, THE PACIFIC STAR, THE BURMA STAR, AND THE DEFENCE MEDAL.

Qualifications and instructions for the issue of ribbon and emblems.

SECTION I.

The King has been pleased to alter the conditions of the 1939-43 Star (renaming it the 1939-45 Star) and of the Africa Star, and to withdraw the decision promulgated in paragraph 1 and paragraph 3 (e) of A.F.O. 3658/43 that "no individual will qualify for both the Africa and 1939-43 Stars". His Majesty has also been pleased to approve the institution of further campaign stars, viz: the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Pacific Star, and the Burma Star, and of a Defence Medal.

The respective ribbons are as follows :---

THE 1939-45 STAR.—The ribbon is dark blue, red and light blue in three equal vertical stripes. The dark blue stripe is intended to mark the service of the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navy, the red stripe that of the Armies and the light blue stripe that of the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

2. THE AFRICA STAR.—The ribbon is pale buff in colour with a central vertical red stripe and two other narrower stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The background is intended as a symbol of the desert; the central red stripe stands for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navy, and the light blue stripe for the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

3. THE ATLANTIC STAR.—The ribbon is blue, white, and sea green, shaded and watered, the design being intended as a symbol of service in the Atlantic. The ribbon is to be worn with the blue edge furthest from the left shoulder.

4. THE AIR CREW EUROPE STAR.—The ribbon is light blue with black edges and there is, in addition, a narrow yellow stripe on either side. The design is symbolic of the continuous service of the Air Forces by night and day.

5. THE ITALY STAR.—The ribbon is in the Italian colours—green, white, and red. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in red at either edge, and one in green at the centre, the two intervening stripes being in white.

6. THE FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR.—The ribbon is in the red, white and blue of the Union Flag and these colours are also used as a symbol of France and the Netherlands. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in blue at either edge and one in red at the centre, the two intervening stripes being in white.

7. THE PACIFIC STAR.—The ribbon is dark green with red edges and with a central yellow stripe. There are also two other narrow stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The green and yellow stand for the forests and the beaches of the Pacific, the red edges for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navies, and the light blue stripe for the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

8. THE BURMA STAR.—The ribbon is dark blue with a central red stripe and, in addition, two orange stripes. The red stands for the British Commonwealth Forces and the orange for the sun, and these are placed on a contrasting background of dark blue.

9. THE DEFENCE MEDAL.—The centre of the ribbon is flame coloured, and the edges are green, symbols of the enemy attacks on our green and pleasant land. Two black stripes represent the black-out.

SECTION II.

In the Navy, the following classes are eligible for the Stars and the Defence Medal:--

- (a) All officers and men of the Royal Australian Navy and its Reserves.
- (b) Officers and men of the Merchant Navy under T. 124 and like agreements in His Majesty's ships of war.
- (c) Officers and ratings of the Women's Royal Australian Naval Service.
- (d) Members of the Nursing Services.
- (e) Canteen Staffs.
- (f) Civilians with protective commissions serving in His Majesty's ships.

2. No one will be held to have qualified for the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Pacific Star or the Burma Star until he has qualified for the 1939-45 Star (except as laid down in paragraphs 6 and 7 of this section).

3. Officers and ratings who have qualified for the 1939-45 Star through time spent as prisoners of war, as set forth in paragraph 2 (g) of Section III. below must serve such time afloat, or on shore in an operational area, before they can be held to begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star, or to qualify for one of the other Stars.

4. Officers and ratings who have qualified for the 1939-45 Star through service on shore in areas of Army Operational Commands as set forth in paragraph 2, E (b) of Section III. below or have qualified for it by reason of the award of a decoration or Mention in Despatches, or have qualified for it under Navy Order 466 of 1943, paragraph 5, must have served six months afloat, or on shore in an operational area, or two months in the case of air crews, before they can begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star, or qualify for one of the other Stars, or, if they happen to have so served for some period less than six or two months, they must serve six or two months less such period already served.

5. Officers and ratings who lose their lives on service that would be a qualification for any of the Stars, or as a result of sickness attributable to such service, or whose qualifying service is brought to an end by a disability due to service will be held to qualify for the Star, irrespective of whether

they have completed the prior operational service normally required to be completed before they arc held to qualify. In the case of death, the ribbon will not be issued, but the Star, when manufactured, will be sent to the next of kin.

6. Officers and ratings who receive the award of a decoration or a Mention in Despatches while on service that would qualify for any of the Stars will be granted the Star forthwith, irrespective of whether they have completed the prior operational service normally required to be completed before they are held to be qualified.

7. Any officer or rating who began his service afloat less than six (or in the case of air crews, two) months before the 8th May, 1945, the date when active hostilities in Europe ended, if on service qualifying for the Italy Star or the France and Germany Star, (or before 15th August, 1945, if on service qualifying for the Pacific or Burma Star) will be awarded the Star in question, though he has not done the prior six or two months' service normally required. Similarly, if on service qualifying for the Atlantic Star, he will be awarded that Star though he has not completed six or two months' service nor done the prior six or two months' service normally required.

8. Any officer or rating who has transferred to the Royal Australian Navy from one of the other Services may count qualifying service for the 1939-45 Star while in the Army or Air Force towards the service required to qualify.

9. Naval personnel appointed or drafted in a non-operational area ashore for staff duties in connexion with the operations that qualify for the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Burma Star or the Pacific Star can qualify for the Star in question by 30 or more days' service on duty in the area qualifying for the Star, provided that they are already qualified for the 1939-45 Star.

10. A candidate who qualifies for the Atlantic Star, the France and Germany Star and the Air Crew Europe Star or two of these will be awarded only the Star first earned. A clasp will be awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. A silver rose emblem will be worn to denote the award of the France and Germany, Atlautic or Air Crew Europe clasp as the case may be.

11. R.A.A.F. PERSONNEL. -(a) The ribbon and emblem of any of the awards dealt with in this Order may be issued to the R.A.A.F. ranks on loan to the Royal Australian Navy who are qualified under Naval regulations.

(b) Records of those to whom the ribbon and emblems are issued should be kept on the form prescribed in Section IV. of this Order. On completion, one copy of this form is to be sent to the Secretary, Naval Board.

SECTION III.

1. (A) Service qualifying for the respective awards is as shown below in paragraphs 2-10. The expression "Service afloat" means service while borne for pay on the books of :---

- (a) A ship of war in seagoing commission. (Service while refitting may count as "Service afloat" provided that the ship remains in commission.)
- (b) A parent ship for service in commissioned tenders which are wholly or mainly employed on sea-going duties,

- (c) A commissioned ship for such other seagoing service as the Naval Board may declare to qualify for this purpose. In this category will be included :---
 - (i) Service while embarked for duty in merchant ships (e.g., D.E.M.S. personnel, Commodores of Convoy and their staffs, Naval personnel in hospital ships, etc.).
 - (ii) Service in seagoing boom defence and examination vessels.
 - (iii) Service afloat in combined operations craft as laid down in paragraph 2 (K) of this Section.
- (B) The following shall not be regarded as service afloat :---
 - (a) Service in stationary depot ships which only went to sea when proceeding from port to port (e.g., for the purpose of changing base for refit, etc.).
 - (b) Service at shore bases and depots.
 - (c) Service in vessels employed wholly or mainly within boomprotected waters, or when no boom existed, within the limits of smooth waters.

(C) In any case of difficulty, the Naval Board shall determine, for the purpose of the award, which vessels or classes of vessels shall be regarded as ships of war, what nature of service afloat shall be considered as sea service or harbour service, and what flying unit shall be considered operational. Applications from headquarters personnel of the Naval Air Arm for exceptional treatment may be considered if accompanied by full details of their operational service.

2. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE 1939-45 STAR.—Six months' service afloat as defined in paragraphs (E), (F) and (G) at any time after 3rd September, 1939, up to the 15th August, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in the Pacific, in areas of active operations. These areas are :—

- (i) From 3rd September, 1939: The Atlantic Ocean, including Home Waters and the North Sea; the Baltic; the Arctic Ocean between Greenland and longitude 70 E., and that part of the Indian Ocean lying south of 15 S. and west of 55 E.
- (ii) From 1st June, 1940; As (i) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the rest of the Indian Ocean.

(iii) From 10th June, 1940; Anywhere at sea.

(B) In the case of Naval air crews not qualified by six months' service afloat, to have flown operationally in a first line squadron, and to have completed two months' service either at an operational base, or in an aircraft carrier or C.A.M. ship or fighter catapult ship afloat, refit or leave periods not counting towards the service required.

(C) The award of an honour, decoration or Mention in Despatches for service afloat, or in air operations or in service on shore in Army operational areas.

(D) Service afloat, or in the air, or on shore in Army operational areas, either brought to an end by wounds or other disability due to service, or interrupted by a wound or other disability due to service of sufficient gravity to cause discharge to shore, or, if on shore,

to cause evacution from the operational area. Such service brought to an end by death qualifies and, in due course, the Star will be sent to the next-of-kin of those so qualified. Preliminary issue of the ribbon to next-of-kin will not be made.

(E) With reference to A.F.O. 3658/43, paragraph 4 (b), the following lists have been approved :—

(a) Of operational commands, service in one or more of which between the dates set against each command amounting in the aggregate to six months will qualify in the Army for the 1939-45 Star:--

(F) Officers and ratings of the classes listed in Section II., paragraph 1, will qualify for the 1939-45 Star under Army rules if they served ashore, having been appointed or drafted for such service between the appropriate dates in the areas and operations listed above.

Officers or ratings passing through one of these areas on a visit or tour of inspection or for the purchase of materials, etc., in it are not thereby qualified, but if the visit or tour exceeded 30 days the case may be submitted for special consideration.

Officers and ratings who took part afloat in the operations listed in paragraph (E) (b) will not qualify under Army rules but will count this service, with other service afloat, towards the six months' qualifying period.

(G) Time spent as a prisoner of war captured during service defined in paragraphs (A), (B), or (E) (a) of Section III., will count towards the qualifying period unless there is doubt as to freedom from blame.

(H) Time spent on passage through dangerous waters in one of H.M. or H.M.A. ships or a merchant ship, or by air, to a sea appointment or to an Army operational command as defined in paragraph (E) (a) of Section III. will count towards the qualifying period for the 1939-45 Star, provided that the journey was completed. The journey will count only if the date of arrival falls within the dates set out in paragraph (E) (a) against each operation. It will then count from the date of embarkation.

Those who did not complete the journey owing to death or wounds, or injury resulting from enemy action, will qualify under paragraph 2 (D) of this section.

Passage through dangerous waters to non-operational commands will not count towards the qualifying period.

(I) The 1939-45 Star may be given specially to selected senior officers such as Commanders-in-Chief or Flag Officers Commanding important independent operational commands who do not qualify under the approved rules.

(J) CLASP TO THE 1939-45 STAR.—A clasp to the 1939-45 Star to be denoted by a silver gilt rose emblem worn on the ribbon has been instituted to mark service in the Battle of Britain. The qualification is service as air crew of fighter aircraft in the Battle of Britain between 1st July and 31st October, 1940.

(K) COMBINED OPERATIONS PERSONNEL.—The following are the conditions of award of the 1939–45 Star for service as Combined Operations Personnel:—

- (a) Naval Beach Commandos and Signal Parties qualify only by service ashore in operations which qualify the Army or by six months' service in an Army operational command.
- (b) Regular Crews of Combined Operations Craft, viz.:—seagoing commissioned major landing craft crews and the personnel of seagoing minor landing craft flotillas and landing barge flotillas, provided they have been to sea in their craft and have completed six months' service as such.

3. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE AFRICA STAR.—(A) Service afloat in the Mediterranean east of the Straits of Gibraltar at any time between 10th June, 1940, and the 12th May, 1943. (Service in Gibraltar or in ships based on Gibraltar, unless they served in the Mediterranean, will not be a qualification.)

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(B) Service on shore or in harbour, if appointed or drafted for such service in-

(C) The King has also been pleased to approve that the clasp approved to the 1939-43 Star referred to in A.F.O. 3658/43, paragraph 5, and denoted by the silver rose emblem as promulgated in Navy Order 466 of 1943 shall be transferred to the Africa Star, and that the silver rose emblem issued shall cease to be worn on the 1939-45 Star ribbon but shall be worn instead on the Africa Star ribbon.

The qualifications for this clasp are shown in the Appendix to this Order.

4. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE ATLANTIC STAR.—(A) Six months' service afloat as defined in Section III., paragraphs (A)-(G) or (in the case of air crews) two months' service in the Atlantic Ocean and/or home waters between 3rd September, 1939, and the 8th May, 1945.

(B) Service in home waters, service on the convoy routes to North Russian ports, service in the South Atlantic between the longitude of Cape Horn and longitude 20° E., including service in minesweepers that at any time within the relevant dates acted as escort or patrol vessels, will count towards qualification for the Atlantic Star, as well as service in ships based on Gibraltar (excluding any time served in the Mediterranean).

(C) Service in Force H after 9th November, 1942, will not count towards qualification for the Atlantic Star.

(D) Service in ships employed solely for the defence of a port (e.g., sea-going boom defence and examination service vessels) will not be held to qualify for the Atlantic Star, since such service is adequately recognized by the 1939-45 Star.

(E) Service afloat or in the air on and after 6th June, 1944, south of a line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South), in the English Channel, or in the Bay of Biscay east of longitude 6° W., since it qualifies for the France and Germany Star, and the Atlantic and France and Germany Star are alternatives, will not count towards qualification for the Atlantic Star.

5. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE AIR CREW EUROPE STAR.— (A) Two months' service in the period between 3rd September, 1939, and 5th June, 1944 (both dates inclusive), in air crews making operational flights over Europe (including the United Kingdom) from bases in the United Kingdom.

(B) Air crew service in operations at sea is not a qualification for the Air Crew Europe Star.

6. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE ITALY STAR.—(A) For the Army, entry into operational service on land subsequent to the capture of Pantellaria on the 11th June, 1943, in Sicily until the 17th August, 1943, in Sardinia until the 19th September, 1943, and in Italy, in Elba (being regarded for the purpose as part of Italy), in the Aegean Sea, and the Dodecanese Islands, in Greece and in Yugoslavia up till the 8th May, 1945.

(B) For the Navy, service afloat or in the air (including sorties from the Mediterranean over Europe) between the 11th June, 1943, and the 8th May, 1945, in direct connexion with active operations in the areas set forth in paragraph (A) including Cretan and Albanian waters, and in Naval operations in connexion with the invasion of the South of France, or service on shore, if appointed or drafted for such service, in the areas qualifying the Army as set forth in paragraph (A).

(C) Service in all ships in the Mediterranean Command after the 11th June, 1943, will qualify except—

- (i) Ships on passage through or working up in the Mediterranean;
- (ii) Ships based on Gibraltar, North African, Palestinian and Cypriot ports, unless they were directly connected with active operations as defined in paragraph (B).

7. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR.—(A) Service afloat or in the air between 6th June, 1944, and the 8th May, 1945, in the North Sea south of a line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South), in the English Channel and in the Bay of Biscay east of longitude 6° W., provided such service was directly in support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, etc.

(B) Service on shore, if appointed or drafted for such service, in France, Belgium, Holland or Germany on or after 6th June, 1944.

(C) Service afloat or in the air in the Mediterranean in support of operations in the South of France does not qualify for the France and Germany Star.

8. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE PACIFIC STAR.—(A) Service afloat or in the air on or after the 8th December, 1941, in the Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea, and the Indian Ocean east of a line running due south from Singapore round the south-east coast of Sumatra, through Christmas Island, and southwards along the meridian of 110° E.

(B) Service ashore, if appointed or drafted for such service, in-

(C) Casual entry into the area qualifying for the Pacific Star, as, for instance, service in ships of the East Indies Station that crossed the western boundary of the area (as laid down in paragraph (A) above) for the sole purpose of fuelling, etc., in Western Australia will not be a qualification for the Pacific Star.

(D) Anyone who has qualified for the Burma Star is not eligible to receive the Pacific Star, but, if he subsequently qualifies for the Pacific Star, he will receive a clasp denoted by a silver rose emblem to be worn on the ribbon of the Burma Star.

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9. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE BURMA STAR.—(A) Services afloat or in the air on and after the 11th December, 1941, in that part of the Bay of Bengal enclosed by a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra and continuing east to the western side of Sunda Strait; and in the Malacca Strait.

(B) Service ashore, if appointed or drafted for such service, in-

(C) Casual entry into the area qualifying for the Burma Star, as, for instance, service in ships proceeding from Colombo to Trincomalee in order to refit, will not be a qualification for the Burma Star.

(D) Anyone who has qualified for the Pacific Star is not eligible to receive the Burma Star, but, if he subsequently qualifies for the Burma Star, he will receive a clasp denoted by a silver rose emblem to be worn on the ribbon of the Pacific Star.

10. QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE DEFENCE MEDAL.—(A) Three years' service on shore since 3rd September, 1939, in the United Kingdom.

(B) One year's service on shore since 3rd September, 1939, in nonoperational areas overseas from or outside the country of residence (e.g., for a Canadian, one year's service in the United Kingdom, or for an Englishman, one year's service in India).

(C) Three months' service since 3rd September, 1939, in active mine and bomb disposal duties in the United Kingdom.

(D) Three years', or one year's service, as the case may be, in administrative duties in connexion with mine and bomb disposal.

(ii) Service may be aggregated, but time overseas in non-operational areas amounting to less than a year will be added at its actual time value to service of less than three years at home, that is to say, it will not be multiplied by three.

(iii) Those qualified for any one of the Campaign Stars may be granted the Defence Medal in addition, and the subsequent award of one of the Campaign Stars will not supersede a previous grant of the Defence Medal. (iv) Service qualifying for the Defence Medal, if brought to an end before the period of three years or twelve or three months' service has been completed, either by death due to enemy action when on duty, or by injuries entitling the candidate for a wound stripe, will be a qualification for the grant of the Defence Medal. In the event of death, no issue of the ribbon will be made, but the medal, when manufactured, will be sent to the nextof-kin.

(v) The receipt of an award or commendation in respect of service qualifying for the Defence Medal qualifies for the medal without regard to the three years' or twelve or three months' service requirement.

(vi) The closing date of the qualifying period for the Defence Medal in respect of service in the Royal Navy will be 8th May, 1945, the date on which active hostilities ended in Europe. Qualifying service overseas as defined in paragraph (B) above will continue to be reckoned until the end of active hostilities in the Pacific.

SECTION IV.

1. The ribbons and emblems of the Atlantic Star, Air Crew Europe Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Pacific Star, and Burma Star, and, if not already issued, of the 1939–45 Star and the Africa Star, should be issued without delay to those who have qualified for them, as soon as supplies are available.

The following are general instructions for the issue of the ribbons and emblems :---

(a) It is the intention that the ribbons and emblems should be issued to serving officers and ratings entitled to receive them by the ships, establishments, etc., in which they are borne. Entitlement should be checked as far as possible from Service documents or other available information (in some cases of doubt, depots may be able to assist), but Commanding Officers are authorized to issue the ribbon and emblems provided they feel satisfied that the qualifying conditions have been fulfilled. Only in very exceptional cases should reference be made to the Naval Board. In all cases it should be made clear that the issue is provisional only and does not confirm the title of the recipient to the award of the Star or clasp.

It is suggested that the duty of checking claims from ratings should be carried out by their Divisional Officers.

(b) Record should be kept of those to whom ribbons or emblems have been issued on Form A.S. 1129z of which a model is shown below. This is a common form designed for use in the issue of the ribbons of all the Campaign Stars and of the Defence Medal and of the emblems denoting clasps to the Stars. Supplies of the form in question will be issued, on demand, by the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Garden Island, Sydney. On completion, the form is to be forwarded to the Secretary, Naval Board.

NOTE.—Anyone who has 7 may have 10 or 13 if he has qualified for them, but may not have both. Similarly, anyone who has 9 may have 8 or 13, but not both and anyone who has 12 may have 8 or 10 but not both.

RIBBONS.

Applications for bulk quantities of ribbons for the various Stars on the basis of a length of 21 inches for each individual should be addressed by H.M.A. Ships and Establishments to the Superintending Victualling Store Officer, Royal Edward Victualling Yard, Sydney, stating the quantity in yards or feet required.

Applications for the Rosette should be forwarded to the Secretary, Naval Board, Melbourne.

2. COMBINED OPERATIONS PERSONNEL.-The instructions in paragraph 1 (a) of this Section above are not entirely applicable to combined operations personnel who are all borne in H.M.S. Copra. In their case therefore, the following instructions should be substituted :--

Issue of ribbons and emblems to combined operations personnel should be regarded as a matter of local administration and carried out as such in accordance with C.A.F.O. 1732/43. Entitlement should be checked as far as possible from Service documents or other available information, but Commanding Officers are authorized to issue the ribbon, rosettes and emblems, provided they feel satisfied that the qualifying conditions have been fulfilled. Reference to H.M.S. Copra or to the Naval Board should be resorted to only in exceptional circumstances when the information available locally is thought to be unreliable. In all cases it should be made clear that the issue is provisional only, and does not confirm the title of the recipient to the award of the Star or Clasp.

3. A further announcement will be made about the issue of ribbon and emblems to officers and men discharged from the Service.

4. Officers serving on headquarters staffs should make application to the Secretary, Naval Board.

With reference to Navy Orders 640 of 1944 and 264 of 1945, and Admiralty D.E.M.S. General Instruction No. 80, the following additional particulars are promulgated for the information of all concerned.

R.A.N. Personnel attached to Australian Military Forces, or where deaths occur in an A.M.F. Hospital.

- (i) The effects of R.A.N. personnel attached to the A.M.F. who are reported dead, missing, wounded or sick, or whose death occurs in a military hospital, will be forwarded by the Military Authorities to the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the nearest H.M.A. Naval Depot or, in the case of personnel attached to the A.M.F. who become prisoners of war, to the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Penguin.
- (ii) Prior to despatch, an inventory of the effects will be made in triplicate, two copies of which will be forwarded to the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the nearest Naval Depot, or the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Penquin (as appropriate). together with the request that one copy be receipted and returned to the forwarding Military authority. The third copy is to be forwarded to the Secretary, Department of the Navy, Melbourne.

D.E.M.S. R.A.N. Officers or Ratings.

In the case of death of a D.E.M.S., R.A.N. officer or rating, a complete list of all effects should be forwarded to the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Rushcutter, for the purpose of his obtaining advice from Navy Office as to their disposal.

MESSAGES OF CONGRATULATION.

The following messages, received on the occasion of the surrender of the Japanese Empire, are promulgated for information :---

HIS MAJESTY THE KING.

