



COMMANDING OFFICER'S REPORT

2012 has indeed been a busy and full year for HMAS Creswell.

From a training perspective large numbers of trainees have continued to pass through *Creswell*. While the Passing Out Parades for New Entry Officers' Courses 46 and 47 were the most notable, visible and ceremonial culmination points for training at *Creswell* it is important to note that by far, much greater numbers of officers and sailors pass through *Creswell* on leadership, management and promotion courses.

These courses have kept *Creswell* staff and ship's company very busy this year. In fact at times this year we have almost run out of accommodation for trainees and visiting staff and lecturers. As usual, the RAN SSSS has also run at full pace and the set to work of the dynamic leak stop training unit at the School has added a valuable state of the art facility to RAN training.

However, as impressive as the volume of work and training completed is, by far more important is the quality of the delivered training. In all areas 2012 has been a year where courses have been reviewed, improved and tightened to ensure that all initial, leadership and management training is current, effective and efficient. To highlight a few examples, the Lieutenant Commanders' Promotion Course has now been implemented, a proposal to rework the Junior Officers' Leadership Course has been prepared, the Lateral Entry Programme has been fully reworked, and the Sailors' Leadership and Management continuum promotion courses have continually been quality controlled and reviewed. Of particular note the New Entry Officers' Course practical leadership exercises have been thoroughly redesigned to ensure they more effectively test the leadership skills, teamwork and resilience of officer trainees in a more realistic maritime context and exercise setting. These improvements have all been well received by trainees and staff alike.

Away from training *Creswell* has continued to provide excellent support to the Fleet. Support for ships, submarines and aircraft. The Beecroft Weapons Range is an important RAN training facility, and it has unfailingly supported Naval Gunfire Support firings and many other exercises throughout 2012. The Port Services Section has certainly been busy meeting the needs of visiting and exercising ships. This is an often little noticed activity, but I can assure that it is vital for RAN training and that *Creswell* Command notices and acknowledges the unstinting efforts of all staff to deliver port services smoothly and without fuss.

It has also been quite noticeable that *Creswell* is now a venue of choice for senior Defence conferences and visits. It is not only the great facilities that Geelong House can offer, the great accommodation and Messes or the natural beauty that is sought out and highly appreciated; but it is mostly the service, support and friendliness of all *Creswell* staff and ship's company that is personally highlighted to me after each visit.

Like any year, 2012 saw many personnel depart and new personnel post in. This will be particularly the case over the upcoming reduced activity period. I would like to thank everyone departing Creswell for your support and efforts in delivering and improving Creswell's mission. I hope this year's Creswell Magazine goes some way to capture all that has been done and the unrelenting effort of those working in Creswell in 2012.

WHAT HAVE WE ACHIEVED?

We have had a number of initiatives start and progress this year. The federal budget has had an impact on our own budget, and only exacerbated the continuing uncertainty for the civilian members of *Creswell*. Yet, I am amazed at the very positive attitude that permeates across the base. I spoke in last year's article about the camaraderie of *Creswell*, and I still think that is our greatest strength.





As I said before, we have trained and influenced nearly 2500 Officers, Senior Sailors and Junior Sailors across four geographically separate locations – RAN Recruit School, Sailor's Leadership and Management Faculty (SLMF) – East and SLMF-West. Nearly 1000 of those were trained here at the RANC! With what we have, we do an impressive job, and we should be very proud of that – because each and every one of us, from the instructors to the developers and planners behind the scenes, has made that possible – and we couldn't have achieved it without each other. We mustn't forget our contractors who work behind the scenes in helping us do what we do either. They have become just as much a part of the *Creswell* family as the uniformed and civilian staff.

A personal first for me was reopening a lighthouse - the Point Perpendicular Lighthouse. Finished in 1899, it is a stunning building that had nearly a century of service before it was replaced in 1993 with the solar powered light. It was built completely from local materials and is one of the only lighthouses that belong to Navy, being given back to us in 1995 by the Australian Maritime Safety Authority. Navy completely refurbished the lighthouse in 2012 and it was relit for the International Lighthouse and Lightship weekend in September. If you've never had the chance to see it up close, take the family for a picnic in the grounds — it is spectacular for the views alone.



OFFICER INITIAL TRAINING FACULTY (OITF) REPORT

The Officer Initial Training Faculty (OITF) had a challenging but successful 2012, ensuring a total of 264 officers graduated from 11 courses.

In January, LEUT Aaron Norley joined as Flinders Divisional Officer for New Entry Officers' Course (NEOC) 46. During the course, LEUT Amanda Folkes, who had been acting as Head Officer Initial Training Faculty (H-OITF) since January, was replaced by LCDR Rod Howard, who had just completed a deployment to Afghanistan.