"The surrender of Japan has brought to a victorious end the war which has engaged our full fighting strength all over the world. I send my heartfelt congratulations to the men and women of my Navies, Armies, and Air Forces throughout the British Commonwealth and Empire. Through the long years of the grim struggle with our enemies in the west and in the east, your unflinching resolution and indomitable courage in the face of manifold adversity have earned you the eternal gratitude of your countrymen. Many of your comrades have fallen in the fight; with you, I grieve for their loss. for the sufferings of the wounded and for the sorrows of the bereaved ; with you I look forward to the safe homecoming of those who had to endure captivity. By God's mercy, the forces of evil have been overthrown, but many tasks remain to be accomplished if the full blessings of peace are to be restored to a suffering world. It is the duty of each one of us to ensure that your comrades have not died in vain and that your own hard won achievements are not lost to the cause of freedom, in which you undertook them. On behalf of all my peoples, I thank you. God bless you all. George R.I.".

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

"Please convey my heartiest congratulations to all personnel under your command on to-day's good news.".

THE SPEAKER, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, CANBERRA.

"In accordance with the direction of the House, I am transmitting to you hereunder the terms of a Resolution which was agreed to unanimously by the House of Representatives on Wednesday, 29th August, upon the motion of the Prime Minister, the Right Honourable J. B. Chifley :---

That the thanks of this House be accorded to the officers, warrant officers, petty officers and men of the Royal Australian Navy, for their heroic services in every theatre of war, for the guardianship of Australia from the attacks of our enemies, for the increasing vigilance in the patrol of many seas, for their courage and skill in convoying their soldier comrades and supplies to operational areas, and for the prestige they have won for their country wherever they have been.

That the thanks of the House be accorded to the officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Australian Military Forces in the field for their courage and efficiency, their endurance in circumstances of unexampled hardship, for their magnificent achievements and for their undaunted spirit which has carried them through years of toil and suffering to complete victory.

That the thanks of this House be accorded to the officers, noncommissioned officers and men of the Royal Australian Air Force for their brilliant daring and conspicuous skill over land and sea, and for their calm courage and devotion to whatever dangerous and vital duties they have been allotted. That the thanks of this House be offered to the men of the Merchant Navy, who carried out the vital task of keeping open the supply lines, always at great risk and imposing severe tests upon their endurance.

That the thanks of this House be accorded to the women of all the auxiliary services of the three arms of the fighting forces for their devotion and skill and solicitude for the sick and wounded of our sailors, soldiers and airmen.

That this House records its deep appreciation of the devotion and sacrifice of the fathers, mothers, wives and sisters of Australia's sailors, soldiers and airmen.

That this House records its deep appreciation of the efforts, money and gifts from the women, men and children of Australia to mitigate the hardships of Australian fighting men, to alleviate the lot of our prisoners of war and to make more comfortable the sick and wounded.

That the thanks of this House be offered to munitions and war workers generally in secondary and primary industries; to those men of 1914-18 who gave valuable home service in garrison and other work, and to the Volunteer Defence Corps.

That this House acknowledges with deep submission and reverence the heroism of those who have fallen in the service of their country, and tenders its sympathy to their relatives in the hour of their sorrow and their pride.

I desire to ask that you will be good enough to have the terms of the above resolution brought to the notice of all personnel referred to therein who come under your administration.".

THE BOARD OF ADMIRALTY.

"The surrender of the Japanese Empire brings to an end six years of achievement in war unsurpassed in the long history and high tradition of the Royal Navy.

2. The phase of Naval warfare which came to an end three months ago enriched the record of British sea power with such epic actions and campaigns as the Battle of the Atlantic, the domination of the Mediterranean, the maintenance of the Russian supply lines and the great combined operations of 1943 and 1944. The world wide story was completed with the inspired work by sea and air of the British Pacific Fleet and the East Indies Fleet. The Board are deeply conscious of the difficulty and novelty of the problems facing the British Pacific Fleet, the patience and skill with which they were overcome and the great contribution in offensive power made by the Task Forces operating with our American Allies. No less memorable is the work of the East Indies Fleet in the protection of India and Ceylon and in operational support for the Burma campaign.

3. At this moment, our eyes are turned to the Far East and it is fitting to recall in remembrance those who gave their lives in the days of disaster in 1941 and 1942. To their relatives and to the relatives of all officers and men of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines and of the Naval Forces of the Commonwealth and Empire and of all in Admiralty service who have paid the full price of victory, the Board extend their profound sympathy.

4. It is no small part of our thankfulness for this total defeat of the enemy that deliverance will come to those, naval and civilians, who were made prisoners of war by the Japanese and who have been subjected to great trials during the years of their captivity. 5. To the officers and men of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines and of the Naval Forces of the Commonwealth and Empire, the Board wish to express their congratulations, their gratitude, and their good wishes. They wish also to record their high appreciation of the contribution to the success of the Fleet made by the Auxiliary Services, the W.R.N.S., the Q.A.R.N.N.S., and the Civil Service in the employ of the Admiralty throughout the world.

6. It is the intention of the Board to proceed as rapidly as possible to the re-establishment of normal conditions. Officers and men and civil employees of the Admiralty will readily recognize, however, that the complicated work of six years cannot be simplified in a day and also that many commitments must be undertaken as a legacy of victory in two hemispheres. The new situation which now confronts us can only be dealt with successfully and speedily with the full co-operation and good will of all."

THE SUPREME COMMANDER OF THE ALLIED FORCES.

(a) "I have received the following inspiring message from His Majesty King George the Sixth of England and am proud and happy to forward it through you to the Forces:—

[•] I send you my heartfelt congratulations on overwhelming success which has crowned your efforts. From the first day of the treacherous attack on the Philippines up to this last glorious moment your Military skill, your dauntless courage and your inspiring leadership have gained universal admiration and esteem.

On behalf of all my people, I would ask you to convey a special message of thanks and congratulations to the Forces of the British Commonwealth who have had the honour to serve under your command in the series of operations now so brilliantly concluded '.".

(b) "Australian soldiers, sailors and airmen :

Since the eighteenth of April, 1942, it has been my honour to command you in one of the bitterest struggles of recorded military history—a struggle against not only a fanatical enemy under the stimulus of early victory but the no less serious odds of seeming impenetrable barriers of nature—a struggle which saw our cause at its lowest ebb as the enemy hordes plunged forward with almost irresistible force to the very threshold of your homeland.

There, you took your stand and with your Allies turned the enemy advance on the Owen Stanleys and at Milne Bay in the fall of 1942, thus denying him access to Australia and otherwise shifting the tide of battle in our favour. Thereafter at Gona, Wau, Salamaua, Lae, Finschhafen, the Huon Peninsula, Madang, Alexishafen, Wewak, Tarakan, Brunei Bay, and Balikpapan your irresistible and remorseless attack continued.

Your airmen ranged the once enemy controlled skies and secured complete mastery over all who dared accept your challenge—your sailors boldly engaged the enemy wherever and whenever in contact in contemptuous disregard of odds and with no thought but to close battle so long as your ships remained afloat.

These, your glorious accomplishments, filled me with pride as your Commander, honoured for all time your flag, your people and your race, and contributed immeasurably to the advancement of the sacred cause for which we fought. I shall shortly relinquish this Command which throughout its tenure you have so loyally and so gallantly supported. I shall do so with a full heart of admiration for your accomplishments and of a deep affection born of our long comradeship in arms.

To you of all ranks I bid farewell. MACARTHUR.".

THE COMMANDER, 7TH FLEET.

"In relinquishing command of the Allied Naval Forces, S.W.P.A., I desire to express to my gallant officers and men who made the units of this Force my gratitude for their loyal devotion to duty and my admiration of their magnificent fighting spirit which made possible the performance of our assigned tasks. KINKAID.".

THE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF, BRITISH PACIFIC FLEET.

"Please accept my grateful thanks for the great welcome and material support which has always been accorded to the British Pacific Fleet by the Governments and peoples of Australia and New Zealand on whom we have been based.".

THE PRIME MINISTER OF NEW ZEALAND.

"The Government and people of New Zealand extend to you and to the Chiefs of the Naval and Air Staff of Australia and all ranks under your command their warmest congratulations on the outstanding part played by all ranks of the Australian fighting forces to the victory we now enjoy. We recall the anxious days of the Japanese advance in New Guinea and in the waters north of the Continent halted by the gallantry and heroism of the men of the Australian fighting forces. These grim battles were the sure foundation upon which our victory has been built. We know that in peace as in war the armed forces of Australia and New Zealand will work together and that the imperishable traditions of Anzac will ever endure.".

THE SPEAKER, LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA (TO THE MINISTER FOR THE NAVY).

"The Legislative Assembly at its sitting yesterday passed the following resolution that the Legislative Assembly of Western Australia in Parliament assembled desires to convey the deepest thanks of the people of Western Australia to the fighting men of Australia for the magnificent service given by them in the cause of freedom, justice and righteousness. The deepest appreciation of our people is also expressed to all those men and women who assisted the fighting men by work and service in the various theatres of war on the seas, in the air or the home front.".

THE SECRETARY, NAVY, ARMY AND AIR FORCE CLUB OF VICTORIA.

"I have great pleasure in advising you that, at the meeting of the Committee of this Club held on 23rd August, 1945, the following resolution was unanimously passed :---

'That the President and members of the Navy, Army, and Air Force Club of Victoria place on record their boundless admiration of the gallantry and high patriotism which all ranks of the Royal Australian Navy have shown during years which have called for the highest qualities of manhood. That we forward to the First Member of the Naval Board our congratulations on the achievement of victory in Europe and the Pacific, and express our thanks and gratitude to all members of the R.A.N. whose courage and fortitude contributed to that victory.

"Desire to thank all members of Legislative Assembly of Western Australia for resolution passed conveying the deepest thanks of the people of Western Australia to the fighting men of Australia for the magnificent service they have given. I shall be pleased to convey this resolution to the Government and members of the Royal Australian Navy.".

TO ALL R.A.N. SHIPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS.

"The Naval Board sends to the R.A.N. their warm appreciation of the fighting spirit, devotion to duty and cheerfulness which have been shown by all officers and men during nearly four years of intensive warfare against the Japanese enemy.

Sea power assisted by air power stemmed the Japanese advance which in 1942 threatened Australia. The relentless use of sea power has been largely responsible for destroying the enemy's power of aggression and desire to carry on the war, thus causing him to surrender. In this application of sea power, the R.A.N. has played its part with conspicuous efficiency, producing a record of which we can all feel justly proud.

The Naval Board wishes to express to all civilians of Administrative Staffs, Dockyards, Maintenance and Supply Depots and all Establishments in the Naval organization its warm appreciation of their splendid efforts during almost six years in the greatest war in history. As an integral part of the Naval Service, they have made an indispensable contribution to victory often in circumstances of the greatest urgency and pressure, and can feel justly proud of their fine record.". TO ALL R.A.N. SHORE ESTABLISHMENTS.

"The Naval Board sends to the W.R.A.N.S. and R.A.N. Nursing Service their warm appreciation of the efficiency, cheerfulness and devotion to duty shown by all members during the years of warfare.

The achievements of the Women's Services have been a very definite contribution to victory and have excited the pride and admiration of all.".

TO PRIME MINISTER OF NEW ZEALAND.

"On behalf of all ranks of the R.A.N., I thank you most sincerely for your inspiring message which we are honoured to receive.

We would convey to you our admiration of the outstanding achievements of the R.N.Z. Navy in the war at sea and recall with pride our association in the Anzac Squadron in the anxious days of the Japanese attack.".

3. The following statement by the Minister for the Navy is also promulgated for information :--

"Now that victory has come at last, it is fitting that we should pay tribute to the men of the Fighting Forces who have made that success possible, first by holding the enemy away from our shores, and then by carrying the war to the enemy's heart.

My own association with the Royal Australian Navy as its Minister dates from shortly before Japan commenced hostilities. Since then I have come to know many of its officers and men and to learn something of the difficulties under which they work. In the eyes of the Australian people, the prestige of the Royal Australian Navy stands at its highest level. It has carried out a task, many of the implications of which are not always apparent to the public and cannot always be translated into words.

Its task, in common with the Navies of the other United Nations, has been to keep the seaways of the world open to the Allies, and to deny the use of those seaways to the enemy. The world's greatest carrying vehicle is still the merchant ship, and it cannot carry troops, war materials, petrol and munitions to the battlefronts unless the world's oceans are kept open to it.

This policing of the seas is the basic function of a Navy in war, a function which has been faithfully discharged.

Numerically the smallest of the three Australian Services, the Royal Australian Navy has made the world its battlefront for almost six years. When Germany surrendered, the Admiralty recorded their sincere appreciation of the Royal Australian Navy's very valuable services in the war at sea. As it is Sea Power, fundamentally, which has brought Japan to her knees, and as our own Navy has played its part with the Allies in implementing that power against Japan, we can justly echo that message of congratulation.

This work has not been accomplished without loss. Since the war began, the Royal Australian Navy has suffered 2,948 casualties, including 1,327 killed, died of wounds, or missing presumed dead. Prisoners of war in Japanese hands total 249. Through enemy action we have lost three Cruisers, four Destroyers, two Sloops, one Corvette, a Depot Ship, and two miscellaneous craft—apart from losses by maritime hazards.

As we celebrate the victory, let us not forget those men who gave their lives that we might see this day, and the relatives and friends who are left to mourn them.

Jet love

All Australia will join me in honouring their memory, and in paying tribute to the officers and men who have come safely through the years of war. With that tribute we must link the personnel of the Women's Royal Australian Naval Service and of the Royal Australian Naval Nursing Service.

It must be borne in mind that unlike the other Services, a not inconsiderable Section of the Naval Organization comprises civilian officers and employees of all grades, taking a most important and active part behind the fighting Ships, maintaining them in an efficient condition and supplying the necessary stores, food, and munitions.

I am personally aware of the loyalty and hard work of the whole of the civil side of my Department, from the Senior Administrative Officers down, often under difficult circumstances and working against time. They have not spared themselves in their service to the Government.

The whole-hearted co-operation of both uniformed and civilian sections of the Navy has undoubtedly greatly contributed to the prestige of the Royal Australian Navy.".

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413. Procedure for dealing with Naval Stores In Vessels Being Paid Off under the Demobilization Scheme.

PROCEDURE FOR DEALING WITH NAVAL STORES IN VESSELS BEING PAID OFF UNDER THE DEMOBILIZATION SCHEME.

The following instructions are to be observed in connection with the paying off and destoring of ships at the various ports. Whilst these instructions refer to documents which in some instances are only in use in centrally stored ships the principles and procedure are applicable to all ships subject to modification in regard to detailed procedure and vouchers as determined by the particular storekeeping system in force.

2. At each port the Naval Officer in Charge should arrange a conference of the following Officers to determine a general programme for the paying off, return of Naval Stores, &c. :--

Naval Officer in Charge or representative.

(Superintending) Naval Store Officer and other Dockyard Officers as requisite.
Base Supply Officer.
Base Engineer Officer.
Commanding Officers and Supply Officers of ships concerned.
Officers to be responsible for ships or groups of ships whilst in reserve.

3. In each ship the Commanding Officer should confer with the ship's Supply Officer and ship's Officers holding items on loan to arrange a planned programme within the ship for the return of stores from loan, their temporary stowage in the ship, and ultimate return to store.

(1) The Commanding Officer should—

- (a) arrange that each Officer holding stores on Permanent Loan has his list compared with the Storekeeping Officer's standard copy to ensure that the remains shown in the Departmental copy agree with the Storekeeping Officer's copy which is the official list, musters his stores, and reports in writing any differences. On receipt of a report of differences action in accordance with the relative regulations should be taken (B.R. 4, Chapter XII., Instructions for Supply, Accounting, &c., for Naval Stores in Merchant Vessels commissioned for Naval Service; Commonwealth Navy Order 632 of 1943).
- (b) Ensure that before an Officer leaves the ship the stores on his charge have been either returned to the Storekeeping Officer or transferred to another Officer.
- (c) It will not be practicable in most cases for all the portable stores recurned from Permanent Loan to be stowed in the ship's storerooms and the Commanding Officer should arrange for other suitable lock-up stowage, i.e., spare cabins &c., as may be necessary to be made available to the Storekeeping Officer to ensure the safety of the stores whilst they are in the ship awaiting return to the shore store.

- (2) Officers holding Stores on Loan are to-
 - (a) arrange for comparison of their copies of Permanent Loan Lists with the standard copy held by the Storekeeping Officer, muster the stores in their charge and after investigation report in writing to the Commanding Officer any differences.
 - (b) Ensure that their reliefs or other Officers take over and sign for any stores remaining in their custody on the date of their departure from the ship.

(3) Storekeeping Officers are to-

- (a) Organize a programme for the ordered return of the stores on Permanent Loan to the extent necessary and practicable to their custody, and their safe stowage pending return to the shore store.
- (b) Arrange to clear the Permanent Loan Lists and the Naval Store Ledgers as the various items on Permanent Loan are returned by Officers concerned.
- (c) Ensure that as each Officer leaves the ship a receipt for any items remaining on the Permanent Loan List concerned is signed by another Officer.
- (d) As soon as the date of paying off is known, put in hand as much preliminary work as possible so that the considerable amount of work involved is spread over the full period available. For instance an immediate start can be made in preparing forms A.S. 331 in ships which are to destore on paying off. As the first step these should be prepared for all items stocks of which are in the ship's Naval Store. The pattern numbers and descriptions only (not quantities) should in the first instance be written up on the forms A.S. 331 direct from the ledgers. Later when the stores are to be returned to the shore Naval store the quantities as per actual physical check are to be inserted on the forms A.S. 331 before the items are removed from the ship's store.
- (e) In the case of items returned from Permanent Loan, stores common to various Departments can be placed in the Naval Store and their return dealt with when return of similar items from Naval Store stocks is arranged. For the balance of the loose items returned from Permanent Loan it may be more convenient for the A.S. 331 to be prepared from each A.S. 1091 concerned. All A.S. 1091's for items returned from Permanent Loan are to be attached by the Stores staff to the pertinent Storekeeping Officer's copies of the Permanent Loan Lists but need not be posted in the store ledgers which may be cleared direct from properly receipted quadruplicate copies of forms A.S. 331.

- (f) Review tools and other Naval Stores on temporary loan and arrange for early return to the store of items which will not be required.
- (g) Arrange for unused stocks of Consumable stores held by ships Officers outside the Naval storeroom to be returned to the Naval Store on forms A.S. 1091.

4. Particular attention is drawn to the fact that all valuable portable items, e.g., clocks and watches, telescopes, binoculars, &c., not required to be retained on board should be returned separately to the (Superintending) Naval Store Officer or Base Supply Officer. Such items are not to be placed with or returned with other stores but are to be taken personally to the store concerned and a receipt obtained for them on the spot. In order to guard against the possibility of loss they should not be retained in the ship longer than is necessary.

5. The return of Naval stores from ships being paid off and destored should be dealt with generally in two phases. In the first phase all stocks of Naval stores normally held in storerooms together with all portable items should be returned. Fitted equipment and bulky items such as furniture, &c., should not normally be dealt with until the return of easily portable items has been satisfactorily finalized in order that confusion may be avoided and bearing in mind that fitted and bulky items are not subject to loss to the same extent as are the smaller portable items.

6. It is pointed out that in the case of M/Ls. and other small vessels to which the provisions of Navy Order 632 of 1943 are applicable the Storekeeping Officer of the parent ship or Base is the Storekeeping Officer of the M/L. &c., and in such vessels the Commanding Officer stands in much the same relation to the Storekeeping Officer as does the Head of a Department in a larger ship to the Storekeeping or Supply Officer.

7. All Officers who hold Naval stores on temporary loan, on Permanent Loan, or as Storekeeping Officers are informed that they are responsible for such stores until that responsibility is assumed by another Officer and it is their responsibility to see that when giving up charge, finally leaving the ship, &c., the stores are turned over to their reliefs or other Officers. In the case of stores returned to ships' storerooms or to shore stores, Officers are to ensure that they obtain proper receipts for all items parted with.

8. The work devolving on ships' Storekeeping Officers and staffs and on shore Store staffs will be very heavy and the Naval Board expect other Officers to assist to the extent practicable in facilitating their work. In particular the following will help—

- (i) When it is known that a ship is to pay off and destore application for replacement of unserviceable permanent items should not be made unless it is known they will be required. Demands to replenish the stock of Consumable Stores should be kept to a minimum.
- (ii) Any unused Consumable stores in ready use storerooms under control of ship's Officers should be used up in lieu of drawing further items from the ship's Naval Store.

- (iii) Demands on the Naval store by departments of the ship should be limited to essential requirements for use, and the hours during which the Naval Store is open for normal issues should be strictly limited to permit the Stores staff as much opportunity as possible to progress, without undue interruption, the large amount of work they are required to undertake. Stores staff should be given such assistance as is possible to facilitate their work.
- (iv) It is the responsibility of Officers holding stores on Permanent loan to muster their own stores and Store staff should not be called on to assist unless the circumstances are exceptional.

9. The Base Supply Officer of the port or other Supply Officer specially appointed for the purpose will be generally responsible for ensuring compliance with the paying off instructions applicable to the ship's paying off in the port insofar as the return of stores, closing of accounts, &c., are concerned. Local arrangements are to be made at each port for the Base Supply Officer to be notified in advance of the date on which each Storekeeping Officer or Departmental Officer of a ship holding Naval Stores on Permanent Loan is due to leave the ship and on receipt of this information he is to take steps to ensure that all necessary action by those Officers has been properly finalized. He is to report specially to the Officer-in-Charge of Reserve ships and the Naval Officer-in-Charge any cases where the Naval Store Accounts are unsatisfactory or where serious losses, &c., have occurred.

Inspecting Officers attached to the staff of the Director of Naval Stores will be allocated to each port to advise Base Supply Officers and ships' Storekeeping Officers in connection with destoring procedure, closing of accounts, &c.

10. On completion of paying off Naval Stores remaining on board together with the Naval Store accounts or Inventories of ships concerned will be the responsibility of the Officers appointed for the purpose.

11. A summary of action to be taken in vessels paying off under the several categories mentioned is appended.

SUMMARY.

The instructions in C.O.R. Articles 414 and 415 will, subject to the following, govern generally the procedure to be followed. Variations considered desirable by Naval Officers-in-Charge to these Instructions should be submitted for the approval of the Naval Board.

Note.--References to Dockyard Officers at ports other than Sydney apply to the appropriate Dockyard or Base Officers.

- (1) Vessels paid off into reserve at Standard Notice.
 - The instructions in Appendix XXIV., Section 1, of B.R. 4 will be applicable. The vessels will not be destored and the Naval Store Accounts will remain open.
- (2) Vessels to be Dismantled and Sunk.
 - The provisions of C.O.R. Articles 414 and 415 will applysee also Appendix XXIV., Section 2, of B.R. 4. All Radio Equipment is to be treated as for W/T. After return of all Naval Stores, other than those necessarily retained in the ship, inventories of items remaining on

board are to be prepared in accordance with the relevant regulations. The Naval Store Accounts are to be finally closed and forwarded with all supporting vouchers to the Director of Naval Stores, Navy Office, Melbourne, under cover of a letter of advice signed by the Storekeeping Officer, showing particulars of the closed ledgers, permanent loan lists and packages of vouchers, &c., concerned.

- (3) Vessels to be paid off into Reserve at Extended Notice, for Disposal, &c.—
 - (a) A.M.S. Vessels and other ships built as war vessels, to be paid off into "F" Class Reserve, i.e., at extended notice for care and maintenance.- The provisions of C.O.R. Articles 414 and 415 will be applicable-see also Appendix XXIV., Section 2, of B.R. 4-except that in the case of Radio Equipment sub-paragraphs (b) and (c) hereunder are to be complied with and, in the case of A/S. and E/S. Gear, Appendices "A" and "B" of this Order are to be observed. These vessels are to be destored and items remaining on board shown in Inventories in accordance with the appropriate regulations. The Naval Store Accounts are to be closed and together with all supporting vouchers forwarded to the undermentioned Officers under cover of a letter of advice signed by the Storekeeping Officer showing particulars of the closed ledgers, permanent loan lists and packages of vouchers, &c., concerned :---

- (b) In the case of ships smaller than A.M.S. all Radio (including Radar) Equipment should be removed and returned to Store.
- (c) In A.M.S. and above where the vessels are not paying off to be dismantled and sunk the fitted Radio Equipment will in general be retained on board. In such cases :---
 - (i) Any remote Radar Display Unit (such as a P.P.I.) fitted on a compass platform or other exposed position, is to be removed together with its case and placed in the Radar office of the set to which it belongs. This also applies to units of W/T. equipment fitted in exposed positions.
 - (ii) The reflector and horn of the Radar type A276 aerial are to be removed and placed in the A276 office and a waterproof canvas cover fitted over the remaining portions of the aerial. The wave-guide opening revealed by the removal of the aerial horn should be covered with a blank metal or wooden plate. Aerials of gunnery Radar sets should also be fitted with a waterproof canvas cover.

- (iii) Offices housing Radio equipment (W/T. and Radar, &c.) are to be locked. Where a set is installed in a chart room or items of equipment are situated in any other office or plotting position, such room or plotting position should be locked, otherwise equipment should be removed and placed in the office of the set to which it belongs, or in the case of a set situated in an office which cannot be locked, the panels of this set should be removed and placed in one of the other Radar or W/T. offices.
- (iv) In the case of Radar sets with the transmitter situated in a lobby or passageway, the unit should be locked, and in cases where no lock is provided, one should be fitted.
- (v) All ventilating trunks, &c., open to the weather should be closed.
- (d) Auxiliary Vessels.—These will generally fall under two categories, viz. :—
 - (i) Those owned by the Navy.
 - (ii) Those on hire which require to be returned to the Owners.

In the case of Navy owned vessels the procedure (except for Radio Equipment, A/S. and E/S. Gear) applicable to ships at extended notice should be generally followed but the vessels should be destored only to the extent that this is necessary to ensure safe custody of the stores and equipment. The instructions in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) above apply to comparable Auxiliary vessels. In the case of vessels on hire and paid off for return to their owners the procedure outlined in Navy Order 574 of 1943 should be observed. Special precautions should be taken by the local Naval Officers-in-Charge to ensure that all stores on board are in safe custody during any period between the date of paying off the vessel and the date of turnover to the Owners.

Note.—Radio equipment is taken to include W/T., R/T., Radar, D/F., Loran, R.C.M., &c., together with associated aerials, remote display or control units, power supplies, &c. S.R.E. equipment when on charge as a Naval Store item is to be regarded as Radio equipment.

12. The principles of this Order are also applicable to Shore Establishments and Services being closed down.

APPENDIX "A".

Where these instructions in regard to A/S. and E/S. Gear are in conflict with C.O.R. the latter will be inapplicable.

I. A/S. EQUIPMENT.

(i) Dome to be left shipped in the housed position and should not be pumped out except when docking or for the purpose of periodically changing water.

(ii) Oscillator to be unshipped and returned in transport box to nearest Naval Store.

Type 128-Blank cover plate to be fitted.

Type 134—Tube inner, tube intermediate and strut streamline to be removed from directing gear assembly and returned to store. Top of directing gear assembly to be blanked off with plate blanking.

(iii) Mechanical gear to be well greased. All bared electrical leads to be taped to prevent ingress of moisture.

(iv) Batteries—All dry cells (Patts. 2951, 14001, 3773, 3774) to be withdrawn from installation. Accumulator—if serviceable or after economical repair, to be returned to store for issue as required and if so issued others supplied to ship in lieu on recommissioning.

(v) Motor alternators (high and low frequency) and lifting motor to be removed and returned to store.

(vi) Instruments in exposed positions (Bridge recorder, loud speaker, bearing plotter) to be detached and stowed in instrument space.

(vii) Stylus guide bars and springs or recorders to be oiled, time to fire mechanism to be greased.

(viii) A/S. Hut, Instrument space and Directing Gear compartment to be kept locked.

II. E/S. EQUIPMENT.

(i) Hull tanks to be topped with fresh water. Gravity feed system to be removed and tanks sealed in accordance with B.R. 638 (Handbook of E/S. Set Type 758) Chap. 11, paragraph 6.

In cases of ships fitted with Type 766 the portable transceiver unit is to be removed and stowed inboard.

(ii) Batteries—All dry cells (Patts. 2951, 14001, 3773) to be withdrawn from installation. Accumulators—if serviceable or after economical repair to be returned to store for issue as required and if so issued others supplied to ship in lieu on recommissioning.

(iii) Instruments in exposed positions (Recorders, Amplifiers Boards Charge/discharge) to be detached and stowed in A/S. Instrument space or other locked compartment.

(iv) Sliprings, tank face and mechanical parts of Recorder to be lightly coated with vaseline.

III. Detailed instructions in regard to certain ships are shown in Appendix "B".



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No. Subject. 414. Depth Charges—Care and Maintenance. C.9408/45.

DEPTH CHARGES CARE AND MAINTENANCE.

Reports received from ships indicate that the regulations for care and maintenance of depth charge equipment in many Frigates, A.M.S. vessels and M.L's are not being carried out.

2. In several cases, failures of depth charges to fire have been due to bad drill.

3. Frequent visits should be made to vessels by Base Torpedo and A.S. Officers to ensure that the instructions for care and maintenance are being carried out. Instructions and drill should be given by Base Staff where found necessary.

4. Commanding Officers of ships visiting a port where Base Torpedo and A/S Officers are borne should avail themselves of the services of these officers for instruction in care and maintenance of depth charge equipment and in depth charge drill.

5. The most common faults that occur in the preparation of depth charges for service are :---

- (a) Fitting of Pistols.—Detonator carrier screwed up only hand taut to the pistol body. This gives deep firing and, in the worst cases, complete failure. The detonator carrier should be screwed tightly to the pistol body using two spanners, St. No. 6213. (C.B. 4257 (6) para. 64.)
- (b) Priming.—Primer loose or only screwed up hand taut in the primer tube. This is the cause of shallow firing, which may easily cause damage to the firing ship as well as nullifying the attack.

The primer should be inserted in the primer tube until it bears against the pistol, when the handle of the primer will protrude approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ in. from the end of the primer tube. The slotted end of the primer locking tool, St. No. 6177, should be engaged with the split pin on the stopper spindle to prevent rotation of the primer. The handle should then be turned to expand the rubber ring, which should be finally screwed up taut by inserting the tool in the handle.

The importance of screwing up taut cannot be over emphasized. (C.B. 4257 (6) para. 68.)

A watertight joint between pistol and primer tube is equally important. Spanner box, St. No. 6825, should be used with a samson to increase the leverage when screwing up the pistol securing nut.

- (c) Lubrication of Pistols.—Too much grease has been used on pistols. A very thin film of grease should be applied by dipping the finger in the grease and then running it over the parts concerned. (C.B. 4257 (7) para. 73.)
- (d) Primer Gauge.—The primer gauge should always be used after fitting pistols. (C.B. 4257 (6) para. 66.)

6. Plugs, wood primer tube, St. No. 6053, and bolts complete with nuts and washers, St. No. 6012, are always to be supplied with the charge and are to be retained on board. The plugs complete with bolts and washers are always to be fitted when depth charges are landed or transported. Wood plugs and associated stores remaining on board from expended depth charges should be returned to the nearest armament depot at the first opportunity.

3

When depth charges are unfitted or unprimed, the primer tube should be closed by means of these plugs to prevent the entry of water and foreign matter.

Demands to make good any deficiencies of plugs, &c., should be forwarded to the nearest armament depot.

7. Practice Expenditure.--

- (a) Ships fitted with depth charge throwers are to fire for practice one full pattern of depth charges every six months.
- (b) Ships fitted with chutes only are to expend for practice one depth charge every quarter.
- (c) Ships and patrol craft in full commission carrying depth charges (M) are to expend one D.C. (M) each quarter.
- (d) Opportunity should be taken by ships and depots during the above practices to expend any depth charges with split welds, obliterated markings or other defects which will not affect the functioning of the fitted depth charge.
- (e) Attention is drawn to C.B. 4257 (1), para. 39, re minimum speeds when dropping depth charge patterns.

8. Depth Charges with Split Welds.—Whenever depth charges have to be dumped due to split welds or other causes, a report should be forwarded to the Director of Ordnance, Torpedoes and Mines, Navy Office, giving the number of the depth charge, filler initials, date of filling, particulars of filling, date received on board and whence received.

Care should be taken to dump the charges in deep water.

History sheets are important documents and should be filled in and despatched without delay.

(b) Depth adjuster keys are not required at Navy Office, and after being sighted by the Administrative Authority they should be returned to the nearest armament depot.

(c) The report rendered by the Administrative Authority should state that the depth adjuster key has been sighted.

(d) When filling in history sheets, the following additional information should also be included : Mark, lot No. and filler's initials of both primer and detonator.

10. Depth Charges.-(a) Slightly rusted depth charges should be cleaned and repainted, taking care not to paint over explosive markings. Those badly rusted should be used for practice, or returned to the nearest armament depot, as to scrape them on board may be dangerous.

(b) Primer tube.-Rust in the primer tube should be cleaned off and the surface given two coats of varnish with a soft, clean brush, the first coat being allowed to dry hard before applying the second.

(c) In hot climates, depth charges should be sheltered from the direct rays of the sun as much as practicable by canvas covers, screens or other suitable means to obviate the possible fracture of the welding due to expansion of the explosive charge.

BURSARIES FOR CHILDREN OF PERSONNEL KILLED OR DISABLED DURING THE PRESENT WAR.

The King George's Fund for Sailors has established a Fund by which bursaries tenable at schools in New South Wales are to be made available to children of Naval personnel killed or disabled in this war.

5

2. Bursaries are to be known as the "King George's Fund for Sailors Bursaries" and no more than twenty will be operative at any one time.

3. They will be tenable at any Public School or Private School in New South Wales approved by the Committee. (By Public School is meant not a State School which latter includes Primary, High and Technical Colleges.) There being no fees payable at State Schools, bursaries will not be tenable at them though in certain cases the Fund will assist with grants for books, &c., where approved by the Principal. Application for these subsidiary grants should be made in the same manner as for a full bursary.

4. Each bursary will be to the value of twenty-five pounds $(\pounds 25)$ per annum and will be tenable for three years subject to satisfactory reports from the Principal. They may be renewable for a further period after the expiration of three years on the recommendation of the Principal.

5. Application for a bursary is to be made through the Head-master or Head-mistress at the school at which the boy or girl is attending or intends to attend. The Principal of the school must certify that the candidate is a desirable candidate from the educational angle. Such applications should be sent by the Principal to the office of the Flag Officer-in-Charge, N.S.W., Wylde Street, Potts Point, Sydney, marked "School Bursaries" and must be received not later than 1st January each year.

6. Candidates must be not less than 14 years of age as at 1st February in the year of application.

7. The Fund will assist financially in the education of boys and girls under the age of fourteen. Application for such assistance should be made in the same manner as for older children.

8. All applications for bursaries are to show the rank or rating of father, name of father, official number where applicable, and ship in which killed or disabled.

9. The choosing of the bursaries to be awarded will be made by the Flag Officer-in-Charge, Sydney, and the domestic and financial circumstances of the parents will be taken into consideration in awarding the bursaries.

ACCOUNTING FOR NAVAL STORES INCORPORATED IN W/T, A/S, RADAR, ETC., SETS.

Instructions relating to the procedure for accounting for naval stores incorporated in W/T, A/S, Radar, &c., Sets are re-promulgated hereunder for the information and guidance of all concerned.


2. The actual components of each individual set are to be dealt with as one complete unit for store accounting purposes, the underlying principle being that the several individual components of each set are essential to its satisfactory performance and that, if the particular set is fulfilling its service function satisfactorily, it may be accepted that these components are duly present in the set.

It is not desired that any alteration should be made to the accounting procedure in force in existing ships and establishments, except in the circumstances referred to hereunder, and the following modifications will, for the time being, be instituted only in vessels under construction, and in instances where it is necessary to prepare new naval store ledgers. The modified system may also be put into force in ships in commission, or under refit, and in shore establishments, where a set is replaced completely by another set, or where an additional set is supplied. In these latter instances, the services of an Inspecting Officer (Naval Storekeeping) may be applied for to assist in effecting the necessary alterations to the naval store ledgers.

3. The modified method of accounting will be as follows :--

- (a) One ledger page will be used for each complete set, the components of which are detailed in the relevant establishment list.
- (b) On receipt of supply notes indicating the separate components comprising the complete set, they should be compared with the relevant establishment list for the set, and the set then taken on charge as---

The ledger page should be noted on the vouchers for the several components, and the vouchers then bundled in the usual manner.



- (c) The complete set should be issued on permanent loan as a set and shown in the appropriate permanent loan list as described on the ledger page, *vide* (b) above, a copy of the relevant establishment list being filed with the loan list.
- (d) Spares and accessories, both permanent and consumable, which are allowed by establishment, will continue to be accounted for as at present, i.e., a separate ledger page is required for each description of item. When an accessory of a permanent nature is issued on permanent loan, it should be recorded in the permanent loan columns of the ledger and recorded separately on the permanent loan list. When, however, a spare permanent item is issued in lieu of a defective component of a complete set, it should be issued outright and written off charge in the serviceable column of the ledger. The defective item should be taken on charge as unserviceable and later returned to the dockyard, a serviceable item being obtained in lieu to restore the spares carried in the ship to the authorized allowance as per the establishment list concerned.

Whilst all transactions in the spares and accessories should be recorded in the ledger, the establishment list for the particular set should only be noted when a reduction, or addition, to the original quantity of a component is involved, i.e., when a component is returned defective and replaced by a serviceable spare no alteration is necessary in the establishment list.

(e) In the event of a component of a set, a spare of which is not allowed *vide* the establishment list, requiring replacement, it will be necessary for the defective component to be taken on charge in the unserviceable ledger, and written off charge on return to a naval store depot. When the replacement is received from the Naval Store Officer, the item should be taken on charge in the serviceable stores ledger, issued outright and written off charge therein.

It will be noted that such transactions will be recorded in the ledger, but the items will not remain on charge therein. In order to avoid raising a separate ledger page for each such item, a ledger page for each separate set or assembly should be raised, and all transactions in the components thereof for which spares are not carried recorded therein.

- (f) (i) When a set is to be modified or converted to another set, particulars of the stores required for modification or conversion are notified in the relative Navy Order, Confidential Commonwealth Navy Order, &c., and supply is effected without demand by the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney.
- (ii) Upon receipt, modification or conversion stores are to be taken on charge in the Naval Store Account in the usual manner. They are then to be issued outright to the Departmental Officer concerned on Forms A.S. 156, any replaced items being returned from the Departmental Officer on Form A.S. 1091, taken on charge in the Naval Store Account and returned to the Superintending Naval Store Officer, Sydney. Any spares or accessories included amongst the modification or conversion stores should be dealt with as indicated in paragraph 3 (d) above.

- (iii) If the modification does not involve a change in the type of the set, any items which are to be incorporated therein (i.e., permanent components or consumable items to be fitted) should be entered in the "as fitted" column of the permanent loan copy of the pertinent Establishment List, and the Registered Nos. of the relevant Forms A.S. 156 endorsed thereon. Similarly, any items removed from the set as a result of the conversion should be deleted from the "as fitted" column of the Establishment List and the Registered Nos. of the Forms A.S. 1091 quoted.
- (iv) When the modification or conversion does involve a change in the type of the set, a conversion voucher indicating that the set has been converted from one type to another is to be prepared, vide Article 38 of B.R. 4, and the registered Nos. of the Issue and Return Vouchers, A.S. 156 and A.S. 1091 quoted thereon. The pertinent ledger page and the Permanent Loan Lists are to be endorsed :—

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

FOOD COUPONS-NAVAL PERSONNEL-RATIONING YEAR, 1945-1946.

The 1945-46 rationing year commenced on Monday, 4th June, 1945, upon which date the current Food Ration Sheet for the Defence Services was brought into operation. Each individual food coupon sheet for a half-week contains the following :---

Tea	 	 	one-half coupon,
Sugar	 	 •••	one-quarter coupon,
Butter	 1.2	 	one-half coupon,
Meat	 	 • • •	two half coupons,

the quantitative value being one-half of the corresponding civilian coupon.

2. This Food Ration Sheet is common to the Navy, Army, and Air Services, including Royal Australian Naval Nursing Service and Women's Royal Australian Naval Service. Coupons are negotiable whenever presented, and are not limited to a specific period as in the case of civilian coupons.

3. Entitlement to Food Ration Coupons.—Specially printed sheets representing a "half week" entitlement of rationed food commodities are issuable to the following personnel :—

- (a) Personnel proceeding on leave.
- (b) Personnel in receipt of provision allowance or victualling allowance and not specially permitted to purchase from Service stocks of provisions.

(c) Personnel on consolidated rates of pay, other than Naval Dockyard Police and civilian canteen staffs who retain their civilian ration books.

4. For leave purposes coupons are to be issued to each person on the following scale :---

and so on, but in no case are coupons to be issued at any one time for a period exceeding 28 days.

When issues are made for periods of two weeks or more, one butter half-coupon and one meat half-coupon are to be excised or cancelled in ink, or by indelible stamp, for each two weeks' entitlement. Periods of less than two weeks are to be disregarded. Monthly returns of coupon transactions are, in accordance with paragraph 8 (b) (iv) of this Order, to include a certificate that such action has been taken.

The surrender of food coupons is not required for meals at a hostel, hotel, or other residential establishment, if period of stay is less than six days in any one fortnight. Personnel are to be informed, when such accommodation is anticipated, that coupon issue is not to be applied for.

5. In addition to the personnel referred to in paragraph 2, issue may be made to all sea-going personnel serving in Naval Establishments who are granted "short leave" to visit their homes as defined in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 170. Entitlement is one "half-week" coupon sheet for each half-week to such personnel as are granted regular short leave. "Home" may be interpreted, at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, as including the home of a near relative (e.g., parent, sister. or brother).

6. Requisitioning of Coupon Supplies.—Sheets, each containing twenty (20) "half-week' combined coupons, are to be requisitioned from the State Deputy-Director of Rationing by Naval Officers-in-Charge at Sydney, Brisbane, Fremantle, Port Adelaide and Hobart, for issue to H.M.A. Ships and Establishments and to other Naval Authorities within or adjacent to their districts. Naval Officers-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, Port Melbourne, and Darwin are to requisition upon the Director of Victualling.

Sea-going ships are to obtain requirements from the most convenient of the authorities referred to. Requirements of tenders and outlying stations are to be met by parent ships or base depots. Personnel returning from outlying stations or areas where stocks of coupon sheets are not held are to report to the Naval Authority at their first port of arrival on the mainland for coupon issue.

7. Custody of Coupons, Accounting and Returns.—Stocks are to be held in the custody of a responsible officer, and coupons are only to be issued on the authority of the Commanding Officer, who is responsible that a suitable record is maintained of all receipts and issues and that every precaution is taken to avoid abuses or unauthorized issues.

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8. The following returns are to be rendered to the Director of Victualling at the end of each calendar month :—

- (a) By Naval Officers-in-Charge, indicating-
 - (i) Number of coupons received.
 - (ii) Number of coupons issued.
 - (iii) Ships, other than tenders, supplied.
 - (iv) Number of coupons remaining in hand.
- (b) By Commanding Officers of establishments and of sea-going ships, indicating—
 - (i) Number of coupons received during the month and sources of supply.
 - (ii) Number of coupons issued.
 - (iii) Number of coupons remaining.
 - (iv) Compliance with paragraph 4, sub-paragraph 2, of this Order in regard to cancellation of coupons.
- 9. Navy Orders 266 and 605 of 1944 are cancelled.

H.M.A. SHIPS PAYING OFF-RETURN OF NAVAL ARMAMENT, GUNMOUNTING, AND TORPEDO STORES.

The following instructions are to be observed in connection with return of Naval Armament, Torpedo and Gunmounting stores from H.M.A. Ships paying off into Reserve or for disposal:—

- (a) Ships Paying off for Disposal.—All ammunition 40 m.m. and below stowed in Ready Use lockers and all "exposed" small arm ammunition is to be dumped in deep water prior to paying off. The remainder of the outfit of Naval Armament, Torpedo and Gunmounting stores is to be returned to the Naval Armament, Torpedo, or Gunmounting Depot at the paying off port or, where such depots do not exist, to the Naval Officer-in-Charge for despatch to the nearest appropriate depot.
- (b) Ships Paying off into Reserve at Extended Notice (i.e., 4 Months).-

Stores to be disposed of as in (a) above except as follows :--

(i) Gun bodies 3 pdr. and above to be retained on board in a state of preservation.

> (Mechanisms, spare parts and appurtenances, etc., for such guns to be landed and retained at the port where the ship is held in reserve.)

- (ii) A proportion of fireworks as arranged with the Senior Officer in charge of ships in reserve to be retained.
- (iii) Gunmountings 3 pdr. and above to be retained on board in a state of preservation. (Spare parts, etc., for such mountings to be landed and retained at the port where the ship is held in reserve.)
- (iv) Torpedo tubes are to be retained on board in a state of preservation.

2. Store accounts are to be closed on return of stores as above and forwarded to Navy Office with all supporting documents.

3. Lists are to be prepared in triplicate of all Naval Armament and Whitehead torpedo stores which are necessarily retained on board in accordance with paragraph 1 (b) and distributed as follows:—

Naval Armament Stores-

Original guarded in fixture list. Duplicate forwarded with closed account. Triplicate to Naval Armament Supply Officer.

Whitehead Torpedo Stores-

Original guarded in fixture list. Duplicate forwarded with closed account. Triplicate to Torpedo Depot. 4. Notes in regard to preservation of equipment are appended :---

Preservation of Guns.—Bores are to be coated with a mixture of 95 per cent. mineral jelly and 5 per cent. beeswax and hermetically sealed at both ends by waxed wooden plugs tightly inserted and rendered watertight by the application of putty.

Exteriors are to be painted with one coat of red lead paint followed by one of service grey. Where abnormal deterioration of the paint is likely to occur, a second coat of service grey may be applied. Clinometer planes are not to be painted but are to be heavily coated with a mixture of white lead and tallow and the preserving covers secured in place. The breech openings of guns with sliding type of breech block are to be regarded as exterior parts.