NEOC 46 undertook sea training on HMAS *Tobruk* and HMAS *Newcastle* during Exercise *Ocean Shield* off Newcastle and visited HMAS *Cerberus* for weapons training. The course passing out parade was reviewed by Fleet Commander, Rear Admiral Tim Barrett, AM, CSC, RAN.

In July, NEOC 47 began with 72 trainees. The course also had the opportunity to join HMAS *Tobruk* for sea training, participating in amphibious Exercise *Sea Lion* off Townsville and transiting with the ship on her way to Exercise *Croix du Sud* off New Caledonia. NEOC 47 graduated 62 officers in a passing out parade that was reviewed by Chief of Defence Force, General David Hurley, AC, DSC.

Exercise *Matapan*, the final leadership assessment for NEOC, was given an overhaul in 2012, turning *Creswell* into a disaster zone complete with evolutions requiring liaison with the Australian Federal Police, Booderee National Park, the Fleet Air Arm and Serco-Sodexho Fire Services. Trainees were challenged to take charge of their peers in numerous and challenging leadership serials over five days.

The Reserve Cell was also busy, training 50 Reserve Officers in various stages of the Reserve Entry Officers' Course. Other courses conducted throughout the year were the Warrant Officer and Senior Sailor Entry Officers' Course (WOSSEOC), and two Undergraduate Entry Officers' Courses (UEOC).

At the end of the year we said farewell to three Divisional Officers, LEUTs Samuel Andrew, Matthew Cooke and Daniel Hodgkinson and welcomed LCDR Chloe Wootten and LEUT Shane Kennedy to the ranks as staff for 2013.





Staff will now have the opportunity to take a well deserved break at the end of 2012 and prepare to attack 2013 with the same gusto and professionalism. BRING IT ON.


TA-ITLM COURSE PLANNING REPORT

Naval Police Coxswain's (NPC) primary roles at HMAS *Creswell* are Garrison Policing, Discipline, Minor Criminal Investigation, Physical/Personal Security Officer duties and Service Administrations.

*Creswell** NPC's statistics for 2012 were as follows:

- · 350 Prohibited Substance Tests:
- · 2286 Alcohol breath tests conducted and
- · 209 Official Passports procured.

The primary functions of NPCs are the maintenance of Discipline and the conduct of investigations. This is supplemented for more serious offences through the use of Australian Defence Force Investigative Service, Australian Federal Police and NSW State Police.

Our administrative duties have included the procurement of official passports of New Entry officers and the ongoing renewal of ship's company passports. NPC staff have also conducted lectures for staff, students and trainees which have included induction training, security awareness, DFDA, members leave/travel categorisation and Crime Scene Preservation briefs.

One of the non core NPC tasks is to assist and coordinate the Ship's company with traffic and parking management/control for a number of high profile events during the year including the New Entry Officer Courses' graduation week, the ANZAC dawn service and VIP visits.

During 2012, the NPC office has been subjected to Audits from various organisations. These audits have included a Protective

Security Assessment and a Service Police Technical Standard Inspection with 'standard achieved' during both audits - only minor deficiencies identified. Throughout the year NPC staff have also assisted with OP reliefs onboard HMAS Betano and HMAS Success.

The closure of HMAS Albatross Library was significant in 2012. Virtual Library Services includes the Digital Media Library Service, Overdrive. This library service offers electronic library items exclusively for downloads onto personal electronic devices, home computers, smart phones, and iPods or eBook readers. Creswell may look like the swan gliding effortlessly across the water, but in 2012, Defence Support was heavily involved in the activity underneath the surface, making things happen. Every lawn mowed, book borrowed, travel request submitted, had a role for Defence Support to play to assist Navy in continuing to deliver quality outcomes at Creswell.

The major redevelopments base-wide were completed in 2011, but 2012 was when the facilities came into full use. The gymnasium, Griffiths House and Geelong House became assets that helped Creswell once again forge a reputation as one of the premier ADF establishments.

Over the course of the year, 127 visits from external groups were supported, ranging from Camp Quality to the Austin A40 club

In total, over 170,000 meals were served for people in 408 cabins that were used almost 70,000 times.

PORT SERVICES REPORT

HMAS Creswell waterfront has been employed for trials of new equipment, training and supporting the Fleet in 2012. Port Services is also the first point of call for visiting agencies. Parachute Training School (PTS), Clearance Diving Team 1 (CDT1), MGDST and THALES to name a few have all been assisted by the Port Services team over the year. The regular high tempo of operations and support has kept the team busy and required a large amount of organisation, and on occasion, diplomatic skills.