Holes for fixing screws are to be plugged with greasy tow and putty.

Counterbalance weights, if fitted, are to be removed.

- Preservation of Mountings.—To be thoroughly scraped and painted where necessary. Rollers and all movable parts, pivot bolts, etc., to be coated with mineral grease.
- Preservation of Torpedo Tubes.—To be thoroughly cleaned, oiled and painted when necessary. All working surfaces, steel parts, springs, valves and guide strips are to be well coated with mineral grease.

Rubber pads and fittings are to be coated with graphite paste.

COLLECTION OF INCOME TAX BY INSTALMENTS--MEMBERS OF THE FORCES RELEASED ON LEAVE FOR SEASONAL OCCUPATIONS.

In cases where members of the Royal Australian Navy are granted leave for harvesting operations before 31st December, 1945, the Commissioner of Taxation has agreed that they may be granted exemption from instalment deductions until 31st December, 1945.

2. In this connection, a certificate should be completed in duplicate as per *pro forma* below, the original being retained by the member and the duplicate forwarded to the Deputy Commissioner of Taxation in the State referred to in the certificate.

3. The member of the Forces to whom the certificate is issued must present the certificate to his employer in order that the employer may be satisfied that he is authorized to refrain from making tax instalment deductions from the earnings of that member.

4. It should be noted that any income received by a member of the Forces from harvesting operations is subject to tax and that the arrangement now authorized relates only to the deduction of instalments from that income. 5. In order to assist Commanding Officers in carrying out the procedure which has been outlined above, the names and addresses of the Deputy Commissioners of Taxation in the several States are set out hereunder :---



RECOVERY OF VALUE OF STORES LOST BY NEGLECT.

The following general signal, T.O.O. 261359 September, is included in Navy Orders for the guidance of all concerned :--

"Reference-Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions Article 9, clause 3. Until further notice, Commanding Officers are to investigate, as soon as detected, all cases of deficient stores or stores lost by neglect and assess liability on form A.S. 126 whether or not the value exceeds five pounds.

2. Where the value exceeds five pounds, the matter should be reported to Navy Office, as provided in clause 4 of Article 9, but recovery is on all occasions to be effected forthwith in accordance with the Captain's decision.

3. Where deficiencies or other losses of stores by neglect are detected only after an officer or rating has been discharged to a demobilization depot, the matter is to be immediately reported to Navy Office in addition to taking other normal action.

4. The foregoing procedure is to be closely observed in order to ensure that charges for losses due to neglect are made immediately, whenever practicable, or at latest before personnel are demobilized."

MESSAGE OF CONGRATULATION.

The following message has been received on the occasion of the surrender of the Japanese Empire and is promulgated for information :---

The President of the Senate: (To the Minister for the Navy.)

"In accordance with the direction of the Senate, I am transmitting to you hereunder the terms of a Resolution which was agreed to unanimously by the Senate on Wednesday, 12th September, upon the motion of the Minister for Trade and Customs (Senator the Hon. R. V. Keane) :---

That the thanks of the Senate be accorded to the officers, warrant officers, petty officers, and men of the Royal Australian Navy, for their heroic services in every theatre of war, for the guardianship of Australia from the attacks of our enemies, for their unceasing vigilance in the patrol of many seas, for their courage and skill in convoying their soldier comrades and supplies to operational areas, and for the prestige they have won for their country wherever they have been.

That the thanks of the Senate be accorded to the officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of the Australian Military Forces in the field for their courage and efficiency, their endurance in circumstances of unexampled hardship, for their magnificent achievements and for their undaunted spirit which has carried them through years of toil and suffering to complete victory.

That the thanks of the Senate be accorded to the officers, noncommissioned officers, and men of the Royal Australian Air Force for their brilliant daring and conspicuous skill over land and sea, and for their calm courage and devotion to whatever dangerous and vital duties they have been allotted. That the thanks of the Senate be offered to the men of the Merchant Navy, who carried out the vital task of keeping open the supply lines, always at great risk and imposing severe tests upon their endurance.

That the thanks of the Senate be accorded to the women of all the auxiliary services of the three arms of the fighting forces for their devotion and skill and solicitude for the sick and wounded of our sailors, soldiers, and airmen.

That the Senate records its deep appreciation of the devotion and sacrifice of the fathers, mothers, wives, and sisters of Australia's sailors, soldiers, and airmen.

That the Senate records its deep appreciation of the efforts, money and gifts from the women, men, and children of Australia to mitigate the hardships of Australian fighting men. to alleviate the lot of our prisoners of war and to make more comfortable the sick and wounded.

That the thanks of the Senate be offered to munitions and war workers generally in secondary and primary industries; to those men of 1914–18 who gave valuable home service in garrison and other work, and to the Volunteer Defence Corps.

That the Senate acknowledges with deep submission and reverence the heroism of those who have fallen in the service of their country, and tenders its sympathy to their relatives in the hour of their sorrow and their pride.

I desire to ask that you will be good enough to have the terms of the above Resolution brought to the notice of all personnel referred to therein who come under your administration.".

H.M.A. SHIPS PAYING OFF-NAVAL ARMAMENT STORE ACCOUNTS.

With reference to paragraph 2 of Navy Order 443 of 1945, care is to be taken, when H.M.A. Ships pay off, that the Naval Armament Store Account is completed and closed in accordance with the instructions printed throughout the ledger (Forms F.A. 30, S. 1423, or S. 1423A). The attention of ships using Form F.A. 30 is particularly drawn to pages V. and VI., paragraphs 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, and 33.

2. The ledger should contain an accurate and complete account of all Naval Armament Stores received, expended, issued or otherwise disposed of (with the exception of packages and arisings, *ride* Navy Order 383 of 1943).

3. The Naval Officer-in-Charge or Naval Armament Supply Officer should, if necessary, provide the Accounting Officer with suitable office space for closing his account, and with any advice and assistance required, especially with regard to vouchering the stores to be landed. Care should be exercised as far as possible to ensure that the Ship's Return Notes agree with the stores actually returned.

4. The account, when completed and signed by the Commanding Officer on the first and last pages of the ledger, should be handed to the Naval Armament Supply Officer for examination and transmission to Navy Office by registered post. Where there is no Naval Armament Supply Officer, this should be done by the Naval Officer-in-Charge.

5. Owing to the considerable quantities of stores that will be landed at certain paying-off ports, complete check of stores returned will take some time and to avoid undue delay in closing accounts, the ledger, with the exception of small arms, should be posted from the triplicate copies of the Ship's Return Notes, in accordance with Navy Order 328 of 1945. If the receipted duplicate copies of the Return Notes are not received by the time the account is ready for despatch to Navy Office, the account should be forwarded without them, a note being inserted to that effect. The Officer receiving the stores should forward the Receipted Vouchers to Navy Office as soon as possible, with his observations regarding any discrepancies.

6. In the case of small arms (i.e., sub-machine guns, rifles, and pistols) the Return Notes must be checked and receipted prior to closing of the account.

A report has been received of damage to the rear end of 4-inch Mark XVI* gun chambers in one of H.M.A. Ships caused by careless handling of drill cartridges.

ADVANCEMENT OF RATINGS-NOTATION OF SEAGOING RECOMMEN-DATIONS ON CONDUCT SHEETS AND NOTATIONS ON A.S. 264.

Owing to frequent drafting, Forms A.S. 239A (Conduct Sheets) in respect of many ratings, bear a succession of notations "Under three months" in connection with recommendations for advancement (and efficiency assessments), with the result that there is often no record of a rating having been recommended for advancement from a seagoing ship.

It has been decided that, in future, the efficiency and advancement columns of conduct sheets of men serving in seagoing ships are to be completed for periods of one month or more, the notation "I.K." (insufficient knowledge) being used, if necessary. In depots and other shore establishments, these columns are to be completed for periods of three months or more. In either case, the columns may be completed for shorter periods if there is sufficient knowledge of the man concerned.

CANTEEN ARRANGEMENTS IN H.M.A. SHIPS AND NAVAL ESTABLISHMENTS—CONSOLIDATION.

During the present war it has been necessary to depart substantially from established Naval canteen procedure prescribed in regulations, instructions and standing orders, and existing arrangements, as promulgated in Navy Orders 484, 599, and 618 of 1944, Navy Order 34 of 1945, and Naval Board general signal No. 090523 July, 1945, are consolidated hereunder for ready reference and close observance by all ships and establishments concerned :--

A. SERVICE SYSTEM CANTEENS.

- (i) The Australian Army Canteens Service maintains regular supplies of canteen stores to all Service System Canteens in Naval Establishments which are, as a standing principle, to demand their requirements of canteen stores from the most convenient A.A.C.S. Issuing Point (a list of issuing points concerned is shown as an Appendix to this Order), obtaining supplies from other sources only in case of emergency. Where it is desired, however, to include in canteen stocks an article (apart from a different brand only) of a nature not normally held in A.A.C.S. stocks, supplies may be drawn direct from a manufacturer or merchant or, in the case of shore bases in the islands North of Australia, from a Victualling Store Issuing Ship, the selling price being fixed as provided in (v) hereunder.
- (ii) Canteens in seagoing ships, but excluding harbour ships, may obtain their requirements of canteen stores from the most convenient source. Such stores are regularly carried in V.S.I. Ships for issue on repayment to ships in Northern operational areas and, in addition, supplies will be available to those canteens from A.A.C.S Issuing Points to the extent that stocks permit. In the case of controlled items and items in short supply, e.g., cigarettes and tobacco, it may be necessary, temporarily, for seagoing ships to obtain requirements at mainland ports from A.A.C.S. Issuing Points. Selling prices are to be regulated by the Canteen Committee in accordance with K.R. and A.I., Article 630, clause 6.
- (iii) Stores supplied to Service System Canteens, both ashore and afloat, by A.A.C.S. will be charged at that organization's retail prices operating in the area of supply, less a discount of 5 per cent. At Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, and Fremantle, bonded stores supplied to seagoing ships will, however, be charged at cost prices only, plus 2½ per cent. All supplies by A.A.C.S. will be made on a strictly cash basis.

- (iv) In addition to the 5 per cent. discount referred to in sub-paragraph (iii), a rebate of 5 per cent. on the amount of the total purchases of all Service System Canteens, excluding purchases of bonded stores at the ports named in sub-paragraph (iii), is paid monthly to Navy Office by the Central Canteens Control Board, and is accompanied by a schedule showing the amount due in respect of the monthly purchases of each ship and establishment. One-third of this rebate is paid to the credit of the R.A.N. Central Canteen Fund, the functions of which are set out in Section D hereunder, while the balance is paid, through Supply Officers, to the individual ships and establishments concerned where officially authorized canteens operate.
- (v) Supplies obtained from A.A.C.S. by shore-based canteens are invariably to be sold to ship's companies at the prices shown in the current A.A.C.S. Retail Price List for the area of supply, copies of which should be obtained from the local A.A.C.S. representative. Where supplies are drawn from sources other than A.A.C.S., as provided in sub-paragraph (i) above, the selling prices are to be regulated by the Canteen Committee in accordance with K.R. and A.I., Article 630, clause 6.
- (vi) C.O.R., Articles 454 and 455 (clause 2), provide that Naval Board approval is necessary to the establishment of a canteen in any H.M.A. Ship or Establishment, or other place used exclusively by Naval personnel. This approval is necessary whether or not an advance from public funds is desired in accordance with Naval Account Regulations and Instructions, Article 61. Any ship or establishment in which a Service System Canteen is at present operating without specific Naval Board approval, other than A.M.S. Vessels and Frigates in which the establishment of a canteen has been approved by a Naval Officer-in-Charge under authority delegated by the Naval Board, is therefore to report the matter to Navy Office forthwith for covering approval.
- (vii) Naval Officers-in-Charge and Port Directors are required to co-operate with the local representatives of A.A.C.S., who are to be furnished with such information as is necessary in order to ensure the maintenance locally of adequate stocks to meet known and anticipated requirements of Naval canteens on shore, a similar procedure being observed in the event of a sea-going ship requiring replenishment from A.A.C.S. sources.
- (viii) In ships and establishments with Service System Canteens, the general procedure prescribed in K.R. and A.I., Article 632, is to apply wherever a Supply Officer is borne, except that half-yearly reports are to be forwarded to Navy Office as at 30th June and 31st December.

The following modified instructions are, however, to be strictly observed in all cases where a Supply Officer is not borne :---

(a) Canteen Rules.

The Captain shall cause proper rules to be drawn up for the conduct and administration of the canteen.

(b) Canteen Committee.

The composition of the Canteen Committee is to be based, as far as the complement permits, on the general principle enumerated in K.R. and A.I., Article 630, clause 2, and the Executive Officer is always to act as ex-officio president.

(c) Duties of Canteen Committee.

Subject to (a) above, and the instructions contained in sub-paragraph (i) to (v) of this section, the Canteen Committee is responsible for the general administration of all matters relating to the canteen and for the administration of the Ship's Fund.

(d) Ship's Fund.

The profits of the canteen are to be paid to the Ship's Fund, which is to be utilized and controlled as provided in K.R. and A.I., Article 630, clause 4.

(e) Prices.

A list of prices authorized in accordance with sub-paragraphs (i), (ii), and (v) of this section is to be displayed prominently in or near the canteen.

(f) Canteen Attendants.

Canteen attendants may be paid such remuneration for their services as may be decided by the Canteen Committee and approved by the Captain.

(g) Periodical Audit of Accounts and Stocktaking.

The accounts of the canteen are to be audited and the stock checked by at least two representatives of the Committee detailed for the purpose by the Captain. These operations are to be carried out at the end of each quarter and at least on one other occasion during the quarter without notice. A record of such examinations is to be maintained on board, which is to be inspected by the Supply Officer of the parent ship at every opportunity.

(h) Custody of Money.

The Captain is to ensure that satisfactory arrangements are made for the custody of canteen money. Where practicable, a banking account should be opened for the purpose and be operated upon by at least two members of the Canteen Committee, one of whom is to be the Executive Officer. Moneys retained on board, except such as may be necessary for change purposes in the canteen, are to be kept in the possession of an officer, and a suitable record maintained of all sums received and issued, against which signatures are to be recorded.

(i) Security of Canteen Stores.

The Captain is to ensure that suitable lock-up accommodation is provided for the safety of canteen stores.

(j) Half-Yearly Report and Balance Sheet.

A report on the operation of the canteen is to be forwarded to the Director of Victualling on 30th June and 31st December of each year, also on paying off. This report is to be accompanied by a certified copy of the balance sheet on those dates. The persons certifying to the correctness of the balance sheet should be the representatives of the Canteen Committee referred to in sub-paragraph (g) above, and the valuation of unsold stock is to be calculated at cost prices.

B. CANTEENS CONDUCTED BY A.A.C.S.

- (i) In Naval Establishments where canteens are wholly conducted by A.A.C.S., a monthly rebate of 5 per cent. on total retail sales is paid to Navy Office and is distributed in the same manner as provided in Section A (iv) above, viz., one-third is paid to R.A.N. Central Canteen Fund and the balance to the individual establishment concerned, through the Supply Officer.
- (ii) Any complaint which may arise in connexion with the normal operation of any one of these canteens, either in respect of stocks or service, is to be investigated by the Commanding Officer who, if necessary, will represent the matter to the local District Board of A.A.C.S., a copy of any communication being forwarded to the Naval Board for information and further action, if considered desirable, with the Central Canteens Control Board, through the Department of the Army.

C. TENANT CANTEENS.

- (i) A.A.C.S. will, when so requested, assist canteen tenants in H.M.A. Ships in procuring their requirements of stores. Where these are drawn from A.A.C.S. Issuing Points, the basis of charge will be as provided in Section A above.
- (ii) In order that seagoing ships with canteen tenants may participate in contributing to the Central Canteen Fund, the scale of canteen rentals shown in C.O.R., Article 455, was increased by 25 per cent. as from 1st October, 1944, the whole of such increase being paid by Supply Officers in the ships concerned to the credit of the Central Fund at the end of each quarter.

D. R.A.N. CENTRAL CANTEEN FUND.

- (†) The Naval Board have established a special fund known as the R.A.N. Central Canteen Fund, the functions of which are—
 - (a) to provide amenities of a general nature beyond the capacity of an individual ship or establishment;
 - (b) to contribute the Navy share to certain special funds (not of Government origin) now used to supplement the Government scheme for education of children of deceased or disabled servicemen; and
 - (c) to promote the welfare of Naval or ex-Naval personnel in any other manner which the Naval Board may approve.
- (ii) The Central Canteen Fund is partly financed, as indicated in sub-paragraphs A (iv), B (i), and C (ii) above, by a general levy in all H.M.A. Ships and Establishments on funds normally obtainable from canteen sources and credited to the Ship's Fund; also partly from a small levy on the value of bulk canteen stores maintained in V.S.I.S's. for issue on repayment to ships and island bases, and from profits made on bulk issues of bottled beer maintained in V.S.I.S's. for issue to ships' companies.
- (iii) Information regarding the composition of the Central Canteen Fund Committee, the general method of administration of the Central Fund, &c., will be promulgated separately in Navy Orders at an early date.

E. Use of Army Hostels and Officers' Clubs by Naval Personnel.

The Department of the Army extends the full use of A.A.C.S. Hostels and Officers' Clubs to Naval personnel, available sleeping accommodation being apportioned between Naval and Army personnel having regard to the strengths of the respective Services in each locality concerned.

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No. Subject. 470. Post War Opportunities in His Majesty's Colonial Service. C.10042/45.

POST WAR OPPORTUNITIES IN HIS MAJESTY'S COLONIAL SERVICE.

Hostilities having now ceased, recruitment to the Colonial Service is re-opening on a considerable scale. The following arrangements have been made for the submission of applications by Australian candidates who are now serving in or have been discharged from the Australian Forces.

2. The principal appointments are for Administrative, Agricultural, Education, Engineering, Forestry, Medical, Police, and Veterinary Officers. There are Medical, Nursing, Educational, and a limited number of other posts open to women. Short particulars of the age limits, qualifications required, salaries, &c., are given in the Appendix to this Order.

3. Attention is particularly drawn to the qualifications described in the Appendix for each of the various classes of appointments.

Candidates who do not possess the qualifications mentioned will be wasting time in applying for further particulars.

4. Further particulars of the post-war opportunities in the Colonial Service and of the arrangements which are being made for post-war recruitment are given in a leaflet issued by the Colonial Office, marked R.D.W. 6. More detailed information about the various classes of appointments, including such matters as the nature of the duties, general conditions of appointment and service and the geographical area in which vacancies may usually be expected, is contained in a series of official Recruitment memoranda, which severally describe each branch of the Service. Copies of these memoranda can probably be made available, if required, on special enquiry.

5. Intending candidates who appear to possess the required qualifications should write to the Director-General of Manpower (Scientific Personnel Section), Herald Building, 66 Pitt-street, Sydney, N.S.W., and ask for a copy of the Colonial Office leaflet R.D.W. 6 and the appropriate application form. In their letter they should state for which branch or branches of the Colonial Service they wish to apply, and they should give a brief statement of their qualifications.

6. Service or ex-service personnel desiring to be considered under these special arrangements must before 30th November, 1945, indicate to the Director-General of Manpower, as explained in paragraph 5, their intention to apply for a Colonial Service appointment.

7. In order to expedite as much as possible the lodging of applications, applicants are advised to request those who write testimonials in support of their applications to send testimonials direct to the Director-General of Manpower (Scientific Personnel Section), at the address above. The two confidential referees named by each applicant will be communicated with by the Director-General on receipt of the application. 8. Application forms should be filled in with special attention to the marginal notes, and after completion should be returned to the Director-General of Manpower (Scientific Personnel Section) at the address above.

9. There is no written examination and no entrance fee. Candidates will be selected, as in peace time, by competitive selection based on record and (where considered prima facie suitable) personal interview.

10. Suitable applications will be submitted for consideration to Selection Committees which have been set up in each State of the Commonwealth. Applications recommended by a State Committee will be further considered by an Australian Selection Committee. Applications recommended by this Committee will be transmitted to the Colonial Service Appointments Board in London, which advises the Secretary of State.

11. The arrangements set out in this Order will replace, so far as Australian Service applications are concerned, any inconsistent provisions in R.D.W. 6, in Recruitment memoranda, or in the application form supplied.

APPENDIX.

Summary of principal appointments dealt with by— The Director of Recruitment (Colonial Service).

The particulars given in this summary relate to the pre-war regulations with the exception of the age limits. The present minimum limit $(20\frac{1}{2})$ is common to all appointments. The present maximum is shown below for each class of appointment.

The following points should also be noted :--

- (a) In addition to the salaries shown, free quarters (or allowances in lieu,) free passages and free medical attendance are in most cases provided.
- (b) Above the salary scales there are higher posts, which are filled by promotion inside the Service. Some indication of the nature and range of such posts is given under the various headings below. Colonial Governorships, carrying salaries and allowances amounting to as much as £8,000 a year in some cases, are also normally filled by promotion from the Colonial Service.
- (c) "Areas" denotes those areas in which vacancies may occur to be filled by new entrants to the Service. Vacancies may occur elsewhere to be filled by promotion or transfer inside the Service.

The Colonial Administrative Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 2).

Age.-Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1910.

Qualifications.—High standard of general education, intellectual ability, leadership, character, physique, University education (Honours) generally desirable, but not indispensable. Salary.—Initial salary from £350 to £490, on scales rising to £1,000 or £1,400. Super-scale posts in District Administrations and the Secretariats ranging from Deputy Provincial Commissionerships to Colonial Secretaryships, at salaries varying from £1,100 to £3,000.

Areas.—Mainly West and East Africa: Malaya, Hong Kong, Ceylon, Fiji, and Western Pacific: Palestine, Cyprus, Aden; occasionally Basutoland, Bechuanaland, Swaziland. Not West Indies.

N.B.—The Description of the duties of an Administrative Officer given in Recruitment Memorandum No. 2 applies particularly to the present pre-war functions of the Administrative Service. In future, however, Administrative Officers will be required in increasing numbers to undertake more specialized duties as the technique of Colonial Administration develops and the range of governmental activities in the Colonies increases. In particular, they may be required to undertake duties in connexion with public relations, economic policy, labour, the co-operative movement, demographic surveys, industry, commerce, &c. Candidates, therefore, who are interested in and possess qualifications for these branches of administration may hope, if selected, to find increasing opportunities of specialization.

The Colonial Agricultural Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 4).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—A University Degree in Agriculture, or Natural Science, Candidates are considered in the first instance for postgraduate Colonial Agricultural Scholarships involving two years further training, partly overseas, in General Agriculture or in specialist subjects (e.g., Botany, Entomology, Chemistry). Holders of these Scholarships form a pool from which vacancies are filled.

Salary.—Initial salary from £400 to £560 on scales rising to £840 or £1,120. Scholarships worth £200 (home) or £225 (abroad) with fees and overseas passages paid. Super-scale posts for Senior Agricultural Officers, Directors and Deputy Directors of Agriculture at salaries of up to £1,750.

Areas — Mainly East and West Africa; Malaya; occasionally West Indies, rarely elsewhere.

The Colonial Audit Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 2.)

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1910.

Qualifications.—In general as for the Administrative Service, with a natural inclination for figures and accounts.

Salary.—Initial salary from £350 to £400 on scales rising to £920. The Directorship of Colonial Audit and other super-scale posts at salaries ranging from £960 to £1,700.

Areas.-Various.

The Colonial Customs Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 8).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1910.

Qualifications.—High standard of general education and personal qualities. School Certificate, or approved equivalent, regarded as minimum educational qualifications.

Salary.—Initial salary from £350 to £420 on scales rising to £780 or £1,120. Super-scale posts at salaries ranging up to £1,680.

Areas.-Mainly Malaya. Very rarely elsewhere.

The Colonial Education Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 5).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—For immediate appointment—University degree (usually Honours) and Education Diploma or equivalent. For Education Probationers—University degree, to be followed by special Diploma training course at London University Institute of Education.

Salary.—Initial salary from £350 to £360 on scales rising to £840 or £1,120. Probationers receive £20 a month during course. Super-scale posts, both administrative and specialist at salaries ranging up to £1,780.

Areas.—Mainly East and West Africa; Malaya, Hong Kong; occasionally West Indies, Mauritius and elsewhere.

The Colonial Engineering Service and Appointments for Architects and Town Planners.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 10).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—(1) Civil Engineers.—Corporate Membership of the Institution of Civil Engineers, or an Engineering Degree or Diploma recognized as granting exemption from Sections A and B of the Associate Membership of the Institution of Civil Engineers, and two years' practical experience.

(2) Mechanical Engineers.—

- (i) Railways—Engineering Degree or Associate Membership of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers and apprenticeship in locomotive works, with subsequent practical experience in railway running, department or works management.
- (ii) Public Works-Engineering Degree or Associate Membership of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers and apprenticeship with subsequent experience of engines.

(3) Electrical Engineers.—Electrical Engineering Degree or Associate Membership of the Institution of Electrical Engineers, and apprenticeship with subsequent power station and mains experience, and in the case of Telegraph Engineers, thorough training in telegraph and telephone engineering, with experience in a Post Office Engineering Department or on a British Railway. N.B.—During the Reconstruction period, candidates may apply who (a) possess an Engineering Degree or Diploma, but have been prevented by war service from obtaining practical experience, or (b) have no academic qualifications, but have during their war service obtained extensive experience of engineering practice.

(4) Architects.—Associateship of the Royal Institute of British Architects or an equivalent qualification in a Dominion, with experience of the general work of an architect's office.

(5) Town Planners.—Final Examination of the Town Planning Joint Examination Board or its equivalent, and experience of all stages of the technique of the Town Planner.

Salary.—Initial salary from £450 on scales rising to between £840 and £1,120. Super-scale posts for Engineers exist at salaries ranging from £1,050 to £1,800 per annum. Architects and Town Planners are occasionally engaged as Consultants.

Areas.-Various.

The Colonial Forest Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 4).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—A University Degree in Forestry. There are also post-graduate scholarships in forestry for candidates with other degrees, usually Honours in Natural Science including Botany, tenable at the Imperial Forestry Institute, Oxford, for one year in the first instance.

Salary.—Initial salary usually from £400 to £560 on scales rising to £840 or £1,120. Super-scale posts for Conservators and Senior Assistant Conservators at salaries ranging up to £1,600.

Areas.—Mainly East and West Africa; Malaya; sometimes West Indies.

The Colonial Legal Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 5).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—A Barrister or Solicitor with not less than four years professional experience since Call or Admission. (The majority of appointments are for barristers.)

Salary.—Initial salary usually £600 (with increments for experience in some cases) on scales rising to £840, £1,000 or £1,400. Super-scale posts for Judges and Senior Law Officers at salaries ranging up to £2,500.

Areas.-Various.

The Colonial Medical Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 3).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—A medical qualification registrable in the United Kingdom. Preference for candidates who have held hospital or public health appointments.

Salary.—Initial salary from £600 to £700 on scales rising to £1,000 or £1,120. Super-scale posts, both administrative and specialist, e.g., Pathologists, Bacteriologists, Surgeons, Radiologists, Anaesthetists, Senior Health Officers. Salaries ranging from £1,150-£2,000.

Areas.-Mainly East and West Africa and Malaya.

N.B.—There are also vacancies for Dental Surgeons.

The Colonial Police Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 8).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1910.

Qualifications.—High standard of general education and personal qualities. School Certificate, or approved equivalent regarded as minimum educational qualification.

Salary.—Initial salary usually £350 to £420 on scales rising to $\pounds760$ or $\pounds1,120$. Super-scale posts at salaries up to $\pounds1,680$.

Areas.-Mainly Malaya and East and West Africa.

The Colonial Survey Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 7).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1910.

Qualifications.—An Honours Degree in Mathematics, Physics, Civil Engineering or Geography (including Geodetic and Trigonometrical Survey) or certain equivalent qualifications.

Salary.—Initial salary from £400 to £560 on scales rising to £840 or £1,120. Super-scale posts at salaries ranging up to £1,680.

Areas.—Mainly East and West Africa; Malaya; occasionally Hong Kong, rarely elsewhere.

The Colonial Veterinary Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 4).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—Diploma of Membership of Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, or veterinary qualification obtained in one of the Dominions. Candidates are normally considered in the first instance for a Colonial Veterinary Studentship involving at least one year's further training in this country. Holders of these Studentships form a pool from which vacancies are filled.

Salary.—Initial salary usually from £560 to £630 on scales rising to £840 or £1,120. Studentships worth £300. Super-scale posts ranging up to £1,470.

Areas.—Mainly East and West Africa; Malaya; occasionaly West Indies, rarely elsewhere.

The Colonial Chemical, Geological Survey and Mining Services, and Meteorological Appointments.

(Recruitment Memorandum Nos. 4 and 7).

There are also a comparatively small number of appointments in the above branches of the Service for candidates with appropriate academic or professional qualifications in Analytical Chemistry (Memorandum No. 4), and in Geology, Metalliferous Mining and Meteorology (Memorandum No. 7).

Age.—Candidates for these appointments must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Labour Appointments.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 11).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—Sufficient practical experience of labour administration in the United Kingdom to qualify the candidate for a post as Industrial Adviser, or Labour Officer responsible for negotiation and arbitration work, in a colony; alternatively, sufficient experience of the control and management of native labourers (including a knowledge of local language) to be able to undertake supervision and inspection of conditions of work in a colony.

Salary.—Dependent on qualifications, but at least comparable to salaries paid in Great Britain for corresponding work.

Areas.-Most parts of the Colonial Empire, but mainly in Africa.

Social Welfare Appointments.

(Recruitment Memorandum No. 11).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—Sufficient practical experience in one or more branches of social welfare work to qualify the candidate for a senior post such as Social Welfare Organizer to a Colonial Government, or as a Social Welfare Supervisor. A Social Science Diploma or Certificate may also be required.

Salary.—Dependent on qualifications, but at least comparable to salaries paid in Great Britain for corresponding work.

Area.-Mainly Tropical Africa.

APPOINTMENTS FOR WOMEN.

(a) Colonial Education Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum Nos. 5 and 9).

Age.—Candidate must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.

Qualifications.—A recognized teaching qualification and subsequent practical experience. Qualifications in domestic subjects and experience of teaching young children are often required, and a university degree is sometimes essential. Salary.—Initial salaries usually from £330 to £420 in scales rising to various points between £600 and £840.

Area.-Mainly East and West Africa, Malaya, and Hong Kong, occasionally West Indies and elsewhere.

(b) The Colonial Medical Service.

(Recruitment Memorandum Nos. 3 and 9).

Age.—Candidates must have been born on or after the 1st January, 1905.



The non-substantive rating of Acting Q.R.I. (S/V) may be granted to Chief Petty Officers, Petty Officers, or Leading Seamen carrying out the duties of Gunnery Instructors at :-

(a) Gunnery Instructional Centres.

(b) D.E.M.S. Centres.

(c) Shore Establishments where employed as Gunnery Instructors owing to the shortage of Gunners' Mates.

The badge to be worn is that of a Q.R.I.

2. Acting Q.R.I's (S/V) are eligible for the non-substantive rate and pay of 1s. 6d. per diem :---

- (i) If they have completed successfully a special Instructors' Course at the R.A.N. Gunnery School, Flinders Naval Depot, and passed an examination for which they have been granted a certificate, and while carrying out the duty of a Gunnery Instructor or Gunner's Mate allowed on complement.
- (ii) With the approval of the Naval Officer-in-Charge, on the recommendation of the Gunnery Officer, while carrying out the duty of Gunnery Instructor or Gunner's Mate allowed on complement without possessing the certificate from the Gunnery School. The names of these ratings should be reported to the Naval Officer-in-Charge, Flinders Naval Depot, so that they can be drafted in for course when reliefs are available.
- (iii) When allocated to a specific duty which is considered to justify the non-substantive rate of Q.R.I., approval to rate and pay is, in this case, to be obtained from the Naval Board.

3. The non-substantive pay of 1s. 6d. per diem is not payable concurrently with other gunnery allowances or training allowances.

4. The non-substantive rating of Acting Q.R.I. (S/V) may be granted to ratings qualified in accordance with paragraph 2 above, with retrospective effect to 1st July, 1943, but not earlier.

5. The grant of the non-substantive rating of Acting Q.R.I. (S/V) and date of ceasing to be employed as such in a vacancy in complement are to be reported on Form A.S. 161 in every case.

6. Naval Officers-in-Charge of the activities referred to in paragraph 1 of this Order are to forward to Navy Office, as early as practicable, lists of ratings eligible and recommended for payment as Acting Q.R.I. (S/V) together with qualifying periods of service from 1st July, 1943 to 30th June, 1945, in order that authority for payment of arrears of the allowance may be issued. Payment of the allowance from 1st July, 1945, is to be effected strictly in accordance with paragraph 2 of this Order.



NAVAL STORES-PREVENTION OF MISAPPROPRIATIONS, LOSSES, ETC.

The following instructions in regard to care and custody of Naval Stores in H.M.A. Ships and Establishments and action to be taken in the case of losses are brought to the notice of all concerned :-

A.-Prevention of Misappropriation.

(1) All officers are to use their best endeavours to check the misappropriation of stores especially when their ships are fitting out or paying off, when vessels are alongside, or in other circumstances likely to offer exceptional opportunities for misappropriation. Commanding officers are to ensure that the provisions of this Order are brought to the notice of responsible officers and others concerned on all occasions immediatley before the vessel is placed in dockyard hands.

B.—Care of stores in ships under repair, etc.

(2) Attention is particularly drawn to the need for all possible precautions to be taken to avoid losses of stores by theft when ships are under repair, while in commission with stores on board at refitting yards, etc.

(3) Portable valuable stores that are particularly liable to misappropriation, e.g., binoculars, watches, telescopes, W/T equipment, electrical instruments, etc., are to be kept in a place of security. A locked drawer or cupboard in an officer's cabin is not considered to provide sufficiently secure stowage against theft whilst the vessel is in dockyard or contractors' hands for refit, nor, in connection with navigational watches, is the locked compartment provided in the chart room (in certain classes of ships) for stowing chronometers and watches regarded as adequate.

(4) If workmen are likely to be employed in compartments where such valuable stores are normally stowed, alternative arrangements should be made for the stores to be removed to a safe place on board or ashore.

(5) Commanding Officers are to ensure that satisfactory arrangements are made to safeguard all stores and particular attention should be given to-

- (a) Arrangements for custody and issue of keys of storerooms.
- (b) Posting of sentries in accordance with K.R. and A.I., Article 738, and in storerooms, when work is being carried out in those compartments.
- (c) Arrangements for special police supervision at the dockside when practicable.

(6) In cases of theft or suspected theft, the time factor is important. A preliminary notification should therefore be made to the police (dockyard or local) as early as possible.

(7) It is desirable, whenever possible, that stores should be landed during refit. Base Supply Staffs cannot undertake to 7

assist in destoring but the Naval Store Officer or local Base Supply Officer, should endeavour to make a lay-apart store available in which the ship can deposit the stores, at the ship's risk, and hold the key. This does not apply to valuable portable items referred to in paragraph 3. When such stores are landed for safe custody they should be taken personally to the appropriate Naval Store Depot or Base Naval Store and a receipt obtained for them on the spot. In the case of ships undergoing refit at Garden Island, valuable stores should be deposited with the Superintending Nava! Store Officer in accordance with Clause 2, Article 115, Sydney Port Orders, for safe custody during period of refit.

C.-Valuable and important Naval Stores-General Precautions.

(8) Particular care is to be taken at all times to safeguard important and valuable stores. Such items which are portable are invariably to be locked up when not actually in use, and care should be taken to ensure that the persons responsible for any such stores, and any other persons authorized to use them, are fully acquainted with the regulations regarding their safe custody.

D.-Bicycles.

(9) All Departmental bicycles are to be branded with the letters "R.A.N." and provided with a suitable locking device. Arrangements should be made to ensure that, when bicycles are left unattended, they are securely locked to prevent unauthorized removal.

E.—Procedure for dealing with losses.

(10) The procedure for dealing with losses is set out in K.R. and A.I., Articles 1936 and 1938 and in B.R. 4, Chapter XII., and R.A.N. Supplement to B.R. 4.

(11) Losses of valuable and important Naval Stores whether by accident or neglect are invariably to be reported in detail to the Naval Board. For this purpose, important and valuable Naval Stores include :---

- (i) Ships' anchors, Boats, Binoculars, Telescopes, Stop Watches, Electrical Instruments, Portable W/T Radar A/S, etc., equipment.
- (ii) Any single item of value of £5 or more.
- (iii) Groups of items of value of £5 or more lost at the same time or in the same set of circumstances.

(12) When forwarding particulars of a loss to the Naval Board, the Naval Officer-in-Charge or Commanding Officer concerned is to ensure that all relevant facts are reported and it should always be stated whether it is considered the loss was due to accident or neglect. In the latter case it should be stated whether recovery of the value or part value of the missing item has been effected as provided in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 9.

SERVICE SYSTEM CANTEENS—RENDITION OF REPORTS ON PAYING OFF.

The following general signal, T.O.O. 101151 October, is included in Navy Order for the guidance of all concerned :---

"Special attention is drawn to Item 10 of Commonwealth Navy Order 618 of 1944 which requires rendition to Director of Victualling of reports of Service System Canteens on paying off.

2. Commanding Officers of all Ships and Establishments in which such canteens are operating, are to ensure that final canteen accounts are carefully compiled in sufficient time to permit of complete audit by representatives of the Canteen Committee for presentation to the Committee, before paying off.

3. In particular, all outstanding accounts, including any liability for advances from public funds, are to be settled before paying off and stock and other assets realized or disposed of in accordance with the decisions of the Committee and the Commanding Officer's approval.

4. The report forwarded to the Director of Victualling is to be accompanied by a final balance-sheet and a statement certified by the Commanding Officer showing the disposal of assets, including stock and cash.

5. When determining the disposal of cash assets, the Canteen Committee of each Ship or Establishment is requested to give consideration to making a donation to the R.A.N. Relief Fund, the purposes of which are outlined in Navy Order 264 of 1941.

6. Items of canteen equipment originally received as gifts or presentations from charitable or patriotic organizations are not to be regarded as the property of the canteen but are to be accounted for and disposed of strictly in accordance with C.O.R., Article 396.

7. The attention of Commanding Officers and Canteen Committees is drawn to A.F.O. 4835/45 and the procedure outlined therein is to be observed as a general guide to ensure the efficient audit of canteen accounts.

8. It is emphasized that it is the direct responsibility of each Commanding Officer to exercise the closest supervision in order to ensure strict compliance with the foregoing when for any reason a Service System Canteen is terminated.".

PROCEDURE FOR DEALING WITH VICTUALLING STORES IN TENDERS PAYING OFF AS A RESULT OF GENERAL DEMOBILIZATION.

The following instructions regarding victualling stores and accounts of H.M.A. Ships paying off on demobilization, are promulgated for general guidance and are to be observed by all concerned :--

A.-General.

(a) At Sydney, the provisions of Article 133 of Sydney Port Orders are to be observed in conjunction with any additional instructions contained in this Order.

- (b) Ships paying off at Fremantle, Brisbane, and Melbourne, are to return all victualling stores (excepting fresh provisions) to the local Victualling Depot.
- (c) If suitable storage space is available in the local Naval Base, fresh provisions remaining on board are to be transferred to the Base Supply Officer for early consumption, otherwise the Base Supply Officer concerned will arrange disposal to best advantage.
- (d) At Adelaide, Hobart, or other ports where no Victualling Depot is maintained, all victualling stores are to be returned to the local Naval Establishment which will take on charge and issue receipts for all quantities returned.
- (e) When advice is received by a Commanding Officer that the ship under his command is to pay off, arrangements are to be made to complete, in advance, as much work as possible in connection with a full muster of all types of victualling stores on charge and to initiate preliminary arrangements for their disposal, all stores on loan issue being collected and accounted for as early as practicable after arrival in port. Arrangements are to be made for all stores ratings borne to be retained until all stores are returned and accounts finally closed.
- (f) As soon as possible after arrival at the paying-off port, the Commanding Officer is to advise the Base Supply Officer of the approximate quantity of stores to be returned, indicating when such stores will be available for removal. The Base Supply Officer will then arrange with the local Victualling Store Officer accordingly, any additional working parties necessary for the handling and forwarding of stores being provided as required.
- (g) Base Supply Officers are to arrange suitable facilities for transporting victualling stores from ship to their destination and for their safe custody during transit.
- (h) Articles of Clothing, Officers' Mess Traps, Implements and Mess Utensils are to be securely packed for return with packing list enclosed in each package. Cases required for this purpose, also necessary packing material for fragile articles, may be obtained from the local Victualling Yard or Depot. The packing lists are to be prepared in duplicate, both copies being signed by the Officer of the ship detailed for victualling duties. The duplicate copy of the packing list is to be forwarded as an attachment to the Return Note referred to in paragraph (i).
- (*) In all instances, Return Notes are to be sent before or with the stores, and a responsible stores or other senior rating is to accompany the stores to the establishment concerned in order that losses or damage in transit may be avoided.
- (j) To facilitate the prompt closing of the ship's accounts, it is important that returns be checked without delay and receipts forwarded by receiving officers to the ship.

B.—Closing of Accounts.

All provisions, clothing, implement and officers' mess trap accounts are to be completed in accordance with the printed instructions, special care being taken to ensure that all transactions relevant to the accounts are supported by duly completed vouchers. Repayment mess balances and debit balances in respect of mess traps replacement allowances are to be calculated without delay and transmitted to the parent ship.

C.-Discrepancies of Stores and Losses by Neglect.

Any discrepancies in victualling stores discovered on paying off are to be investigated forthwith by the Commanding Officer and dealt with as specified in Navy Order 454 of 1945.

In the event of large discrepancies being disclosed, a detailed explanatory report is to be furnished to the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the port concerned. Such reports are to include a list of the discrepancies disclosed, indicating whether losses are considered to be attributable to the neglect of any officer or rating together with recommendations and proposals for recovering the value of losses. In this regard the attention of Commanding Officers is drawn to K.R. and A.I. 1853A and the instructions contained in the Victualling Store Accounts-A.S. 462 series. Where necessary a Board of Inquiry will be arranged for by the Naval Officer-in-Charge to ascertain responsibility.

D.-Mess Debts.

- (a) Commanding Officers are responsible that any mess debits incurred by repayment messes are recovered from messes concerned before paying off, for payment to the Base Supply Officer-see Section B, above.
- (b) Any debit balance resulting from the replacement of consumable items of Officers' Mess Traps and Seamen's mess utensils in excess of the authorized free replacement is also to be recovered from the messes concerned and paid to the Base Supply Officer.

E.—Mustering and Packing.

Dry Provisions, Loan and Repayment Clothing, Mess Traps and Implement Account stores, are to be carefully mustered and checked and dealt with in accordance with Section A above, Return Notes in duplicate being prepared on Forms A.S. 549 for the actual quantity of stores concerned, copy of which is to accompany such stores to the Victualling Yard. Care is to be taken that articles of mess and galley gear, etc., are properly cleaned before return.

F.—Supervising Stores Officers.

(a) Arrangements have been made for a Warrant Stores Officer attached to the staff of Director of Victualling to be in attendance at each port to supervise and advise on all matters relating to the return of stores and the closing of accounts. These officers will prepare a report in

triplicate indicating the condition of store accounts and stores of each ship dealt with, one copy being forwarded to the Director of Victualling, one to the Naval Officer-in-Charge and one to the Commanding Officer of the ship concerned.

(b) When the ship's and parent ship's copies of the final accounts have been duly completed, the Warrant Stores Officer referred to in (a) Section F, is to initial each account concerned and arrange for them to be forwarded to the relevant Parent Ship by hand or by registered post as necessary.

QUARANTINE CONTROL—ANIMALS AND ARTICLES SUBJECT TO.

4

The entry into Australia of animals or birds from places outside Australia is subject to strict regulation under the Quarantine Act, owing to the risk of the introduction of rabies, piroplasmosis and other diseases.

2. Under no circumstances will permission be granted for the conveyance by sea from places outside Australia to the Commonwealth of Australia proper, including islands adjacent to the coast, of—

- (a) living mascots, pets or other animals or birds, whether acquired before or after embarkation from Australia;
- (b) plants, fruit, seeds and any parts of plants including straw and grass;
- (c) reptiles or living insects;
- (d) parts of animals such as skins, horns, hooves, wool, hair and feathers, unless such articles have been processed or manufactured.

3. Commanding Officers of Ships and Establishments are to take action with local civil quarantine authorities to have destroyed forthwith, living mascots, pets, animals or birds from outside the Commonwealth of Australia, which disembark at a port in Australia.

4. Birds or animals in a Ship proceeding from one overseas port to another, may enter an Australian port *en route*, providing that such animals or birds are kept securely on the vessel and are not permitted to land. On arrival of the vessel, the Commanding Officer is to advise the local civil quarantine officer and make necessary arrangements with him for inspection and security of the animals or birds.

RADIO MECHANIC BRANCH-TRAINING AND ADVANCEMENT.

The introduction of the rating of Radio Mechanic (C) promulgated in Naval Board's General Message Navy Circ. 8771, timed 1241 of 9th May, 1945, necessitates a revision of the rules for training and advancement of Radio Mechanics.

Radio Mechanics (C) will be trained in all forms of Radar and W/T (meaning W/T, R/T, D/F, &c.), Electronic Navigational Aids (including Loran, &c.), and Radio Counter Measures (meaning all radio counter measures including Radar).

- Part I.—Transfer of existing categories of Radio Mechanics to Radio Mechanics (C).
- Part II.—Transfer of ratings from W/T Branch to Radio Mechanics (C).
- Part III.—Transfer of ratings from other Branches to Radio Mechanics (C).