Within the core roles of providing support to the Fleet and working closely with DMS, the following services have also been regularly provided over the year: Crane support up to 25 Tonnes and forklift operations up to 2.5 tonnes. Port Services have also provided 45,000 litres of fuel over the last 12 months to local and visiting units.

Port Services is also the point of contact for the latest in the Fleet Training Program (FTP), which we update immediately upon receipt of changes. Possible conflicts are quickly resolved to ensure maximum efficiency and support to the Fleet. The latest version of the FTP is emailed daily to the Command regulator to be utilised by the Officer of the Day.

The Port Services team has provided the following services/support over the last three months:

- a. Crane drivers, Dogmen and forklift drivers to AUSCDT1 who have been in the area recovering diodes/mines from the Jervis Bay province.
- b. Crane support, fuel, a berthing plan and 24 hour support to Dt. Seal.
- c. Fuel, a berthing plan, Shark Risk Profile briefs.
- d. A safety boat and Shark Risk Profile brief to adventure training teams and NEOCs carrying out continuation training in the bay.

- e. Storage of inert mine shapes prior to laying.
- f. The bulk storage of fuel.
- g. Support for urgent URDEF rectification through stores delivery.
- h. Support of MEDEVACs.
- Monitoring of recreational boat (South wind, Explorer and Alexander, Friendship) endorsements and bookings, private boat access to the waterfront boat ramp and out of hours activities.

After a busy 2012, we have ensured a safe, but exciting work environment.

The team are well motivated and looking forward to supporting the Fleet and other external units into 2013.

PRACTICAL LEADERSHIP TRAINING REPORT

In relation to practical leadership training, 2012 was a change in emphasis from previous years. As part of an ongoing review to make our training more 'marinised', we looked to replicate challenges we face out on the high seas or tri service operations. As such, we moved to focus on areas such as moral courage, resilience, courage, honesty and professionalism in order to provide more mental and physical challenges within our practical leadership exercises. Our assessment criteria reflect our values and our theoretical training, which allows us to coach and inform our trainees more clearly on the expectations and standards we wish to see them achieve.

NEOC 46 and 47 rose to the challenge and by Exercise *Matapan* (at the end of their training) we saw them dealing with issues surrounding the fire service, the AFP, boat work, a whole base lockdown and the use of weapons as part of their rules of engagement. Staff involvement has been reduced to allow NEOs to come to their own solutions more readily. This approach allows for fairer and more detailed development throughout the six months, that each group is with us. Realism in training in order to highlight the potential challenges they may face in their career has produced some strong feedback from trainees, which allows us to modify our work to suit their ways of understanding.

Exercise Dardanelles saw the teams bond as Divisions for the first time under arduous circumstances with the sea becoming a dominant theme. When challenged the trainees physically come together and offer mutual support and motivation, highlighting the ethos of life at sea where we are all of one company. NEOs feel a huge sense of achievement after Dardanelles as during the process, they will have met many of their previous conceptions of their ability and moved through them, increasing both their self esteem and confidence.

Having built the teams, Exercise *Sunda Strait* allows us to then build their decision making and resource management skills through clear communication, and starts the visual assessment and development process heading towards graduation. Scenarios allow them to solve physical conundrums that need whole team participation and leave no team member without a role. This replicates ships' teams and allows trainees to understand the 'skills of communication', aided by in-depth debriefs by staff, both during and after the exercise.

Exercise Coral Sea requires teams to put together a brief on the Battle of Coral Sea and the lessons learned in relation to teamwork, communication and leadership. Linking our training back to these key historical events allows trainees to see that many of the same principles still apply today and skills such as initiative, understanding your people and the ability to diagnose and drive through a solution are skills demanded of every officer. The exercise itself is for the individual leader to guide a team and, whilst largely containing bespoke 'stands,' gives them more confidence, allowing for a detailed one to one debrief, setting them up for success or further development if required. Post exercise classroom sessions focus on lessons learned and lead up to the final leadership exercise and beyond.

The climax of practical leadership training is Exercise *Matapan*. This exercise is a culmination of the practical training received to date by the NEOs. As such they conduct a simulated 'work up' to proceed on a mission to assist civil authorities for disaster relief and restoration of order. This simulation is related to relief of a town called Com, in the Luatem district of Timor Leste. This town has similar dimensions to HMAS *CRESWELL* and as such it made the ideal training ground, considering its access to the sea and land resources. Training opportunities reflected protection of local

people and resources as well as assistance to local authorities in support and repair operations. There was live active liaison with fire, police, rotary wing, ranger, medical and other military forces during the serials which ran for five days, interacting with approximately 26 role players. A particular thank you to Ross Masterson and Steve Szabo for their commitments in fire brigade and AFP support throughout.