Part IV.-Training and advancement of Radio Mechanics (C).

Part I—Transfer of Existing Categories of Rudio Mechanics to Radio Mechanic (C).

3. Existing categories of Rado Mechanics, i.e.-

(R) Trained in Radar only,

(W) Trained in Radar and small ship W/T,

(S) Trained in W/T for shore W/T stations and light craft,

will be drafted as opportunity offers by arrangement between the Commodore, Superintendent of Training and Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. *Watson*, to H.M.A.S. *Watson* for conversion courses as follows:--

- (R) 6 weeks' course in W/T, Electronic Navigational Aids and R.C.M.
- (W) 6 weeks' course in W/T, Electronic Navigational Aids and R.C.M.
- (S) 15 weeks' course in Radar, Electronic Navigational Aids and R.C.M.

4. On successful completion of these courses, ratings will be transferred to Radio Mechanic (C) with their original substantive rating and seniority.

5. Failure to Qualify.—Ratings remain in their original category and may not be recommended for a further course until twelve months after date of failure.

6. (a) Radio Mechanics (W) who fail or who have no opportunity to carry out course in paragraph 3 may be advanced to Petty Officer Radio Mechanic (W) by Commanding Officers on attaining one year's seniority as Leading Mechanic (W) in accordance with paragraph 19 (a). (b) Leading Radio Mechanics (S) who fail or who have no opportunity to carry out course in paragraph 3 may be advanced to Petty Officer Radio Mechanic (S) in accordance with Navy Order 156 of 1945.

(c) Advancement to C.P.O. Radio Mechanic (C) is shown in paragraph 19 (b). For the present, owing to the difficulty of drafting Petty Officer Radio Mechanics for courses shown in paragraph 3 above, Petty Officer Radio Mechanics of any other category who are qualified in accordance with paragraph 19 (b), sub-paragraphs (i) and (iii) may be advanced to Acting C.P.O. Radio Mechanic in their existing category to fill Fleet Numbers without completing the required course. Ratings must, however, successfully complete the required course before being confirmed C.P.O. Radio Mechanic.

Part II—Transfer of Ratings from W/T Branches to Radio Mechanic (C).

7. Telegraphist ratings may volunteer for transfer to Radio Mechanic (C) provided they hold a W/T 3 higher standard nonsubstantive rate, or above. Names of recommended volunteers should be forwarded to the Commodore Superintendent of Training, copy to Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Watson. As only very limited numbers can be accepted, selection will be made from volunteers by arrangement between the Commodore Superintendent of Training and the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Watson. Ratings selected will be drafted to H.M.A.S. Watson for a conversion course.

8. On successful completion of a course of fifteen weeks in Radar, Electronic Navigational Aids and R.C.M., ratings will be transferred to their equivalent substantive rating with their original seniority in that rating except that W/T 3 (higher) will be transferred to Radio Mechanic on the date of qualifying in this course and advanced to Leading Radio Mechanic the following day.

9. Failure to Qualify.—Ratings who fail retain their present rating and may not apply for a further course until twelve months after the date of failure.

Part III—Transfer of Ratings from Other Branches to Radio Mechanic (C).

10. Ratings below leading rate of all branches (whether C.S., Reservists or H.O.) may volunteer for transfer to Radio Mechanic (C).

11. Ratings volunteering must be between 18 and 30 years and hold an Intermediate Certificate but Leaving Mathematics and Physics or Technical School equivalent is desirable. Names of recommended volunteers are to be forwarded to the Commodore Superintendent of Training (copy to the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. *Watson*) with the following information:—

(i) Age.

- (ii) Educational qualifications, stating subjects.
- (iii) Any other special courses.
- (iv) Previous radio experience.
- (v) General opinion of rating.

12. From the roster established from these applications, preselection will be made by the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Watson who will apply to the Commodore Superintendent of Training for appropriation of pre-selected ratings to H.M.A.S. Watson for final selection.

13. Ratings finally selected will carry out the following courses at H.M.A.S. Watson:-

- 24 weeks Mathematics, Electrical Science and Technology and Radio.
- 6 weeks W/T.
- 2 weeks Electronic Navigational Aids.
- 1 week R.C.M.
- 15 weeks Radar.

14. During the course, ratings will retain existing rating until successful completion of the 24 weeks' theory and six weeks' W/T course when they are to be transferred to Radio Mechanic (C) from the date of qualifying and advanced to Leading Radio Mechanic (C) the following day. Thereafter advancement is to be as in paragraph 19.

15. Ratings failing to qualify are to be returned to their previous Branch.

Part IV-Training and Advancement of Radio Mechanics (C).

16. (a) Direct Entries—Ordinary Seamen (Radio Mechanics).— Ordinary Seamen (Radio Mechanics) will be given a course as in paragraph 13 for Radio Mechanic ((') at H.M.A.S. Walson after completing disciplinary training at Flinders Naval Depot.

(b) Selection.—On application for entry as O/Sea. (Radio Mechanic), Recruiting Officers are to forward information as laid down in paragraph 11 to the Commodore Superintendent of Training and the Commanding Officer, H.M.A.S. Watson.

Preliminary selection will be made in the same way as for ratings transferred from other Branches and the ratings chosen will be interviewed by an officer delegated by H.M.A.S. *Watson* for further selection as under:—

- (i) Those from Queensland and N.S.W. at H.M.A.S. Watson.
- (ii) Those from Victoria and Tasmania at H.M.A.S. Lonsdale.
- (iii) Those from Sth. Australia at H.M.A.S. Torrens.
- (iv) Those from West Australia at H.M.A.S. Leeuwin.

Selected ratings are to be placed on a roster and entries will be made as required.

17. Ordinary Seaman (Radio Mechanic) will be transferred to Radio Mechanic (C) on successful completion of 24 weeks' theory and six weeks' W/T from the date of qualifying and advanced to Leading Radio Mechanic (C) the following day.

18. Ordinary Seamen (Radio Mechanics) who fail to qualify may be required to transfer to other Branches. 500

19. Advancement.-(a) After one year's service as Leading Radio Mechanic (C) or a combined total of one year's service as Leading Radio Mechanic (W) or (S) and Leading Radio Mechanic (C) advancement to Acting Petty Officer Radio Mechanic (C) may be made by the Commanding Officer if satisfied that the man is technically suitable for the rate and his conduct is satisfactory. If after eighteen months as Leading Radio Mechanic he is still not considered suitable for rating to Acting Petty Officer, the facts are to be reported to the Naval Board (copy to the Commodore Superintendent of Training and the Commanding Officr, H.M.A.S. Watson) in order that his retention in the Branch may be considered. A full statement of the circumstances is to be made, giving reasons which may exist for his incompetence or any details as to misconduct. An Acting Petty Officer may be confirmed Petty Officer Radio Mechanic on completing twelve months' service as such, provided he holds a certificate signed by a qualified Communications or Radar Officer stating that he is technically competent or that the rating has successfully completed a six weeks' re-qualifying course and that his conduct has been satisfactory. This certificate, of course, may be obtained at any time after being rated Acting Petty Officer Radio Mechanic (C).

(b) Qualification for C.P.O. Radio Mechanic (C)-P.O. Radio Mechanics (C) must have-

- (i) Completed three years as such, or a combined total of three years' service as a P.O. Radio Mechanic (R), (W), or (S) and P.O. Radio Mechanic (C).
- (ii) Successfully completed a six weeks' re-qualifying course at H.M.A.S. Watson. Courses shown in paragraphs 3 and 8 will count in lieu of this, if ratings have been transferred from existing Radio Mechanics (R), (W), or (S) or telegraphist branch.
- (iii) Been recommended on form S.507 by Commanding Officer.

NOTE.—Commanding Officers may at any time recommend for special advancement ratings who have gained outside the Naval Service the qualifications required for higher rating. All such cases are to be referred to the Naval Board through the appropriate administrative authority. FULL details in justification of the recommendation for such advancement must be given.

20. It is anticipated that further alteration will be required in the training and advancement in the Radio Mechanic Branch in the light of post-war policy and requirements. When these are known, applications will be called for permanent service engagements from Radio Mechanics (C) and the telegraphist branch.

21. Uniform.—C.P.O. Radio Mechanics will wear Class I uniform; others will wear Class III uniform. The badges to be worn by all types of Radio Mechanics are detailed in A.F.O. 1261/44.

22. Messing .- Radio Mechanics will use the Artisans' Mess.

23. Medical Standard.—In general, ratings should be Grade I, medical and vision standard IV or better. Lower vision standards may be accepted with the approval of the Naval Board.

24. Disrating and Re-advancement.—The rules for disrating and re-advancement in the Radio Mechanic Branch are those which are applicable to ratings other than those advanced by classes. The lowest rating to which a man may be disrated is Radio Mechanic.

LEAVE ENTITLEMENTS.

It has been decided to bring the Navy into line with the other Defence Services as regards leave entitlements and the following instructions are substituted for those contained in Navy Order 38 of 1941, and C.O.R., Articles 267, 268, 269 and 277, unless otherwise indicated. The provisions of this Order will not apply to personnel of the R.N. or any of the Dominions serving in the R.A.N. on loan or on exchange duty.

War Service Leave.

2. War service leave will accrue in respect of-

(a) Service at sea or on shore since the commencement of the War, viz., 3rd September, 1939, outside the South-West Pacific Zone, which would normally have carried an entitlement to foreign service leave.

- (b) Service at sea since the commencement of the War, viz., 3rd September, 1939, inside the South-West Pacific Zone, as may have been classified as service outside Australia for the purposes of exemption from taxation under the Income Tax Assessment Acts, provided that, in arriving at war service leave credits for the period 3rd September, 1939, to 6th December, 1941, inclusive, account is taken of any periods of home service leave granted during this period in excess of 24 days per annum.
- (c) Service on shore subsequent to 7th December, 1941, inside the South-West Pacific Zone but outside the mainland of Australia, as may be classified as service outside Australia for the purpose of exemption from taxation under the Income Tax Assessment Acts.

3. War service leave will accrue at the rate of seven and a half days for each completed six months, a broken period in total of over four months' service will count as six months and a half-day in total will count as a full day.

4. Where war service leave accrued does not amount to fourteen days, a minimum of fourteen days will be deemed to have accrued.

5. In the case of "hostilities only" personnel and members of the Permanent Naval Forces discharged during hostilities and the demobilization period, payment will be made in a lump sum in lieu of war service leave. This payment will be made by Navy Office after final discharge. Instructions will be issued in due course in regard to serving members of the Permanent Naval Forces.

6. There is to be no minimum period of service in the South-West Pacific Zone (outside the mainland of Australia) to qualify for war service leave, provided a member is appointed to a seagoing ship, or an establishment outside the mainland of Australia which would be classified as service outside Australia for the purpose of the full exemptions from taxation under the Income Tax Assessment Acts. Where a member has temporary duty in the South-West Pacific Zone but outside the mainland of Australia which would not necessitate an appointment away from his base, there is to be a qualifying period of 90 days' continuous service or 180 days in the aggregate.

7. War service leave takes the place of foreign service leave.

Home Service Leave (not applicable to Naval Dockyard Police).

8. As from 1st July, 1942, home service leave will normally be limited to 24 days a year, calculated on the basis of two days for each completed month of service, in lieu of the existing maximum of 42 days per year.

Personnel are eligible for home service leave in respect of service-

- (a) at sea or on shore inside the South-West Pacific Zone,
- (b) at sea or on shore outside the South-West Pacific Zone but inside the Pacific area and against the Japanese.

9. The special scale of leave for personnel serving on shore in Darwin, Thursday Island and the New Guinea Area is abolished.

10. Home service leave up to 24 days may be granted at any time during the leave year (i.e., from 1st February) in anticipation of the period of accumulation being completed, and this amount of leave may be exceeded where, due to the exigencies of the Service, it is desired to give leave in excess of this amount.

11. The amount of leave due to personnel will be calculated at Navy Office by crediting two days' leave for each completed month of service from 1st July, 1942, and debiting leave taken since the same date. Any debit or credit balance will be carried forward from month to month.

This information will be extracted from the victualling columns of ships' ledgers; care should therefore be taken to distinguish on the ledger between disembarkation leave, compassionate leave, sick leave, home service leave and travelling periods.

Any leave taken during the current and the preceding quarter is to be noted on Form A.S.1031z on final discharge.

12. Payment in lieu will not be made in respect of home service leave to the estates of personnel who died prior to 1st April, 1945.

13. In the case of "hostilities only" personnel, and members of the Permanent Naval Forces discharged during hostilities and the demobilization period, payment in lieu for any balance of home service leave not taken will be made after final discharge. Instructions will be issued in due course in regard to serving members of the Permanent Naval Forces.

14. Where home service leave is in debit on final discharge, no financial adjustment will be made where the debit has arisen on compassionate grounds or because a member has been required to take his home service leave in anticipation of his entitlement and to suit Service requirements.

15. A debit balance of leave at the beginning of a leave year is not to restrict the amount of home service leave which may be given under paragraph 10.

Periods not to be Counted for War Service or Home Service Leave.

16. The following will not be counted as service qualifying for war service or home service leave:-

(a) periods of absence on leave without pay,

(b) periods awaiting trial, spent in cells, detention or in prison.

Classes of Members Disqualified for War Service Leave and/or Home Service Leave.

17. Payment in lieu of war service leave and/or accumulated home service leave will not be made where a member has been :---

- (a) discharged "RUN,"
- (b) dismissed from His Majesty's Service with disgrace,
- (c) dismissed from His Majesty's Service,
- (d) discharged from the Šervice as "Services No Longer Required,"
- (e) whose services are dispensed with on account of misconduct,
- (f) who is invalided from the Service for causes due to misconduct or within his own control.

18. In the case of a recovered deserter becoming eligible by subsequent satisfactory service for the removal of "RUN," the Naval Board may, when approving of "RUN" being removed, also approve of any war service leave or accumulated home service leave being paid in lieu on final discharge. Payment in Lieu of War Service Leave and for Home Service Leave Where a Member is Discharged Abroad.

19. Members discharged abroad will be paid in lieu of war service leave and any accumulated home service leave in Australian currency, as if their discharge had been effected in Australia.

Disembarkation Leave.

20. On return to Australia from service in an area where home service leave is not credited, disembarkation leave will be granted subject to the exigencies of the Service.

21. Ordinarily, disembarkation leave should be not less than fourteen days, but where little or no local leave has been taken during service in an area where such leave applies or in other special circumstances, the leave may be increased up to a maximum of 30 days.

22. Disembarkation leave taken on return to Australia will not be debited against any accrued home service leave.

23. Disembarkation leave will not be granted to personnel returned to Australia for disciplinary reasons.

Re-Establishment Leave.

24. Re-establishment leave will operate as from the 15th August, 1945. It will be granted to personnel discharged or demobilized on or after that date. Instructions regarding method and rate of payment have been promulgated. Personnel with six months' service or more will be entitled to 30 days' re-establishment leave and personnel with less than six months' service will be entitled to fifteen days' re-establishment leave.

25. A claim made by a member on the Repatriation Commission will be determined during the period of his re-establishment leave. The Repatriation Commission has arranged to provide medical treatment during the period of re-establishment leave in respect of all disabilities indicated by medical boards as apparently war related.

26. Navy Order 38 of 1941 is cancelled.

LUBRICATING OILS-ACCOUNTING FOR.

It has been brought to notice that difficulty in accounting for lubricating oils supplied in drums containing fractional quantities has been experienced at certain bases.

2. It has been decided, therefore, that such drums of oil may be accounted for by the consignee to the nearest full gallon (e.g., quantities between 44 and $44 \cdot 5$ gallons as 44 gallons, and from $44 \cdot 5$ to under $45 \cdot 5$ gallons as 45 gallons, &c.).

3. Any discrepancies arising as a result of the above method of accounting should be adjusted at the ship or base concerned by means of Report of Stocktaking, Form A.S.148.

DESTORING OF SHIPS ON GENERAL PAYING OFF-MEDICAL AND DENTAL STORES.

The following instructions with respect to medical and dental stores in ships to be destored on paying off as a result of demobilization and reduction in the R.A.N. are promulgated for information, guidance and observance.

2. Commanding Officers of ships not carrying a medical officer, and medical and dental officers of ships are, where their ship is paying off, to arrange for stores on their charge to be returned to store via the channels outlined. The receiving officer for medical stores is the medical officer-in-charge of the depot. A clearance only will in all cases be given by the receiving officer of the destoring authority. "Auditing" and "passing in Office" of medical or dental store accounts will be effected by the Director of Naval Medical Services only, as heretofore. 3. (a) Sydney and Port Stephens.—All medical stores to be returned to the R.A.N. Medical Store, Glebe, accompanied by completed return note, A.M.165z, in quadruplicate (original, triplicate, quadruplicate and quintuplicate), the green duplicate copy being retained by the destoring vessel as a temporary receipt for attachment to the rough medical store account.

The fair medical store account is to be closed beforehand and forwarded to the Director of Naval Medical Services, Navy Office, immediately after return of the stores.

The medical and dental store officer is to receipt the green original copy and forward it immediately to the Director of Naval Medical Services in order to clear the audit of each account.

(b) Newcastle.—As only small vessels will be paid off in this port, small medical sets only will be involved.

Scale F or F.1.—Return medical stores to the Medical Officer, H.M.A.S. Maitland, under cover of A.M.165z. Receipted green original copy to be returned to the Commanding Officer as his receipt and the certified orange triplicate copy forwarded to the Director of Naval Medical Services, Navy Office.

Scale "E".—Return medical stores to the Medical Officer, H.M.A.S. Maitland, under cover of A.M.165z. Receipted green original copy is to be attached by the Commanding Officer to the medical store account which is to be closed beforehand. The account is then to be forwarded immediately to Navy Office.

(c) Brisbane.-Small craft only-as for Newcastle.

(d) Townsville.-Small craft only-as for Newcastle.

(e) Darwin.-H.M.A.S. Platypus to act as receiving officer for medical store temporarily until plans are finalized.

Routine as for Sydney—Senior Medical Officer, H.M.A.S. *Platypus*, acting as receiving officer for medical stores pro. tem.; or in the event of *Platypus* not being attached, H.M.A.S. *Melville* to act.

(f) Fremantle.—As for Sydney. Petty officer-in-charge of medical store acting in place of the medical and dental store officer.

(g) Adelaide.—As for Newcastle.

(h) Melbourne.—As for Newcastle.

4. All stores are to be suitably cleaned and/or secured before packing for return to store.

5. All ports, other than Sydney and Fremantle, to return the collected stores, as and when convenient, to the R.A.N. Medical Store, Glebe, New South Wales, or Fremantle, Western Australia, whichever is the nearer.

6. All vessels "paying off" are to return all medical stores. Any medical treatment necessary is to be furnished by the depot at which destoring is taking place.

7. The medical store accounts with relevant vouchers from all vessels "paying off" are to be forwarded to the Director of Naval Medical Services, Navy Office, immediately the stores have been returned to the receiving authority. A forwarding address, to which communications regarding the account can be sent, is to be clearly indicated in the spaceprovided, or endorsed on the cover of the account.

8. The more complete the information given in the account the quicker it can be audited and passed in office.

9. Unserviceable stores already surveyed and brought forward from a previous account or from an interim survey of the current account, are to be returned to store from the vessel paying off on a voucher marked "unserviceable" and separate from the main body of stores. (1919/2/80.)

ACCOUNTING PROCEDURE FOR NAVAL STORES IN STATIONS AND OR SERVICES ATTACHED TO H.M.A. DEPOTS AND BASES.

With reference to paragraph 2 of Navy Order 682 of 1943, relative to the supply of consumable naval stores for Services and/or Stations attached to H.M.A. depots and bases, in some cases requirements of ordinary consumable maintenance stores cannot be met from stocks normally carried at the parent depot or base and are supplied direct from the appropriate naval store depot.

2. In such cases, the supply notes should be forwarded by the (Superintending) Naval Store Officer to the Supply Officer at the parent depot or base, who is to arrange for the notes to be endorsed and signed by the officer concerned at the Station or Service as to receipt of the items shown thereon and returned to him. After he has made a check to ensure that quantities demanded and supplied are reasonable, the Supply Officer should then file the supply notes in a separate guard at the parent depot or base. It is not necessary for such transactions to be shown on Forms A.S.156 or posted to the ledgers of the parent depot or base.

3. The above modified procedure is designed to eliminate unnecessary ledger entries, but should not be brought into operation at any base without prior Naval Board approval.



U.S. NAVY SYSTEM OF FEED WATER TREATMENT-ADOPTION IN THE R.A.N.

It has been decided to adopt the U.S. Navy System of feed water treatment in the following ships of the Royal Australian Navy:-Australia, Hobart, Shropshire, Swan, Warrego, and all River Class Frigates.

Pending the results of trials being carried out by the Admiralty in accordance with paragraph 9 of A.F.O. 1310/45, it is not intended to adopt this system in R.A.N. destroyers. Separate instructions will be issued should it be decided to adopt the system in any A.M.S. vessels.

3. Full instructions regarding the use of U.S. Navy boiler compound will be issued from Garden Island with the necessary pattern 2541 boiler water testing sets.

WAR GRATUITY TO MEMBERS OF THE NAVAL FORCES.

In amplification of the information already communicated to all Discharging Depots, the following particulars in regard to the provisions of the *War Gratuity Act* 1945, are promulgated for general guidance.

2. Gratuity.—The rate of gratuity for overseas qualifying service is £3 15s. per month, and for general qualifying service other than overseas service, 15s. per month.

A gratuity is not claimable as a matter of right but is deemed to be a free gift by the Commonwealth in recognition of honourable service during the war and may be withheld or deferred by a prescribed authority or made subject to such terms and conditions as a prescribed authority thinks just and proper.

The Act provides that certain classes of members, such as those whose services are terminated on account of an offence or misconduct, may be disqualified from receiving a gratuity.

3. Overseas Qualifying Service consists of :--

- (a) Service abroad or in a seagoing ship on or after 3rd September, 1939, if the member had served continuously for 90 days, or an aggregate of 180 days in any twelve months;
- (b) all service abroad or in a seagoing ship if the member returned to Australia, or was discharged from a ship, owing to accepted injury or illness;
- (c) all service abroad or in a seagoing ship after having qualified as in (a) and (b);
- (d) time in hospital immediately following return to Australia or discharge from a seagoing ship owing to accepted injury or illness;
- (e) an additional 90 days after return from abroad or discharge from a seagoing ship or hospital if already qualified for overseas service, provided the member was not returned to Australia or discharged from the ship at the member's own request, or for disciplinary reasons or accepted injury or illness;

(f) time of accrued leave for which the member has been paid.

If a member has qualified for overseas service and such qualifying service is less than twelve months, the period of overseas service will be deemed to be twelve months, unless the member has been returned to Australia or discharged from a ship at own request or for disciplinary reasons or for accepted injury or illness.