The exercise draws together in one holistic package a clear, indepth understanding of the leadership potential of the trainees across a range of environments and scenarios. Closely relating activities to future needs or tasking has been the cornerstone of the PLT team and as one trainee stated afterwards "I feel that keeping a positive attitude and behaviour, any challenge could be conquered". Our role is have NEOs internalise reactions to situations in a pragmatic, efficient and well communicated fashion that would not only inspire others but instil confidence in them as leaders.

This contextualisation, through either critical self reflection in the field or classroom sessions, is the key objective of all of our training. I would like therefore to acknowledge the hard work and diligence of all OITF staff and supporting RANC assessors in that process. Thank you to all staff, military and civilian, who contributed to Leadership Training at HMAS CRESWELL in 2012. Without your support the activities could not take place and we could not provide the best possible training to all New Entry and Reserve Entry personnel.

RAN SCHOOL OF SURVIVABILITY & SHIP SAFETY REPORT

Throughout 2012 the Royal Australian Navy School of Survivability and Ship Safety (RANSSSS) has continued with the enormous task of training members of the RAN in the skills of Combat Survivability (CS).

To say the RANSSSS have had another busy year would be an understatement. With the growing need and demand for Advanced CS training along with all the other elements of Damage Control, 2012 has been one of the busiest years for the school in recent history. Training Facility East (TF-E) has trained over 3500 personnel in all forms of CS this year including Pre Workup Training (PWT).

2012 has also been the second year of operation for the refurbished TF-E following an \$18 million redevelopment which was completed in January 2011. During this year students have been exposed to world class facilities with the Dynamic Leak Stop and Repair Unit and the diesel fired Advanced Fire Fighting Unit, both of which are computer controlled from the central Simulator Control Room. These two units in particular, provide students with the, 'as close to real' scenarios, that are possible to achieve within a safe training environment.

2012 has also seen the refurbishment of the Static Leak Stop and Repair Unit which gives TF-E redundancy for training when the Dynamic Unit needs to be shut down for maintenance. Owing to its configuration it also gives students some complex shoring activities that differ from the Dynamic Unit. The Helo Fire Fighting Unit has also been refurbished and is now providing ships' flight deck teams the opportunity to experience a real fire during PWT.

Through all the changes that have occurred in 2012 the RANSSSS continues to consistently perform to the highest standards and live up to its motto.

NAVY RESERVE INITIAL ENTRY TRAINING TEAM (NRIETT) REPORT

The year 2012 has been a busy and productive time for the team at NRIETT. Throughout the year, 34 Reserve Officers successfully completed their Reserve Entry Officer Course training. Through the positive management of Navy Reserve training, we have continued to reduce the Reserve training liability of Officers under training, to 50.

The Phase 1 (Residential) course members continue to be known as 'Hunter Division' - named for Vice Admiral John Hunter, the second Governor of New South Wales. The Division has worked well together and appreciated their refined, packed program which kept them busy throughout the days and well into the evenings with instruction and task book activities. Leadership exercises, *Sunda Strait* and *Coral Sea*, were conducted as overnight field exercises and the feedback from course members indicated that they not only appreciated the insight that these evolutions gave them into their own capabilities, but that they considered these exercises the highlight of the course.

Two Phase 1 courses were conducted in 2012 with a total of 27 trainees successfully completing the arduous training. In 2013 there are three Phase 1 courses programmed. One will be a specifically designed course for a small unique group of Reserve Officers, early in the year.

Phase 2 (Service Knowledge) conducted as a distance learning course, assessed and managed by NRIETT, saw 31 graduate at the time of writing this article. More completed assessment tasks are expected over the Reduced Activity Period.

Phase 3 courses (Sea Prerequisite) continue to be managed by NRIETT with 23 Officers completing their training in 2012. Two Phase 3 courses are planned for 2013.

Phase 4 courses (Sea Training Deployment) saw 30 Officers complete this phase of their training in 2012. Competition for Sea

Training Bunks has become tight with the bunk availability shrinking annually. This has meant that there has been disappointment when opportunities have been lost at the last moment.

The Reserve officers in 2012 came from a wide variety of backgrounds – from ex-Army and RAAF officers, soldiers and sailors, to doctors, lawyers, journalists, maritime trade specialists, psychologists, nurses, medical specialists, chaplains and a

meteorologist. Their ages range from the mid 20s to late 50s – as diverse as their experience. They are united by a strong desire to serve and to give something back to their country.

In 2012 the NRIETT staff (LCDR A Newman - H-NRIETT, WO R. McLaurin - 2IC NRIETT, CPO R Timms - Chief Instructor and LS M Webb - Office Manager) continued to provide a dedicated service to Reserve trainees and RANC.