4. General Qualifying Service consists of :--

- (a) Overseas qualifying service;
- (b) full-time service other than overseas qualifying service on and from 7th December, 1941, if the member has already served six months' continuous service at that date;
- (c) service on and from the day following the date the member had served continuously for six months subsequent to 7th December, 1941;

(d) time of accrued leave for which the member has been paid, but will not include any services rendered after the expiration of a period of twelve months subsequent to the cessation of hostilities.

5. Special provisions as to qualifying service.—Any period during which a member was not eligible to receive his full daily rate of pay, will not count for either general qualifying service or overseas qualifying service.

Any service in an overseas area of a special nature or short duration, such as voyage only, service or inspection dutics, will not contribute to overseas qualifying service.

6. (a) Date of entitlement is the date on which a member or other person becomes entitled to be credited in the Register of War Gratuities with war gratuity in respect of the service of the member.

(b) The date of entitlement of mobilized personnel will be the date six months after the cessation of hostilities or, in the case of a member who is serving as a member on that date, either the date on which the member's service is terminated or the date twelve months after the cessation of hostilities, whichever is carlier.

(c) The date of entitlement for members of the Permanent Naval Forces will be the date to be proclaimed by the Governor-General as the date when the general qualifying service of a member of the Permanent Naval Forces shall cease.

7. Date of Payment.—Payment of gratuity will be made at the expiration of a period of five years and six months after the cessation of hostilities, except that where the gratuity payable is less than $\pounds 10$ or where payment of the gratuity is to be made to—

- (i) the widow of a member;
- (ii) the widowed mother of an unmarried member;
- (iii) the mother of a deceased member, if totally dependent on the member at the time of death or in necessitous circumstances; or
- (iv) a member who is blind or totally and permanently incapacitated,

payment of the gratuity may be made in whole or in part at any time after the date of entitlement that the prescribed authority decides.

8. Application of War Gratuity towards purchase of home.—At the request of a member and on the recommendation of a prescribed authority, the Minister may authorize the whole or portion of the gratuity to be transferred to the War Service Homes Commissioner or other approved authority, for the purpose of being credited by way of deposit or otherwise towards the cost of the erection or purchase of a dwelling house for the member.

9. Interest on War Gratuity.—Unless paid in full within three months from the date of entitlement, a member will be credited with compound interest on his gratuity at the rate of 34 per cent. per annum.

10. War Gratuity and Interest are not liable to income tax.

11. Deceased Members.—The Act contains special provisions applicable to gratuities payable in respect of deceased members whose deaths were due to war service. These provide—

- (i) for the payment of an additional seven months' gratuity, at the rate applicable at date of death, to be added to the gratuity that would otherwise be payable;
- (ii) that, where a member's death occurred prior to the expiration of the period of twelve months immediately following the cessation of hostilities and there was any one totally dependent on the member, a minimum of three years' gratuity at the overseas rate will be payable whether or not the member had, at the date of his death, any general qualifying service.

12. Method of application.—Application for gratuity will be made on special forms which will be issued to all members at the time of their discharge.

Members of Permanent Naval Forces will make application after the date referred to in paragraph 6(c).

13. Definitions.—The following definitions are set out for guidance in respect of the foregoing:—

- "Australia" means the area (including adjacent islands) which comprises the various States of the Commonwealth, together with the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory;
- "Australian Territories" means the Territories of Papua, New Guinea and Norfolk Island;
- "Cessation of hostilities" means the date proclaimed by the Governor-General as the date from which hostilities shall be deemed to have ceased;
- "Excepted injury or illness" means a self-inflicted injury or an injury or illness which, in the opinion of the prescribed authority, was due to or arose from—
 - (a) the serious default or wilful act of a member; or
 - (b) any occurrence happening during the commission of a serious breach of discipline;
- "Member" means any male or female person who, at any time during the war, has been a member of the Commonwealth Naval, Military or Air Forces;
- "Mouth" means a period of 30 days, provided that any period which is less than 30 days will be deemed to be one month;
- "Oversea Area" means-
 - (a) prior to 7th December, 1941—any area outside Australia and outside Australian Territories; or
 - (b) on and after 7th December, 1941—any area outside Australia;
- "Prescribed authority" means a person appointed a prescribed authority in accordance with the provisions of the War Gratuity Act 1945.

"Seagoing ship " does not include a depot ship or a ship principally employed on, or in connection with, port or harbour defence. (487/202/768.)

SUPPLY OF BEER TO H.M.A. SHIPS AND NAVAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

6

The arrangements for the supply of beer to H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments have been revised and are promulgated hereunder for general information.

2. Beer is carried in Victualling Store Issuing Ships for issue, under the general directions of the respective Naval Officers-in-Charge, to H.M.A. Ships and shore bases in the New Guinea and Moluccas areas.

3. Such issues are made in complete cases and are restricted to a maximum of three bottles per head weekly for all personnel, including officers. Up to six weeks' requirements may be issued in bulk, if desired, to each ship or base which can provide satisfactory storage for that quantity, but the maximum stocks which may be maintained at any time are not to exceed two months' requirements. The foregoing represents the maximum quantity which may be supplied at any one time; it may be necessary on occasions, owing to freighting difficulties, to restrict supplies to a lower figure to ensure the equitable distribution of available stocks. In no circumstances are more than two bottles of beer to be issued to a rating on any one day.

4. Case supplies of beer from Issuing Ships are charged to seagoing ships at 9s. per dozen bottles net and to shore bases at 13s. 9d. per dozen bottles net. The issuing price of beer sold to messes in seagoing ships is 10d. per bottle, and, in shore bases, 1s. 3d. per bottle.

5. All profits resulting from bulk sales of beer from issuing ships are paid to the credit of the R.A.N. Central Canteen Fund after the completion of each voyage.

6. Subject to the approval of the Naval Board, reserves of beer may also be established on shore in the New Guinea and Moluccas areas, under the control of the respective Naval Officers-in-Charge, to supplement supplies available from Issuing Ships. Bulk issues will be made from these reserve stocks under the same conditions as apply to issues made ex Issuing Ships.

7. The Australian Army Canteens Service will continue to make supplies available to Naval personnel in advanced areas provided adequate notice of requirements is given. Such supplies will be confined to a maximum ration of three bottles per head per week.

8. In order to ensure that the available stocks of beer in the New Guinea and Moluccas areas are equitably distributed, it is important that the average consumption of beer from all sources in individual ships and shore bases does not exceed the authorized maximum allowance of three bottles per head per week. Commanding officers of ships and bases are to supervize closely all requisitions for supplies to ensure compliance with the foregoing.

9. To assist in eliminating duplication of supplies for individual messes, no orders for separate supplies are to be placed on merchants at mainland ports by ships and establishments in the New Guinea and Moluccas areas for transport in H.M.A. Ships, Store Issuing Ships, Store Carriers, or other vessels. Arrangements have been made with the Department of Trade and Customs whereby releases for such separate orders will not in future be approved. 10. Beer for messes and canteens in Naval Establishments within Australia will continue to be supplied either by the Australian Army Canteens Service or by direct purchase from brewers as hitherto. As a result of increased demands for supplies required for shipment to Service personnel serving outside Australia, it is necessary for supplies to Service messes and canteens on the mainland to be curtailed temporarily, and details of approved quotas for messes drawing supplies direct from brewers will be communicated to Naval Officers-in-Charge monthly.

11. Demands for bottled beer for export to Service personnel have imposed a heavy strain on the capacity of Australian brewers to produce bottled beer, and also on available production of bottles and other packaging materials. It is therefore essential that, wherever practicable, draught beer is used in preference to bottled beer in canteens and messes in shore establishments within Australia.

12. It is essential also that all empty bottles should be preserved to the utmost extent for return to the original source of supply. In the case of supplies made to ships and shore bases in the New Guinea and Moluccas areas empty bottles should be repacked in the original cases, together with the straw or fibre envelopes, for return to the ship or base from which supplies are next drawn, and ultimate return to the mainland. To enable this procedure to operate satisfactorily, care is to be exercised when opening cases to avoid damage and to ensure that they are entirely suitable for re-packing.

13. The percentage of emply beer bottles in cases returned by H.M.A. Ships receiving supplies from Service sources in the New Guinea and Moluccas areas has hitherto been much too low, and unless considerable improvement is effected, future supplies to these areas will necessarily be greatly prejudiced. In order to ensure the uninterrupted continuance of this amenity, Supply Officers in Store Issuing Ships and bases where stocks of beer are maintained have been instructed to restrict future issues on the basis of four full bottles for every three bottles returned. This procedure will result in the return of at least seventy-five complete cases of empty bottles for every one hundred cases issued. For the satisfactory control of returned empty bottles, ships should arrange, wherever practicable, to retain them on board until the next supply of full bottles is obtained from a Vietualling Store Issuing Ship or other issuing source.

14. The proceeds of all returns of empty bottles and cases are credited to the R.A.N. Central Canteen Fund.

15. Navy Orders 538 of 1944 and 81 of 1945 are hereby cancelled. (668/202/281.)

The Repatriation Commission is desirous of securing the services of male orderlies and female household workers at medical institutions controlled by them in the various States of the Commonwealth.

2. Applicants preferably should be persons who have served with the forces overseas. However, service with the forces in Australia only would not constitute a bar to employment.

3. Vacancies will occur in both temporary and classified (permanent) positions, and the general conditions of employment (long service, furlough, superannuation, recreation leave, sick leave, etc.) are similar to those obtaining in the Commonwealth Public Service.

4. Appointments to the classified positions and to certain temporary positions will be subject to the passing of a medical examination.

5. Orderlies' salaries at present are at the rate of £280 per annum. Opportunities may arise for the advancement of Grade I. orderly (range £292-£308 under an award).

6. Household workers are paid at £192 per annum under the Female Minimum Rates Regulations, and, where board and lodging is provided by the Department, a deduction of 17s. 6d. per week is made from salary.

7. Uniform allowance at the rate of £6 per annum is payable to classified orderlies and household workers. Temporary staff is provided with official uniforms, and all uniforms are laundered at departmental expense.

8. Hours of duty normally are 44 in a working week of 53 days, where practicable.

9. Applications should be made, in writing, to the Deputy Commissioner of Repatriation in the State in which the applicant desires engagement. Full name, age and particulars of war service should be specified in the applications.

SIGNAL TRAFFIC.

A review of signal traffic shows that the volume has actually increased since the cessation of hostilities and that the amount of traffic being handled is resulting in excessive delays to important messages.

POST-DISCHARGE MALARIA.

5

The Repatriation Commission will accept responsibility for providing any treatment necessary in respect of the first attack of malaria suffered by an ex-member of the R.A.N. after his discharge from the Navy.

2. During such treatment, the Commission will institute inquiries as to eligibility or otherwise for the treatment of any subsequent attacks of malaria.

3. On the first occasion after his discharge that an ex-member becomes ill with malaria, he should—

- (a) if resident in a capital city—report to the Repatriation Department's branch office or general hospital, either in person or by telephone, when immediate examination and treatment will be arranged;
- (b) if resident in the country—report to and request treatment from the nearest Repatriation local medical officer, who will send a report to the Repatriation Department. It will be necessary for the ex-member to identify himself by production of his discharge certificate.

4. (a) If it is not possible so to report, the ex-member should consult and request treatment from his local civilian doctor, and, provided prompt advice is sent by the doctor or the ex-member to the Repatriation Department, the Commission will assume full responsibility for the payment of medical fees, hospital fees and the cost of drugs.

(b) Arrangements for any further treatment will be notified to the ex-member by the Repatriation Commission as soon as possible.

5. Information regarding the treatment of malaria, with particular reference to ex-service personnel, has been sent by the Commonwealth Department of Health to civil medical practitioners.

6. In view of the foregoing, it is unnecessary for any member to be examined by a final medical board at the time of his discharge merely on account of a history of malaria. If the member has had an attack during his service, it will be on record in his medical history. Whether or not the member has had an attack during his service, he will be cared for by the Repatriation Commission should he develop an attack of malaria after his discharge.

MEMBERS OF THE NAVAL FORCES UNDERGOING DETENTION OR IMPRISONMENT—MAINTENANCE OF THEIR WIVES AND/ OR DEPENDANTS—REVISED PROCEDURE.

In cases where members of the Naval Forces in receipt of marriage and/or dependant allowances are detained awaiting trial and subsequently sentenced to imprisonment or detention with consequent cessation of pay, allotments are to be declared at, or reduced to, the standard

rate plus marriage allowance or dependant allowance from the pay period following the date of commencement of the waiting trial period. In all such cases, marriage and/or dependant allowances are to be credited and the full amount of the allotment is to be charged. (In the case of recovered deserters, the allowance is to be credited from the date of recovery from desertion subject to the declaration of a fortnightly allotment at a pro rata rate from that date, to be increased to the standard rate plus the allowance from the next full fortnightly pay period.) When such a member is to be retained in the Service on completion of his period of detention or imprisonment, the debit balance so accrued is to be recovered in suitable instalments upon his return to duty.

2. In cases where such members are subsequently approved to be discharged on completion of sentence, the Commonwealth will accept to a degree liability for the maintenance of their wives and/or dependants if the members are—

- (a) serving sentences in Service detention barracks whether convicted of a "civil" or "Service" offence, or
- (b) serving sentences in a civil gaol as a result of sentences by Service courts.

3. The dependants of members serving, in civil gaols, sentences imposed by civil courts for civil offences, will be the direct responsibility of the State in which they are residing, assistance being rendered at the State rate in force.

4. Action will be taken in Navy Office to advise the member's wife or dependant of the fact that he is to be discharged and of the particulars in regard to future payments of allotment.

In all such cases, payment of allotment will be continued for two pay days from the date of such notification to the allottee, at the standard rate of allotment plus marriage allowance or dependant allowance. In cases as per paragraph three above, payment of allotment will be stopped after the two pay periods and the ship in which the member's pay account is held will be advised accordingly.

In cases covered by paragraph 2 above, allotments to wives (including dependent females) with children will be reduced after the two pay periods to a rate equal to the rate of marriage and/or dependant allowances then being credited to the member (i.e., excluding the allotment from active pay). No means test will be applied to such payments.

Allotments payable to wives (including dependent females) without children and to other dependants (e.g., mothers, &c.) will be continued, after the two pay periods referred to, only where the allottee is totally dependent on the member and is unable to work.

5. Action taken in Navy Office regarding allotment payments will be communicated to H.M.A. Ships carrying such members' pay accounts. In all cases, marriage and/or dependant allowances are to be credited to the date of stoppage of payment of the allotment.

6. In those cases where reduced allotments are being paid, it will be necessary, on the release of the member from detention or imprisonment, for H.M.A. Ship carrying the member's pay account to forward Form A.S. 54 to Navy Office, stopping his allotment at the pay day prior to his discharge from the R.A.N. 559.

SALES OF STORES AND PROPERTY.

Attention is directed to Article 336 of the Naval Account Regulations and Instructions, which provides that all authorities issued from Navy Office to sell stores will contain a sales authority number and that, in the event of such a number not being quoted in the Navy Office communication, it should be immediately applied for.

2. This requirement applies to disposals and covers all types of property authorized for sale.

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TELEGRAMS TO NAVAL PERSONNEL.

Arrangements have been made with the P.M.G's Department for the transmission of all classes of telegrams to personnel serving in H.M. and H.M.A. Ships, provided that such ships are in a port in the mainland of Australia.

2. The Superintendent of Telegraphs in each State will be advised by Navy Office of all of H.M. and H.M.A. Ships which are in port in Australia and for which telegrams may be accepted. The list will be kept up to date by advice from Navy Office.

3. Messages will be delivered to the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the port where the ship is located, and it will be the responsibility of the Naval Officer-in-Charge to ensure that delivery is effected as early as practicable.



CERTIFICATES OF SERVICE.

Perusal of certificates of service received in Navy Office shows that in a large number of cases, the document itself and its enclosures have not been correctly compiled.

2. The most common omissions from certificates of service are character and efficiency assessments and notation of award of good conduct badges. In regard to the enclosures—History Sheets, Forms A.S.264, and A.S. 239A Conduct Sheet (in respect of Notes 4, 5 and 8) also frequently fail to include necessary notations. Delay often takes place in recommending the removal of "R" from the certificates of recovered deserters, and the re-advancement of ratings summarily disrated. Cases have arisen, e.g., where acting engine room artificers, 4th class, have been awarded engine room watchkeeping certificates although they are not eligible therefor.

3. It is essential that a member's certificate of service contains a complete and accurate record of his service. Commanding Officers should take immediate steps to have all certificates of service and enclosures thereto carefully inspected and corrected or brought up to date as requisite.

FURLOUGH OR EXTENDED LEAVE—MEMBERS BEING DEMOBILIZED.

Applications for payment in lieu of furlough or extended leave in accordance with Articles 211 and 212 of Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions are being received at Navy Office in respect of members who are not eligible.

2. It is therefore promulgated for general information that these awards may be made only in respect of members of the Permanent Naval Forces who would normally serve under the usual engagements in the Royal Australian Navy for at least 20 years, or who may, due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g., on account of discharge invalided), be precluded from completing that period of service. They are not made in the case of members who joined for "hostilities only" or members of Royal Australian Fleet Reserve or Royal Australian Naval Reserve. The following requirements are necessary:—

- (a) Completion of 20 years' continuous service, or
- (b) completion of at least 4 years' service where the member's discharge is due to death or invaliding, or
- (c) completion of 12 years' service where retiring age has been reached.
 - (Note.—In accordance with the principle governing the grant of furlough or extended leave, it is a condition that a member discharged on account of death or invaliding must have been eligible to complete 12 years' service before he would be discharged on reaching the retiring age. This condition was suspended in respect of members who served in the Royal Australian Navy during the period of hostilities.)

3. Completion of engagements totalling 12 or 17 years does not of itself qualify, and members who take their discharge at those stages do not receive any payment in lieu of extended leave. It should be noted that members who did not re-engage but who were retained for war service and may have completed nearly 20 years' service are not eligible for furlough unless they have reached the retiring age.

Any such members may apply to have their demobilization deferred so as to permit completion of the full qualifying period of 20 years or until retiring age is reached if such could eventuate within the period allowed for demobilization.

4. Other than those members referred to in the latter part of paragraph 3, no payment in lieu of extended leave may be made to members who are discharged under the demobilization arrangements.

DISPOSAL OF BOOKS, PRINTED MATTER, ETC., HELD IN H.M.A. SHIPS, ETC. PAYING OFF.

With reference to Navy Order 413 of 1945, the following procedure is to be observed in regard to the disposal of books, printed matter, &c., in vessels being paid off and in Shore Establishments and Services being closed down:---

Unbound orders for 1942 and 1943 are also to be destroyed.
- (c) The provisions of the above-mentioned Navy Order as regards muster and return to store of all Books of Reference and O.U. publications on permanent loan, closing of accounts, &c., are generally applicable, except that all closed B.R. and O.U. accounts are to be forwarded to the Officer-in-Charge, Naval Store Depot, Esplanade West, Port Melbourne, under cover of a letter of advice.
- (d) Unused printed forms, stationery and office requisites are to be returned to the Base Supply Officer or (Suptg.) Naval Store Officer, as appropriate, and a receipt obtained on forms A.S.331 which should be stamped "not for ledger". Only such quantities of stationery, &c., as may be required for use whilst paying off should be retained on board.

SERVICE SYSTEM CANTEENS—RENDITION OF REPORTS ON PAYING OFF.

Special attention is drawn to section A, paragraph (viii) (j) of Navy Order 469 of 1945, which requires rendition to the Director of Victualling of reports of Service System Canteens on paying off.

2. Commanding Officers of all ships and establishments in which such canteens are operating are to ensure that final canteen accounts are carefully compiled in sufficient time to permit of complete audit by representatives of the Canteen Committee for presentation to the Committee before paying off.

3. In particular, all outstanding accounts, including any liability for advances from public funds, are to be settled before paying off, and stocks and other assets realized or disposed of in accordance with the decisions of the Committee and the Commanding Officer's approval.

4. The report forwarded to the Director of Victualling is to be accompanied by a final balance sheet and a statement certified by the Commanding Officer showing the disposal of assets, including stock and cash.

5. When determining the disposal of cash assets, the Canteen Committee of each ship or establishment is requested to give consideration to making a donation to the R.A.N. Relief Fund, the purposes of which are outlined in Navy Order 264 of 1941.

6. Items of canteen equipment originally received as gifts or presentations from charitable or patriotic organizations are not to be regarded as the property of the canteen, but are to be accounted for and disposed of strictly in accordance with C.O.R., Article 396.

7. The attention of Commanding Officers and Canteen Committees is drawn to A.F.O. 4835/45, and the procedure outlined therein is to be observed as a general guide to ensure the efficient audit of canteen accounts.

8. It is emphasized that it is the direct responsibility of each Commanding Officer to exercise the closest supervision in order to ensure strict compliance with the foregoing, when, for any reason, a Service System Canteen is terminated.

PREVENTION OF FIRE IN MOTOR BOATS-WEARING OF PROTECTIVE CLOTHING.

An explosion of petrol vapour in the engine room of one of H.M.A. motor boats occurred recently, resulting in the death of two ratings from extensive burns.

2. The ratings concerned were not wearing overall protective clothing at the time and the Board of Enquiry considered that the extent of the burns would have been minimized and the life of one of them most probably saved had the orders in this regard been complied with.

Failure to do so is to be treated by Commanding Officers as a disciplinary offence.

MOTOR TRANSPORT-PREVENTION OF THEFT.

A number of cases has been reported recently of the theft and unauthorized use of Service motor vehicles which have been left unattended.

2. Action should be taken to advise all concerned that, when a vehicle is left unattended, the ignition is to be locked and the ignition keys removed from the vehicle and retained in the custody of the driver. When a vehicle is likely to be left unattended for a lengthy period, the doors and windows (when applicable) are also to be locked as an extra precaution.

3. All jeeps, which are not provided with ignition locks, are to be fitted with a locking device to ensure against theft. An extension piece of mild steel is to be bolted, spotwelded and riveted to the dashboard. This extension piece is to be drilled to take a padlock, and when the vehicle is left unattended the gear lever is to be placed in reverse and locked to the extension piece with a padlock. Copies of a sketch illustrating the method of locking the vehicles are being forwarded to all concerned.

4. Any vehicles other than jeeps, which are not provided with ignition locks, are also to be fitted with a similar locking device where practicable.

5. A report is to be forwarded to Navy Office when all vehicles concerned have been fitted with locking devices.

KIT BAGS, HAMMOCKS. ETC.—LOSSES DURING TRANSPORT— LABELLING AND MARKING.

The following signal despatched to all Shore Establishments in Australia, T.O.O. 230924, November, is included in Navy Orders for the guidance of all concerned:---

"Unaccompanied baggage delivered by Naval Establishments to Military Forwarding Organization for transmission to other Naval Establishments on mainland, in accordance with instructions contained in Navy Order 264 of 1945, will, as from 24th November, be consigned by Military Forwarding Officers direct to main railway centres only. For example, packages for *Cerberus* and *Lonsdale* to Spencer-street Railway Station instead of to Local Military Forwarding Officer as at present.

(2) Consignments to *Huon*, however, will, for shipping reasons, continue to be dealt with by the Military Forwarding Officer, Melbourne.

(3) Packages for destinations other than *Huon* are to be addressed to main railway centres, as indicated above, before delivery to the Military Forwarding Officer.

(4) Convoy Note and copy of Consignment Note will be forwarded by Military Forwarding Officers direct to Naval Establishments concerned, which are to arrange for baggage to be collected immediately after arrival.

(5) Instructions regarding signalled advices to receiving establishments of baggage delivered to Military Forwarding Officers, and subsequent confirmation by mail on Form D.80, *vide* paragraphs 8 and 10 of Navy Order 264 of 1945, are to continue to be observed. (6) It is noted that at certain centres unaccompanied baggage is, on occasions, still being despatched by Rail Transport Officers, instead of from Naval Establishments through Military Forwarding Officers, as directed in paragraph 6 of Navy Order quoted. Having in view the necessity for proper record and subsequent action in relation to claims to be rendered to Railway Departments in event of loss or damage occurring in transit, despatch of unaccompanied baggage by Rail Transport Officers is to be entirely discontinued.".

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MEDICAL STAFF-REPATRIATION COMMISSION.

In view of the increasing responsibilities of the Repatriation Commission consequent on demobilization, applications for full-time employment are invited from medical practitioners, particularly those with oversea service, for—

(a) classified (permanent) appointment;

(b) temporary appointment;

(c) limited period appointment for one or more years.

2. Appointment would be to the staff of a Repatriation General Hospital or Sanatorium, but, as a result of the arrangement whereby Repatriation patients will be admitted to separate wards in Army base hospitals, a progressively increasing number of medical officers, as well as nursing and other staff, will be employed in them. Eventually the control of these Army base hospitals will pass to the Repatriation Commission.

3. Special opportunities exist for the appointment of medical officers with experience in treatment of psychiatric disorders or of pulmonary tuberculosis. Quarters for married men are not available, and may not be even for single men.

4. There are also vacancies on the medical staffs of the Repatriation Branch Offices in the capital cities in Queensland, New South Wales and South Australia.

5. The present commencing rate for medical officers is £760 per annum, rising by annual increments of £36 to £904, and then to £952, and these rates are subject to adjustment based on the rise and fall in the cost of living. The maximum rate for Branch Office appointments is £48 higher than the institutional rate. The general conditions of the Commonwealth Public Service apply as to medical examination prior to appointment, hours of duty, sick and recreational leave, long service furlough, retiring age, contribution to superannuation, or, under certain conditions, to the Provident Fund. However, applicants must serve for a probationary period of six months if appointed to the classified staff, before confirmation of appointment is approved. Application should be made, in the first instance, to the Repatriation Commission, 314 Collins-street, Melbourne, C.1, Victoria, stating age, whether married or single, qualifications, civil and war experience, the State in which employment is desired and its nature, e.g., permanent, temporary, or for a fixed term.

6. The Commission also invites applications from specialists and consultants for part-time or visiting appointments, and those interested should give full particulars of their qualifications, experience and the State in which appointment is desired. Of course, if full-time appointment, either permanently, temporarily, or for a period, were desired, this should be stated.

ORDNANCE Q.F., 2 PDR., MARK VIII—ADJUSTMENT OF CARTRIDGE HEADSPACE.

The attention of all Ships, Armament Depots and Inspecting Officers is drawn to the necessity of maintaining the correct headspace adjustment of Q.F. 2 pdr., Mark VIII guns, in order to avoid failures due to separation of projectile and cartridge case in the feed box.

2. All guns are to have the headspace adjusted to 0.092'' by the following method:—

(a) Insert Gauge D.O.T.M. 2816, with marking applied to the base, into the chamber of the gun, taking care that it is fully home and that the large flats on the gauge are vertical.

- (b) Remove upper gib and gib locking bars.
 - Assemble the lock and extractor on the connecting rod making sure that the connecting rod nut is screwed hard home. Present the lock to the gauge cautiously and repeat, adding adjusting washers under the connecting rod nut, until there is a rubbing contact between extractor face and the gauge so that the extractors will just not rise freely.
- (c) Whenever adjusting washers are added, the connecting rod nut must always be screwed hard home before testing.
- (d) The correct adjustment is with the minimum number of washers which will transfer marking to the lock face.
- (e) The adjustment of each lock may be different for each gun mechanism.
- (f) When the upper gib is reassembled in the lock and pressed hard down in the unlocked position, the gib must not be proud of the extractor face.

3. Gauges D.O.T.M. 2816 will be issued without demand in the following proportions:--

1 to each ship equipped with 2 pdr. Mark VIII guns.

2 to each R.A.N. Armament Depot, Sydney, Fremantle and Darwin.



ECONOMY IN THE USE OF MOTOR TRANSPORT.

The attention of Commanding Officers and all other Naval personnel concerned is drawn to the necessity for closer supervision in the use of Naval Motor Transport, and for strict compliance with standing regulations and instructions in relation thereto, with the object of ensuring that the employment of such transport is at all times confined to essential Service matters.

In future, the replacement of motor vehicles or the supply of additional vehicles will only be approved when it has been conclusively established to the satisfaction of the Naval Board that essential Service requirements cannot be reasonably met by a re-allocation of vehicles already authorized for the naval base concerned.

DISPOSAL OF RELICS, PRESENTATIONS, AND TROPHIES HELD IN H.M.A. SHIPS, ETC., PAYING OFF.

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With reference to Navy Order 413 of 1945, the following procedure is to be observed in regard to the disposal of relics, presentations, and trophies in vessels being paid off and in Shore Establishments and Services being closed down :—

- (a) Relics, presentations, and trophies are to be classed as valuable items and dealt with as indicated in paragraph 4 of the abovementioned Navy Order, the provisions of which generally are applicable as regards muster and return to Store of all relics, presentations, and trophies on Permanent Loan.
- (b) Separate Return Vouchers (Forms A.S. 331) are to be raised for presentations, &c. In the case of any items the donor of which stipulated a condition at the time of presentation, e.g., to be returned on cessation of hostilities, &c., advice by memorandum of such condition is to be forwarded by the Commanding Officer of the ship, &c., to the Naval Officer-in-Charge concerned, the serial number of the relevant Form A.S. 331 being quoted therein.
- (c) On receipt at a Naval Store Depot or Base Naval Store, the presentations, &c., from each ship should be stowed separately, and every possible precaution is to be taken to ensure safe custody.
- (d) Particulars of all presentations, &c., received from each individual ship at a Naval Store Depot or Base Naval Store should be forwarded to Navy Office, including details of any conditions attached to such items, *vide* (b) above.

2. In the case of trophies and presentations in the nature of table decorations, &c., which fall more readily under the category of mess traps or victualling items than ordinary naval stores, the Naval Officer-in-Charge at the port concerned should determine in the light of storage and other facilities available whether such items should be stored at the naval or victualling storehouses. Where storage at a victualling storehouse is desirable, arrangements should be made for the items concerned to be transferred direct from the ship to the appropriate Victualling Store Officer or Supply Officer.

3. The attention of all concerned is drawn to Appendix Reference No. 3 to the R.A.N. Supplement to the Naval Storekeeping Manual B.R.4, particularly in regard to inspection as to condition before a receipt is given and care in handling, &c., to safeguard articles from damage, &c.

2. It is to be clearly understood that a clasp to a R.A.F.R. Medal will only be awarded to applicants who have served or are serving as mobilised reservists or on engagements in respect of which approval has been given for the service to reckon for reserve benefits.

3. Rosettes to be worn on the ribbon of the Medal when worn without the Medal will be issued at the same time as the clasp.

4. This Order has retrospective effect, and applications for the award of clasps may be made in manuscript or on Form A.S. 218, endorsed "CLASP ONLY" and should be forwarded to the Secretary, Naval Board, Melbourne, by the Commanding Officer of the ships and establishments in which the men are serving, accompanied by a True Copy of Service Certificate.

DISCHARGE FROM THE R.A.N. ON ACCOUNT OF PHYSICAL UNFITNESS FOR SERVICE.

The conditions relating to the discharge of members of the R.A.N. on account of physical unfitness have been reviewed and are shown hereunder. This procedure is apart from that applicable to demobilisation through the organisation set up for that purpose and in regard to which instructions have been issued separately.

2. In regard to date of discharge from the R.A.N .---

- (a) A member on full time duty who, following examination by a Medical Board of Survey, is, in the opinion of the Naval Board, unfit for further service will, subject to the provisions of sub-paragraphs (b), (c), (d), (g), and (h) hereof, be discharged from the Service—
 - (i) When he is no longer, at the time, in need of further active medical treatment as an in-patient and is capable of—
 - (a) resuming his pre-enlistment occupation; or
 - (β) following some other occupation; or
 - (γ) being trained for some skilled occupation; or
 - (ii) when the period of his treatment in a Service hospital or convalescent depot in Australia has totalled six months, whichever is the earlier.
- (b) Where a medical board considers that the member's recovery or rehabilitation into civil life may be furthered by retention in a Service hospital or convalescent depot for a further period or periods not exceeding a total extension of six months, recommendation may be made to the Naval Board that the member's discharge be postponed accordingly.

- (c) In special cases, such as those with severe amputation, or requiring special bone grafting, facio-maxillary or plastic surgery treatment, the extension referred to in sub-paragraph (b) may be increased by the Naval Board to twelve months if such extension will further the member's recovery or rehabilitation into civil life.
- (d) A member suffering from an incurable malignant disease whose expectation of life is a matter of months, may, subject to the Naval Board's approval, be retained in a Service hospital and his discharge postponed accordingly for as long as he is in need of active medical treatment up to twelve months after the expiration of the period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) (ii), provided that a further extension or extensions may be granted if necessary with the special approval of the Naval Board.
- (e) In cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, whether attributable to war service or not, the time of discharge will be governed by sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) above, and for the purposes of these sub-paragraphs, treatment in a repatriation or other civil institution will be deemed to be treatment in a service hospital or convalescent depot in Australia.
- (f) In cases of incurable or unmanageable mental disease, the provisions of sub-paragraph (e) will apply.
- (g) Subject to sub-paragraphs (d), (e), and (f) above, a member who is unfit for further service as a result of a pre-enlistment disability not aggravated by service or of chronic disease or constitutional inadequacy not related to service is—
 - (i) If no longer in need of immediate active medical treatment and unsuitable for medical rehabilitation to be discharged with Naval Board approval to the shore as soon as practicable, notwithstanding that the period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) (ii) has not elapsed.
 - (ii) Whilst in need of immediate active medical treatment or suitable for medical rehabilitation, to be retained, with Naval Board approval, until the period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) (ii) has elapsed, and then discharged, notwithstanding the provision of subparagraph (b) hereof.
- (h) In amputation cases, a member may be retained in the R.A.N. until an artificial limb has been supplied and he has been instructed in its use, provided that the maximum period of his retention shall not exceed that provided for under subparagraph (b) or in cases to which sub-paragraph (c) applies, the period provided for under that sub-paragraph. (See Navy Order 63 of 1942 re supply of artificial limbs.)

3. Arrangements are to be mude for the attendance of a medical officer of the Repatriation Commission at invaliding surveys and the reason for recommending discharge or further treatment should be clearly stated on Form A.M. 252z. Such surveys should be held at convenient periods, but not less frequently than once a month if cases are awaiting decision.

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With reference to C.O.R., Articles 557 (1) and 558 (6), as amended by Navy Order 280 of 1942, prescribing that survey of cases should be held after a period of 151 days' continuous treatment, where a reasonable probability of ultimate fitness for return to duty exists, it will not be necessary for the Repatriation Commission to be represented at such surveys.

4. The opinion of the medical officer of the Repatriation Department, as to the eligibility of the member for war pension, should be noted at the foot of page 4 of Form A.M. 252z.

5. Discharge from the R.A.N. will take place as a rule, as soon as practicable after the date on which all papers relating to the case are forwarded to the Repatriation Commission fromNavy Office. In the interim, necessary action in connection with rehabilitation to civil life should be taken. If the case is not one for reference to the Repatriation Commission, discharge will take place as soon as possible after the date of survey, on completion of rehabilitation procedure, subject to recall in the event of Naval Board approval to discharge not being given in any special case. Advice regarding actual date of discharge is to be forwarded to Navy Office in all cases, as soon as it is known. Payment in lieu of re-establishment leave is to be made on discharge.

6. For the information of medical officers, the following are the requirements necessary to establish a diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis :----

- (a) The tubercle bacillus to be found on at least two occasions in sputum which has been expectorated in the presence of a medical officer or nursing sister or responsible sick berth rating, or in the gastric contents or pleural fluid; or
- (b) The diagnosis to be agreed upon by a medical representative of the Repatriation Commission, who should be afforded the opportunity of seeing the case, attending the Board or examining the clinical records before the Board is held.
- 7. Provision of medical treatment and rehabilitation-
 - (a) Prior to discharge from the R.A.N., medical treatment and rehabilitation will be provided by the Navy Department, except in the case of patients suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis or incurable or unmanageable mental disease, who should be transferred to a Repatriation or other civil institution, as appropriate, as soon as practicable.
 - (b) After discharge from the R.A.N., treatment will be provided as follows :---
 - (i) Members entitled to Repatriation pensions-

Normally by the Repatriation Commission, except that, in order to meet special circumstances, the provision of treatment may be a matter of arrangement between this Department and the Repatriation Commission.

(ii) Members not entitled to Repatriation pensions-

By civil medical institutions, provided that, pending such accomodation being available, treatment may be continued in a Service hospital. 8. Before any member who is an inmate of a Service hospital and who does not become a Repatriation responsibility is discharged, arrangements are to be made for the continuation of any nccessary treatment in a civil hospital as an in-patient or an out-patient, according to the requirements of the case. The cost of such treatment is not a liability of the Commonwealth beyond date of discharge from the Navy.

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9. The following action is to be taken in respect of members surveyed for invaliding :---

(a) Non-Repatriation Cases—

- (i) When an unqualified recommendation of discharge "P.U.N.S." or "B.N.P.S." is made by the Medical Board of Survey and where the member concerned no longer needs active medical treatment and can be discharged without detriment to health, approval is given for such member to be discharged to home port, action then being taken in accordance with paragraph 5 above,
- (ii) When the recommendation of the Board of Survey is qualified, i.e., in cases where a clear recommendation of discharge "P.U.N.S." or "B.N.P.S." is not given, or when any doubt as to ultimate disposal exists, the question of whether discharge is to take place or not will be decided by Navy Office, and a signal made accordingly. Pending receipt of this signal, members coming within this category are to be retained.

The ship or establishment in which the member is surveyed is to bear the ledger account for the period of travelling involved, making all necessary adjustments, and finally close the account and render Form A.S. 1031z, &c., to the Director of Navy Accounts. Advice of the disposal of the member concerned is to be forwarded immediately to Navy Office, the Commodore Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depot, and the Naval Officer-in-Charge of the home port.

(b) Repatriation Cases-

A member who the Board of Survey (including a Repatriation Medical Officer) considers should be referred to the Repatriation Department, should be sent to home port, if fit to travel, to await Naval Board decision regarding his or her discharge, usual rehabilitation procedure being followed in the meantime.

10. A member with no disability or whose degree of civil disability is negligible should be dealt with in accordance with the procedure set forth in sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph 9 above, even though he is recommended for reference to Repatriation Department in respect of treatment.

11. To facilitate action in Navy Office, a signal is to be sent after survey for invaliding stating the names and official numbers of members surveyed who have been considered Repatriation cases and who have claims for pension in respect of a degree of civil disability.

R.A.N. EDUCATION SERVICE : RECONSTRUCTION TRAINING SCHEME.

Under the Reconstruction Training Scheme, instruction by correspondence in a wide range of subjects is now available through Universities, Technical Colleges, State Education Authorities, and some other institutions. The subjects at present available are listed in an Appendix to this Order and amendments to this Appendix will be promulgated as new courses are added.

2. Education Officers have been appointed to the principal bases and to cruisers and should be consulted in regard to any difficulties and enquiries arising in connection with the Reconstruction Training Scheme and also in regard to other facilities available through the R.A.N. Education Service.

3. In ships and establishments in which an Education Officer is not borne, the Commanding Officer is to detail an Acting Education Officer who is to accept applications for correspondence courses and carry out liaison duties with the Base Education Officers.

4. Procedure of Enrolment.—All applicants for instruction must complete a General Information Form in duplicate and forward both original and duplicate copies of this form to the Director of Education and Vocational Training, Navy Office, Melbourne, through their Commanding Officer.

5. When possible, General Information Forms should, before being forwarded, be referred to the Base Education Officer who is to check the course desired and the eligibility of the applicant. When eligibility has been checked, an Enrolment Form should be completed and forwarded together with the General Information Form.

6. Enrolment Forms together with the Authority to Debit Ledger Account with Fee Deposit are to be completed in duplicate, the Education Officer verifying the fact that the correct name of the subject or subjects as shown in the Appendix to this Order is inserted in the space provided, the correct stage indicated, and the correct figure inserted in the space for amount to be charged in Ship's Ledger. Both copies of the form are to be signed and approved as indicated, the duplicate copy being retained in the ship or establishment for future reference and the original forwarded to the Director of Education and Vocational Training, Navy Office, Melbourne.

7. The amount shown in the Authority to Debit Ledger Account with Fee Deposit is to be estimated on the pro rata basis of 15s. for each individual subject. Applications for more than two subjects will not be accepted. Henceforward the only method of payment of fee deposit is through the Ledger Account, and cash remittances should not be forwarded.

8. When an applicant is uncertain as to what course to take up, or when he desires to do a course that is not listed in the Appendix to this Order, the General Information Form only is to be completed and an Enrolment Form is not to be forwarded until advice of approval of enrolment has been received from the Director of Education and Vocational Training. 9. In the main, one subject is sufficient to keep a Service student fully occupied, and unless there are definite reasons to the contrary, his interests will be best served by his being enrolled for one subject only. Candidates for university and public examinations may be enrolled for two subjects. In the case of the Sydney Technical College, it is desirable for some subjects to be studied concurrently. Subjects so affected are bracketed together. Although, in the main, the subjects listed hereunder are available to members of the Royal Australian Navy from all States, members are advised to enrol through their home State when possible.

10. Procedure for debiting Pay Account.—As soon as a member has been enrolled, a Form of Advice will be sent to his Commanding Officer. On receipt of this advice, the amount involved is to be charged against the pay account of the member in accordance with the Authority given in the Order, and the Director of Navy Accounts furnished, as early as possible, with a reference to recovery. The Fee Deposits will then be paid from Navy Office direct to the School concerned. Where the accounts of the Ship in which the member is borne and to which advice of enrolment is sent are kept elsewhere, the advice should be forwarded immediately to the Accountant Officer concerned for action.

11. On the satisfactory completion of each subject, the fee deposit paid will be refunded to the member through his ledger account on advice from Navy Office. In the event of his desiring to enrol for a further subject or subjects, the same procedure should be followed as for an initial enrolment.

12. This Order supersedes Navy Order 524 of 1944, which is hereby cancelled.

13. Supply of Handbooks, Forms, Equipment, and Text Books.—A "Handbook for Education Officers" giving details of the courses available through the Sydney Technical College and Melbourne Technical College has been distributed to all ships. Other courses have been notified in circulars issued by the Director of Education and Vocational Training. Supplies of General Information Forms and copies of the above Handbook can be obtained on request either from the Base Education Officer or from the Director of Education and Vocational Training at Navy Office.

14. Requests for text books should be made on an Order Form as laid down in Navy Order 287 of 1944. A text book order (*vide* Navy Order 287 of 1944) should be forwarded together with the Enrolment Form by members who wish to do Leaving Certificate and Intermediate subjects. In the case of Technical College subjects, when text books are required the approximate price is shown in the Handbook, and in respect of these subjects a text book order should be forwarded. Personnel may arrange for the purchase of books other than text books through the Services Book Supply Depot, Bent-street, Sydney, but it must be clearly understood that the provisions of Navy Order 287 of 1944 do not apply in this case and personnel will be required to make their own arrangements for forwarding the money.

15. Enquiries about other facilities that are available through the R.A.N. Education Service such as box libraries, maps, gramophone records, documentary films and sets of tools for pre-vocational training centres, should be made either through the Base Education Officer, or direct to the Director of Educational and Vocational Training.

16. Class Instruction .--- Where a candidate enrols at a University, Technical College, or other approved institution and attends classes in subjects which are covered by correspondence courses, provision has been made by the Department of Post-War Reconstruction for a refund of fees paid, up to a maximum of £5 10s. per year. Applicants desiring to enrol for class instruction should obtain the approval of their Commanding Officer and arrange their own enrolment in the same way as does a civilian. After enrolment, a General Information Form should be completed, endorsed "Enrolment for Class Tuition Effected," and forwarded to the Director of Education and Vocational Training. On the completion of the course of instruction, application for a refund of fees should be made through the Commanding Officer to the Director of Education and Vocational Training, who will, after investigating the eligibility of the applicant, take any necessary steps to have this refund effected.

17. Matriculation .- The various universities of the Commonwealth have agreed to give special consideration to Service personnel who apply for matriculation. Instead of being required to pass in all the prescribed subjects at one sitting, a member of the Services is allowed to present himself for examination in one or more subjects at a time. Subjects passed at a previous Matriculation or Leaving Certificate examination may, under some circumstances, be taken into consideration.

18. Examinations.-Arrangements have been made for the supervision of university and other examinations under Service conditions. Personnel who are doing correspondence courses and who are eligible for examination will be notified and will be required to lodge an application with the Director of Education and Vocational Training not less than two months before the date of the proposed examination.

19. Examination papers will be forwarded through the Director of Education and Vocational Training to the Commanding Officer of the member with all necessary instructions. The completed examination papers will be properly sealed and returned in a confidential package to the Director of Education and Vocational Training at Navy Office.

20. When Service conditions do not permit a member to sit for examination at the exact time and date prescribed, he may sit at the first convenient opportunity within fourteen days of the prescribed date, provided his worked papers are accompanied by an adequate explanation on the part of his Commanding Officer, and a statutory declaration on his own part that he had no knowledge of the content of the papers at the time of his entry into the examination room.

21. As far as the requirements of the Service permit, Commanding Officers are to make provision for the proper conduct and supervision of examinations. It may sometimes be found convenient to land candidates who are serving in small ships so that suitable arrangements for the supervision of their examination may be made by the Base Education Officer.

22. A member doing any subject under the R.A.N. Education Scheme is entitled to complete that subject when demobilized. It is emphasized however that, if that subject forms part of a course, there is no guarantee that he will be able to obtain financial assistance to study further subjects of that course after discharge. The R.A.N. Education Service has no authority to say what course (if any) a member may do when demobilized. This is decided by the Regional Committee of the Central Reconstruction Training Committee when a demobilized member makes his application.


